3	morning. I am New York City Council Member Brad
4	Lander, chair of the City Council's Land Use
5	Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting and
6	Maritime Uses; happy to be joined this morning by
7	Council Member Annabel Palma from the Bronx and
8	Jumaane Williams of Brooklyn. We have two items on
9	our calendar this morning. We will hear both of
10	them schools, so we're functioning on our public
11	sitings capacity, and we'll hear from the School
12	Construction Authority both about Application
13	Number 20135772 at PS 317 in Council Member Palma's
14	district, and we'll do that one first, and I think
15	it's possible after that that we'll pause and vote
16	on that item. And then we will hear Item 20145162,
17	a 456 seat primary school proposed for Bayside
18	Queens in Council Member Halloran's district. So
19	let me invite the School Construction Authority up
20	to present, and I guess Kenrick Ou will represent
21	the School Construction Authority on this item.
22	[Pause]
23	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Good morning.
24	Thank you very much for being here and the floor is
25	yours.

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 4 2 KENRICK OU: Good morning Chairperson 3 Lander and Council Member Palma and Council Member Williams. My name is Kenrick Oh and I'm Senior 4 Director for Real Estate Services for the New York 5 City School Construction Authority. I'm joined by 6 7 Jensen Ambachen, the SCA Senior Attorney for Real Estate to my right. The New York City School 8 9 Construction Authority has undertaken its site 10 selection process for a new public primary school 11 facility on a site consisting of Lots 5, 7 and 9 on 12 Block 3733 in the borough of the Bronx. The site assemblage is located on the east side of White 13 14 Plains Road between Watson Avenue and Bruckner 15 Boulevard within the boundaries of Bronx Community 16 District Number 9 and Community School District 17 Number 8. The proposed site consists of a total of 18 approximately 22,000 square feet of vacant land. 19 Under the proposed plan, the SCA would acquire the 20 site assemblage and construct a new public primary school facility containing approximately 379 seats. 21 22 The SCA has negotiated and executed a contract of 23 sale for the purchase of the site assemblage from 24 its current owners and the purchase is contingent upon final approval of the site by the Mayor and 25

A Phase I Environmental Site 3 Assessment and Phase II Environmental Site 4 Investigation were completed for the site assemblage and did not identify significant 5 environmental concerns. As a precautionary 6 7 measure, however, a soil vapor barrier and sub-slab depressurization system will be installed in the 8 9 new school building and two foot layer of environmentally clean fill will be installed in 10 11 areas where the soils would remain exposed on the 12 site.

The Notice of Filing of the site plan 13 14 was published in The New York Post and City Record 15 on June 5th, 2013. Bronx Community Board Number 9 16 was notified of the site plan on June 5th, 2013, 17 and was asked to hold a public hearing on this 18 proposed site plan. The Community Board did not 19 hold a public hearing or submit written comments 20 regarding the proposed school site. The City Planning Commission was also notified of the site 21 plan on June 5th, 2013, and it recommended in favor 22 23 of the proposed site. The SCA has considered all 24 comments received on the proposed site plan, and affirms the site plan pursuant to Section 1731 of 25

2	the Public Authority's Law. In accordance with
3	Section 1732 of the Public Authority's Law, the SCA
4	submitted the proposed site plan to the Mayor and
5	the City Council for consideration on November 6th,
6	2013. We look forward to your subcommittee's
7	favorable consideration of the proposed site plan
8	and are prepared to answer any questions you may
9	have. Thank you.
10	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
11	much. Council Member Palma, do you have questions
12	or comments?
13	COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Sure. I just
14	I am excited about the proposed project and I am
15	just saddened that the Community Board didn't get
16	to you know, hold a public hearing as they should
17	have, but nonetheless, we are excited to be getting
18	a new school facility in the district and it's much
19	needed. You know, we've heard concerns about
20	overcrowding in the neighborhood schools, and so
21	I'm glad that School Construction Authority brought
22	forth the project. There were only two concerns
23	while we were meeting in preparation for today's
24	vote and it was around the MTA and DOT; the bus
25	stop that's directly in front of what would be the

 entrance of the school and in terms of the traffic
 because of the White Plains area and access of the
 Bruckner being right near the vicinity of the
 school. I just wanted to get more information on
 those two concerns.

