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speaker Quinn: All right. We are going to start our ceremonial. We only have one today and if I could ask Council Member King and the Bronx delegation to come on up and we are going to recognize Carmen Rosa [phonetic] for over 20 years of service to Community Board 12 in the Bronx, which is crazy. [applause] So, if Carmen and everybody who is here for this ceremonial could make their way up.

COUNCIL MEMBER KING: There she goes, Miss Rosa. The Bronx is in the house. [applause] Wow, we're, here we go. Father Gorman [phonetic] and all. [off mic] There we go. you. Good afternoon, everyone. Good afternoon. It's my distinct pleasure as a Council Member representing the 12th District of the Bronx and this is my first proc so I'm really excited about it. [applause] And I couldn't have picked a better candidate to receive my first proclamation and this ceremonial, Miss Carmen Rosa. Let's give Carmen a... [applause] I have had the privilege of knowing Miss Rosa for the past ten years and she has been a tireless worker and a servant of the 12th District representing our Community Board, our

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District Manager. I want to give a special thanks to Father Gorman who is here also who is our Chari of Community Board 12 [applause]. But Miss Rosa, one of my early days of activism, I used to come by the Community Board and she would fill me with the do's and the don'ts and who to stay away from and watch out for the potholes in the community and making sure that I keep my face, my nose and everything that comes out of my mouth on the right side of the conversation. So, I really appreciate all your guidance, all your love, your commitment over 20 years work for the City of New York but more importantly the district of District 12 and we want you to know we really love you, your children rely on you each and every day. I know her son and her daughters and the fiancé is here also, wanted to say thank you for sharing your mother with us and I know there's been some times you would have loved for her to have been home but we have adopted her and we've taken her from you. And she's done the work that we need all our services to do across New York City and most importantly the 12th District. So, with that I'll say, great love, we love you, keep on staying

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strong, let God watch over your health and be
strong. We need you. We need you another 20
years. I know you're going to retire but we just
going to ask for 20 more. All right, we'll ask
for two more. We'll ask for two. Ah, you never
know. With that all said, on behalf of all the
delegation here in the Bronx, Council Member
Koppell, we share the district and this is the
Community Board, we share together. I'd like for
you to say a few words also to our oh. And at
that point can we ask the, can I have the clerk
with her delightful smile read the proc for us,
please? Thank you. Thank you.

FEMALE VOICE 1: Council, City of
New York, Proclamation. Whereas the Council of
the City of New York is proud to honor Carmen L.
Rosa, a first generation New Yorker and longtime
resident of the Bronx for more than 20 years of
stellar service and contributions to Community
Board 12. And whereas in 1995 after serving seven
years as Community Board 12's Assistant District
Manager Miss Rosa became District Manager. From
the start she has applied an unparalleled level of
expertise, dedication and leadership skills to

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improving the quality of life for Community Board 12 residents and for the Bronx as a whole. whereas during Miss Rosa's tenure as District Manager of Community Board 12 she played an instrumental role in getting the toxic site known as Hexagon Labs cleaned by the Federal and State Departments of Environmental Protection ensuring the contaminants contained at the site would no longer endanger residents. And whereas in her role as District Manager for the second largest populated district in the borough of the Bronx Miss Rosa respond to the needs of young people and submitted a proposal to the Mayor which identified a potential site for an all inclusive recreational facility. And whereas Miss Rosa's work with the Bronx Overall Economic Development Corporation, the South Bronx Economic Development Corporation and the White Plains Road Merchants Association culminated in a revitalization program with local industrial merchants developing a vital economic engine in the 12th District. And whereas Miss Rosa's advocacy work with the Department of Aging and the Human Resources Administration led to the implementation of a satellite SNAP [phonetic]

program office in the district. And whereas, in
addition to her tireless work with Community Board
12 Miss Rosa is a devoted mother of two children,
Linda Ungera [phonetic] and Alfredo Ungera
[phonetic] as well as an adjunct professor at
Monroe College. Now therefore be it known that
the Council of the City of New York, including all
members of its Bronx delegation honor Carmen L.
Rosa for her many years of outstanding service to
Community Board 12 and to the community at large.
Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the entire
Council, Andy L. King, Council Member, 12 th
District, Annabel Palma, Council Member, 18 th
District and all of the members of the Bronx
delegation.

