CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Council hearing for September 24th, 2013 and first off we have Council Member Fernando Cabrera from the Bronx and we're gonna be honoring The Samaritans of New York, so if the group can come forward.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: We have all the volunteers with Samaritans of New York and I'm gonna turn... turn the mic over to Council Member Cabrera to talk about the group. Council Member.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: Thank you so much. Truly it's an honor to honor a group, The Samaritans, they are doing life-saving work, literally they're saving lives; suicide prevention work; they have a tremendous hotline.

What you're lookin' at right now, you're lookin' at, right now you're lookin' at volunteers that receive three months of training; they are committed to do this at least for a year, some of them have gone on to doin' this in a longer time span. Having come from this field of mental health, as a licensed mental health counselor and I hold my Doctorate in Counseling, I can truly tell you that if it wasn't for you, for the work that you do, there

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will be more casualties and we need to elevate this
level of discussion to a place where it is okay to

4 talk about a word that is taboo; often we talk about

5 just about everything and somebody could be sick,

6 they could have an illness and we'll talk about that

7 | illness, but when it comes to suicide there is a

8 | taboo that in our society we need to get rid of so we

9 can continue saving lives; Samaritans been doing that

10 for 30 years, 30 years and they deserve a real good

11 | round of applause.

Let me just say one more thing; I was thinking about the name Samaritan and there's a biblical motif there of someone who was saving... who took the time, they didn't have to, to save somebody who was injured and we have a lot of people who are emotionally injured and if that person would have been left there they will probably not make it and that's what you're doing; you are going forth and touching those who are emotionally crippled, who need help and you're there for that help and we wanna thank you.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: 'Kay, can the Clerk please read the proclamation?

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Council, City of New York 2 CLERK: 3 Proclamation. In observing September as Suicide Prevent Month, the Council of the City of New York is 4 proud to honor Samaritans of New York for its 5 6 critical contributions and services. And whereas 7 suicide is now the tenth leading cause of death in the United States, resulting in more fatalities 8 9 annually than automobile accidents, in New York City suicide is the fourth leading cause of death for 10 11 those 15 to 34 years of age and the sixth leading cause for those 35 to 44. This serious public health 12 problem can have lasting harmful effects on 13 individuals, families and communities. While the 14 15 causes of suicide are complex, the goal of suicide 16 prevention is simple; promote education and 17 awareness, provide immediately accessible support, 18 identify warning signs and risk factors and enhance

On this occasion we are proud to acknowledge that Samaritans has excelled in this cause for over 30 years and whereas Samaritans of New York and its more than 100 dedicated volunteers from across the five boroughs staff the City's 24-hour suicide prevention hotline, 212-673-3000, answering

protective factors that increase resilience.

over 60,000 calls each year and provide immediately
accessible and ongoing emotional support in crisis
responses to callers in distress, depressed and
suicidal and whereas Samaritans suicide prevention
efforts also include public education, suicide
survivor support groups, community collaborations and
outreach programs that provide needed care, support,
training and resources to those touched by suicide.

The organization has also had a significant impact in promoting suicide prevention awareness, education and readiness, especially for at-risk youth, in collaboration with the New York City Council, the New York City Department of Education, Department of Youth and Community Development, Department for the Aging, New York City Housing Authority, NYPD, FDNY, GMHC Aids Task Forces, Safe Horizon, Asian-American Federation on Mental Health, Communal Life and others and through the training and professional development of more than 35,000 New York City caregivers and health providers.

SAMARITANS CHAIRMAN: Just wanna thank you very much; Samaritans wouldn't be here if it weren't for the support of the City Council; your acknowledgment of the importance of suicide prevention in our communities; in our schools is so important; the recognition of September as Suicide Prevention Month in New York is something that's very important for this health epidemic in this country and the volunteers of Samaritans have been doing this work for over 30 years, over 120 people working 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, have answered over a million calls from people in distress, who are overwhelmed, who are in crisis, who are traumatized; have been through disasters, manmade and otherwise, and as the Council Member said, people talk about Samaritans; these volunteers morning, noon and night

come and do the work, they're rarely recognized, they work behind the scenes, but when someone in New York is in trouble we're always there. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Today's land use call-ups were adopted by a vote of 44 affirmative, zero in the negative. Communication from the Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. We are voting on a number of pieces of legislation today dealing with recommendations from the Building Resiliency Task Force and a piece of legislation coming out of the Civil Rights Committee; let me start with that piece of legislation dealing with adding extra requirements around not discriminating against pregnant women in the workplace. Can we just get a little quiet for a sec?