7 KENRICK OU: And so, both location and the concerns regarding the existing bus stop and 8 9 pedestrian safety, as well as traffic concerns, we 10 have reached out already to the Department of 11 Transportation, the Borough Commissioner as well as the Office of School Safety Engineering. 12 As the design process for this project, which is scheduled 13 to conclude in spring of 2014, continues we will 14 15 have further meetings with MTA and DOT to finalize 16 the plans to address those concerns.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: And so I just 18 you know, respectfully request that my office 19 continues to remain you know, involved in those discussions and I will continue to be as helpful as 20 I can in anything that needs to you know, be 21 discussed or about the school on moving forward. 22 23 Again, I'm you know, grateful on the proactive act from SCA about the project and allowing for 24 discussions prior to the vote around the school and 25

So I thank you so 3 much for reaching out and I will continue to be a 4 partner to make sure this project will work. KENRICK OU: Council Member... 5 [crosstalk] 6 7 COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: And will go... [crosstalk] 8 9 KENRICK OU: Thank you so... I want to 10 thank you for your support and we will continue to 11 work with you and your staff as the design process 12 moves forward. I do... and I have to apologize for the record; I did want to acknowledge that this 13 14 site was actually brought to our attention by our 15 District 8 superintendent, Tim Behr, as well as the 16 District Family Advocate, Jean Depesa. So the 17 local eyes in the neighborhood have helped us 18 identify this site. 19 COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Thank you, Mr. 20 Chair. CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you and 21 congratulations on your good work here and thank 22 23 you for your answers to those questions. So we are 24 going to go ahead and vote on this item before we hear the next item, and we've been briefly joined 25

LEGAL COUNSEL: Council Member Palma. 8 9 COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Again, thank you 10 to the School Construction Authority under Superintendent Tim Behr and the local leaders who 11 12 helped identify this site and this project, and I 13 vote aye. 14 LEGAL COUNSEL: Council Member 15 Williams. 16 COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Aye. 17 LEGAL COUNSEL: In a vote of three in 18 the affirmative, zero in negative and zero 19 abstentions, Preconsidered Item Number T20137108 is hereby adopted. 20 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very 21 much and we'll now move onto the second item on 22 23 today's calendar and I just want to let folks know 24 in advance, we're not going to vote on this item today. We are laying it over and we will vote 25

3	This is in a district that is in council member
4	transition, so currently it's in Council Member
5	Halloran's district, but we have Council Member-
6	elect Vallone, who also want to talk to and consult
7	with and have not had time to do that yet. So we
8	will go ahead and have our hearing today and we
9	appreciate that you're all here, and so we will be
10	hearing from in addition to the SCA, Sari Latto and
11	I guess if you'll also if anyone who speaks will
12	go ahead and introduce themselves before you do.
13	Let me turn it over, and we have I'll just flag
14	then two individuals signed up to testify in
15	opposition as well. So the floor is yours.
16	KENRICK OU: Thank you, Chairperson
17	Lander and subcommittee members. Again, my name is
18	Kenrick Ou. I am Senior Director for Real Estate
19	Services for the New York City School Construction
20	Authority. To my right, I am joined by Jensen
21	Ambachen, our SCA Senior Attorney for Real Estate,
22	and to his right are two of our District 26
23	principals, Principal Sari Latto from PS 41 and
24	Principal Joan Casale of PS 162, who have joined us
o =	

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 2 today to share some insights that they have working 3 within District 26.