10	of civil rights leader Medgar Evers and also then
11	Lou Fidler who folks may or may not know that John
12	Noel [phonetic] the Emmy award winning WNBC TV
13	reporter passed away last week or the week before
14	that after a long and we thought also was going to
15	be victorious struggle with brain cancer. John
16	took a sudden turn for the worse in the end. So,
17	if I could call on our Majority Whip, Council
18	Member Al Vann and then Council, Deputy Majority
19	Leader Lou Fidler.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: All right,
21	thank you.
22	SPEAKER QUINN: And could we get
23	quiet, please from the balcony? And if we can
24	keep the door closed in the back, I think it's
25	actually, I thought it was the balcony but coming

from the outside. Thank you, Al.

COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: 3 Yeah, thank 4 you, Madam Speaker. Good afternoon, my colleagues, ladies and gentlemen. June 12th, 1963 5 was a late spring day both in New York and in 6 Mississippi but the social climate in our country was very different from the one we enjoy today. 9 African Americans across the South were fighting to overturn Jim Crow laws, laws that were designed 10 11 to segregate and oppress black communities. They 12 were fighting for access to the polls, for equal 13 access to public accommodations, for access to 14 institutions of higher education that had been 15 restricted to white students only. These weren't 16 abstract battles within legislative halls. 17 these were committed people, often very young 18 people who put their bodies and their lives on the 19 line in the fight for civil rights. Medgar Wally 20 Evers was one of the, such individuals. In the 21 early 1950's he was a young man who had married 22 his college sweetheart, Myrlie Beasley. They had 23 three young children and ambitions of personal 24 success. But his desire to see progress and justice in the quest for civil rights was strong, 25

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perhaps even stronger than his personal interest. And so he went on into the belly of the beast, into Mississippi. Mississippi was a strong and blatant tradition of racism. He went to challenge there for injustice, to challenge the injustice which was really at its core. He applied to the segregated University of Mississippi Law School as part of a test case. He organized a boycott of filling stations that denied blacks the use of restrooms and in 1954 he was named the NAACP's first field secretary for the State of Mississippi. In that role he continued his work on voting rights and was instrumental in the investigation of the death of Emmett Till, a young black teenage boy who was brutally beaten and lynched, beaten beyond recognition. As Medgar's work expanded so did the hatred and threats of violence against him. His phone constantly rang with death threats and his children had to be trained to take cover in case of a snipers bullet rang out. Well, 50 years ago today the sound of a sniper's bullet did cut through the night as his wife and children sat inside, maybe 50 or so feet away, Medgar Evers coming home from a meeting was

gunned down in the driveway of his home. It would
take more than 30 years for the murderer to be
criminally prosecuted and in that time Medgar
Evers example of heroism and sacrifice helped to
change this nation. He inspired me and countless
others to dedicate themselves to public service.
When we in Brooklyn were successful in negotiating
with the Board of Higher Education of City
University to establish a college in Central
Brooklyn to specifically address the educational
needs of our community we were proud and honored
to have the institution named for Medgar Evers.
On this 50^{th} anniversary of the assassination of an
American hero who made the ultimate sacrifice that
we all may live in a society that is more free and
more just. Thank you for the opportunity.

