Puerto Rican Studies and the phenomenal work that

they do and today we are honored to have them here to

receive this Proclamation; we know my colleague here,

Melissa Mark-Viverito wanted to put this together and

along with my colleagues that are here we have this

great event. So I'm gonna pass the mic over to MMV

real quick.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Majority Leader and I wanna congratulate El Centro de Estudios Puertorriquenos on their 40 years; I thank all the colleagues, we have a lot of colleagues that have signed onto this; many of them are present, and as we all know, in the 1970's was a really difficult

time, for there was a lot of focus on empowerment, minority rights and in terms of having our studies taught in a university system and it was through that struggle that in February of 1973 the Center for Puerto Rican Studies was born and it came out of the urging of CUNY faculty as well, as a way of having a repository of where our history, our contribution would be available.

And so this year it's... the Center's celebrating those 40 years, a place where the history and the story of 4.7 million stateside Puerto Ricans is held. And in this anniversary there's been a whole series of events happening this year to document it and we're very excited that we're able to recognize those accomplishments here in the City Council.

Focus of the Center is on research,
education; they have a wonderful library and
archives, which now has recently been moved to my
District in El Barrio East Harlem, also publications,
an incredibly thorough website where a lot of
research information can be found and obviously
events that are held.

So for myself, personally; as a Puertorriquena, as the first Puerto Rican woman to represent my District, El Barrio East Harlem, which is known as the cradle of the Puerto Rican community, and now El Centro has moved and is located in the community; it's really an honor for them to be here today and to really thank El Centro for all the work that they've done to really document our contributions over the years.

So with that I would like to ask the Clerk to read the Proclamation and then we would ask the Director of Center, Edwin Melendez, to say a few words.

York Proclamation. Whereas during the social turmoil of the early 1970's a group of visionary Puerto Rican professors at CUNY, spearheaded by renowned scholar, Frank Bonilla, urged the Board of Higher Education to establish a venue for research that would galvanize CUNY's fledgling Puerto Rican Studies Department.

On February 26th, 1973 El Centro de
Estudios Puertorriquenos, Center for Puerto Rican
Studies or Centro, made its debut. And whereas
guided by Dr. Bonilla as its founding Director for

to migration.

its first 20 years, Centro integrated many strands of Puerto Rican study; history, politics economics and cultural development, with the aim of exposing the forces behind ethnic and racial prejudice, examining the colonial relationship between Puerto Rico and the mainland and analyzing the extensive post-world war

Centro quickly grew into one of our nation's top archives and research centers on the Puerto Rican experience. Today Centro is the oldest and largest Latino research and archival institution in the Northeast United States.

And whereas now under the guidance of Director Edwin Melendez, Centro is a critical venue for policymakers, researchers, writers, historians, educators and others seeking to discover the unique stories of over 4.7 million stateside Puerto Ricans.

And whereas this year, as part of its

40th anniversary Centro embarked on a year-long
campaign entitled the 100 Puerto Ricans for

Historical Preservation. The campaign is designed to
encourage 100 Puerto Rican stateside individuals and
organizations to become part of our historical
resources by donating their personal papers and other

Council Member Tish James on her win-off in the

Department of Health to deal with restaurant issues,

they also will require the Department of Health to
develop and disseminate a food service establishment
inspector code of conduct, a food establishment
advisory board, a consultative inspection program so
restaurants can have kind of a run-through inspection
before the final inspection, so I wanna thank
everyone for their work on this. Let me call on
Chair Arroyo, Council Member Gentile, Council Member
Koo, Council Member Van Bramer and Council Member
Reyna, if she'd like to say anything, in that order
and if we could get a little quiet for the Chair
[crosstalk]

COUNCIL MEMBER ARROYO: Yeah, for my... for my neighbor next to me who's... thank you, Madame

Speaker and thank you for your leadership and your commitment to making sure that the package of legislation that we will adopt here today makes a great deal of sense for our City and the small businesses across our individual district. Those of us who frequent our establishments in our district get nothing but complaints about the letter-grading inspection process; I think what we do here today sets an incredibly strong framework moving forward

and begins a conversation about how we can further improve it in the future.

Thank you, Madame Speaker and my colleagues for their support in this process and I urge my colleagues to vote yes on all the bills.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Chair Arroyo.

Council Member Gentile.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Thank you,

Madame Speaker and thank you for your leadership on
this issue also and to Chairman Arroyo.

