COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: We're getting ready to start. [background comments] Before we get started, I want to wish Council Member Andy King a happy birthday.

[cheers, applause, background comments]

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: I think he told

me he was like 30-something; I don't now.

[background comments, laughter] I'm Council Member

Fernando Cabrera and it's truly an honor to stand

here with the legends, the founders; the pioneer of

hip hop. [cheers, applause] To be able to put

together the people that we have been able to

assemble here together is just short of -- if I may

use the word -- miracle. Coming from different

backgrounds, people living in different places, and I

wanna first thank Rocky. Rocky, thank you so much,

Rocky Bucano, for being instrumental putting

everybody together; [applause, cheers] we've been

working on this now for a while.

And today I'm also very excited about the fact, and we're gonna be talking more about this during the press conference immediately after the Pre-Stated; the desire… there's a desire here that's been burning now for years for a hip hop museum in

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the Bronx; [cheers, applause] it's time. It's time.

It's time. Started in the Bronx and it must stay in the Bronx [background comment] and so we'll be talking more about that later. [background comments]

So what we're gonna do, I'm gonna... I'm gonna give the due time... this is really... really to serve; I'm gonna be calling on each of the founders and just... there's so much to be said about them, but for the sake of time, I'm gonna be calling out each one and presenting the proclamation and then we're gonna hear from the City Clerk and then we're gonna hear from a couple of them; I'm gonna ask my staff to be ready.

First, Afrika Bambaaataa. [cheers, applause] Here's the godfather of hip hop, founder of the Universal Zulu Nation, [cheers, background comments, laughter] created the musical genre electro funk; he recorded the critical acclaimed song, "Planet Rock" [cheers, applause] with a Soulsonic Force. [background comments, cheers, laughter]

We've been... let me acknowledge we've been joined by our beloved Public Advocate, Tish James, who has [cheers, applause] joined us, alongside with my colleagues here in the Council.

2	we also want to acknowledge, and I don't
3	think he… he's… I think he got stuck at the airport,
4	right, but I want to acknowledge… I used to… I must
5	confess; I used to pop dance [laughter] many years
6	ago, moonwalk, the whole thing [background comments]
7	there you go, there you go… [laughter] come on; don't
8	shout me out, don't shout me out. But Kurtis Blow,
9	[cheers, applause] music producer, rapper and
10	minister, who in 1979 signed a deal with Mercury
11	Records, making him the first rapper signed by a
12	major label and Rocky, can you receive that okay,
13	good, Melle's gonna be receivin' it… [background
14	comments] he's keepin' it. [laughter] He's gonna
15	have to give you a free concert ticket [background
16	comments, cheers, applause] And also holding the
17	proclamation who are we talkin' about here, people?
18	[background comments, cheers] Melle Mel.
19	[background comments, laughter]. You may not know
20	this, but he was the first to refer himself as MC, or
21	Master of Ceremony; he was inducted in 2007 into the
22	Rock and Roll Hall of Fame as part of the group,
23	Melle Mel and the Furious Five. [background
24	comments] Come on, let's give it up. [cheers,
25	applause]

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We also been joined and we wanna honor Grand Wizard Theodore, come on. [cheers, applause] One of early hip hop's most skilled DJs and he's universally acknowledged as the inventor of the scratch. [cheers, applause, background comments]

Then also we've been joined by

Grandmaster Caz. [cheers, applause, background

comments] There he is, ladies and gentlemen. DJ

whose name was Casanova Fly, [cheers] he teamed up

with JDL to form the Notorious Two and became the

first DJ to rap while handling records on their

turntables. [cheers, background comments] Come on;

let's give it up. [cheers, applause]

We've also been joined by Jasie

[phonetic] Jay. [background comment] Jazzy, I'm

sorry, Jazzy. [background comments, cheers,

applause] Jazzy. Jazzy. [cheers, background

comments]

Alright; leave the pastor alone.

