

3	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Okay, good morning,
4	good afternoon everyone. Can I have some quiet
5	please? Thank you very much. My name is Mark
6	Weprin, I'm Chair of the Zoning and Franchises
7	subcommittee of the Land Use Committee and we are
8	here today on two items. Land use number 922 which
9	is the Waterfront Revitalization Program which we
10	had the hearing on before and then the land use
11	numbers 923 through 928 inclusive off of the St.
12	John's, St. George Waterfront Development,
13	otherwise known as the Staten Island Wheel and the
14	Outlet Deal. There you go.
15	With the, on the St. John's waterfront
16	development project I'd like to call St. George.
17	You know as I represent St. John's, you represent
18	St. George. We have, oh we do have a quorum here I
19	should say. We have Councilmember Rivera,
20	Councilmember Comrie, Councilmember Vann,
21	Councilmember Garodnick, Councilmember Lappin,
22	Councilmember Wills, and Councilmember Ignizio.
23	We're also joined by Councilmember Rose whose
24	district the St. George Waterfront Development is

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 4 in and I would like her to explain some of the 2 3 aspects of this plan. Councilmember Rose. 4 COUNCILMEMBER ROSE: Thank you so much Chair Weprin. Staten Island will no longer be the 5 6 forgotten borough. I want to think Speaker 7 Christine Quinn, Ramon Martinez from the speaker's office, Gale Benjamin, Ann McCoy, and Amy Levin 8 from the Land Use division. I'd like to thank my 9 Staten Island delegation colleges Jimmy Oddo and 10 11 Vinny Ignizio, and land use chair Leroy Comrie, and Zoning and Franchise Subcommittee Chair Mark 12 Weprin, and my staff, who I will name at the full 13 stated meeting, and EDC, I didn't think I would say 14 15 that but EDC, and the mayor's office, for all of their support and assistance during this unique and 16 17 exhausting experience. This has been the biggest 18 thing to ever happen to the north shore of Staten 19 Island. In fact it is the biggest observation wheel in the world. I started this process wanting these 20 projects to be a win-win benefitting Staten Island 21 and there was doubt expressed that these goals 22 23 could be reached. I'm proud to stand here today and say the elusive win-win has been achieved. This 24

