2	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Okay. Okay. We
3	ready? [gavel] So with that gavel bang, that
4	is the last session the Committee. Who was
5	here last time to hear my sappy speech when I
6	gotokay, you heard, okay. So, I didn't know
7	for sure that I was going to be coming back, so
8	I laid on extra sap at that last hearing,
9	thought it my last last, but this is not a
10	hearing, but it's a vote by the Committee, but
11	it gives me another opportunity to be sappy and
12	silly. So good afternoon. Good afternoon.
13	Good afternoon. I am Chairman James F.
14	Gennaro. Normally I say Jim Gennaro. On this
15	last day we're going with James F. I'm Chairman
16	James F. Gennaro. I'm Chair of the Committee on
17	Environmental Protection and today, the
18	Committee will hold a vote on proposed Intro
19	876A and proposed Intro 1060A, two bills which
20	when enacted will considerably improve indoor
21	and outdoor air quality in New York City. I
22	will tend to use an adjective stronger than
23	considerably, but I didn't write this. So think
24	of an adjective bigger than considerably and
25	just insert that. Monumentally improved. Thank
l	l

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 4 you, Oliver, thank you. Poor indoor air 2 3 quality has been linked to an increased prevalence of a variety of respiratory 4 5 diseases. For example, Americans spend up to 90 percent of their time indoors, and indoor б allergens and irritants can play a significant 7 role in triggering asthma attacks and other 8 In 2009, 13 percent of 9 respiratory problems. 10 New York City children 12 and under, about 177,000 children had at some point in their 11 12 lives been diagnosed with asthma, and more than 13 one in eight of these children were exposed to 14 asthma triggers in the home. Other respiratory conditions such as fungal infections, sinusitis 15 and allergic rhinitis also have been linked to 16 17 poor indoor air quality. Many adverse environmental events such as flooding or fires 18 can significantly decrease indoor air quality 19 20 and have negative health impacts on building 21 occupants after waters had receded from many of the storms we've gotten and the fires have been 22 put out. Proposed Intro 867A would create a 23 24 voluntary, we repeat, voluntary registration program for master environmental hazard 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 5 remediation technicians. To be eligible to 2 3 register, an applicant would be required to complete a course of training involving classes 4 in safety and remediation of various 5 environmental hazards through a training 6 provider approved by the department, meaning 7 the Department of Environmental Protection. 8 The bill would impose a 1,000 dollar minimum 9 10 fine per violation on any person who holds himself or herself out as a master 11 12 environmental hazard remediation technician, 13 but who has not registered with the Department 14 as such and is now taking the classes. The bill would also authorize the Commissioner of 15 Environmental Protection to set registration 16 17 and renewal fees. We want the program to pay for itself so the fees will be set at that 18 level. We want the Commissioner also to be 19 20 able to revoke registrations for negligence, 21 incompetence, or legal violations and to update and audit the courses required for registration 22 in response to developments in the field. This 23 24 legislation will increase public health protection by providing standards, training 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION б 2 materials and registration procedures for 3 parties already engaged in this field as well as new entrance to this field. Let me go off 4 script for a second and just indicate that, you 5 know, while the City does a great job with б asbestos, a great job with lead, there are 7 other contaminants out there and there are 8 companies and individuals who hold themselves 9 10 out, you know, to be, you know, master remediators of these kinds of substances when in 11 12 the end of the day they really know nothing. 13 They come in, they charge a lot of money, they 14 make a big mess. And so we don't like that, and so that's really what this is all about because 15 there's a very, you know, vibrant industry of, 16 17 you know, wonderful professionals who certainly are well trained, but are kind of, you know, 18 being undercut by people who charge less but 19 don't know what to do and come in make a big 20 mess. And this will, you know, lead the City in 21 a direction of people having the ability to 22 select a company or a person that they know has 23 24 the City's seal of approval in terms of taking these courses and actually being a master in 25

So we think this is a real, you 2 3 know, boom for consumers in New York City and is particularly very important in a post Sandy 4 era when, you know, floods and all kinds of 5 nonsense are creating mold and other kinds of б hazardous conditions that really should be 7 remediated by people who know what the hell 8 they're doing. And so that's what this is 9 about. 10 The next bill proposed Intro--I don't think I've ever said hell before in an opening 11 12 statement, but we're really going for it here. 13 That wasn't written in here. I just did that, 14 you know. Proposed Intro 1060A speaks to the adverse impacts of air pollution emitted by 15 commercial refuse trucks. Many people know 16 17 that, you know, that the Department of Sanitation, you know, trucks are very, very 18 They've, you know, won awards from the 19 clean. Environmental Protection Administration. 20 They-21 -and you know, the bills that we've done here in the Council to make them use biofuels and 22 everything else. We've got very, very good 23 2.4 fleet of trucks that pick up the City's municipal waste, but for the--but for private 25

