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2 CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Good

afternoon, everyone, welcome to the Consumer Affairs Committee of the New York City Council. Today is Tuesday, May 21st. My name is Dan Garodnick and I have the privilege of chairing this Committee. I'm joined today by Council Members Karen Koslowitz, Charles Barron, Oliver Koppell and Lew Fidler. Today we're going to be moving on Intro 1035-A, a bill designed to improve the enforcement of illegal gambling in gaming at cafés. This bill's lead sponsors are Council Member Williams and Council Member Fidler. Committee held a hearing on Intro 1035-A on April 17th. During the hearing we welcomed testimony from a number of sources, including the Department of Consumer Affairs and representatives from the game and café industry. Gaming cafés are DCA licensed businesses which offer three or more computers that consumers, for a fee, may use to play games. These businesses are subject to approval by the local community board and Council Member, cannot serve minors during school hours during the school year, and most importantly cannot offer cash prizes to their patrons.

Unfortunately, we have seen a recent new trend of
establishments calling themselves "internet
sweepstakes cafés." These establishments are
licensed as game cafés but operate under a very
different business model. Internet sweepstakes
cafés sell a service like internet access, which
comes bundled with a certain number of entries
into a sweepstakes. Their customers can then use
these entries to play a casino like game, which
rewards winning with cash prizes. These places
clearly violate the terms of gaming café licenses.
Moreover, they violate New York State's blanket
ban on gambling. There's no question that there's
illegal activity going on here. Intro 1035-A
would help to crackdown on it. It allows DCA to
revoke the license of any gaming café that offers
cash prizes, or otherwise violates the section of
the state penal law dealing with gambling
offenses. This bill should help stop the spread
of internet sweepstakes, internet sweepstakes
cafés and improve the City's ability to prevent
illegal gambling. At this point, I would like to
turn the microphone over to the lead sponsors of
this bill, starting with Council Member Williams

and then Council Member Fidler. Council Member

Williams, the floor is yours, welcome.

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COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank

5 you, Mr. Chair. Of course I'd like to thank the Chair, Dan Garodnick, my colleague and the 6 cosponsor of this very piece of import--very important piece of legislation, Council Member Lew 9 Fidler, Speaker Quinn, as well as the Council of Government Affairs Division for their combined 10 11 work on Intro 1035-A. In addition, I'd like to 12 thank the Department of Consumer Affairs, also 13 deserves appreciation for their stated commitment 14 to crack down on illegal gambling facilities and 15 to support this legislation. And at minimum I 16 believe this legislation will do some prodding of 17 DCA to push up the enforcement. With the passage 18 of Intro 1035-A, the Department of Consumer 19 Affairs will pursue strict enforcement in our 20 City's amusement arcades and gaming cafés that 21 engage in and encourage inappropriate activities 22 and illegal activities. Amusement arcades and 23 gaming cafés do not have the proper license for 24 gambling activity and therefore should be 25 prohibited from allowing these activities to exist

in their place of business. As a strong,
outspoken advocate for small business and economic
development, I understand that in times of extreme
economic strain, our local entrepreneurs are
essential to expediting fiscal recovery. At the
same time, it is equally important that businesses
respect the boundaries and parameters of the law.
As stated at the last, at the hearing last month,
I personally witnessed a number of businesses
engaging in unlawful gaming activity, and we have
seen brazen advertisement for these establishments
in many of our City's neighborhoods. This
behavior is detrimental to our local community and
Intro 1035-A will help to establish our position
against the promotion of such illegal vices. I
will go further and say that predatory practices
such as those demonstrated by these types of
establishments that intentionally mislead the
public are shameful and should be subject to
appropriate penalties. This legislation was
drafted with the interest of the larger community
in mind. The message we are sending is clear: we
will under no circumstances tolerate businesses
that attempt to take advantage of legal loopholes

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or just violate the law period, in order to prey
on individuals. Once again, I would like to thank
all parties who have stepped up on this
legislation that encourages responsible business
practices and helps keep our community safe.

CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Thank you very much. Let me just note that we've been joined by Council Members Ferreras and Comrie, and now we'll turn the microphone over to Council Member Fidler.

COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Thank you,
Chairman Garodnick, and let me also begin by thank
you for your assistance in getting this
legislation to this point today. Also, thank Brad
Reed from my staff who's sitting here in the front
row, for his work on this bill, and particularly
Council Member Williams and the other cosponsors.
Council Member Williams and I noted a problem that
seemed to be growing in our communities, didn't
know if it was affecting everybody else, but
apparently to some degree it is. And for once,
we're going to get out in front of a problem and
stop it from spreading. There's no question—
well, there can be argument that the government

should or shouldn't be involved in gambling. What
there can be no argument about is that we don't
need private enterprises popping up, bringing
gambling to our commercial strips and to our
neighborhoods, en masse and unregulated. Council
Member Williams and I both sought the assistance
of the Department of Consumer Affairs, the New
York City Police Department, and it was kind of a
little bit like the Scarecrow in the Wizard of Oz,
who said, "They went thataway." And particularly
at DCA, which right up through our initial hearing
here, seemed to be oblivious to their role in
protecting our communities. So, I am hopeful that
we will pass this legislation out of Committee
today, pass it on the floor tomorrow, and wipe out
this illegal business from spreading throughout
our neighborhoods. And I thank you again and I
urge the Committee to vote aye.

CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Thank you,

Council Member Fidler. I'm going to go back to

Council Member Williams for a moment.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank

you. I am embarrassed and remiss, because I did

not thank my staff, Stefan Ringle [phonetic] and

2	most importantly Kay Bane [phonetic], my
3	Legislative and Budget Director, for his work on
4	this.

CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Good, we're glad you did that, Council Member Williams.

[laughter] Let me see if there's--I don't see anybody else on the panel who wishes to make remarks on this. So we will ask the Council, the Clerk, to call the roll, and we will go from there.

CLERK: Kevin Pin, Committee Clerk, roll call on the Committee on Consumer Affairs, Intro 1035-A. Council Member Garodnick.

CHAIRPERSON GARODNICK: Thank you. I vote aye and recommend an aye vote.

CLERK: Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I did want to say one thing before I vote, and I am going to support and vote age on this, but this is a very contradiction in the sense that, as Lew Fidler alluded to, I remember when they was running numbers in our neighborhoods, number runners, it was the worst thing in the world, it was morally corrupt. But then when they legalized it and

called it a lottery, you know, then it became
something that was all right. And this lottery
money's supposed to be coming to education and see
in the Census, I never see that. And I'm always
concerned when the illegal activities are whether
these things are being come down upon because of
some competition with some more legalized
gambling. So, I think we're very inconsistent
when it comes to gambling, particularly when it
comes to poor neighborhoods and some of the
chances that they take, is because of the
oppression, the unemployment. So they are willing
to take more chances. The reason why I'm voting
for this bill, because I think this exploits that
condition, and I think y'all did a good job in
making that clear. But I think we need to be
consistent across the board with this kind of
approach. You know, people will run to Atlantic
City and run to different places, and engage in
gambling and this state is even considering
gambling casinos coming in and saying it'll create
jobs and all of that stuff. But then when it
comes to others, then we now we have this moral
authority, you know, to sustain it all on this

2	level. I support this, 'cause this is the right
3	thing to do, but I think we need to be consistent
4	and look at the larger issue of gambling and its
5	addiction and its exploitation of people who are
6	struggling to make ends meet. I vote aye on this.
7	CLERK: Comrie.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Pass. No,
9	I'm just kidding, I vote [laughter] I vote aye.
10	CLERK: Koppell.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: [off mic]