MALE VOICE: Keep it down please... [crosstalk]

SPEAKER QUINN: I wanna thank Alix Pustilnik, Julene Beckford and Damien Butvick for their work on this; I wanna thank the lead sponsor of the bill, Council Member Jimmy Vacca and the Chair of the Civil Rights Committee, Debbie Rose, for their work on this.

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2	This piece of legislation will require
3	that the City's Human Rights Law is crystal clear
4	around employers' requirement to not just not
5	discriminate against pregnant women, but also to
6	require that they make appropriate accommodations in
7	the workplace when necessary for a pregnant employee.
8	This bill was championed in addition to Council
9	Member Vacca and Debbie Rose by NOW, New York City,
10	by Legal Momentum and A Better Balance and we wanna
11	thank all of them and thank the women whose personal
12	stories of treatment in the workplace, which you
13	would just find so shocking it still occurs, helped
14	all craft this bill and make sure we will now have a
15	very strong Human Rights Law in this area which give
16	people, if they are the victims of discrimination,
17	the option of going to civil court or to the Human
18	Rights Commission. Let me call on the sponsor of the
19	bill, Chair Vacca and the Chair of the Committee,
20	Chair Rose.

This law seeks to have proactive action taken to protect the rights of pregnant woman. I

CHAIR VACCA: Thank you Speaker Quinn.

sponsored this legislation because there were glaring

holes in existing rules and regulations that govern

this matter. Things that you and I may think of as common sense and things that you and I may say of course will be accommodated were not always being accommodated in the workplace and it caused distress and it caused major problems for women who had to work because of economic situations or other reasons wanted to work during their pregnancy. Many of those affected are in the retail sector of our employment. We heard stories and I just wanted to read one or two.

A pregnant home attendant was sent home from work at 17 weeks pregnant because she submitted a doctor's note with a modest lifting restriction.

The employer acted without any discussion of what she could or could not do on the job; she was simply sent home. She could've stayed and worked and avoided hefty lifting but was never given the opportunity; she was terminated; she had to go to a homeless shelter.

A pregnant retail worker was rushed to the emergency room when she fainted on the job because her boss would not let her drink water while standing for hours at the cash register. She was 16 weeks pregnant and severely dehydrated; her doctor

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2	had told her to be vigilant about drinking water, but
3	her boss would not allow it; she was rushed to the
1	hospital by ambulance and treated with intravenous

5 fluids.

So where you and I think that this is just common sense and common decency, we never codified into City law that these rights are basic rights, we... [interpose]

SPEAKER QUINN: I'm sorry; can we just get a little quiet for Council Member Vacca?

CHAIR VACCA: Thank you Speaker...

[interpose]

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you; sorry Jimmy.

CHAIR VACCA: Thank you Speaker Quinn.

16 We... what we've done is that we've told people, go to

17 | the Human Rights Commission; go take civil action.

18 | Well we want to avert that from happening; those

19 actions, be it civil court or a brief with the Human

20 Rights Commission, those actions take months to

21 | adjudicate while the pregnant woman cannot go to work

22 or works under terrible conditions affecting her

23 | health and the health of her unborn child. So

24 today's legislation speaks to what our city should do

to protect the rights of both the unborn and the pregnant female.

So I hope that you'll pass it; I wanna thank the advocacy groups; I wanna thank those who came forth and testified and really made this legislation a reality and it will go a long way to protecting so many of our women in this city. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Chair Rose.

CHAIR ROSE: Thank you, Speaker. I wish to thank the Council Members and Council Member Vacca for his leadership on this legislation and to Speaker Quinn for her support. I am proud to be a co-sponsor of Intro 0974 A, the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act.

And after hearing the testimony of woman after woman who came before the Committee to talk about something that is natural, as natural as breathing, how it had become a handicap and could lead to a woman losing her job simply because she was pregnant.

I wish that this bill was not needed; that in 2013 pregnant women were not in danger of losing their jobs or positions of authority based on pregnancy. The Federal Pregnancy Discrimination Act

was passed more than 30 years ago, but still the problem persists. And I wanna thank Angie Welfare for her bravery in fighting this.

The national figures are alarming;

pregnancy-related discrimination charges have

increased by 35 percent in the past decade and

comprise 20 percent of the discrimination claims

brought by women; this is unacceptable, especially as

women comprise almost 50 percent of the workforce and

are the primary or co-primary earners in over two
thirds of American households.

