3	ceremonials, and the first one that we have is for
4	Mexican Independence Day which we are celebrating on
5	the upcoming Monday. It's going to be the 203rd
6	anniversary, and today we have with us the Mexican
7	Consulate, and we want to give a proclamation, you
8	know, recognizing all the efforts and the rich
9	history that we have within the Mexican community
10	here in New York, in the United States, and of course
11	in our great relationship with the great country of
12	Mexico. I have with us my Council colleagues. We
13	have Council Member Liz Crowley and Council Member
14	Rosie Mendez bright-eyed and bushy tail, just a
15	couple days after the elections.
16	So, with that I want to ask the clerk to
17	please call the roll I mean to read the
18	proclamation.
19	COMMITTEE CLERK: Council of the City of
20	New York. Council of the City of New York is proud
21	to join all New Yorkers in celebrating the 203rd
22	anniversary of Mexican Independence day and to foster
23	a greater appreciation for the extraordinary rolls
24	Mexicans and Mexican-Americans have played in shaping
25	our city and our nation, and whereas the story of the

2	Mexican people is similar to the story of the United
3	States. The Mexican community's values, love of
4	family, a strong work ethic, a respect for our
5	heritage and a deep faith, our American values or
6	release citizens to great risks to begin new
7	independent and free lives for themselves and their
8	families, and that tradition continues today.
9	And whereas, Mexico, the fourth largest
10	country in the Western Hemisphere, is a cradle of
11	great pre-Spaniard civilizations like the Olmecs,
12	Mayas, Toltecs and the Aztecs of Mexicas [phonetic].
13	The story of its independence tells not only how it
14	came to be but also reveals its present realities and
15	future possibilities.
16	And whereas, Mexican Independence Day
17	celebrates the events and people that eventually
18	resulted in independence from Spain, the country that
19	controlled the territory known at that time as New
20	Spain. Near the end of the 18th century, the people
21	began to question how the traditional society was
22	based. They longed for freedom of speech, a
23	representative government, and restrictions on the
24	power of the Church.

2	Whereas, on September 15th, 1810, Father
3	Miguel Hidalgo officially proclaimed independence
4	from Spain. Within three months in the city of
5	Guadalajara, he also issued a decree abolishing
6	slavery, making Mexico the first nation to do so in
7	the Americas.
8	And whereas, today New York City is a
9	proud home to more than 319,000 Mexican immigrants
10	and Mexican-Americans who daily contribute the

11 cultural, artistic, economic, and entrepreneurial 12 vitality of the city. As they all continue to 13 strengthen the fabric of our city and our nation as a 14 place of unity and progress, we stand together to 15 recognize this important milestone and reflect not 16 only upon Mexico's rich heritage but its great future 17 as well.

18 Now therefore be it known that the
19 Council of the City of New York is proud to observe
20 Mexican Independence Day in celebration of its 203rd
21 anniversary.

24	Fernando Cabrera who's the Co-Chair of the Black,

8	surge of Mexicans that are the population of
9	Mexicans is growing 60,000. Now when I came in 1988
10	there were a few and so we're seeing a significant
11	part of the Mexican population growing, but we
12	rejoice and this Mexican Independence Day and we're
13	here to serve the community. Thank you so much.

15	much.
16	Okay, ladies and gentlemen, my
17	colleagues, we're going to start the second
18	ceremonial. Today we have with us the Lincoln Center
19	Education that we're going to be giving a
20	proclamation to on behalf of the Speaker, Gale
21	Brewer, Borough President Elect, I believe. Not yet
22	until November. And Jimmy Van Bramer, who is fresh
23	off of the primary elections. With that being said,
24	I want to give an opportunity to our colleague,

20	assigned to the 10th Mountain's First Brigade combat
21	team based at Fort Drum, New York.
22	While growing up in Staten Island,
23	Michael dreamed of following his father and
24	grandfather's footsteps in joining the Army. Shortly
25	after graduating Michael J. Petrides High School in

2	2006, he enlisted and served one tour in Iraq and was
3	on his second tour in Afghanistan when he was killed.
4	His neighbors described him as a quiet,
5	respectful young man, who loved sports, was truly a
б	great kid who would do anything to help people. His
7	mother Linda said, "we are so proud of Michael. He
8	always wanted to be a soldier, and we were very
9	supportive of him. He had just received the Bronze
10	Star a few weeks ago."
11	Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis is survived by
12	his parents, Robert and Linda, many relatives and
13	friends, and a grateful nation. He was the 92nd New
14	Yorker to die in service to our country since 9/11.
15	And to end on more uplifting new, which
16	Father George, it's so great you're here today to
17	give the invocations as we get to announce as you did
18	that Julissa gave birth to her first son Julian
19	yesterday and [applause] and thank God she and
20	Julian and everyone are doing terrific, but also to
21	keep the Council's family growing, Dan Garodnick and
22	his wife Zoe welcome their second child yesterday
23	[applause]. They had another boy, Devin Randolph
24	Garodnick. He weighed in at eight pounds even, and
25	mom and dad and big brother Asher are doing terrific.