[background comments] American Hip Hop DJ and

producer who's known for his involvement in the music

group, Afrika Bambaaataa, and Soulsonic Force

[cheers] since 1980. [background comments, applause]

We also wanna recognize one of those founders that are usually not recognized, but they were very significant and we're talkin' about Joe Conzo, photographer [cheers, applause] who captured the birth of hip hop music and culture that will forever change the world. [background comments] Cutman LJ. LG, boy, I'm turnin' it out today. [cheers, applause] LG. [background comments] I just changed your name. [background comment] Peter did it, so you can do it. Come on, it's your next level. [background comments] So. [laughter] unique DJ associated with Zulu Nation, who after serving great DJ years ago implemented his own great DJ style. Come on, let's give it up again. [cheers, applause]

Then we have Jorge Fabel Pabon, pop
master, [cheers, applause] hip hop dancer, whose
talents by 1982 were being featured, naturally,
international. Come on, give us some moves in there
my brother. [cheers, applause, background comments]
So here we go my brother. [background

So here we go my brother. [background comment] Here we go; you ready? [laughter, cheers, applause] Well also, we want to honor Pete DJ Jones. [cheers, applause] Well I didn't really know DJ

Jones passed away on Wednesday, January 15th, 2014 at the age of 79. He was known for hosting parties in the 70s and in the 80s in the Bronx, has been placed by legends as one of the first disc jockeys to use two turntables and spin two copies of the same record, which later became critical in mixing and scratching. [cheers, applause]

I wanna turn it over to the City Clerk for the reading of the proclamation and we're gonna be hearing from some of these great artists.

[background comments, cheers]

Proclamation. New York City is more than 8 million rhythm strong, but for nearly 40 years a completely unique rhythm has galvanized into a signature style we know as hip hop. Since its birth in the South Bronx in the 1970s, hip hop has given those living in neighborhoods with abandoned buildings, crime and poverty a means of escape in more ways than one.

Today hip hop is an international multi-billion dollar phenomenon and encompasses much more than music. Hip hop has created a culture that incorporates ethnicity, art, politics, fashion technology and urban life. And whereas, in the 1980s

hip hop culture continued to evolve with every
generation and in the 1990s had a meteoric rise that
hit mainstream media and consumers, especially
suburban youth. Staying true to its urban roots
lyrics were often informed by street smarts and
street survival. As commercial and gangster rap
gained more exposure, hip hop culture as a whole was
suddenly and mistakenly considered synonymous with
many negative attributes, even though many hip hop
artists featured and continue to focus primarily on
socially conscious and politically oriented lyrics.
Hip hop has now grown into an entire cultural
movement that has changed generational thinking on
everything from politics and race to art and
language. And whereas, today hip hop continues to
expand with subgenres, fusion forms and regional
variations on all these and its culture continues to
influence people around the world. On this occasion
the Council of the City of New York is proud to
recognize the original New York artists who planted
the seeds for this global cultural revolution.
Working together is the umbrella organization called
Universal Zulu Nation; they plan to observe November
2014 as hip hop month around the world and they are

currently working to open a museum to promote the

3 educational, communal and historic perspective of hip hop, where it all began. Now therefore, be it known 4 that the Council of New York is proud to pay tribute 5 to Jorge Fabel Pabon, Pete DJ Jones, Grandmaster Caz, 6 Cutman LG, Rocky Bucano, Jazzy Jay, Joe Conzo, Kurtis Blow, Grand Wizard Theodore, Melle Mel; Afrika 8 9 Bambaaataa as the original legends of hip hop in 10 recognition of their pioneering contributions to hip 11 hop culture in New York City and beyond. 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[cheers, applause]

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: I wanna take a moment to give one more proclamation and this moment would've not been possible if it wasn't for Rocky Bucano, [cheers, applause] a financial advisor and current executive director at Teamwork Foundation, Inc.; New York Gauchos, thank you, Rocky, for making this moment possible. [applause, cheers] I'm gonna turn it over to you; you could introduce the other two.