Small businesses are the backbone of our economy, so in order to help these businesses grow and succeed, health inspectors must work with restaurant owners rather than attempt to catch them off guard and penalize them.

My bill develops an inspection code of conduct pamphlet based on standards that exist in the restaurant inspection process. As inspectors will be required to distribute the pamphlet to all restaurant owners and operators prior to an inspection, this bill ensures that everyone is aware of how inspections are to proceed and no one is caught off guard; no more gotcha type of activity from the Health Department. Thank you.

Intro 1146, will strengthen the restaurant grading

2	system by allowing restaurants to voluntarily receive
3	non-punitive consultative inspections, allowing small
4	business owners, particularly new small business
5	owners, those who are newly opening restaurants, to
6	request that a health inspector come and walk through
7	the establishment with the owner and instead of
8	fining them and taking their money at one of the most
9	vulnerable points, actually teaching them and working
10	with them to do the right thing so that they don't
11	have to be fined and allowing them the opportunity to
12	correct any problems that they may be having and to
13	instruct them on how they can do things better. I
14	think this is a win-win; it's great for our
15	restaurants; they very much will appreciate this
16	opportunity to be inspected, but on a instructive and
17	educational basis, in a non-punitive way and our
18	long-standing restaurants will also be able to
19	request this educational inspection and this will
20	only make our restaurants better and most
21	importantly, keep the hard-earned dollars in the
22	pocket of our small business owners so they can
23	reinvest those in the communities in which they
24	operate. So thank you very much, Madame Speaker and
25	all my colleagues.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. And we are also voting today on Intro 1049 A, a piece of legislation that will expand service on the Staten Island Ferry; I wanna thank Chair Jimmy Vacca for moving this through the Transportation Committee, Lyle Frank, Molly Murphy, Guy Ferzola [phonetic], Jonathan Sermano [phonetic], Nathan Toth [phonetic] and Chima [phonetic] Ochicheri [phonetic] for working on this... Shima [phonetic], excuse me, Ochicheri, for working on this piece of legislation.

I wanna congratulate the sponsor,

Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo and also congratulate

Council Members Vinny Ignizio and Debi Rose, members

of the Staten Island Delegation, in case you couldn't

pick that up, for their work on this bill and let me

call on the sponsor of the bill, Minority Leader

Oddo.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Thank you, Madame Speaker. There is an unfortunate right of passage for just about every Staten Islander and that's racing to catch the boat and having those doors close in your face and knowing that you now have to wait for the next one. And on the weekends, from 7 p.m. on, that wait was an entire hour and what this bill

message.

does is say that we're gonna give some immediate help and additional service on those weekend hours and we're gonna establish a date certain where we have 24 hours a day, 7 days a week half-hour ferry service. So this is a pivotal juncture in the shaping of the North Shore of Staten Island and Staten Island as a whole, this is a huge victory for the commuters and the residents of Staten Island and maybe a little bit more subtly, this sends a very critical message to the current small business owners on the North Shore and those folks looking at the potential projects slated for the North Shore and thinking about investing; it sends them a very positive and powerful

I wanna thank Chairman Vacca, I wanna thank the staff that the Speaker alluded to, and including; I don't know if she mentioned, Laura Popa for her assistance; Chris DeCicco, my legal counsel. Obviously I wanna thank Council Members Ignizio and Rose for the united effort in getting our colleagues to sponsor.

I'd like to thank Nicholas and Rashenda
[phonetic] from the... Nicholas and Rashenda, who came
to visit my office several months ago from the Ferry

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Riders Committee and the St. George Civic
Association, who really, with the impetus with
fighting this fight once again.

And I would just like to close on this. In 1999, when I was first elected, 15 years ago, women on Staten Island faced the longest waits for mammographies in the City. And not only did women not get timely mammographies, many of them chose not to get mammographies at all and 15 years ago I enlisted the help of my new colleague, Christine Quinn and for 15 years in this body as the Health Chair and as a Speaker she has been my friend and she has been a friend to my community. And as we end our Council tenure together, it's really a remarkable legacy she leaves and to leave it on this high note with this really critical bill that will help people long after she's not longer the speaker, it's very fitting, so I just wanna publicly thank my friend, Chris yet again. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much,

Jimmy. We are also voting today in the Finance

Committee on the SoHo BID; wanna thank Council Member

Chin and Chair Recchia for their work on that. I

wanna thank Tanisha Edwards who worked for many

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months to achieve an agreement on the SoHo BID and I don't know, Council Member Chin, if you wanted to say... do you wanna say anything about the SoHo BID?