2	waste is a much different story, and that's
3	what this bill speaks to. It is part of, you
4	know, the Mayor's overall revamp of the City's
5	air code which was given to us a very, you
6	know, late moment in the term, and so what we
7	did is we worked with the administration to,
8	you know, to get to the biggest piece of what
9	they wanted to do in the air code, which is
10	this piece that deals with the commercial
11	refuse trucks, because you know, the amount of
12	numbers that are being put up in terms of
13	harmful emissions is very substantial and we
14	feel that we not only have the duty, but you
15	know, really the obligation to make sure that
16	we, you know, do what we can to make this fleet
17	of trucks cleaner in the private sector.
18	Although doing it in such a way where we don't,
19	you know, gouge people and drive them out of
20	business. So, every attempt to be fair was made
21	and there were, you know, very extensive
22	negotiations. I'd like to thank Jeff Baker
23	[phonetic] and also Samara Swanson [phonetic]
24	for the work that they did, but let me read
25	what they wanted me to read about the bill.
I	

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 9 Okay. Proposed Intro 1060A addresses the 2 3 adverse impact of air pollution emitted by commercial refuse trucks. I don't think this is 4 going to be as good as what I said, but I'm 5 going to go--I'm going to do it for them, you б know. The commercial refuse trucks in the 7 license and CL2 fleets, okay, use heavy-duty 8 diesel engines. Diesel exhausts include 9 10 substances that have been proven to be detrimental to both human health and the 11 12 environment, including nitrogen oxides, which 13 we call NOX, particulate matter which we call 14 NOX is a direct respiratory irritant and PM. also combines in the atmosphere with unburned 15 hydrocarbons in the presence of sunlight to 16 form ground level ozone or what we like to call 17 smoq. Currently, the License, and CL2 fleets 18 together are estimated to produce 2,188 tons of 19 NOX and 125 tons of PM, which is particulate 20 21 matter per year. Those are huge numbers which really, you know, dwarf what the city trucks 22 put up. So we just really had to do this, and I 23 24 give credit to the Administration for working, you know, with the business integrity 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 10 commission, you know, to work with the 2 3 marketplace to find out that we can do this in a fair way and this is what we have arrived at. 4 5 Particulate matter particles formed by combustion and fossil fuels including diesel 6 fuel are a complex mixture of elemental, which 7 is to say black carbon unburned or partially 8 combusted fuel sulfate and fuel sulfur and 9 10 lubricant products. These are all the funky stuff that's like part of the particulate 11 12 matter which gets, you know, really in dead--13 which these are particles that are small enough 14 that bypass like the natural filters in the lungs and go right into your lungs, and it's 15 just like, it's unacceptable. Diesel 16 particulate matter includes more than 40 17 substances considered by the US EPA to be air 18 toxins, and so this bill does something about 19 that. Proposed Intro 1060A creates a new 20 section, 42-163.11 in the administrative code 21 in the City of New York which mandates the use 22 of an EPA certified 2007 or later engine, 2007 23 24 being the year where they, you know, really started to mandate clean engines for diesels, 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 11 or the best available retrofit technology as 2 determined by the Commissioner of Environmental 3 Protection in heavy-duty trade waste hauling 4 vehicles by January 1st, 2020. It also 5 provides for waivers where such retrofit would 6 create financial hardship to the licensee or 7 registrant. However, all waivers issued 8 pursuant to the subdivision would expire by 9 January 1st, 2025. Violation of this section 10 carries a civil penalty of 10,000 per vehicle. 11 12 In order--so this this serious business. An 13 order to correct is issued at the same time--14 God bless you. God bless you again. An order to correct is issued at the same time as the 15 violation which allows these violations to be 16 17 corrected without penalty. So you don't have to pay the 10,000 dollars if you do within 60 18 days from the date of the order. Where such 19 20 penalty is not corrected within 60 days, a 21 separate additional penalty may be imposed of not more than 500 dollars for each day that the 22 violation is not corrected beyond 60 days from 23 such order. The combined impact of these local 24 laws will be a reduction in the adverse impacts 25