2	ROCKY BUCANO: I'd like to thank
3	Councilman Cabrera again for your steadfast
4	willingness to support hip hop culture in the Bronx
5	and makin' today a reality for all of my peers that
6	are standing here along with me. I'd like to thank
7	Andy King, Vanessa, Letitia James, thank you for
8	coming, all of our supporters up there in the
9	gallery, [cheers, applause] all of our family members
10	that are here to support us, [cheers] this is a
11	monumental day for hip hop; we look forward to
12	exploring the opportunity to put the Universal Hip
13	Hop Museum at the Kingsbridge Armory [background
14	comments, cheers, applause] and today is one step
15	forward. Thank you guys, thank everybody.
16	[applause, background comments, laughter]
17	MALE VOICE: What's goin' on everybody?
18	[background cheers, applause] It's a great day… is a
19	great day today in hip hop, because just like how
20	Rocky said, the most important thing; we celebratin'
21	the 40th anniversary of hip hop; we've been here for
22	40 years and we're still goin' on strong; I've only
23	been responsible for about may 37 of 'em so; you know
24	 what I mean; [background comments, applause] tryin'

to bring up the rear, but I think... you know as far as

hip hop goes, you know we've been doin' it for so
long and we did it for nothin'; there wasn't no money
in it and we gave all we had, you know what I mean,
we laid it down with everything we had and sometime 1
think the mainstream media kinda forgot about us, but
see the most important thing is we didn't forget
about us [cheers, background comments, applause] and
we didn't forget about y'all, because when they
needed som'in in the hood that was positive and that
was enlightenin' and that meant som'in and that was
the beginnin' of the revolution, we were standin' on
the front lines [applause, cheers] and we put it
there and it stayed there to this day and that's the
most important thing about that hip hop museum
because that's a difference between music and art;
they can have the music, they can have the dope
beach, you can ride around play 'em in your Jeep, but
guess what; we put it down for the best and we're
here to stay; we gonna keep it goin', [cheers,
applause] we are the art form, we are the history of
the game, we are the truth, we are the true meaning
of hip hop, and that's the key word, the key word is
important, and just because you're rich, that don't
necessarily mean that you're important [cheers,

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applause]

background comments] and that's the bottom line.

Hey, I would like for Caz... Caz, end this thing out,

man; go ahead... [cheers] come on man, you gotta do

that before, man. [cheers] You gotta do it before.

Come on, now give it for Grandmaster Caz. [cheers,

GRANDMASTER CAZ: I just wanna say thank you to hip hop, alright. [background comments] Yeah, yeah, we are the pioneers or founders or whatever, but without an audience we'd be doin' this to ourselves or with ourselves or by ourselves, alright. [cheers, applause] So because of the audience and the people who supported our culture this long is the reason why hip hop has grown to the proportions that it has and I think Mel wanted me to say, before rap was a game or hip hop was a nation, before Lauren Hill began her miseducation, before Milk was chillin or PE brought the noise, before Heavy D and the Boyz, before the roof caught on fire, before fresh was the word, before Whodini and friends and Roxannes Revenge, before the freaks came out at night, before say Ho, before the Crash Crew was rockin on the radio [applause, background comments, cheers]. Before Whitney, Mariah, J-Lo and Janet,

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before Bam and the Soulsonic Force rocked the planet, before these are the breaks, before Hard Times, before the Sugarhill Gang and before Superrhymes, before Reaganomics, before rappers got shot in their stomachs, before our found hip hop in comics, before G's, before weed was trees, before goin' raw dog gave you a deadly disease, before [background comments] haters, before thugs and perpetrators, before the alphas and before the betas, before beepers and cell phones and retro gods and Fed Ex, food stamps and metro cards, before cops was 5-0 or gats was answers, before all the B-Boys turned into break dancers, [background comments] before Legs was crazy, out turned to swazey, when Mel said it's hot, humid and hazy, before all the bull and by no means get it twisted we are hip hop and we have always existed [cheers] in this physical form or in the essence of rhyme. Grandmaster Caz, baby, greatest of all time. [cheers, applause]

MALE VOICE: One, two, what's up? One, one, one, one, one. [background comments] First, always givin' our greatness to the great supreme force to whom we call by many names, Allah, Jehovah, Yahweh or Enyeh or the Ancients of Ornaze are to

