As a mother, I have daughters, I have sisters, aunts and as a woman myself; nieces; I just was glad my motherly instinct kicked in and I was able to help another young lady. Thank you. is proud to honor Idalia Washington for going above

and beyond her call of duty to courageously save

the life of a fellow New Yorker. And whereas the

City of new York has made meaningful progress in

reducing sexual assault and over the last 20 years

the overall rates of violence against women have

decreased, years ago, victims had fewer resources

2	and often no recourse, today victims are now more
3	empowered to speak out and get help, while new laws
4	have increased options for both safety and justice.
5	Despite this progress, there is much work to be
6	done. Across the nation young women ages 16 to 24
7	still experience the highest rates of rape and
8	sexual assault. 84 percent of the college women
9	who reported a sexual assault experienced the
10	incident during their freshman or sophomore years.
11	Even today, many victims of sexual assault
12	including women, men and children suffer alone,
13	burdened by shame or unsure anyone will listen. As
14	a result, sexual assaults remain consistently
15	underreported even though the physical and
16	emotional trauma they leave behind can last for
17	years. On this occasion, we are proud to pay
18	tribute to Idalia Washington for bravely and
19	creatively intervening during such a crime, and
20	whereas in addition to being a conductor with MTA
21	NYC Transit for more than 15 years, Miss Washington
22	is an eight-year cancer survivor. She is active in
23	fundraising for the American Cancer Society and
24	recently participated in the Walk for a Cure for
25	breast cancer in October. And whereas on May 15th,

2	2013, Miss Washington was working on the four train
3	and as she pulled into the Saratoga Avenue Station
4	in Brownsville, Brooklyn it was around 3:00 a.m.
5	and her train was nearly empty, but when she opened
6	its doors and looked out the window she saw a young
7	woman jump out screaming at the top lungs. "He's
8	trying to rape me," she yelled. "He's trying to
9	rape me!" As she tried to flee, a man appeared
10	running behind her exposing himself and attempting
11	to sexually assault her. And whereas that night,
12	Miss Washington's four train was comprised of 10
13	cars in two segments, each half locked and sealed
14	off from the another. When the young woman broke
15	away from her assailant and jumped back into the
16	train; the front half of the train and Miss
17	Washington swiftly shut the doors to that segment
18	to protect the passenger from the monster outside.
19	When the relentless attacker moved to board the
20	adjacent car, Miss Washington moved quickly to
21	close the rear doors hoping to lock him in the back
22	of her train until the police could get him. With
23	a split second difference in timing, the assailant
24	ended locked out of the train altogether, then ran
25	to confront Miss Washington face-to-face, cursing

that he is looking so well and healthy so. And I want to just, on behalf of everyone, echo the statements of Council Member Wills. It's a great honor to have two of our Tuskegee Airmen with us. I believe they're exiting the chambers, so let's give them [applause] another round of applause.

We are voting on a number of pieces of legislation today; the first 1047-A out of Environmental Protection. I want to thank the chair, who is also the sponsor, Jim Gennaro and I want to thank Samara Swanson, Laura Popa and Baaba Halm for their work on this legislation. This is a piece of legislation that builds on work we have already done, pushing biofuel forward in an effort to make the fuels we use in this city more sustainable and less polluting. I want to thank Chair Gennaro for his long-term focus on biofuel and making this council a real leader in that area and call on him to give us more information about 1047-A, please.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you,

Madam Speaker. Thank you for your leadership and
doing all the things we've done to make the air
cleaner in New York City, particularly what we've

