11	Hearing; my name is Domenic M. Recchia, Jr.; I'm the
12	Chair of this committee; this is our first hearing
13	after the budge adoption on June 26; it's a pleasure
14	to be reunited with all my colleagues; at this time
15	I'd like to recognize all my colleagues who are with
16	us this morning. We have Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo,
17	Council Member Vincent Ignizio, Council Member Oliver
18	Koppell, Council Member Helen Diane Foster, Council
19	Member Diana Reyna, Council Member Joel Rivera;
20	Council Member Julissa Ferreras.
21	Today we have 5 items on our agenda; we
22	have two land use items, transparency reso and two
23	bills related to property taxes.
24	Let's start with the two land use items,
	1

both of which are in Council Member Melissa Mark-

Viverito's district; these items provide property tax
exemption to properties that provide rental housing
to low-income families. The first item, 74 West
105th Street provides 10 units of rental housing for
low-income families; this property will receive a
full property tax exemption for 30 years.

The next land use item, 153 Manhattan

Avenue, provides 64 units of rental housing for lowincome families; this property will also receive a

full property tax exemption for 30 years.

Those are our land use items for today.

Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito supports these items, representatives from HPD also here to answer any questions you may have on these items. We have also been joined by Council Member Lewis A. Fidler.

Now let's move on to transparency reso; this resolution sets forth new changes in the designation for certain organizations receiving local age and youth discretionary funding as well as new changing in the designation of certain organizations receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. This is our first transparency reso since the budget adoption, so please review it carefully. Representatives from Council Finance are

2 here to answer any questions you may have in the 3 transparency reso.

Organizations appearing in the resolutions that have not yet completed the prequalification process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contracts, the Council or another entity are identified with an asterisk (*) next to the. As with all transparency resos, council members will have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not a conflict exists. If any council member has a potential conflict of interest with any organization listed, he or she has an opportunity disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. As a reminder, please disclose any conflicts you might have with repose subcontractors that are used by the organizations. These disclosures must be made before the subcontractor can be approved; members will be contacted by the Council of Ethics and Employment Council Nadir (sp?) to complete disclosure forms as necessary.

The next item relates to the transfer of the alternative exemption for veterans upon the purchase of real property after the application deadline. This legislation is sponsored by Council

Member Vincent Ignizio, myself and the Speaker,Christine Quinn.

As it stands today, the application for filing the veteran property tax exemption must be filed by March 15th in order for the exemption to apply to the new fiscal year beginning July 1st. If a property owner moves or files an application after March 15th, the exemption will not apply to the property up to the subsequent July 1st. The delay results in the veteran waiting up to 16 months for the property tax exemption to apply to the property. During this period the veteran must pay the full amount of property tax even though he or she is eligible and has submitted an application.

In 2006, recognizing the burden of this lag time placed on veterans, the State Legislature adopted legislation to allow New York City to adopt the local law providing that once a veteran moves in a new purchased property within the five boroughs of New York City and informs Department of Finance of the move, the veteran's exemption will be pro-rated and transferred immediately to new residence upon the application. The exemption will be reflected in the next property bill paid by the veteran. This bill,

which acts on authority provided by the State will be effective immediately and applied to next year's assessment rolls.

The Department of Finance is here to answer any questions you may have on the veterans' bills. Eric Munson's here; he loves to get questions by council members. [laugh]

Our next and last piece of legislation is sponsored by Council Member James Oddo, Vincent Ignizio, myself and Speaker Quinn. The item relates to property tax rebate for certain properties affected by Superstorm Sandy. Pursuant to New York City Charter the taxable status of real property in the City was fixed for 2013... this year on January 5th, 2012. The real property taxes billed for fiscal year 2013 was based on the condition of the real property on that date. Since the value of these properties were determined before Superstorm Sandy, many property owners are currently paying property tax on properties at their pre-Sandy values which do not affect their current condition. This legislation provides real property tax relief to owners of properties on which there is a building determined by the Department of Buildings to be seriously damaged

and unsafe to enter or occupy or completelydemolished as a result of Superstorm Sandy.

The council and the administration have worked with the state legislation that would allow New York City to adopt a local law to provide a rebate of real property taxes to owners and tenant stockholders of eligible properties. The amount of the rebate reflects the reduction of the value of the improvements on eligible property for a period of eight months from the date of Superstorm Sandy to the end of FY 2013, which was June 30th. Rebate checks will be mailed in August with the single-family homeowners receiving a median income of \$629, commercial and manufacturing property owners will receive a mean amount of \$3,426.

On June 17, 2013 and June 20, 2013 the Assembly and the Senate passed State legislation which is pending the Governor's signature. This law adopts for the provision of State legislation and will go in effect once the Governor signs the State legislation.

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA: Okay... very close and effectively with us. I also wanna thank my wonderful Finance staff who's done a great job.

Before we hear from Department of Finance on the veterans' new bill and the rebate bill, I'd like to turn the microphone and recognize my colleagues.

Vincent Ignizio, if you would like to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Yes, thank you Mr. Chairman; I wanna thank you for hearing this bill and... and for our conversations and you helping spearhead it through this great committee and I appreciate your role as chairman and making this possible.

Now this is a... a bill which is such common sense and basically what New York City was doing was in fact charging a moving tax to our veterans who moved from the boroughs to the boroughs.

If you moved from Queens to Staten Island or from		
Staten Island to Queens and you had a veteran's tax		
exemption, well you would not receive that veterans		
tax exemption because of your moving. Ultimately it		
would not be applied until the subsequent tax year;		
that was just unfair and doesn't make any sense and		
we were taking several hundred dollars out of		
veterans' pockets who rightfully protected our		
country and this is a great bill that's gonna rectify		
that. I wanna thank Tanisha Edwards who worked with		
me and my office on making this bill a reality and		
finding out the limits that we were allowed to impose		
and also for the New York Post who also gave it a		
voice in their paper and Speaker Quinn, who upon		
hearing about the bill was as appalled as we all are		
and said we have to make this change. So this is a		
lesson in good government; this a good bill and this		
is one that's gonna put pockets into those who risked		
their lives for us and I appreciate it. Thank you		
very much, Mr. Chairman.		

CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA: Thank you Council Member. Council Member James Oddo.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Yeah, I'd like to start by thanking the Daily News.

And let me say this 15 though, that this was negotiated; this is the best 16 deal that we can get; clearly we wanted to cover a 17 larger universe of folks and it's my sense and my 18 hope, actually, that certainly not me; I will be long 19 gone, but next year sometime I think this institution 20 is gonna have to go back and the next administration on its own will have to address longer term property 21 taxes of Sandy impacted area, because this is nice, 22 23 it's good, we'll take it, but much more work is gonna have to be done, so thank you. 24