4 The New York City School Construction Authority has undertaken this site selection 5 process for a new public primary school facility on 6 7 a site consisting of Lots 28, 38, 39 and 49 on 8 Block 7327 in the Bayside section of Queens. The 9 site assemblage is located on the north side of 48th Avenue between 2010th and 211th Streets within 10 11 the boundaries of Queens Community District Number 11 and Community School District Number 26. 12 The proposed site contains a total of approximately 13 14 45,000 square feet of lot area, and is currently 15 occupied by a garden nursery business and a residence. Under the proposed plan, the SCA would 16 17 acquire the site assemblage, demolish the existing 18 on site structures and construct a new public 19 primary school facility containing approximately 20 456 seats. The SCA has negotiated and executed contracts of sale for the purchase of the site 21 22 assemblage from its current owners and this 23 purchase is contingent upon final approval of the 24 site by the Mayor and the City Council. Phase I Environmental Site Assessments and Phase II 25

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 12 Environmental Site Investigations were completed 2 3 for this assemblage and did not identify 4 significant environmental concerns. As a precautionary measure, however, a soil vapor 5 barrier will be installed in the new school 6 7 building and a two foot layer of environmentally clean fill will be installed in areas where the 8 9 soils would remain exposed on the site after 10 construction.

11 The Notice of Filing for the site plan was published in The New York Post and City Record 12 on April 15th, 2013. Queens Community Board Number 13 14 11 was notified of the site plan on April 15th, 15 2013, and was asked to hold a public hearing on the 16 proposed site plan. The Community Board held its 17 public hearing on the site plan on May 6th, 2013 18 and subsequently submitted written comments 19 recommending against the proposed school site. The 20 City Planning Commission was also notified of the site plan on April 15th, 2013 and it recommended in 21 favor of the proposed site. The SCA has considered 22 23 all comments received on the proposed site plan, and affirms the site plan pursuant to Section 1731 24 of the Public Authority's Law. In accordance with 25

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 2 Section 1732 of the Public Authority's Law, the SCA 3 has submitted the site plan to the Mayor and the 4 City Council for consideration on November 6th, 2013. At this time, I would just like to ask 5 Principals Latto and Casale to share some of their 6 7 thoughts regarding the enrollments at their 8 schools.

9 SARI LATTO: Good morning. My name is 10 Sari Latto, principal of Public School 41. To give 11 you a little history, my school has been growing 12 every year since I started 15 years ago. We house a District 75 program, P993 at PS 41, and they've 13 14 been there since before I took over the building 15 and they use about six or seven classrooms. Also, 16 about 12 years ago, we got TCUs and they house my 17 second grade, so I have four classrooms in 18 portables and have been there for all of those 19 To give you a little history, back in 2010 years. and 2011, I had 503 students; '11-'12 went to 518; 20 '12-'13 went to 555 and this year, I have a total 21 of 561 students. I had to cap my fourth grade last 22 23 year in 2012-13, and those students went to another public school, PS 159, for the fourth grade and PS 24 98 for the Kindergarten, and then this year, I had 25

2	to cap 14 students and they had to move to PS 198.
3	The first grade, the fourth grade and fifth grade
4	all have 32 students each in every one of the
5	classes. So we're busting out of our seams and
6	parents, when they do have to move to another
7	school, are very disturbed and angered. They have
8	moved, but they're very upset at the whole idea of
9	registering in their zone district and then having
10	to be told to move based on contractual issues with
11	the UFT.
12	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
13	much.
14	JOAN CASALE: Good morning. My name is
15	Joan Casale. I'm the principal at PS 162, and as
16	Miss Latto said, we have experienced overcrowding
17	in the past several years. I've been a principal
18	here three years at 162, and I would like to report
19	that each year, even prior when I was AP, that we
20	have five Kindergartens feeding into four first
21	grades. Our Kindergartens are capped at 25
22	students per class and our first grades have 32 in
23	each class. So therefore, even before in
24	September when we do have an additional
25	registration, we are already at full capacity in