2	done with biofuels. It's a very, very short back
3	story. People may remember that two years ago, we
4	did a B2 mandate, which means all heating oil in
5	New York City had to contain at least two percent
6	vegetable oil, and that's what makes it bioheat.
7	We did that in combination with several other
8	measures to clean the air and the results of what
9	we did and when it was last year's last year was
10	the first heating season we had all the oil in New
11	York City at the B2 level and we did that with a
12	couple of other measures and all of the results we
13	got from that were really, really terrific. We
14	have a huge reduction in the fine particulate
15	matter of many hundreds of tons, which is 73
16	percent of what we wanted to accomplish, all the
17	levels of the very harmful pollutants that really
18	hurt people. I won't go into the same level of
19	detail that I did at the Pre-stated Press
20	Conference, but the B2 law that we did two years
21	ago in last heating season has been a clean air
22	bonanza for the city that has been really, really
23	terrific. So now we'll talk about what we're doing
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today, which follows forward, as the Speaker said,

with what we've done before. So Intro 1047-A is

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going to take the B2 level, which is set in all of New York City buildings. We're going to take city government buildings and we're going to raise them to B5 because that's going to be a prelude for the entire city going to B5, and we're also doing a pilot project where at least five percent of city buildings will have to go to 10 percent biodiesel in the heating oil, what we call B10. So and then as a further prelude to kind of set the stage for the entire city, going to B5 from where it is now at B2, we're doing a study that the Office of Long-Term Planning and Sustainability will have to do and that will... and then they will have to make a recommendation whether and when we go to B5 in the entire city, which I'm sure they'll find it will be prudent to do. So just to recap, we're at B2 now citywide. We're going to city buildings going to We're piloting B10 in city buildings and we're setting the stage for the entire city going to B5 by doing this study. This is a great bill and all of the clean air benefits it would take me hours to indicate all the clean air benefits that we've been able to do with this and many bills like it. So thank you, Madam Speaker, for your leadership. I

want to thank all the staff that was involved and all the sponsors and also the members of the EP Committee. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

Gennaro. And we are passing a number of pieces of legislation out of the Housing and Buildings
Committee today, many of which are bills related to Hurricane Sandy. Today, when we pass our legislation, we will have passed 26 pieces of legislation [applause] in response to Hurricane Sandy to make this city more climate change ready and more emergency prepared, and I want to thank everyone who's worked on that, in particular Baaba Halm, Ed Atkin, Laura Popa, Jeff Baker and many other members of the staff, and if we could just get a round of applause for all of the staff that worked [applause] on the 26 post-Sandy pieces of legislation.

And today, we are voting on Intro 1092-A, introduced by Council Member Lappin. All of the bills we're now going to mention went through the Housing and Buildings Committee, and I want to thank Chair Dilan. Council Member Lappin's bill is one that requires secondary electrical power

2	heating and cooling systems for adult homes and has
3	greater requirements around back up power for
4	hospitals and other healthcare facilities. We, of
5	course, saw the significance of this during
6	Hurricane Sandy. 1093-A, which has been introduced
7	by Council Member Levin; it's requiring to the
8	usage of temporary flood control and response
9	devices be removed from the administrative code.
10	Inadvertently, we actually had things that made it
11	hard for people to put in flood prevention devices.
12	We also have 1094-A, introduced by Council Member
13	Mendez, which is a very important bill that
14	requires an access in a common area to drinking
15	water. It's very important. When buildings are
16	without power, they often can't get drinking water.
17	Intro 1101-A, in relation to requiring natural gas
18	usage as a back-up for emergency and standby power
19	systems that was introduced by Council Member
20	Vacca. I want to thank him. Also out of Housing
21	and Buildings Committee we have a piece of
22	legislation today sponsored by the chair or Council
23	Member Dilan, which does not deal with Sandy
24	related matters, but will require more up to date
25	smoke alarms. One of the significant things about