2	Omarah [sic]. I'd like to say, we honor each and
3	every one who had something to do with hip hop, from
4	Kool Hert, Grandmaster Flash, DJ Breakout, Kool DJ
5	AJ, Love Badoski [sic] and all these honorable greats
6	here, we honor each and every one in hip hop [cheers,
7	applause] for makin' it happen, Sha Rock, Lisa Lee,
8	Sadies Ladies a whole army [sic] and without the
9	people, the people of this great planet Earth,
10	[background comment] the youth who put up the power
11	and the sauce to stand up for somethin' that's from
12	them given from indigenous people, us people, black,
13	some call black and brown people, better known as the
14	indigenous Moors, who came and spread this all over
15	the mighty earth for the people, by the people
16	[applause] and everybody to do somethin' with this
17	called hip hop. We honor everybody from Europa,
18	Africa, America, from Antarctica, every corners of
19	this earth for pushin' the hip hop culture
20	knowledge, wisdom, understandin', beat boys, DJs,
21	MCs, Eversaw writers [sic], the fifth element that
22	holds it all together, the knowledge, [background
23	comment] the knowledge; we thank each and every one
24	of y'all for comin' out, supportin' hip hop, keep the
25	world we constantly wake up our youth and

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2	understanding; glad to have a hip hop museum, but we
3	can't stop there, we want a whole building,
4	[background comments] we want the land. [cheers,
5	applause] So we must always organize, organize,
6	organize. Universal Hip Hop Museum, universal hip
7	hop people of this great planet earth, one love.
8	[background comments, cheers, applause].
9	COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: So we're closing
10	this part of the proclamations that were made for the
11	founders of hip hop and there's gonna be a press
12	conference right outside for a few minutes. Thank
13	you so much.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Ladies and gentlemen, we are going to have our second ceremonial and I am joined by the sponsor, Council Member Vanessa Gibson, who has honored the Garifuna community with this proclamation honoring Garifuna American Heritage Month and I want to ask her to say a few words and invite her special guests up for the second very important ceremonial.

COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Good afternoon. If everyone representing the Garifuna community can please come forward so we can begin our ceremonial. [background comments]

Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen, welcome to City Hall; I am Council Member Vanessa Gibson; I represent the 16th District in the Bronx and I'm so honored to be here today with special friends from the Garifuna American community; I wanna

thank my Council Member, my colleague, the Majority 2 3 Leader, Council Van Bramer for that wonderful introduction and today is our ceremonial. This is a 4 celebration of Garifuna American Heritage Month, from 5 March 11, 2014 through April 12, 2014 we are going to 6 celebrate the Garifuna people. My Garifuna brothers 8 and sisters, I am so honored because I represent many 9 of you in the Bronx and when you think about the 10 Garifuna community you think about the contributions 11 that have been made; we know that the Garifuna 12 community has been through enormous challenges, all 13 of you that represent St. Vincent, Nicaragua, 14 Honduras and Belize and the Garifuna people, to me, represent strength, represent courage, represent 15 16 bravery, represent the fact that you continue to 17 strive to be the very best you can. We here in the City Council recognize the growing diversity across 18 our city and I'm especially honored to not only 19 20 introduce this resolution before the City Council, 21 but make sure that our Council recognizes the important and invaluable contributions of the 22 Garifuna people -- business leaders, entrepreneurs, 23 24 community leaders -- all of the work you have done to celebrate your culture, your heritage and the fact 25

that you are a part of American history. We are 2 thankful for your presence today and I'm delighted that we are joined by my colleagues here, Council Member Andy Cohen of the Bronx, Council member Andy 5 King of the Bronx, Council Member Robert Cornegy of 6 Brooklyn, and Council Member Daneek Miller of Queens, Council Member Donovan Richards of Queens and Council 8 Member Debi Rose holdin' it down for Staten Island. 10 And we are all here because we want to celebrate the 11 Garifuna heritage, and over the next 30 days we will 12 make sure that we have events in our community in the 13 Bronx and in the City that will speak to the culture, 14 we will celebrate each other as brothers and sisters and today is an exciting day and we also have our 15 Minority Leader here, Vinny Ignizio, who I wanna 16 17 recognize, [background comment] and the Public Advocate, our amazing Public Advocate, Letitia James, 18 as well as our Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito. 19 So 20 without further ado, I would like to pass the 21 microphone over to our Speaker to give us welcoming remarks. Thank you so much. 22

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: I will defer; I'm a little bit obviously on skates right now; I will