2	our first grades generally every year, which is
3	about 30, so in `11 and `12 we were capped in
4	fourth grade and those children had to go again to
5	PS 172. In 2013, we were capped with first grade
6	and fourth grade, and in '13-'14, we are now capped
7	at first grade, fourth grade and I had to open an
8	additional second fifth grade class this year a
9	fifth second grade class this year for 11 children
10	so that they wouldn't have to be outsourced to
11	another school because they did have siblings in
12	our school, so I had to open up a fifth second
13	grade class. And we are also 130 percent
14	overutilized in our school and so we do we
15	really are overcrowded in our school as well.
16	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
17	much to both of you for taking time out of your
18	schedule, which I know is a busy one. We really
19	deeply appreciate and respect the role that school
20	principals play. I'm a public school parent and I
21	know what it means and how much you have to do and
22	with the new evaluations that you have to do of
23	your teachers, how much more you even had to do
24	than last year, and I note that we didn't take
25	anything away from you to do while we asked you to

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 16 2 do this work, so that you also came down here 3 speaks meaningfully to us. And I will say, I don't think there's any doubt that District 26 is facing 4 severe overcrowding and so I think even the folks 5 that are opposed to this particular school siting 6 7 will stipulate to the point that there's school overcrowding and something has to be done about it 8 9 and I think you helped us understand how real and specific that need is. What I would like to 10 11 propose that we do, rather than ask you questions 12 now, is go ahead and let the two people who are going to testify in opposition do so, and then ask 13 the SCA at least to come back up you know, and 14 15 answer questions, but I think we'll be better 16 informed by our listening first to what the 17 community concerns are. So if that's okay with you, let me ask that we... unless Council Member 18 19 Palma has questions first. Thank you for the 20 testimony and general presentation and in particular on these issues of overcrowding. 21 Let's invite the two individuals who have signed up to 22 23 testify in opposition and then I'll invite the School Construction Authority back up to answer 24 questions that come out of that testimony. So I am 25

2	now going to invite up Dawa Jung from Senator
3	Avella's office. I apologize if I'm not
4	pronouncing that correctly; and Henry Euler from
5	the Auburndale Improvement Association, and I also
6	want to note for the record that we have testimony
7	in opposition as well from New York State
8	Assemblywoman Nily Rozic.
9	DAWA JUNG: Good morning, Chairperson
10	Lander and Council Member Palma. My name is Dawa
11	Jung. I am Deputy Legislative Counsel to Senator
12	Tony Avella. I am here to share Senator Avella's
13	testimony today on the Item Number T2013-7109, and
14	after I share his testimony, I will be submitting
15	the copy of the document to be included into the
16	record.
17	Thank you for allowing me the
18	opportunity to comment on the proposed construction
19	of a 416 seat primary school facility on 48th
20	Avenue between 210th and 211th Streets where Keil
21	Brothers are currently located. I have received
22	countless calls from the adjacent residential
23	neighbors voicing their opposition to this
24	proposal. In addition, during a public hearing
25	held by the Community Board 11 on May 7th, the site
Į	

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 18 2 selection was overwhelmingly disapproved by a vote 3 of 25 opposed and three in favor. After visiting 4 the location and speaking with residents, I fully understand their concerns and strongly agree that 5 the construction of a new school at this site will 6 7 have a huge negative impact on their quality of I have never seen a structure of this nature 8 life. 9 and capacity built in the center of a residential 10 If the application is approved, the new block. 11 school building will directly abut backyards of 31 12 single-family homes. Given this close proximity, residents are extremely concerned about its 13 14 detrimental impact on their quality of life and a 15 significant decrease in their property value. In 16 addition, the new school will inevitably generate 17 higher volume of pedestrian and vehicular traffic 18 in this already congested area. Residents state 19 that these narrow residential streets cannot 20 support additional traffic caused by school buses and parents picking up and dropping off their 21 children. Furthermore, the additional traffic can 22 23 exacerbate the shortage of parking space in the 24 area and result in possible delays in emergency vehicles, as they would have difficulty getting 25

