18	In between the last we met and today, one of our
19	Council Members, Jumaane Williams' father passed
20	away, and Jumaane is back with us today. So I,
21	all of us want to extend our thoughts and prayers
22	to Jumaane and his family and just ask if we could
23	have a moment of silence. [moment of silence]
24	Thank you all very much. We are voting on a
25	number of pieces of legislation: home rules from

State and Federal Legislation. I want to thank
Council Member Helen Foster, this is her busy time
of year. I want to thank Danielle Barbado and
Scott Crowley who've worked on all of this home
rules. We're also voting on an important
development project in Brooklyn today, we've
referred to it as BAM South. I want to thank
Ramon Martinez, Gail Benjamin, Alonso Carr, Ann
McCauhey [phonetic], Robert Mergelia [phonetic]
for all of their work on this. I want to thank
the Chair, Leroy Comrie, the Chair of the
Subcommittee, Mark Weprin, and the local Council
Member, Tish James, for all of their work on BAM
South, to get the right balance between the
various needs involved. Let me call on Chair
Comrie, Chair Weprin, and then Council Member
James. Please, if we could get a little quiet.
COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I just
wouldI didn't realize I was going first, I
thought Council Member James would go first. But,
I'll just congratulate Council Member James on
dealing with a delicate balance, with trying to
get a project done with her hands tied behind her

back on a lot of the issues. I think that as

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you'll hear from her on details, she was able to try to confirm and hold on to most of the critical pieces to ensure that the project would include a cultural organization that is community based and minority based, to be in control of the, in control of space in the area, that also that the affordable housing, which she was able to extract additional affordable housing from the Mayor's Office. And also that the library space on Pacific Street would be kept as a library, and hopefully maintained fully as a library. I think that there were a lot of issues that came up during the hearing for BAM South, all of which were protracted by the position of the Mayor's Office and EDC, which are issues that we have to look at, because EDC pretty much made it difficult for even a developer to move, to do some things. I am heartened by the level of MWBE that is coming into the project, and also the fact that there will be an opportunity now to have continued dialogue with the developer and unions that will be involved in the project. So, want to congratulate Council Member Weprin on having a full and thorough subcommittee hearing on this

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issue. And also to Council Members Lander and
Levin who worked with Council Member James on this
difficult project. But especially to Tish James
who had to deal with a difficult balancing act
with trying to get this today. And I want thank
all the members for coming to vote on this project
today. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Chair Comrie, and then Chair Weprin, and then Council Member James. And I want to echo Leroy, and I know what will be Mark's congratulations to Tish.

Madam Speaker. Just briefly, this project is a great benefit to the community, it will create affordable housing units, 20 percent of the units will be affordable in this space. The cultural amenities will be significant, for BAM, for public library and performance space, as well as space for the community to use. It also will create an open space, a 16,000 foot, square foot publically accessible plaza on the north end of the site.

And it will also entail 22,800 square feet of retail. So, it's really an iconic building, a

2	building that will really transform the
3	neighborhood, it'll be great for the cultural
4	institutions in the area, it'll be good for the
5	community with library and performance space and
6	open space. So, all in all, I want to compliment
7	Tish James and all the staff for coming together
8	on a deal here that sort of balances the needs of
9	the community with the needs of, our needs of
10	affordable housing, as well. And put together a
11	project that benefits many and will be a terrific
12	project in Brooklyn. Thank you.

I want to thank the hundreds of residents all 4 5 throughout the City who have emailed me, urging me to preserve--and the Administration--to preserve 6 the Pacific Street Library, it's a historic library, a cultural icon in the community. And 9 that was really critically important to me. a library known as the Children's Library in Park 10 11 Slope. And although this project will have a 12 library, it represents two different 13 constituencies, and it was really critically 14 important that children not have to travel across 15 Atlantic Avenue or Flatbush Avenue to enjoy a new 16 library in the BAM South project. That was a 17 major issue for this Council Member who believes in the preservation of libraries, at a time when 18 19 unfortunately our libraries are having a difficult 20 time. I also want to thank Two Trees for their

commitment to continuing to work with the building

trades to ensure that the work on the \$130 million

project will be bid out to multiple union firms,

work. We're confident, I am confident, that the

giving them an opportunity to compete for the

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union contractors will be employed at the site over the course of construction of this great mixed-use project. I also wanted to congratulate Two Trees for exceeding meeting their obligations on women and minority goals, their participation goals for hiring and for hiring local residents. I also want to thank the Administration, because in addition to BAM South, there's two other lots, and the Administration has agreed to increase the affordable housing to 30 percent and reduce the area median income to 30 percent of the area--the income bands which reflect those in downtown Brooklyn, and not less than 150 units will be reserved for households with incomes up to 80 percent of area median income, with a preference for those living in Community Board 2. addition to that, the open space, the foot, the public plaza, now will be reserved for groups in the community, all stakeholders will have an opportunity and will be involved in the programming of that particular cultural space, and in terms of public performances. And last but not least, the cultural use will be in perpetuity permanently, for BAM as well as for 651, which is

2	an African-American cultural organization which
3	serves the diversity in downtown Brooklyn. I want
4	to thank all of you for an indulgence. I want to
5	again apologize for those who had to reorganize
6	their schedules for this special Stated session,
7	for the purposes of approving this BAM cultural
8	district and this BAM South project. And I thank
9	all of you for your support. And I urge all of
10	you to vote yes.

rezoned and developers are getting very, very rich

and getting land very, very cheap. In this case,

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I think it might be around \$16 million. The 80/20
formula is unacceptable to me. 80 percent market
and 20 percent on this particular building; the
others may be $30/70$ , but the $80/20$ formula is
unacceptable. The 80 percent of the AMI, well
Bronx, South Bronx AMI is \$19,000 for a family of
four, and in many Harlem and East New York and
Bed-Stuy, Brownsville, you're talking about
\$30,000 for a family of four. It's not affordable
for us, which is why the City is very segregated,
more segregated than it ought to be, and this will
continue that. And BAM doesn't have a good
relationship in providing space for black cultural
groups. It's good that Tish got them to do this
one, but they have a horrible relationship with
communities of color and providing space and
supporting programs. This is not a good project
for us. When we have this kind of power, we need
to exercise it better and get more out of
developers, so the formula should be closer to
50/50 in affordable housing and we should do
better tat getting solid commitments for community
and union workers because usually when the process
gets unfolded after, we give in our power and pass

bedbug infestations and eradication is voted into
law. While we've made great strides as the AO New
York piece said today, against the bedbug
epidemic, which has plagued this City for a
decade, infestations continue to be reported in
our schools, businesses and homes. This new bill
will allow for transparent communication between
buildings owners and residents, with building
owners reporting on infestations and eradication
measures employed in their buildings to residents,
as well as the Department of Housing and
Development. Landlords will also convey basic
information concerning the prevention, detection
and removal of bedbug infestation to residents.
Once equipped with this knowledge, our City and
its residents will be better able to take measures
to prevent bedbug infestations. Thank you.