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defer to our Majority Leader, who's been doing a great job standing in, to say a few words.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much; obviously everyone knows the Speaker has had a very serious incident in her district; she is just back for 30 seconds, literally, so catching her breath and so on behalf of the Speaker and all of the Council, we're so grateful to Council Member Gibson for honoring the Garifuna American community and all of those in the community, in her district; I have had the privilege of visiting Belize and Guatemala and enjoying your beautiful, beautiful cultures and countries and we're so grateful for this opportunity to have all of you here and so many colleagues to celebrate your contributions. And with that, I'll ask the Clerk to read the proclamation and then the Council Member will [background comment] let us know who's gonna speak.

CITY CLERK: Council, City of New York

Proclamation. Whereas, the Council of the City of

New York is proud to celebrate Garifuna America

Heritage Month as we honor Garifuna Coalition USA,

Inc. for its outstanding service to the community.

And whereas, we celebrate March 11th through April

12th as Garifuna-American Heritage Month to recognize
the enduring contributions of Garifuna Americans to
the fabric of New York and pay tribute to the common
culture and bonds of friendship that connect the
United States and Garifuna countries of origin. And
whereas, the Garifuna are an ethnic group of mixed
ancestry descendents of Carib, Arawak and African
peoples living along the Caribbean coast in Belize,
Guatemala, Nicaragua, Honduras and St. Vincent and
the Grenadines. And whereas, today New York City is
home to the largest Garifuna population outside of
Central America, with more than 200,000 people living
in the South Bronx, Brownsville and East New York and
Brooklyn and Manhattan's Upper West Side. And
whereas, the Garifuna USA Coalition, the GCU,
services as a vital resource, forum, advocate and
voice for the Garifuna immigrant community. In 2009
GCU opened the Garifuna Advocacy Center on East 149th
Street in the heart of the South Bronx. The Center's
volunteers provide information, educational services,
networking opportunities and cultural events for the
Garifuna community through an agreement with Phipps
Community Development Corporation, a 35-year-old
multiservice provider of educational, vocational and

community development programs. The Garifuna
Advocacy Center makes referrals and avails community
members of English as a second language and GED
classes and other critical services. And whereas,
the GCU also supports smaller Garifuna organizations
and has brought 10 with specific youth and women
constituencies into the coalition. GCU provides
organizational capacity building workshops in topics
ranging from fiscal management to media
communications. And whereas, GCU Voter Registration
Campaign seeks to engage communities in the political
process by registering and mobilizing new voters to
the polls. The organization provides voter education
and registration information in local areas where the
Garifuna gather, including parks, festivals, social
events and organizations. Now therefore be it known
that the Council of the City of New York commends
Garifuna Coalition USA for its work and hereby
proclaims March 11th through April 12th, 2014 to be
Garifuna American Heritage Month in New York City.

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COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: And on behalf of the Garifuna Coalition I want to bring up Sulma Arzu-Brown, our Executive Director of the Garifuna Coalition. Congratulations.

[applause]

SULMA ARZU-BROWN: Good afternoon everybody. First and foremost I would like to acknowledge Council Member Vanessa Gibson for being the first council member to bring us here to the Chambers. You have contributed to our history and are already continuing to write our story. really proves that New York is not a melting pot, but a salad bowl full of very colorful antioxidants. [laughter] Okay. I am extremely grateful because I came here from Honduras at the age of 5; grew up the Bronx and there were times where I thought we will never leave the Bronx, but not only are we here, we're here strong, we have representatives and the Garifuna Coalition has managed to bring together all Garifunas from Belize, Guatemala, Nicaragua and Honduras. [laughter] And not only that; we've also brought the first generation Garifuna Americans, Mr. Nixon Arauz, who's part of our [background comments] youth leadership development program, the

[speaking foreign language] Youth Leadership Program, and this is extremely important because we want everybody here to witness because we are a culture of traditions, we pass our stories on from one generation to another, so this will continue to live

with us. So we appreciate you and we thank you.

[applause, background comments]

SULMA ARZU-BROWN: Thank you. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: And the president of the Board, the Garifuna Coalition, a good friend of mine who I've worked with over the years, Mr. Jose Avila Francisco.