2	these smoke alarms is the ones we are requiring
3	will last for 10 years. You cannot take them
4	apart; you cannot take the battery out. They have
5	a 10-year long battery, and we know that we've lost
6	lives already this year in homes that didn't have
7	smoke detectors or had smoke detectors where people
8	had taken out the battery and not replaced them.
9	This bill will help prevent that. As has already
10	been mentioned, and I believe he's escorting them
11	out, but we are passing a piece of legislation
12	today out of the Parks and Recreation Committee.
13	We want to thank Chair Mark-Viverito and Council
14	Member Wills, the sponsor, which renames a street
15	in Queens in recognition and honor of the Tuskegee
16	Airmen, calling it Tuskegee Airmen Way. I want to
17	thank Baaba Halm, Jeff Baker, Chris Satori and
18	Patrick Leveille [phonetic] for their work on this
19	legislation. We are also out of the Technology
20	Committee and I want to thank Chair Cabrera and the
21	sponsor, Gale Brewer, a piece of legislation that
22	requires, as the council has done, that all city
23	agencies webcast their public meeting and web
24	archive them. I want to thank Baaba Halm, Cullen

Howe, Jeff Baker and Laura Popa and I want to call

on the sponsor, Council Member Brewer, to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Me first?

SPEAKER QUINN: Yes.

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COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Okay. Well, thank you. I want to thank the Speaker; Chairman Cabrera for scheduling the vote today on Intro 132, and as the Speaker indicated, it would require that all public meetings by city agencies, committees, commissions or task forces be webcast. particularly want to thank Rob Newman, Cullen Howe from the Speaker's staff and Will Cogrove [phonetic] from my staff. I first introduced this idea in 2007. I think this bill will bring an unprecedented level of transparency to New York City government. Webcasting of public meetings opens up government to the public, particularly for those who cannot travel to City Hall. We believe that there are 18 agencies who are not currently webcasting who would be doing so under this bill and at a very small cost. As many city meetings take place during the standard workday, achieving digital video of meetings allows people to view it as it takes place, and obviously there would be an

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archive component. We would be able to... I want to also mention that being webcast live as a city council shows the importance of it and the quality, which is exceptional here at the city council. have a lot of meetings, they're all webcast and the public is very pleased. I am a strong believer that transparency and technological innovation lead to a smarter, more accountable government and this bill would be a big step forward in bringing government to the people. And I have to say that as you know, I really do think that transparency's important, technology is the way to do it and groups like Code for America and Beta NYC and the folks from Citizens Union, OpenPlans, which is another group that works on technology, NIPERG and Allway, Reinvent Albany and the good news is this transparency effort has brought together those who are interested in technology and open government and those who have been working on good government for a very long time. It's a powerful coalition and I think the webcasting is an example of what can be achieved and great accolades to the Speaker and her amazing technology staff, as well as those from the Mayor's Office, who've been working to

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2 make the success of the webcasting in the city 3 council. Thank you very much.

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SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Brewer. We're also passing three pieces of legislation out of the Transportation Committee, and I want to thank Chair Vacca and also Council Member Levin and Council Member Ignizio, who are the sponsors of two of the bills. to thank Lyle Frank, Kadazale Zaleoff [phonetic], Jonathan Maseroni, [phonetic] Terza Nazar [phonetic] and Molly Murphy for their work on the bill. The three pieces of legislation are Intro 234-A, in relation to taking all of the advisory boards of the TLC and putting them into one board with diverse representation that'll be an easier and cleared point of entry for members of the public, as well as for stakeholders in a taxi field. Intro 904-A, introduced by Council Member Levin, which requires that the Traffic Safety Plan that the city recently released not be a one-time thing, but be redone every five years. I want to thank Council Member Levin for that. And lastly, Intro 1155-A, which is a bill that deals with some confusion around right turns from bus lanes and

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thanks to Council Member Ignizio and Chair Vacca,and let me call on Chair Vacca. Chair Vacca.

COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Thank you. found my chair. Thank you. Thank you, Speaker Quinn. The bills before you today refer to finally formalizing the advisory boards to the Taxi and Limousine Commission, and for some time, the advisory boards have not really met and they've not been cohesive, and the legislation in front of you today provides for representation from all the various stakeholders, as well as from the disabled community. So I'm asking that the council approve this. I think it will be significant because it will bring everyone to the table in a formal way to get input from all segments of the industry, and then to impart that input to the Taxi and Limousine Commission on a regular basis. Thank you, Madam Speaker.