2	through the streets. It is also important to note
3	that two public schools, PS 31 and MS 158 exist
4	only a few blocks away from this site. For these
5	reasons, I strongly urge the Landmarks, Public
6	Siting and Maritime Uses Subcommitte to disapprove
7	this application.
8	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
9	much.
10	HENRY EULER: My name is Henry Euler.
11	I'm first Vice president of the Auburndale
12	Improvement Association. Our civic association is
13	a large one in Auburndale, Flushing and Western
14	Bayside, and I'm also a member of Community Board
15	11 in Queens, but I'm here today to speak on behalf
16	of my civic association in opposition to this site.
17	I'm supporting we are supporting our neighbors
18	in the Bayside Clearspring Civic Council and also
19	the Bayside Hills Civic Association in opposing
20	this project. When I went to the Community Board
21	hearing about this project, there were dozens of
22	residents present. All of them spoke against this
23	site. I did not hear one person in the community
24	speak in favor of this site. I also heard the
25	civic people speak against the site and a lot of

2 the other people that are living adjacent to the
3 area. [chime]

4 There are so many reasons why this site is inappropriate. First of all, as you heard in 5 Senator Avella's testimony, the site goes right up 6 7 the middle of a block and it goes right next to the backyards of the people that live there. There's 8 9 like 31 single-family homes and their backyards are going to abut this new building. It's ridiculous. 10 11 There's also several bus lines that go past the site on 47th Avenue and the streets around the 12 block are very narrow streets, so we don't know how 13 14 the buses or the people dropping off children are 15 going to access the site. And for those reasons 16 and many other reasons, we just think the site is 17 inappropriate.

We do need a new elementary school; a 18 19 new primary school in District 26, as well as District 25. Now, my civic association is taking 20 the stance that instead of building a new school at 21 this site, that we should reclaim PS 130 for 22 23 District 26. PS 130 is located on 42nd Avenue and Francis Lewis Boulevard right on the Auburndale 24 Bayside border where a new school is needed. 25 This

2	school is geographically in District 26 yet, it
3	services District 25 children. District 25
4	children are bused to PS 130, and children living
5	around PS 130 cannot go to their neighborhood
6	school. They are bused to overcrowded schools in
7	District 26; schools like PS 31, PS 159 and PS 162.
8	Now, if we reclaim PS 130 for the local children,
9	that'll take the burden off of PS 31, PS 159 and PS
10	162. We still will need a new school in our area
11	because there's so much overcrowding, but at least
12	it'll take the burden off those schools at the
13	present time. We understand that this process
14	would have to be gradual. We don't want to
15	interrupt the education of the children that are
16	presently attending the school, and there's also a
17	special school on the first floor for special needs
18	students and we don't want to disturb those
19	children at all. If we reclaim that school for the
20	local children, we want the special needs school to
21	remain there and we feel that the children from
22	District 25 should have their own school in
23	District 25 so that they don't have to be bused all
24	over the place to PS 130. It's very expensive to
25	bus students to these various schools and there's

2	no necessity for it. So we're urging my civic
3	association, which consists of almost 600 members,
4	are urging this committee to reject this site and
5	to recommend to the Department of Education to
6	reclaim PS 130, which was originally a District 26
7	school, for grades K through six and K through
8	eight. We want that to be reclaimed for the local
9	children. It's outrageous that the children that
10	live right across the street or within a few blocks
11	of PS 130 are not allowed to attend their local
12	school. I have here and I'm going to leave with
13	you not only my statement, but over 200 signatures
14	on petitions demanding that PS 130 be returned to
15	the local children in District 26. Thank you.
16	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you both
17	very much for coming out to testify and I'll note
18	for the record that we do have in the packet the
19	letter articulating the reasons for disapproval at
20	Community Board 11, which I think match
21	substantially the reasons that you have articulated
22	here. I guess one question I just want to ask in
23	light of the fact that you make this proposal for
24	PS 130 to be rezoned while acknowledging that
25	and District 25 that there's crowding in both

3	the civic associations undertaken to identify
4	potential sites in I guess in either district
5	really, in 25 or 26, but I guess especially in that

8	HENRY EULER: Mm-hm.
9	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And I think that's
10	just a challenge in all of our districts where
11	there's school crowding issues and I know SCA does
12	a lot of work to try to find them, but I wonder
13	whether you've

