vote on Intro 1105-A, a local law to amend the New

York City Charter in relation to planning for

resiliency to climate change as a responsibility

with The Office of Long-Term Planning and

Sustainability.

Superstorm Sandy hit New York City with intensity unparalleled by any coastal storm in recent history. In the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, the Department of Buildings Housing Recovery Operations team surveyed one to two-family homes and multi-family residential buildings and found that upwards of 30,000 housing units located in 9,000 plus buildings suffered damage as a result of Sandy. In order to address the ways that the city's existing building stock could be made more resilient and survivable, in November 2012, Mayor

| Bloomberg and City Council Speaker Quinn announced  |
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| the formation of the Building Resiliency Task       |
| Force. The task force, overseen by the Urban Green  |
| Council; the Urban Green Council is kind of like    |
| the local chapter of the U.S. Green Building        |
| Council. They've done a lot of stuff for us and     |
| they've been great partners. Okay, the task force,  |
| overseen by the Urban Green Council, is a           |
| collection of over 200 experts from a variety of    |
| fields, such as mechanical engineering, real estate |
| development and that were charged with making       |
| recommendations to improve building resiliency and  |
| maximize preparedness for future weather            |
| emergencies, including coastal flooding, heat       |
| waves, high winds and extended utility outages.     |
| After considering dozens of specific                |
| recommendations, on June 13th, 2013 the task force  |
| issued a report containing 33 actionable proposals  |
| for improving building resiliency in New York City  |
| for both new and current buildings. The above       |
| referenced planning process the above referenced    |
| planning processes represent important first steps  |
| in preparing for future events such as Sandy, but   |

The proposed legislation would 6 7 require... that is 1105-A. The proposed 8 legislation would require the city to take action 9 to create a permanent and ongoing planning and 10 preparation effort to make the city more resilient 11 against future natural disasters. The bill amends The New York Charter to add various duties for The 12 Office of Long-Term Planning and Sustainability 13 14 regarding planning to make the city more resilient 15 to natural disasters. Paragraph one of subdivision 16 B of the proposed bill would add resiliency of 17 critical infrastructure to built environment, 18 coastal protection and communities to the list of 19 subjects that The Office of Long-Term Planning and 20 Sustainability must develop policies, programs and actions to address. In short, we're making the 21 22 office bigger. We're giving them more stuff to do;

very important stuff and so that's okay.

page, the proposed bill would add a requirement

that a deputy director shall be appointed by OLTPS,

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1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION particularly to coordinate matters related to 2 3 resiliency planning, programs and actions. 4 deputy director would report to the director of The Office of Long-Term Planning and Sustainability. 5 The proposed bill would require the city's plan on 6 7 sustainability to be update with plans, programs and actions related to making the city more 8 9 resilient by no later than 2015 and every four 10 years thereafter. Finally, the proposed bill 11 would require that experts in fields related to 12 resiliency, such as architects and engineers, be added to the sustainability advisory board that 13 14 advises The Office of Long-Term Planning and 15 Sustainability and by extension plan YC on planning 16 relating to sustainability. Today's hearing and 17 vote is the first step towards a more sustainable future and I wish to call a vote. I'm going to 18 19 recognize the council members here. Of course it's 20 a bill that was introduced by me, so certainly I support it and ask for a yes vote and we're joined 21 by Council Members Vallone, Crowley and Levin and 22 23 with that said, I would... and if anyone wishes to make a statement at this time, I'm you know, happy 24

to entertain a statement or statements or remarks,
