2	CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Okay, can I
3	have your attention, please. Good afternoon. I'm
4	James Vacca, and I'm Chairman of the Committee on
5	Transportation. And today we're here to vote on
6	Intro 591, a bill that will make it easier for
7	customers of intercity busses to be informed of
8	passenger safety ratings. I want to thank Council
9	Member Chin for introducing this bill, along with
10	myself. And before I begin, let me introduce the
11	Members that have joined us today: Council Member
12	James Van BraJimmy Van Bramer, Jessica Lappin,
13	Eric Ulrich, Margaret Chin, Gale Brewer, Peter
14	Koo, myself, Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez,
15	Council Member Debbie Rose. This bill would
16	require the New York City Department of
17	Transportation to post a link to and information
18	about passenger carrier safety. It is common
19	sense legislation with the intent of making every
20	intercity bus passenger more knowledgeable about
21	the safety rating of the bus company they plan to
22	patronize. New Yorkers want to know what they are
23	getting into when they get onto a bus. No riders
24	of any private bus company should have to feel
25	like they are putting their lives on the line

every time they want to use these busses to travel outside of our city. This Committee wants all of these passengers to have some, as much information available to them as possible before they step foot on such a bus. This bill is one step further beyond action the Council has taken in the past to increase the safety of passengers who use intercity busses. In 2011, following a string of horrific incidents involving intercity busses, the Council adopted State Legislative Resolution No. 1 requesting the New York State Legislature to give the City the authority to monitor and regulate the intercity bus industry. In addition, the Council passed Resolution 892, which called on the federal government to pass the Motor Coach Enhanced Safety Act of 2011, and Resolution No. 1000 which called on the State Legislature to pass legislation requirement bus drivers to undergo background checks. To-date, the Motor Coach Enhanced Safety Act of 2011 has been enacted and Governor Cuomo signed into law Chapter 410, giving the City the power to monitor and regulate the intercity bus industry. This law took effect in November and authorized the City to establish rules for a

permit system for intercity busses that pick and
drop off passengers within New York City, and to
designate specific pickup and drop off locations
for these busses. Council Member Chin and I,
along with Speaker Quinn, have urged the
Department of Transportation to promulgate these
important rules relating to the creation of this
permit system. The proposed rules have been
released for comment and will have a hearing next
month. We look forward to their enactment. With
that, do any of my colleagues wish to be heard
before we vote? Council Member Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you,
Chair Vacca. First, I wanted to thank you for
sponsoring this bill with me, and also the
Committee Counsel, Lyle Frank, for helping us
develop this legislation. In 2011, a bus
traveling back to Chinatown from a casino was
involved in a terrible, deadly crash, which killed
a large number of my constituents. Since this
accident, and other incidents, we have worked to
support greater regulation of the intercity
busses. For a consumer, there are numerous bus
company now offering discount rates to travel to

Boston, D.C., Philadelphia, and other city. Some
have questionable safety records and we believe
this essential information that all consumers
should be able to check before deciding which bus
company to use. This bill would ensure that bus
riders can check the safety records of companies
through the City government's Department of
Transportation's website, so they can know before
they ride. Much of this information is available
on the federal Motor Coach Safety Administration
website, but we found that few customer know about
this site and that it's not easy to navigate or
find this information. This bill will make all of
this information more easy to access, thereby
taking the mystery out of the bus safety issue and
empower consumer to make safer choices for
themselves. I urge all my colleagues to support
this bill and I look forward to seeing this
legislation become law. Thank you.