15	HENRY EULER: That is a problem. We
16	haven't done any specific research on that, but
17	there are sites available I'm sure.
18	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: But the board
19	hasn't to your knowledge provided a list to the
20	[crosstalk]
21	HENRY EULER: Not to my knowledge.
22	[crosstalk]
23	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: SCA?
24	HENRY EULER: No.
25

10	Our civic would be willing to help.
11	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: `Kay, alright, I
12	think your concerns, both in the way that you've
13	laid them out and in the way that I have them in
14	the Community Board letter, will enable us now to
15	go back and ask the SCA to essentially respond to
16	some of these questions and concerns. Council
17	Member Palma, do you have any questions? Okay,
18	thank you very much for your testimony and for your
19	time coming out today. Let me now ask Kenrick Ou
20	and the School Construction Authority to come back
21	up and kind of answer some questions about the
22	concerns that we've heard. So I guess let me start
23	at the I'll start where they ended just because
24	they did essentially at the end, as you heard, put
25	out a sort of alternative proposal and I'd heard

2	this before; that PS 130 is nearby and essentially
3	had been previously in School District 26 and is
4	geographically located there, but has you know,
5	become primarily occupied by students from PS 25
6	and so there's this alternative proposal that the
7	community has articulated about allowing the
8	reoccupation or whatever one appropriately says of
9	PS 130 into District 26, and whether you looked at
10	that and considered whether that would address the
11	issues and if not, why not?
12	KENRICK OU: Yes, both after the
13	recommendation from the community board and hearing
14	from the civic association, but also years before
15	when I think the civic association had made this
16	recommendation to the Department of Education, the
17	Department of Education did take a look at whether
18	this proposal would be effective in addressing the
19	need in both District 25 and District 26. The
20	first note and the department and its Office of
21	Portfolio Planning looked at this carefully, but
22	they determined that this would not be sufficient
23	to address the need for a few reasons, the first
24	being that the PS 130 building is a small building.
25	The overall capacity of that building is only 245
	l

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 26 2 seats. So the disparity in the number of seats 3 would not have met the full 450... approximately 4 450 seats that we're proposing now. The second concern, and I would have to say probably the 5 principle concern, is that there is no available 6 7 relocation site for this school. Mr. Euler is absolutely correct. PS 130 was a... that building 8 9 was used to house a District 26 public school up 10 until the early 1980s when it was closed because of 11 low enrollment and then the property was leased to CUNY for a number of years for its law school 12 before in the late '80s the city and the Department 13 14 of Education reopened that building to address the 15 enrollment needs of District 25 and also within 16 District 75, which is the citywide special education district. So the answer is that the 17 option of PS 130 was evaluated, but it was not 18 19 determined to be practical or sufficient to meet 20 the needs within the Bayside area without, in fact, creating additional needs within District 25, which 21 as well suffers from overcrowded school facilities. 22 23 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And there are... in District 25 if there's overcrowding as well, is 24 it identified in the Capital Plan for additional 25

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 27 school sitings, and if so, can you give us sense of 2 3 update on the work of the SCA to try to site 4 schools in that... [crosstalk] 5 KENRICK OU: Well... 6 7 [crosstalk] CHAIRPERSON LANDER: District as well? 8 KENRICK OU: In fact, earlier this 9 10 month, the Department of Education just released 11 its draft Five-Year Capital Plan for Fiscal Years 12 2015 through 2019 because our current Capital Plan is expiring at the end of the current Fiscal Year. 13 That draft Capital Plan does identify the need and 14 15 propose funding for additional seats in Community 16 School District Number 25 for both the sub-17 districts, the northern part of sub-district, which 18 really would adjoin this part of District 26, as 19 well as the downtown Flushing area. So additional 20 need and funding has been identified, and funding is proposed to be allocated over the next five 21 years to try and relieve the overcrowding of 22 23 District 25 schools. 24 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And I mean if you don't have it, I'm sure you can't remember every 25