Member; it's really... [background comment] [laughter]
That's my Council Member, by the way. [laughter]
It's quite an honor and thank you very much for this occasion. It's important for me to mention the fact that the reason that we... [interpose, background comment] celebrate Garifuna American Heritage Month from March 11 to April the 12th has to do with the fact that 217 years ago our ancestors were forcibly deported by the British from the Island of St.
Vincent and the Grenadines to an island called Roatan, off the coast of Honduras. Eventually they

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negotiated with the Spaniards, who allowed us to move into the mainland, we kept walking to the Atlantic coast; that's how we ended up in Belize, Guatemala and Nicaragua and through the process of immigration, begging in the 30s, as merchant marines, that's how we ended up in New York, so what's important is that even though we have been migrating to New York since the 1930s, New York doesn't really get to know us until March 25th, 1990, the Happy Land Social Club fire, 87 victims; 50 of those were Garifunas and that was how New York realized that we were here and the question was, who are these people; how long have they been here? And that is the significance of this proclamation, is the fact that we started this in 2009 and we like to describe it as, it's our way of uplifting our community from obscurity to the pinnacle of recognition.

Daughtry for her words and the moment of silence in reference to the explosion that happened this morning, as many of you may be aware that has happened in my district, a half-a-block from my district office, five blocks from where I live, and so I wanna thank all the colleagues for your words, your concerns; I wanna thank the staff for really stepping up to the plate; I wanna thank the Administration and all the first responders; it's an unfortunate situation; it's probably the worst that I've seen in my district where you have an explosion that took down two

buildings that are residential buildings, that we're
still trying to assess and account for everyone that
was there. I wanna thank the Mayor personally for
coming up to the scene and for his leadership and his
comfort to the families; we've been using our office,
our district office as a command post for the NYPD
and the FDNY; there have been those impacted and
affected who are looking for more information who
have come through our door, so it is still anxious
time and I will be going right back up to my district
after this; it's a sad moment; we've had two deaths
reported and many, many people are hospitalized and
still people unaccounted for. So I thank everyone
for their concern and your thoughts and prayers are
definitely appreciated and would encourage, as we've
been saying, that anyone that is seeking information
to call 311 until the hotline number is set up.

So having said that, we obviously are here today and I wanted to talk about a couple of issues that are important to today's agenda. So today's Stated Meeting we will be introducing new legislation to bring much needed accountability and regulation to New York City's car wash industry.

following: require car washes in New York City to obtain a yearly license from the Department of

The proposed legislation would do the

Consumer Affairs; ensure car wash businesses follow

local, state and federal laws; protect workers,

consumers and the environment from unethical and

unlawful practices; require licensed applicants to

provide detailed information about their business

practices and show proof of compliance with

applicable laws.

As some of you may know, this has been a very important issue to me for some time; I've participated in multiple Council hearings on the car wash industry in the past and it's past time to take some serious action on the issue.

Last week I joined Attorney General Eric Schneiderman to announce a \$3.9 million settlement with a chain of car washes that systematically underpaid employees and engaged in other unethical business practices to the detriment of workers, consumers and the public. Their violations dated back to 2006 and it took until last week to reach an agreement to which their low-wage employees, close to

1,000 of them, will finally receive some restitution for their unpaid wages.

I applaud Attorney General Schneiderman for his great work in the settlement, but it is outrageous that anyone, especially a low-wage worker, is only now being paid wages that were earned as long as eight years ago. This legislation will allow the City to take proactive steps in monitoring the industry and ensuring that these types of problems are addressed much more quickly by requiring that car wash businesses obtain yearly licenses from the Department of Consumer Affairs. So I look forward to working with the Council, with my colleagues to pass this bill and I'm excited that we are able to get the ball rolling today.

Today we'll be voting also on approval of two of Mayor de Blasio's appointments to the Conflict of Interest Board today.

The Rules Committee has heard from these appointees and it is recommending that the Council vote to approve them so they can get to work serving the City. In addition, the Council is exploring legislative options to pass reforms which will prohibit Conflicts of Interest board members from

fundraising for elections, not only within New York 2 City, but also on the State and Federal levels. 3

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There's a great deal of enthusiasm for this plan from the Rules Committee and the Administration has indicated an openness to discussing these reforms. This is a plan that we'll be looking further into in the near future and I definitely welcome input from my colleagues as we

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proceed.