Speaker mentioned, John Noel was buried today

after coming to a lengthy battle with brain

cancer. Many of you know John only in his job as

a reporter for News Center 4. I actually knew

John both as a client as a a friend. I remember,

it's specific, the first person I spoke to on that

horrific day when James Davis was gunned down in

2	our Chambers right after I spoke to my wife, was
3	John Noel. His concern wasn't for being the first
4	guy to get the story. His concern was for the
5	wellbeing of the people who were in the room.
6	John Noel was a kind man, a caring guy, a sweet
7	guy, one of the nicest human beings I've ever had
8	the pleasure to meet. He is survived by his ex
9	wife, by his daughter and his brother Randy and we
10	all stand with them today in prayer and grieve
11	with them for the passing of a truly, truly
12	wonderful human being, John Noel. Thank you.

raise the micro purchasing limit to \$20,000. I

want to thank Chair Mealy for her work on this and

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for being the sponsor. I'm not sure if Chair Mealy is here or not, okay, so we're going to keep moving. In Housing and Building we are passing Intro 103-A, a piece of legislation that will create greater consistency of signage at construction sites. I want to thank the Chair, Erik Dilan, for moving this piece of legislation at the request of the Mayor. We're also out of Housing and Buildings we're voting on 1010A. This piece of legislation relates to J51 and renewing the J51 program which had expired and the State then renewed it and now we are renewing it. I want to thank Amy Stokes for her work on that. I'm - - on the signage legislation I just want to thank Bob Aham [phonetic] and Laura Rodgers [phonetic]. I want to thank Chari Recchia for his sponsorship of 1010-A. There is also preconsidered 1057, a piece of legislation that is going to extend the Hurricane Sandy Waiver until December 31st. This is a waiver for plumbing and electrical system permitting. We have extended this because the Department of Buildings is continuing to get requests for those waivers that are appropriate. It's just taking more time than

we thought. We are happy to pass this and I want
to thank the Chair Dilan and the Mayor for his
support of this legislation. In Transportation we
are appointing, if we could get a little quiet,
passing 1042-A and I want to thank Lyle Frank and
Chair Vacca and Council Member Greenfield. This
piece of legislation will hopefully begin to
introduce the, gotcha, muni-meter tickets and the,
gotcha, waste of money muni-meter's. Very simply,
these pieces of legislation say that when the
muni-meter isn't supposed to be taking your money,
there's no parking rules in effect, it will now
put a message on its screen that says that and
when it is out of paper it will not take your
money, important steps to help New Yorkers keep
their money in their pockets and not take it away
wrongly. Let me call with a little more quiet on
Chair Vacca and then Council Member Greenfield.
Jimmy's here? Okay.
COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Thank you,
Speak Quinn and Members of the Council. I think
that we have legislation
SPEAKER QUINN: [interposing]

Council Member Wills, sit down. You're in the way

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of Chair Vacca. [off mic]

COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Thank you. We have legislation before us today that, again, addresses the issue of parking fairness. the City of new York have parking regulations that often expire at 5 o'clock, 6 o'clock, 7:00, 8:00, 9:00 or even later depending on where you are the meters expire at different times. We want these muni-meters that we have to lock when that time comes because New Yorkers today are so confused as to when parking ends where. And this will end that confusion. It will save New Yorkers in convenience. It will save them money and it will result in fairness. And secondly, when that munimeter does not have paper in it that muni-meter should not be accepting your money, that munimeter should shut down, your money should not be accepted and then you should have an opportunity to go to the next muni-meter, get that slip of paper and put it in the window of your car. So, this legislation addresses what we knew we had to address when the City converted from stand alone meters to the muni-meter system. We knew that we would find areas of concern and we have found them

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through Council Member Greenfield's bill based on the hearings that my committee had. I think we've come up with good legislation that will be fair to all of us that will also let them know that we here at the Council are aware of a problem that we've detected and that we've been able to correct it legislatively. So, I would urge the members today to vote yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I rise today and I will give ten cents to RJ for that copyrighted phrase, thank you Mr. Chairman. But I do rise today to ask my colleagues to support this legislation. legislation, I believe, will end the great munimeter scam of New York City. What is this scam you ask? The scam is when you show up at a munimeter you've got four quarters in your pocket and you seek to purchase a muni-meter receipt. throw the quarters inside, you very delightfully press the green button and nothing happens. is, in fact, a scam because the City is stealing your money. In the rest of the world we would call this theft. In New York City we call it bureaucracy. And so our legislation today would