I don't know if you 2 3 brought the Capital Plan, but do you know the numbers for 25 and 26, either in total, if not for 4 the sub-districts that we're talking about? 5 KENRICK OU: I would not want to give 6 7 you the wrong information, but it would be hundreds of seats for each of the sub-districts. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And District 25? KENRICK OU: Yeah, and I think in 10 11 District 26 what we are propose... what the draft 12 Capital Plan is proposing to fund would be the construction of the 456 seat primary school 13 14 facility at the site that we are discussing today 15 in Bayside. 16 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Okay, alright, 17 let's talk a little to the specific questions raised. I mean I guess I'll just tick them off and 18 19 ask you to kind of respond to them in general. The 20 community has raised concerns about the location on a residential block backing up on the rear yards of 21 22 single-family homes, so if you could speak to you 23 know, whether and how and where that's standard and how you address the issues that are of adjacency; 24 then both sort of the traffic congestion, bus route 25

2	and parking issues that I know were raised by the
3	community board and have been raised again here.
4	You know, what are the things that the School
5	Construction Authority has done either to address
б	or mitigate those issues or investigate them? And
7	I guess obviously, it's decided from your point of
8	view that they're not sufficient to make you, you
9	know, less enthusiastic about the site.
10	KENRICK OU: Right. Well, I think just
11	at a high level, siting schools in residential
12	areas is one of our main goals; that the schools be
13	proximate to the residences that would be served.
14	In the case of this particular site, I think we're
15	entirely sensitive to the unusual configuration of
16	this property. This property has for many,
17	many years, the current property owner has used
18	that adjoins the neighboring homes as part of its
19	business. We have not started the design process,
20	but if and when we do move forward with the design
21	process, I think we would make every effort to
22	place the building along the street frontages and
23	to look at that interior section and how we could
24	treat that in a sensitive way either for a
25	schoolyard or for some non-structured use to try
	I

2	and avoid undue impacts to the neighboring homes.
3	I do want to just say that anybody who would be
4	developing that property would not necessarily be
5	as sensitive to that and certainly would not
6	necessarily be as thoughtful as we are required to
7	be under Environmental Review requirements. We did
8	analyze potential environmental impacts associated
9	with the redevelopment of that leg of the property
10	for a schoolyard and we're committed that if we
11	were to use it for a schoolyard, the schoolyard
12	would be at least 25 feet from the property line to
13	try and mitigate noise concerns or if, for whatever
14	reason, it could not be placed at that kind offset,
15	we would be providing a noise barrier to again, try
16	and be respectful of the neighbors and avoid being
17	a bad neighbor to the residences.
18	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: What's a I mean
19	I'm trying to think of it; a noise barrier.
20	KENRICK OU: It'd be a wall. You know
21	a wall
22	[crosstalk]
23	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So a wall
24	[crosstalk]
25	KENRICK OU: To attenuate noise.

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 31 2 [crosstalk] 3 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: In between... a 4 wall in between the schoolyard and adjoining 5 properties. KENRICK OU: Correct, correct. Our 6 7 standard, as you've seen throughout the schools in New York City is really chain link fencing, but we 8 9 would go as far as to install a barrier to separate 10 visually and also to address noise, but again, this 11 is all part of a design process that we would 12 undertake once we actually have the approval to move forward to acquire this site and we would of 13 14 course you know, keep the concerns that we have 15 received in mind as we continue that design 16 process. 17 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: One of the issues 18 raised around parking was a concern about teacher 19 parking and I know you can't control whether 20 teachers drive to the schools. I do know that in some cases you've, you know, dramatically reduced 21 the amount of teacher parking and not given people 22 23 placards, but on the other hand, this is an area where... well, maybe I shouldn't say. I know 24 there's a couple of bus routes, but knowing Bayside 25