Also, I just wanted to mention a couple of celebrations that are happening in these Chambers, the upcoming Monday coming up is of course St. Patrick's Day and on Wednesday, March 19th we're having our Irish heritage celebration right here in the Council Chambers. Greek independence day is on Tuesday, March 25th and the Council will be holding a celebration in the Chambers to commemorate that occasion. And then two days later, on March 27th, we'll be celebrating Bangladeshi independence, once again, here in the Council Chambers. And last but not least, on March 31st we'll be celebrating Women's History Month.

Also, I do wanna recognize, in terms of my comments; sorry that I'm jumping around a little

bit, but with regards to the situation in my district 2 3 earlier today, I do wanna thank personally my colleague, our colleague, Council Member Dickens for 4

joining me up in the district today. 5

Lastly, I'll just say that, before we move on, we do have probably a rare occasion where two colleagues are celebrating their birthdays on the same day, so we wanna definitely recognize that Council Members Andy King and Council Member Ritchie, Torres, also from the Bronx, so now two from the same day, two from the same borough; I don't think that's gonna happen very often, but we definitely wanna... safely. This occurred just days after the remains of

were found on a waterfront in Queens. Our whole city
prayed for Avonte and grieved his loss along with his
family. So you can imagine the range of emotion that
Symeir's parents felt considering the harm that might
have befallen their son, and now imagine this fact;
Symeir's school had no idea that he was missing until
his parents informed them of this fact. This is
dangerous and unacceptable and I have since learned
that this was not an isolated incident. Symeir's
parents have called for more; our children deserve
more and as a parent and an elected official I feel
compelled to do more. Today I'm introducing a bill
to require the Department of Education to install
audible alarms on all exit doors in public school
buildings housing elementary school and District 75
programs. This simple, safe measure would alert
school personnel to an unauthorized departure during
the school day, allowing them to better protect the
vulnerable children entrusted in their care. This is
a critical safety improvement that can be
accomplished quickly and affordably. In fact, the
principal of Symeir's school acted quickly to install
on the doors in that building, at the cost of only
 \$139 per door; now is the time to implement this

change citywide. I urge you to join me in requiring
Department of Education to make this reasonable
investment in the safety of New York City's public
school children by co-sponsoring the Audible Alarms
Bill. I am joined today by one of the most
courageous and brave young people I know, Symeir
Talley-Jasper, his mother, Quantasia Jasper, his
father, Rondell Talley and his great-grandmother,
Mary Jasper.

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Welcome to the Chambers and thank you for all that you do. Council Member Williams.

Madame Chair; I just wanted to draw attention to these couple of bills that I have; there's quite a few, [background comments] there's a number that I wanted to speak about. One -- the gun violence resolution; I ask my colleagues to sign on; it's basically mirroring a resolution we put forth last year [background comments] and one that Karim Camara and Ruth Hassell-Thompson in the State are putting forth to make June Gun Violence Awareness Month; thank you for all who were able to attend the press

conference today and I'm hoping that we will be able to expand on the gun violence House bills that we have available right now and provide some more funding and just make sure that people are aware and doin' the things that we can do to help prevent gun violence.

Also, I have a Local Law that will provide consumers of a breakdown of the price, including any administrative service or any other fee charged by the used car dealership; does not include tax and registration. This actually came from a personal experience trying to shop for a used car and was astonished by the difference in price that was advertised and the price that I walked in to purchase the car for. After my fifth one, when the car was bait and switched or it just was \$5,000 difference, I explained that I worked for the City in different capacities and they sat down and explained to me the industry-wide way that this works and hopefully this will curb it a little bit.