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seek to rectify this situation. It's not just about the dollar or the two dollars although I will say as a proud New Yorker, even for ten cents I won't let anybody rip me off. But it is about the fact that no that you're out of quarters you're likely to get a parking ticket. nothing can be more frustrating then a citizen who's trying to follow the law and is trying to do the right thing, and unfortunately, is penalized due to a broken system. So, this legislation today will resolve this. It will also resolve the problem of the meters running when there is no need for the meters to take money because the regulations are not in effect and it will also solve what I call the dentist problem, which is you have a dental appointment today at 8:45 in the morning, the muni-meter does not start 'til 9 o'clock and you have to limp out of the office with one of those things on your neck with your mouth full of Novocain trying to get a muni-meter receipt at 9 o'clock to prevent a ticket. will allow you to prepay in the morning. folks, as my Council Member and colleague Dan Garodnick has trademarked, we call this common

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sense legislation and I encourage you to vote for it. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. We are also passing 1045-A out of Parks renaming 52 thoroughfares. I want to thank Chris Tratori [phonetic] for Chris's work on this bill. I want to thank Chuck Day [phonetic] and the Chair of the Committee, Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito for her work. I want to thank Chuck Davis and Chair Rivera for the appointment out of Rules, Privileges and Elections. I want to thank Council Member Comrie and the Subcommittee Chairs and the Land Use Chairs for their work on a number of ULURP's UDAP's and sidewalk café's. I want to thank Emre Adev [phonetic] and Chair Foster for the work on the Home Rules out of State and Federal legislation and just finally I want to call on Council Member Donovan Richards and then Chair Recchia if he would like. We are passing an important piece of legislation today that will keep about 912 units of housing at Seagirt, Far Rockaway affordable. They had been in the Mitchell Lama Program, the owner bought out of Mitchell Lama through moving these units into HDFC

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program and HPD and giving them a 25 year property tax break. We will keep these as low and moderate income affordable units in Far Rockaway and I want to thank everyone for their work on that. So, let me call on Council Member Richards and then Chair Recchia.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: you, Speaker and colleagues. Today marks a great day for the people of Far Rockaway. For far too long the lack of affordable housing units has been a real issue in our community in the Rockaway's, bringing in more families to the Rockaway's is the perfect formula for stimulating our local economy. When nearly 1,000 families were displaced following the storm, the city scurried to find affordable housing units in the Rockaway's but came up short of meeting the great need. However, today we say to those families who were genuinely trying to get out of those hotels, we heard your cries and we are doing something about it. With 916 units opting into becoming affordable housing yet again we say to those families, come home. want you in the Rockaway's and we want you to stay. Although today we are taking a big step in

the right direction I encourage the City to ensure we continue this success by working together to create much more housing, more affordable housing. The opportunity that has arisen to develop beach front property such as the Rockaway's through CBG funding may we ensure all New Yorkers can share in the American dream of home ownership and affordable housing. I would like to thank Speaker Quinn, Chairman Finance Chair Domenic Recchia and the Finance Department for their work on this and the people of the Rockaway's surely are grateful today. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Chair Recchia?