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Madame Chair, Speaker, thank you for your leadership and your support and this has been a long time coming, it's almost two-and-a-half... more than two-and-a-half years and I really wanted to thank all the Steering Committee members and also all the staff of the Department of Small Business Services working together with Chair Recchia and Tanisha Edwards. We've crafted this SoHo BID that is almost like a residential business improvement district, because residential property owners will have 50 percent on the governing board and I think this is really historic and I really wanna thank all the residents and everyone that worked together on this and I urge my colleagues to support it. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. We are also voting on a pre-considered resolution that deals with having the City of New York adopt the provisions of the State legislation on the New York City of Hurricane Sandy filing fee exemption and

reimbursement act. I wanna thank Chair Recchia and the Finance Committee for moving quickly on this to make sure that we would make the opt-in date once the Governor had signed the bill and let me call on the sponsor of this, Council Member Lew Fidler, to say a few words.

Speaker Quinn. You know, we found out that 25 days ago Governor Cuomo signed a piece of legislation that would exempt those who got Small Business

Administration loans as a result of damage sustained in Hurricane Sandy from having to file... pay recording taxes, when they recorded the documents that were required by SBA. It's not a lot of money, but it's the right thing to do and even though it's a small gesture, the money will be refunded to those who've already expended it and for those who haven't done so yet, they will not have to pay it.

I wanna thank Speaker Quinn for moving on this so quickly, because we were really up against a deadline in the Mayor's Administration as well. I wanna thank the Finance Committee and I want to also thank Tyra Zenassa [phonetic], Assemblywoman Helene Weinstein, who passed this enabling legislation in

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Albany and I wanna give a shout out to my counsel,
Brad Reid, who realized we had another five days to
pass it or lose it. So thank you, Speaker again and
I appreciate the support of my colleagues on this
Reso.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much,

Council Member Fidler. And then we... well I wanna
take a moment to thank all of the members of the Land
Use staff who had a lot of work on a lot of different
items, some of which we will discuss, some of which
we won't today, but if you worked on any of the items
we'll discuss, thank you; if you work on any of those
we didn't discuss, thank you as well. Particular I
wanna thank Amy Levitan, Ann McConnaughey [phonetic]
of Land Use and with super, super, particularly,
Ramon Martinez of the Speaker's Office for all of his
work and Amy and Anne's work on what we're gonna talk
about today.

I wanna thank the Chair of the Committee,
Council Member Leroy Comrie, the Chair, in this case,
the Zoning Subcommittee, Council Member Weprin, for
his work. Three of the major proposals we're voting
on today, one deals with a proposal in Halletts Cove
in Council Member Vallone's district, the Five Points

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Development in Council Member Van Bramer's district,

3 and Willets Point in Council Member Ferreras'

district. Let me first call on Chair Comrie, then 4

Chair Weprin, then Council Member Vallone, Council 5

6 Member Van Bramer and Council Member Ferreras.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Thank you Madame Speaker, I just wanted to take an opportunity to congratulate all of the council members that were involved the project, Council Member Vallone for working on the Halletts Point project, which will make a major improvement over a \$1 billion investment in the Astoria area, Council Member Garodnick who had to deal with a difficult situation on East 96th Street, dealing with an expiration of an Urban Renewal project and tryin' to make sure that the needs of the community were met as far as maintaining public space, Council Member Van Bramer with the Five Points Project where it had been a traditional artists location and artists had come in and squatted in the property and turned it into a destination point, where it actually was just featured in a movie, Five Points, and working with to make sure that the developer that had the actual right to the property created an opportunity to make sure that it

1 CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING stays a destination for artists and artists have a 2 3 chance to use it, and also creating more affordable 4 housing in the project and creating opportunities for the community to have a piece of the project as well 5 and increasing the level of affordability. But to, 6 7 especially Council Member Ferreras and her staff, I wanna congratulate her staff as well who put in a 8 9 yeoman effort working with her to change the Willets 10 Point project from what it was going to be a project 11 that is gonna very inclusive for opportunities for 12 the community, opportunities for the existing workers that work in the Iron Triangle, opportunities for 13 14 making... increasing the affordable housing and 15 building all types of affordable housing, creating a 16 school, creating a sustainable farm, creating 17 opportunities for local vendors to be part of the retail complex that will be there, creating major 18 19 construction and permanent jobs. You know for 20 decades Willets Point has served as an ash dump for the City and now as the Iron Triangle has still been 21 a difficult area. During this time the City failed 22 23 to create the proper infrastructure for this

industrial zone and missed many opportunities to

bring resources to the community. Now, thanks to

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Council Member Ferreras we have a real opportunity to remove the blight and to ensure that that now is a destination point for the entire city to be proud of.