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 12 from poor air quality due to the presence of 2 3 unremediated--this is--now we're talking about both laws. Will be a reduction in adverse 4 impact and poor air quality due to the presence 5 6 of unremeidated mold and exposure to pathogens and hazardous non-biological contaminants such 7 8 as pesticides and heavy metals as well as reduction in nitrogen oxides and particulate 9 10 matter, black carbon, and carbon dioxide emissions that also attribute to global 11 12 warming. Enactment of these local laws would 13 make New York City indoor and outdoor air 14 cleaner and healthier. I strongly support this legislation and of course, recommend a yes 15 vote. We're joined by Council Member Koppell, 16 Council Members Lander, Levin, and Richards. 17 Want to tip my hat to the staff that are here. 18 We have Samara Swanson [phonetic] Counsel to 19 20 the Committee. We have Dan Avery, the policy 21 analyst to the Committee. Bill Murray works in my staff doing all of my environmental policy 22 stuff. Jeff Baker who worked long and hard to 23 24 get the air code piece with the bill done, stayed up real late to do that. We certainly 25

And as we're sitting 2 around, I think it bears mentioning, I think it 3 bears mentioning not with standing the fact 4 that we've passed a lot of bills in this 5 committee out of the last 12 years. I was 6 talking to Council Member Koppell, who used to 7 chair once upon a time the Environmental 8 Conservation of the New York State Assembly and 9 10 I was compelled to ask him after bragging to 11 him how many bills I had passed here, which is 12 like a relatively small two digit number, 13 Oliver, you know, modestly indicated to me that 14 he had passed a real big number. What's that number again Oliver? 280 environmental bills? 15 Are you kidding me? Oh, bills. Oh, well that --16 I mean, that's--that's like barely worth 17 clapping for, like you know, 280 bills. 18 And so, you know, that is a great career right 19 20 there. He could have just kind of signed out 21 at that point, but wanted to come back and do more public service and, you know, the city is 22 better for it and the state is certainly, you 23 24 know, better for that. And so if no one wishes to be heard or make a statement, I would ask 25

3	these, right? We've got Intro 1060A. We've
4	got Intro 867A, and I think we're also passing
5	awhatever the verbage I'm supposed to use
6	here. We're passing a resolution that
7	indicates, you know, that we have a notice of
8	the termination of non-significance with regard
9	to environmental impact, which is what we call
10	a negative declaration, and so we're passing
11	the resolution that declares that there is no
12	financialthat there is no negative impact.
13	Are you guysam I a part of this conversation?
14	Okay. I'm part of this conversation. Just hang
15	on a second. Alright. Let me just repeat the
16	numbers of the bill so we're crystal clear.
17	This is Intro 1060A, 867A, and the accompanying
18	resolution which is for the Neg Deck
19	[phonetic], which is for which bill? I'm just
20	going based on that. Okay. Okay. Yeah, we're
21	making a correction here. Okay. Okay. Staff
22	error. Staff error. We're voting on Proposed
23	Intro 1160, not 1060, 1160, which is the air
24	code piece. I'll correct it on this document
25	as well, and we're doing 867A, which is the
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1	COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 15
2	environmental hazard remediation bill. And
3	Samara, if I could have your attention for a
4	second. Like the Neg deck, the resolution
5	associated with the Neg deck is for which bill?
6	Is for 1160. So it'll be the two bills that I
7	mentioned plus the Neg deck which is associated
8	with 1160A. Okay? And so with that said I
9	think we're all set to go. We got our numbers
10	right and I would ask toI would ask the clerk
11	to call the role. Then we'll have a vote, and
12	then I'll have a closing comment, okay? And so-
13	-Yeah, you get whateverI don't want to step
14	down as Chairman of the Committee. As long I'm
15	sitting here I'm like still Chairman. Like
16	once I bang that gavel like I'm done. And so
17	its just like I'm in no rush to get done. So
18	talk all you want. So with that said, we will
19	call the role. As I said I request that I would
20	urge a yes vote on all three items.

CLERK MARTIN: Richards? 18 19 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Permission to explain my vote? I just wanted to second 20 21 what Council Member Levin certainly said, and you know, there was certainly some interesting 22 times we shared this--during my short tenure 23 24 serving with you in the Council over the past 25 few months.