COUNCIL MEMBER RECCHIA: Thank you,
Madam Speaker. I also, I want to thank my staff,
where is Amy? She did a great job for my finance
staff, for Tenesha Edwards [phonetic] and, of
course, Preston Niblack [phonetic] and Jeff Rhodes
[phonetic] but also this was a project that would
bring more affordable housing to the Rockaway's
and Donavan Richards, it was a pleasure working
with you and you should be very proud of this
accomplishment. Of course, our wonder Speaker for
supporting this to make sure this happened working

And going back when the stadium was down where it's currently called the Polo Ground Houses, people used to

deserve praise but also Juan Rodriguez Way, which
we adopted before but it's on the schedule again
in order to increase the number of street co

Manhattan. And so I ask all of you to support
these three bills which impact my district and
Ydanis Rodriguez and Inez Dickens. Thank you.

colleagues, I rise to ask for your support on two

very critical, important street renaming or co

namings. One is African Burial Ground Square in

East New York we did research and found out that

in the New Lots area there was an African Burial

Ground. Africans really built East New York and a

lot of the slave masters have their names all over

out streets, like, Van Sicklen [phonetic] and

Skank [phonetic] the biggest label, maybe that's

why they call them skank. He was one of the
biggest slaveholders and when you look all through
East New York you'll see the names of slaveholders
all on the streets. And now, we want to rename
Barbie who was a slaveholder, Skank was a
slaveholder, we want to name that African Burial
Ground Square where there was an African Burial
Ground there, actually dug up our remains, which
was right side of the remains of white residents,
they reinterred the white residents across the
street on New Lots and threw our bones away and
just discarded out bones. So, we want to rename
that African Burial Ground Square and then we have
a great leader in our community, Gregory Jacko
Jackson [phonetic] of the Brooklyn or the
Brownsville Recreation Center, a great man who
passed away and has done so much for the young
people of Brownsville and East New York. We are
also renaming a street after him. So, I ask you
all for your support. Thank you.

very much. Seeing no others we will now move on

Educational Policy. And this will allow member of

the City Council to appoint four members to the

panel along with the Mayor appointing four and, of 2 course, the Borough President. And it 3 4 specifically states that a member appointed by the 5 City Council should be apparent as one, either a 6 college or a university person and the other will be someone from the community education district. So, it's a good thing and I asked you to sign onto that, Senator Velmanette Montgomery of Brooklyn is the Senator and our former colleague David Weprin 10 11 is the State Assembly Member that are moving these 12 bills. Also, resolution 802 is calling upon the 13 SUNY, State University of New York and the New York State Department of Health to work with all 14 15 of the stakeholders to keep SUNY downstate center 16 open as a leading public medical institution in 17 our great city, more specifically in the borough 18 of Brooklyn and preserve the essential healthcare 19 services that that hospital provides. So, I ask 20 you, all our colleagues to sign onto 1801 and 21 resolution 1802. And finally, the caucus is 22 having a briefing on the two bills that are being 23 reintroduced, the Community Safety Act and it's 24 opened to all members regardless if you're a 25 caucus member or not where they're going to brief

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you on the new aspects of the bill and the new
process that's going to be put into place. So, I
ask you to join us immediately after this Stated
Meeting. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much, Council Member. We now have Council Member Comrie followed by Council Member Williams.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Thank you, Majority Leader. I stand to inform the members on a few bills that are being introduced today. I would ask the other members to vote on all of the Sandy related bills but the one that I'm introducing is Intro 1054 which is asking OEM to create a central hub for relief operations in every borough so that people can have one point in every borough to reach out to when we have a disaster. And that is something that one of the things that we, that came out of the hearing that we need to look at. I would ask members also to sign onto Intro 1055 and accompanying Intro resolution 1797 which is dealing with the issues that happened when we have vehicle collisions in the city where we have, we've had two accidents recently in the city where the driver left the

scene and we're asking the police department to
report information to ensure that they have done a
thorough job of collecting information at the
scene of a crime when we've had collisions that
have resulted in deaths. Number one, the Intro is
to have them report to us on a regular basis all
of the information concerning vehicle collisions I
which the driver left the scene of a collision.
That's Intro 1055 and Resolution 1797 is asking
the police department to establish and implement
procedures which would require the Police
Department to go and obtain any video within the
scene within 24 hours where the driver leaves the
scene of a motor vehicle accident that resulted in
the death or critical injury of another. We've
just had two incidents, one incident last week and
two incidents in the Borough of Queens where we've
had drivers that left the scene. We had two
people that expired and they were not able, did
not collect the data immediately on all of the
cameras that were available. I would also ask
that members sign on Resolution 1795 and 1796