5	Chief Medical Examiner that called into question DNA
6	findings and convictions around rape and sexual

8	that the work of our Chief Medical Examiner as it
9	relates to all efforts, but particularly to law
10	enforcement are above reproach, and that when errors
11	occur thorough review is done and that they are
12	reported to the Council, the Mayor, and the
13	appropriate district attorneys. That is now all
14	going to be required by law. I want to thank Chair
15	Arroyo and Chair Ferreras and all of the council
16	members who participated in two very, very thorough
17	oversight hearings to get to the bottom of the issue
18	with this problem, and I know that these pieces of
19	legislation will assure that if there are ever future
20	mistakes it doesn't cause the kind of tremendous
21	uncertainty and unknown for victims and their
22	families as we saw in this case. So let me thank
23	Council Member Ferreras and call on Chair Arroyo.

13	Member Rose and then Chair James.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you, Speaker.
15	My colleagues, I am proud and excited to sponsor Int
16	1107-A, which would require the Department of
17	Sanitation to conduct a two-year pilot for the
18	collection and composting of organic wastes from
19	residences and schools in the city. I want to thank
20	Speaker Quinn and Councilwoman James and
21	Environmental Chair Gennaro for their support of this
22	legislation and for a speedy progress through the
23	counsel. Int 1107 will expand the composting pilot
24	project launched this May to select areas in the city
25	as well as in our schools and establish a time table

2	for data collection from the pilot project and for
3	full expansion of the composting program throughout
4	the city. Composting makes good fiscal sense for the
5	city which currently pays over \$100 million dollars
б	per year to landfill organic waste. Organics make up
7	35 percent of the overall New York City waste stream.
8	By creating a full body composting
9	program, the city will address three important issues
10	for the city's future: Reducing its carbon footprint,
11	creating jobs, and saving money. By diverting
12	organic waste to composting facilities, New York City
13	will reduce landfill generated greenhouse gases. It
14	will also generate valuable fuel and other resources
15	for the city so that we are less reliant on fuel from
16	outside sources. The development of new composting
17	plants and programs will also generate green jobs and
18	can promote innovative new packaging materials which
19	in turn could become an important job generator for
20	the city.
21	As a Staten Islander, I know only too
22	well what a huge waste output means. We were
23	burdened with a temporary dump that existed for 50
24	years. We need to reduce landfill. We need to
25	reduce our carbon footprint. We need to generate

jobs, and we need to save money for the city. Adding
these factors up, the answer is clear, the time for
composting has come. It is a win-win solution for
many problems that the city faces. I hope you will
join me in voting for this important step towards
improving the city's sustainability in the long term.
Thank you.

percent of New York City's residential waste stream
is comprised of organic waste such as food scraps,
yard waste, and soiled paper. All but a fraction of
that waste is sent to landfills or incinerators.
Currently, the vast majority of composting that
occurs in New York City is conducted at the community
level. A robust residential composting program would
have a significant impact on the city's solid waste
stream.
The bill that we are voting on today
which is sponsored by my very good friend, Council
Member Debbie Rose, would establish a pilot program
for the composting of organic waste from residences
and schools in New York. I'm also happy to note that
the bill also includes a study on improving community

This will increase the 8 9 opportunities that veteran small businesses have in 10 competing and eventually winning city contracts. As 11 with the MWBE program, this is an excellent opportunity for the city to leverage its resources to 12 support an underserved yet capable population in our 13 14 communities. In supporting our veteran run small 15 businesses, we are ensuring that the service given by 16 our men and women in the military is repaid back to 17 them. The second bill is calling upon New York state 18 legislator and Governor Cuomo to pass Bill A2554, a bill that would ensure that at least three percent of 19 the total value of annual state procurements is 20 awarded to eligible veteran-owned businesses. 21 I'd like to my Small Business Committee 22 23 staff, Jeff Compana [phonetic], and wish well our policy analyst, Faith Corbett [phonetic], who has 24 moved on, who is now working in the CUNY System and 25