Additionally, Council Member Ferreras has worked to create marketing plans for the existing workers, the businesses had already been dealt with, marketing plans and job training opportunities and business relocation opportunities for the workers and no small endeavor; she was able to make sure that Flushing Meadow Park had a major contribution to increase the ability to maintain and improve their park in perpetuity. So I wanna thank her, thank all of the people; I wanna thank Council Member Mark Weprin for holding all of these long hearings to make sure that the projects were full vetted. I wanna thank all of the advocates for making sure that they had an opportunity to be totally heard, because none of this would've happened.

And finally, I wanna thank all of the members that supported Council Member Ferreras to make sure that whatever she decided at this project that she had the full support of the entire body to make sure that this happened. Thank you, Madame Chair.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much Chair

3 | Comrie. Chair Weprin.

COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: I'll try to keep it brief, Madame Speaker, thank you very much.

Ladies and gentlemen, it's been a long time coming on these projects and there was a lot of effort put into each one of them and the thing that really does my heart proud is that we did have an 8hour hearing on these projects and heard from hundreds and hundreds of people with many different concerns and you know, the thing that works around here is when you hear the concerns you're able to incorporate them into the individual projects and that's our job; that's what we're out here to do and we heard from everyone who wanted to testify right to the end, into the evening, anyone who wanted to speak on these issues and have their voice heard and they were heard. Now not everyone got everything they wanted, but issues in Willets Point in particular to do with housing, to do with the workers, with the businesses, to do with the park advocates, money for the park, it really was amazing that we were able to take care of so many diverse interests and I've gotta give Council Member Ferreras an enormous amount of

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credit for that, she really worked so hard during a very busy time in her life.

I also just quickly want to acknowledge the other... we had four controversial items on that same hearing and Five Points, where Jimmy Van Bramer's district has managed to increase affordable housing and also to increase artist space, which was the big discussion there; what to do with this project that the developer had given to the community as far as an artist space and now was continuing, trying to figure out ways to keep them happen, and then I see my colleague for 92nd Street, Dan Garodnick, who also had a bit of a negotiation on an unusual project of parkland that was owned by a development who might've done too good a job of making it a park. And lastly, Peter Vallone, Jr. on Halletts Point, who insisted on having access to a ferry service and to look into that project in what is a community supported project.

So the process works ladies and gentlemen and it is great when the community voices can be heard and that the members can sit there and advocate on behalf of their constituents, so it's one of those

times I'm proud to be a member of the City Council.Thank you very much.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much Chair Weprin. Council Member Vallone.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you. As Mark said, Halletts Point is a community supported project; it's been in the works for five years now; it's going to being development to an area, one of the few areas left that sorely, sorely needs it, an area that is an actual peninsula where the Astoria houses exist now that doesn't have a bank, doesn't have a supermarket and until this development didn't have much hope of getting those.

In the last five years I've worked with the people in this room and with the developers to cut this project down half the size that it was to create a beautiful waterfront park and promenade, bring a supermarket, bring a bank, provide space for a K-8 school, provide better sightlines for the community to the water; more integration into the existing community. The developers who did an excellent job went out got the support of, unanimously of the Community Board of every community group of every elected official, other than myself,

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up until last night and of the Borough President.

And last night we did get an agreement with the help of Chair Weprin and others to provide over \$500,000 to a study regarding the feasibility, the engineering and the design of ferry service to that peninsula, because if you're gonna put this many people onto a peninsula you're gonna have to put a way for them to commute that doesn't overburden existing facilities.

So I wanna thank everyone in the room for their assistance and look forward to this needed development for this area. Thank you.

Also, there'll be 12,000 square feet of internal artist studio and gallery space. Initially what was offered was 2,000 square feet; that's 12,000 square feet for artist studio and gallery space, with a written agreement that those who are dislocated will be invited back; those will be the first artists invited back into the new facility.

In addition to the 12,000 square feet of internal artist space there'll be nearly 10,000 square feet of external art panels and walls on the facade of the building that will be reserved for

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graffiti and aerosol art, true to the heritage and the legacy of Five Points, and there is a written agreement that the founder of Five Points will be invited to curate these panels, which is very, very important to me and to the community as well.