First, I'd like to ask colleagues to sign onto Resolution 1802 calling on the State University of New York and the Department of Health to work with stakeholders to keep SUNY Downstate Medical Center open and I want to thank Council Member Jackson for working with me on the resolution. able to save the one close to downtown, the one on Long Island Hospital. We really, to make sure that the other side which is a teaching hospital and it serves a large portion of my district and produces more doctors than anyone definitely in New York City, maybe even more, is now in danger of severely being, services being taken away or even closed and we need to make sure that remains open. I'd also like to ask colleagues to sign on to Resolutions 1813 and 1812. 1813 raises, as a resolution asking our President - - to raise the minimum age of enlisting in the military to age

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The reason I did this is I'd like to make 21. sure that everything matches up. If a young person can be sent to war to kill someone at 18 and can't drink at the age of 18 there is a problem. So, I would like both of these things to be equal because I think they are both, have dire consequences. 1812 was to ask the Mayor to direct the City Department of Mental Health and Human Resources to have and develop a comprehensive interdisciplinary response to gun violence to make it a public health issue and so that all agencies respond to gun violence, not just one agency. We had a tremendous week, - - shooting about a week ago and, of course, the police department responded as they should. But that's just law enforcement. I would like the Department of Mental Health to respond, the Division of Youth and Community Development to respond, the Human Rights Commission to respond. All of this agencies should have their part in gun violence and lastly, call attention to 1079 which is similar to the former 881 and Intro 1080 which his similar to profiling both brand new bills that we've introduced. So, I'd like everybody to sign

2	onto those, read the changes. We think we've made
3	it better. We've done these bills with a scalpel
4	as to have safer streets and have better policing
5	at the same exact time. And please come
6	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA:
7	[interposing] Council Member?

18	Majority Leader Rivera. I want to ask my							
19	colleagues to sign onto two bills that I'm							
20	introducing in today's agenda. The first one you							
21	may have thought was a misprint, it's sponsored by							
22	me in conjunction with the Mayor. Yes, it really							
23	says that, cue up the music to The Odd Couple							
24	right now. But the fact of the matter is it's a							

very important bill and it bans the use of

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establishments in the city. Styrofoam, there are 23,000 tons of Styrofoam in our landfills and our waste stream. It is the single biggest contaminant as we seek to move forward with the plastics recycling bill that we passed three years ago that is being implemented right now. the other end it is, in fact, something that will save us about \$10 million a year if you add up all the alternatives. Now, the high priced lobbyists are out there already spreading misinformation. They'll tell you that we can recycle it. would be great if any of the recycling plants in New York City said we could. None of them think we can. None of them think there's a market for They'll tell you that the cost of shifting over to a paper cup from a Styrofoam cup is 100 percent greater but they won't tell you that that cost is less than a penny. So, you know, don't be misled. This bill is green both financially and for our environment. The other bill is just something that makes so much common sense I can't being to say. It bans the use of 3D printers to

make guns other than as done by a licensed

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gunsmith. I really don't even know if I have to
explain why that's important but now that the
technology has advanced so that something like
that can actually be done we ought to make it
unlawful for other people to do it and not create
a new profit center for illegal, dangerous and
undetectable hand guns.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Council Member, thank you very much. We now move on to Council Member Vann followed by Council Member Richards.

COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: Yeah, thank you Majority Leader. I ask for your support of Intro 107-A. Legislation requiring the Department of Small Business Services to create a small business redemption community investment pilot program. What is that, you say? It's a program that would provide small businesses with a voluntary opportunity to perform community service in lieu of paying certain fines. That should pique your interest. I am very pleased to be joined by our Small Business Chair, Diana Reyna, in sponsoring this groundbreaking legislation that aims to promote civic engagement by using the

avoidance of paying City fines as in incentive for
participation in community service activities out
of the box of legislation. This innovative
program promises to serve communities across our
city by one, easing the financial burden faced by
small business whose bottom lines are often
threatened by City regulatory fines received
during the course of their doing business. And
second, engaging these businesses in charitable
activities that will benefit our communities. The
program provides a novel way to address small
business issues that have been identified by the
City Council advised Regulatory Review Panel that
was created by local law 45 in 2009. Like the
panel, this legislation tends to make it easier
for owners to stay in business while also
minimizing cost. The program will cover certain
fines issued by the Department of Environmental
Health, the Department of Consumer Affairs and the
Department of Sanitation. Hurry up. Get on
board. Support it, Intro 10-A. Thank you.
COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
very much, Council Member. We call on Council
Member Richards followed by Council Member Rose.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: I urge my
3	colleagues to sign on the Intro 1073 today. It
4	marks an important step towards ensuring New
5	Yorkers with special medical needs who reside in
6	healthcare facilities across New York City aren't
7	left out in the storm of disorganization, red tape
8	and isolation during an emergency such as
9	Hurricane Sandy. This Intro ensures that
10	transparency, coordination and adequate tracking
11	mechanisms are in place to prevent chaos and
12	mishaps from occurring at the degree we saw during
13	Irene and Hurricane Sandy. There is no reason
14	that it should take a family member days to locate
15	a loved one who is moved to a shelter following an
16	emergency. So, I'm urging my colleagues to sign
17	on and this would also aid in ensuring that these
18	healthcare facilities also have transportation
19	alternatives in place before an emergency like the
20	storms we saw. So, I urge you to sign on. Thank
21	you.

24	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Id like to
25	encourage my colleges to sign onto Intro 1076

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regarding traffic management plan in response to emergency conditions. It is with hindsight being 20/20 we continue to find more areas of our city that we must prepare in the event of not just another super storm but any emergency. I want to thank Speaker Quinn for her leadership as I am proud to stand with her and Chairman Vacca and other colleagues to introduce comprehensive package of emergency preparedness legislation. There have been many lessons learned and we have learned that there is a demonstrated need for a comprehensive emergency plan, coordinated efforts amongst principal and agencies as well as advanced planning through strategic and improved communication. Some of the biggest problems Staten Islanders and other residents of the City face in the aftermath of Super Storm Sandy and other recent disasters were the loss of power, the unavailability of fuel, inadequate and ill prepared shelters, traffic and transportation disarray and the inability to provide necessities to affected areas. We cannot guarantee that a disaster such as this will never occur again but we are here to ensure that this City will be

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better prepared to respond. I hope that you will
join me, all of you, in supporting 1076 and all of
the bills included in the package of legislation
regarding emergency preparedness. Thank you.

And a correction on one of the items, LU 813 and Resolution 1818 was adopted by a vote of 50 in the affirmative, one in the negative and zero abstentions. you very much. This meeting is now adjourned. No, hold on, - - oh, I - - okay. Intro 1040, we reopen it, sorry about that. Intro 1045-A was adopted by a vote of 15 in the affirmative, zero in the negative and one abstention, SLR 4 and SLR 6 were both adopted by a vote of 50 in the affirmative but SLR 4 was, had zero in the negative and one abstention and SLR 6 had one in the negative and zero abstentions. SLR 8 was adopted by a vote of 45 in the affirmative, six in the negative and one abstention. SLR 1 was adopted by a vote of 46 in the affirmative, four

2	in the negative and one abstentions. SLR 5 was
3	adopted by a vote of 47 in the affirmative, four
4	in the negative and zero abstentions, and
5	Resolution 1739 was adopted by a vote of 50 in the