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 32 in general, it's less transit friendly and I wonder 2 3 what your approach has been in places like this where there is a parking challenge for... 4 [crosstalk] 5 KENRICK OU: 6 Mm-hm. 7 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Residents, so it's understandable why they're not enthusiastic about 8 9 teachers coming and taking the parking spaces. On 10 the other hand, you know teachers are going to 11 drive because it's not a convenient place to get to 12 by public transportation and what, if any, approaches you've taken? 13 14 KENDRICK OU: As a general practice and 15 I think that many of the sites that we've brought 16 before this subcommittee, there has been no 17 practical way to provide on-site teacher parking because the sizes of the sites that are available, 18 19 as well as the priority and the need to put capital dollars to work to create classrooms and school 20 seats would take precedence. In this particular 21 instance, given the unusual configuration of this 22 23 site, and the transportation limitations in terms 24 of transit, I think as long as we can meet our requirements to provide open space for use by the 25

2	students, and if there is available land that could
3	be used for parking, I think we certainly would
4	look at it, as we have in other sites in eastern
5	Queens like the Padavan campus where we were able
6	to accomplish both or all of the priorities; the
7	classrooms and the school seats that are needed,
8	adequate play space upgrade for students and also
9	some parking; some accessory parking for school
10	staff to again, mitigate the impacts to the
11	neighbors.
12	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So I think those
13	my questions. I will confess that I find this one
14	a challenging situation because you know, we have a
15	council member transition taking place and so you
16	know, normally in this situation we rely heavily on
17	the local judgment. It's clear on the one hand
18	that there is an overcrowding need in the district.
19	I don't think anyone is questioning that and we
20	feel a strong pull of uncrowding the schools and
21	providing a seat and on the other hand, with a
22	community board in opposition and with a lot of
23	local opposition expressed, and not having heard a
24	lot from neighbors nearby, on the other hand, we

feel a strong pull to the wishes and sense of the

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 34 district, and without a local council member to 2 3 help weigh those things, we're in a bit of 4 conundrum. So at least, as I mentioned at the outset, I want to check in and get some guidance 5 from the council member elect, who has no of 6 7 course, formal role to play in the process yet, but whose judgment I would be interested in hearing. 8 9 We are statutorily required to act on this item if we're going to. If we don't vote... this is more 10 11 for members of the public than for you, then it deemed approved if we don't vote, so if we are 12 going to act either to approve or disapprove, we're 13 14 going to need to do it at tomorrow's Land Use 15 meeting and Thursday's Stated, so we have some work 16 cut out for us over the next 24 and 48 hours. We 17 may wind up with questions for the School Construction Authority, in which we'll be in touch 18 19 with you or members of the Land Use team here at 20 the Council will be in touch with you, and we'll certainly stay in touch with the elected officials 21 22 in the neighborhood. And I want to appreciate 23 Senator Avella and Assembly Member Rozic and I also 24 want to mention my appreciation to Council Member Weprin, who has the adjacent and adjoining district 25

1 COMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING & MARITIME USES 35 2 and who I've been talking to about this, but who 3 doesn't represent the site of the school itself. 4 So... KENRICK OU: Council Member, I 5 6 apologize. One of my colleagues actually just 7 shared the specifics regarding your question about the seats that are proposed for funding in District 8 9 25. 10 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: 'Kay, go ahead. 11 KENRICK OU: So a total of 12 approximately 1,400 seats are proposed in the next Five-Year Capital Plan, approximately 640 in the 13 northern sub-district of District 25 and 14 15 approximately 760 in the downtown Flushing area. 16 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And do you have 17 any... I mean I can... you know live lead... on any of those sited do you have live leads on those 18 19 sites? 20 KENRICK OU: Part of what happens when we transition between Capital Plans is that we are 21 now going to have our real estate undertake a 22 23 search based on the funded needs. I can tell you that under the expiring Capital Plan, there was not 24 a need or funding for the downtown Flushing area 25

2	and there was a there was funding allocated for
3	the northern part of District 25, but we have
4	actually been investigating sites in the College
5	Point area that were strongly advocated, both by
6	elected officials and also by the local Community
7	Education Council for those seats.
8	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you very
9	much for getting that additional information while
10	we're here.
11	KENRICK OU: Thank you.
12	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So thanks to you
13	and with everyone who came out to testify. We'll
14	go ahead and recess not recess. I guess we're
15	closing the hearing on this item and we'll recess
16	the meeting until 9:45 tomorrow morning. Thank you
17	very much.