vote that will be taken today, I'm sure it will be

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 5 in the affirmative, is going to be a tremendous 2 3 victory for the residents of the north shore for Staten Island and for New York City because this by 4 far will be a transformative project and a boom to 5 the economic development of Staten Island. This 6 7 project is worth over 580 million dollars in private investment and with an additional 51 8 9 million in commitments from the city of New York and the developers. With the approval of this 10 project the north shore of Staten Island will have 11 12 the world's tallest observation wheel on its waterfront at 625 feet tall. We will also have the 13 first high end outlet mall located in New York city 14 15 with up to 125 retailers, eating and drinking 16 establishments, and a 200 room hotel with catering 17 facilities. The project will generate over 1,150 construction jobs and 1,350 permanent jobs. It will 18 19 also generate over 101 million dollars in return to 20 the city. As much promise as these projects hold my concerns were first and foremost for my district in 21 Staten Island. I have consistently said in the past 22 23 year that I wanted to ensure that Staten Island gets the best deal possible with this project. And 24 in order to ensure this we needed at least three 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 6 areas to be addressed among many others; traffic 2 3 congestion, ferry commuter concerns, good jobs for Staten Islanders pre, during, and post 4 construction, and economic development provisions. 5 And I am happy to announce that we have indeed 6 7 gotten many benefits for Staten Islanders with this project and they include; one million dollars for a 8 9 traffic mitigation fund, 700 thousand for planning study for the replacement of Cromwell Recreation 10 11 Center, commuter parking levels that will be maintained throughout the construction of the 12 project, parking rates will be capped, 100 percent 13 union hiring for the wheel and the outlet mall, 14 15 over 1,150 construction jobs, and 1,350 permanent 16 jobs generated mostly for Staten Islanders, 500 17 thousand for a capacity building for MWBE 18 contractors, New York city support for the 19 activation of the north shore right-a-way north shore railroad, support to ensure that public 20 access to Bay Street Landing is ensured, two 21 million for repairs to the Richmond Terrace 22 23 Esplanade and aesthetic upgrades, plans for a private ferry service adjacent to the development 24 area, 35 million in city capital funds for new 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 7 ferries, plans for a ferry service to Snug Harbor, 2 3 a comprehensive signage plan and implement signage for the Staten Island ferry and it's ferry 4 terminals up to 200 thousand dollars, improve 5 signage plans for the Kiss-N-Ride, and for those of 6 7 you who are not Staten Islanders, that's sort of our drop off and pick up area, it's nothing risqué, 8 9 and improve NYPD enforcement of the area. A welcome center and kiosk in the ferry terminals, Wi-Fi 10 11 service in ferry terminals and on the ferry, complimentary ridership for Staten Island school 12 children on the wheel as well as all New York city 13 14 school children in the first year, first free use 15 of space for the wheel terminal building to 16 community groups for meetings, the formation of a 17 community association advisory board, 75 thousand dollars for the creation of a Jersey street local 18 19 development cooperation, rezoning of the New 20 Brighton community from manufacturing, new pedestrian crossings with countdown clocks in St. 21 George, the siding of an eco-deck near, eco-dock 22 23 near the homeport, and aesthetic improvements for St. George and Jersey street corridors. Included in 24 the commitments from the city for the recently 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 8 passed, were the recently passed ferry bill which 2 3 will bring 24 hour ferry service with waits no longer than 30 minutes. These commitments from the 4 developers, the city, and EDC, are over 51 million 5 6 dollars for improvements for Staten Island in 7 addition to the 580 million dollars in private investments for this project. So for years Staten 8 Island's businesses and cultural institutions have 9 been asking our elected officials for a way to get 10 millions of visitors who ride the Staten Island 11 ferry out of the terminal and onto Staten Island. 12 This project will meet that long awaited goal and 13 14 Staten Island will no longer be the forgotten 15 borough. And I encourage all of my, not only the 16 land use members, but all of the council members to 17 vote in the affirmative for this project. Thank 18 you. 19 CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you Councilmember Rose. I'd like to call on 20 Councilmember Ignizio. 21 22 COUNCILMEMBER IGNIZIO: Thank you Mr. 23 Chairman. As a member of this committee I wanted to 24 pay tribute to those that were responsible for getting this here today and my college Debby Rose 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ZONING AND FRANCHISES 9 who came under pressure as of late about the list. 2 3 Well now everybody's seen the list and the answer 4 is she got everything she wanted and congratulations to you. And I want to thank EDC, 5 6 the developers, for everybody for coming to her 7 table and recognizing that this is the renaissance of the north shore, of the gold coast of the north 8 9 shore, and it will return, the return on the 10 investment for the taxpayer will be huge. They are 11 very nervous right now 61 miles north of New York 12 at Woodberry Commons because they hear what we're about to build and they know that we will overtake 13 14 the economic development that they have been 15 counting on for years right here in the city of New York. And as a member of this committee I am 16 17 grateful for everybody who were a part, from EDC, 18 the unions, the developers, and the mayor's office, 19 and the speaker's office for coming together and 20 truly building a better mousetrap. And I promised I would say this on the record but we are wheely 21 wheely excited about this. 22 23 CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Strike that please. No. Thank you Councilmember Iqnizio. At least say 24 it was your daughter who said that, you know, that 25

5 COUNCILMEMBER ROSE: This was very 6 important to not only the community board but to 7 most of the people on the north shore because 8 waterfront access is really important. I need to 9 add to the list that we were able to get 750 10 thousand for the Green Way Trail that will traverse 11 from the Verrazano Bridge to the Goethals Bridge.

12 CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you. Thank you very much colleagues. I am going to couple the 13 following items; the Waterfront Revitalization Plan 14 15 which was land use item 922 and then the items that 16 make up the St. George Waterfront Development 923 17 through 928. Right, those items they're coupled together and we'll call on one vote and I will call 18 on Ann McCoy to please call the roll. 19