In addition to these amenities for the artistic and cultural communities of Long Island City, I am so please that there'll be an over 32,000 square foot public park as a part of this project, over 50,000 square feet of retail space and this project will create over a 1,000 jobs, a 1,000 jobs and there is now an agreement as a result of our work with the Building Trades Council and SEIU 32BJ, all 1,000 of those jobs will be union jobs and that is so important to me as the son of union parents, nothing is more important to me than building pathways to the middle class for our residents.

So there's a tripling of affordable housing in this project as a result of our involvement, over a 1,000 jobs, including over 200 permanent jobs that will be union jobs that will benefit the working middle class residents of my district and we have managed to secure over 20,000 square feet of space for artists, including aerosol

I would also like to thank Make the Road New York, the Fairness Coalition, the Housing Advocates, Sunrise Co-op, the Park Advocates, Faith New York, New Yorkers for Parks, the Queens Chamber of Commerce, the Joint Venture, and yes, the Mayor's Office for helping us come to this

For those of you who are unfamiliar with my district, Willets Point has long been known as the Iron Triangle or the Valley of Ashes and it too has been in the movies. If anybody has watched The Great Gatsby, there's shots of what Willets Point was then.

Because of the industrial network of the auto shop junkyards and factories that have occupied this space and land, for years this area has gone without many of the resources the rest of the City has regularly received, such as sanitation, paved roads and proper sewage and flood drainage.

Before us today is a proposal that seeks to address these issues. Between the City agencies and developers we have the potential to vote in favor for a plan that will forever become a new benchmark not only for my district, but for all of New York City.

After many long years of reviewing this proposal and taking my constituents' concerns into account, I have found that this ambitious proposal will bring affordable housing; 35 percent of all units being constructed at Willets Point will be affordable.

Additionally, the Administration has agreed to release a Request for Proposal for two lots of land that are located in and around my district and I'd also like acknowledge that a plot of land in Corona is in Council Member Dromm's district and that was from some oversight that we had, so to acknowledge him, and will be in my new delineated council district starting January 2014.

It is important to note that never before has the council district seen this much affordable housing; we are talking about over a 1,000 units that will help make a difference now.

Another portion of the proposal includes good service employee jobs, building trades and hotel workers, supermarket workers. This project is set to create 19,000 jobs that are so desperately needed in Queens and in New York City.

In addition, a prevailing wage will be paid to contractors, building service workers and security workers, 25 percent of construction contract values will go to MWBEs and a \$930,000 fund has been created to strengthen the ability for MWBEs to compete for the Willets Point contract.

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This plan also calls for more school seats; this development will include the construction of a new public school at the site, which will deliver a 1,000 seats for our children, a new library and a day care center.

A thorough environmental cleanup of toxic soil is also a major factor that the developers and the Administration have jointed agreed to finance.

An achievable traffic plan will be part of this proposal; it includes improvements in safety and mitigation, as well as the creation of new highway ramps, \$66 million in the City's budget will be allocated for the design, construction and build-out of the new ramps off the Van Wyck Expressway. The developers will contribute an additional \$7.37 million for traffic improvements and mitigation.

A business and worker relocation plan has been created to assist the existing tenants at Willets Point with the continued operation of their business. The City will pay \$15.5 million for the relocation, moving expense and support of the Willets Point businesses, including those businesses that want to move together. The City will also assist

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relocated businesses with marketing in new location and a job skills training program.

Lastly, an agreement on park investment
has been reached; the developers have made an
agreement to make a contribution totaling just under
\$17 million towards the maintenance and upkeep of
Flushing Meadow Park and the creation of a green farm
on the rooftop of the Entertainment Center.

Although there are other details of this proposal that would also benefit, due to time and because I wanna get back to my baby... [interpose]

Short. But to be clear, I am confident that after carefully taking my constituents' needs into consideration this deal will be a win for my constituents, a win for Willets Point and a win for New York City. Our district deserves to have the same treatment as the rest of New York City; we deserve to have access to every single deliverable this plan will bring.

I realize that not everyone may view this proposal the same way that I view it, however I'm strongly committed to improving the livelihood and

For this reason it is crucial to ensure that construction workers as well as building operations and security workers are provided vital safety training that protects workers and the public.

And I would like to just thank the robust coalition of labor and industry advocates that have advocated for this legislation, Build Up NYC, New York City Building Trades, 32BJ, Hotel Trades Council, the Central Labor Council and the Working Families Party, thanking them for making sure that projects like this will continue to have the greatest level of safety for all New Yorkers.