The Pregnancy Workers Fairness Act will prohibit discrimination in employment based on pregnancy, childbirth or related conditions and will require that employers provide a reasonable accommodation to pregnant women and those who suffer conditions related to pregnancy and childbirth as long as it does not cause undue hardship. No long will women be in danger of losing their jobs simply because they need to leave their desk or work station for a drink of water, a quick bathroom break or to get off their feet for a few moments.

My colleagues, I hope you will join me in voting to pass this bill, because with this passage

New York City will be, as it has often been, a leader and trend-setter on an important civil rights issue.

Thank you.

Rose. We are also voting on a package of legislation, as I mentioned, which deals with the recommendations of the Building Resiliency Task Force which the Council and the Bloomberg Administration put together after Hurricane Sandy to ask industry experts to come up with recommendations about how we can improve existing building structures and new building structures to make sure they are more climate change and natural disaster ready.

I wanna make a special thank you to
everyone on the Task Force, but particularly to
Russell Unger; a Council alum who is the head of the
Green Buildings Council and chaired the Task Force
for us. I wanna thank Chair Gennaro, whose
committee... one of the bills went through and is a
sponsor of a number of the bills, Chair Dilan, who
four of the bills went through his committee. I
wanna thank Council Member Fidler, Council Member
Ignizio, Council Member Nelson and Council Member
Richards who along with Chair Gennaro are sponsors of

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the legislation. I wanna thank Laura Popa, Samara Swanston, Dan Avery and Jeff Baker for their work on the legislation in the EP Committee; Bob Homm [phonetic], Colin Howe [phonetic] and Jeff Baker for their work on the legislation in the Housing and Building Committee. These legislation... also... sorry, Ed Atkin, Jeff Baker for their work as well.

These pieces of legislation in the Environmental Protection Committee deal with the important recommendation of requiring that resilience to climate change is a responsibility codified into law into the Mayor's Office of long-term planning and sustainability. I think folks who remember that we in the Council took the important step of making that office a legal requirement in the City of New York; we wanna make sure we respond to what happened in the City by making resiliency to climate change a requirement of the focus of this office. I just also wanna remind folks, as we look at the environmental protection and the housing and buildings bills today, these bills following the 10 other pieces of legislation we passed requiring better planning and preparedness as it deals with the impact of natural disasters on residents across the City.

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Let me start by calling on the Chair of Environmental Protection and the sponsor of 1105 A, Chair Gennaro.

and I'd like to thank all my colleagues for this body's great response to Hurricane Sandy; I think this has been one of the body's finest hours. I'd like to remind all the members that even before Sandy hit back in August of 2012 we passed a comprehensive law that provided for the orderly planning and the financing of all kinds of resilience measures that we would have to do, because we knew back in 2012 that a big storm was gonna come and of course eight weeks later it did. So we were out in front of the issue and then once the storm happened we've really risen to the occasion, so I'm very proud of the Speaker and the body for really doing what it did.

Let me just talk briefly about the bill that the Speaker was just talking about with regard to the Office of Long-Term Planning and Sustainability. We're making the job a little bigger; we... this is an office that the Mayor created that we, like the Speaker said, put forward in law and now we're giving them the added responsibility of

having the position that will deal with this; we're going to actually tweak the Sustainability Advisory

Board to make sure it has members that can deal with these issues; we're calling upon PlaNYC also to fully embrace, you know the idea of making the City more, you know, climate change friendly and more resilient, so this a great step in that direction.

And once again, I thank this body for really rising to the occasion for making this City you know much more climate change friendly. Thank you Madame Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much,
Chair Gennaro. And then I want to again thank Chair
Dilan, Council Members Fidler, Ignizio, Nelson and
Richards and the four pieces of legislation sponsored
by those members deal with requiring that toilets and
faucets be capable of operating with an external
supply of electrical power, a study to study the
effects of wind on city buildings, a manual on flood
construction and protection standards and legislation
requiring a study to prevent the backflow of sewage
and I wanna thank everyone who was a part of that.

I also wanna make note that out of the Transportation Committee we're passing 1088 A and

that?

thank Chair Vacca and Council Member Gennaro, who was a sponsor of that. I wanna thank Lyle Frank, Jeff Baker and Bob Homm who worked on that and that piece of legislation will require a study of permeable roadway and sidewalk materials and I don't know if the sponsor... Jim, did you wanna say a few words on

briefly. This is something that we've been talking about for a long time; it was very critical with regard to how we managed storm water something; it's really an idea that we've trying to push for the last couple years, as we try to deal with storm water, as we try to get less storm water to go in the sewers and that of course leads to less pollution of our local waterways and of course this has been made all the more important in a post-Sandy world and I'm very happy to have worked with Chairman Vacca and other members of the Council to get this permeable pavement built. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. And as we mentioned before, today is a day where we will sadly say goodbye in the City Council sense to our colleague and friend, Helen Diane Foster as she

for Helen.

resigns her seat in the City Council today and
effective tonight the City Council's loss will be the
Cuomo Administration's gain as she becomes the State
Commissioner of Human Rights. So let's hear it again

SPEAKER QUINN: And... and I wanna recognize that we have been joined by Council Member Foster's husband, Eric McKay who is with us, her father, Council Member Reverend Wendell Foster who's with us, her mom... her mom, Helen Foster who's with us and her sister Rebecca who are also with us.

And I think the... how many years has this seat been held by a Foster? I was gonna say 37, but 36, which is remarkable benefit to the Borough and to the District, Helen being the second Foster, entered the Council on January 1st, 2002 and in her 12 years on the Council she has ably chaired the Parks and Recreation Committee, the State and Federal Legislation Committee; she also served on the Committees on Aging, Education, Finance, Health, Public Safety, as well as others. She served for quite some time as the co-chair of black, Latino and Asian caucus and the Women's Caucus. And I just

wanna say, if you were to think of a position that would be the right one for Helen to go to after her incredibly strong forceful, focused advocacy on the City Council it would be a job fighting for human rights across this City and State, because I think notwithstanding all the committees I listed; if you asked everybody what is the issue that Helen, you have fought most aggressively, most effectively and in the most compelling and personal way for; it is equality in this City, in this body, in this government; in this country and I know we would all love you to stay till December 31st, but this really... and not just... 'cause I think your headquarters is in the Bronx, right? This is a job made for Helen Foster, so... [interpose]

[applause]

SPEAKER QUINN: Helen, thank you for your great service to the City and in advance, thank you for your great service to our State and I know the ways that you've improved this City Council, the ways you've improved this City government and this City will now be possible for all the counties of our great state, so it's great to have all of the Council Member... the... shouldn't say Council Members elect,

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sorry Republicans, the Democratic nominees, but particularly to have Vanessa with us today. So Helen, thank you so much and if I could ask you to say a few words.

[applause]

COUNCIL MEMBER FOSTER: Thank you very much. This is... I know this came as a shock to many when you saw the resignation and some people were like, you know, is she okay? Thank God I'm okay and the family's okay.

When I look back it's almost like we went through high school together; we've all been here, some for 12 years, some shorter; I remember when we got here it was the joke; Melinda, Yvette Clark and myself, we were the losers 'cause we couldn't find dates and Diana Reyna set the bar so high by having a baby at like 12 noon an at 12:02 she had visitors and we would laugh; as old as we are, if we ever have kids we don't want people to come see us until the kid is at least two.

COUNCIL MEMBER FOSTER: And I just look around; we've been through so much together, the trips we've taken; of course, when we were here with

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the horrible murder of James Davis; people that outside of this setting I probably would not have gotten to know, like Jimmy Oddo, who I love dearly and every time pre-season or whatever it's called with The Mets, I think of him because I don't know too many Mets fans...

COUNCIL MEMBER FOSTER: Only because I live near the other stadium. So I... I'm... I'm... it's bitter sweet and of course, to my Bronx delegation, I don't know what you guys are gonna do with... well you won't have... [interpose]

COUNCIL MEMBER FOSTER: without me in the delegation meetings, 'cause you gotta admit, I add some... [laugh] I add some humor and of course, to the Finance staff, thank you for making sure my groups got money. To the support staff, I couldn't do it or wouldn't try to do it without you, from Phyllis having a Baby Ruth for me to Barbara telling me where to go, not literally where to go...

In addition to that, it uses very vague terms to define what those undo hardships are, but I am most concerned with Section 22, which indicates that a related medical condition is known or should have been known by the employer. When it comes to issues like this, should have been known is just an impossible legal standard to prove. When we're

dealing with pregnancy there's an obvious, you know,
component to it and there are the not so obvious
components of what go wrong post and prepartum. And
so putting that kind of an onerous on our small
businesses will just heed the trial lawyers, which is
something I'm acutely aware of and so I for that
reason will abstain on it; I think the intention of
the bill is very good; however, ultimately the
language of the bill invites as much trouble for our
small businesses as it does for its possibility of
being overturned for its imprecise language, so I
will vote to abstain on that one. Thank you.