I'm asking my colleagues to sign onto Intro 0171, which I'm hoping will be called Cooper's Law, to remember Cooper Stock, a 9-year-old boy who when crossing the street was killed by a taxi driver due to failure to yield. This bill would automatically suspend the license and automatically call on the police to investigate the reason for the death and if it's found upon investigation that the death was caused by failure to yield, then the taxi driver's license would be permanently revoked; this is something that the City Council could to through the City's Administrative Code; I would hope that the City Council would, upon passing this bill, urge the State to do the same with drivers license. Cooper Stock's family, needless to say, has been devastated, their life has been changed completely and I would appreciate your considering co-sponsoring the bill today. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL:

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introducing a resolution in support of State legislation that would legalize the use of electricassisted bicycles in New York. The State legislation would amend the State Vehicle and Traffic Law to include electric-assisted bicycles in the definition of bicycles and thus permit their use. Many people will benefit, from people who make food deliveries for a living, virtual cyclists, to people who have health problems. New York remains one of the states that has not implemented the Federal standards established in 2002 that set parameters for electricassisted bicycles. To me it just doesn't make sense for the State to maintain the status quo. The use of electric-assisted bicycles can have positive effects on New York City's economy and environment; it is a mode of clean transportation and I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Thank you Madame Public Advocate.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, sir. Council Member Johnson.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER JOHNSON: Thank you Madame
3	Public Advocate. I rise today to speak about Intro
4	0144. This is a bill that would require new and
5	existing residential high-rise buildings to install
6	emergency voice and alarm communication systems in
7	compliance with existing sections of the Building
8	Code. Specifically, this bill would remove existing
9	exemptions for new residential high-rise construction
10	from existing Building Code requirements and extend
11	those same installation requirements to existing
12	residential high-rises over the next two years. It
13	would further require the posting of informational
14	placards alerting tenants to these systems in public
15	and common areas. The unnecessary loss of life due
16	to the lack of communication between first responders
17	and victims can be avoided and it is important that
18	we ensure each building is equipped to alert tenants
19	to safety, precautions and developing information.
20	Evacuating a high-rise residential building in an
21	emergency can pose serious threats to the safety and
22	lives of residents. On January 5th of this year a
23	three-alarm fire caused panic in my district at 500
24	West 43rd Street, a high-rise residential building

25 called The Strand, when flames shot out of a 20th

floor apartment, heavy smoke quickly filled the

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emergency stairwell, which claimed the life of a 27-3

year-old young man named Daniel McClung and 4

critically injured his husband, a 32-year-old man 5

named Michael Todd Cohen. Had there been a system in 6

place to communicate with building residents, in the

8 emergency stairwells instructions that could've been

given to tell residents to use a different stairwell, 9

10 go back to their homes, Danny would be alive.

11 Intuition tells us to leave our apartments during a

12 fire, but not everyone knows if they live in a

13 fireproof building; an emergency communication system

14 in stairwells allows critical real-time information

to be communicated during a fire; this will allow 15

first responders to correspond with residents, 16

17 telling them to stay or go. [bell] I ask my

colleagues to sign onto this bill, and one last 18

thing, Madame Public Advocate, in 1999 there was the 19

20 Macaulay Culkin fire which claimed three lives in a

21 similar fashion; Mayor Giuliani, Deputy Mayor Lhota

and the Fire Commissioner at that time made similar 22

21	COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you Madame
22	Public Advocate. I wanna call your attention to two
23	intros; first, in a state where our city has no right
24	to control its own minimum wage, it's own tax rates,

it's own rent laws, even by the standards of such a

state, the fact that we have no control over where we place red light cameras is simply absurd and indefensible. We have a pilot program now that has placed six red light cameras in front of schools and in the first two weeks of their operation they found nearly 1,000 speeders, which testifies to the scale of a problem. These are six cameras for over 1,000 school buildings; Intro 0117 would call upon the State to grant us the power to set the number and location of speed cameras in New York City.

Secondly, I wanna call your attention to an intro that gets at the problem of inequity in funding for our park system; in fact, it's accurate to say that we have a tale of two park systems in New York City in which a small number of parks receive a large amount of private funding while the broad number of 1,900 parks in the City are underfunded and under-maintained. And Intro 0154 would require the Parks Department to report on a park by park basis the money spent on maintenance and capital expenditures, which would allow us as a legislative body for the first time to accurately gauge the scale and scope of inequality in our park system. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: 2 Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Thank you Public Advocate. My heartfelt wishes and prayers with the residents of Council Member Viverito's district and anything that my office to the south can do to help, we humbly extend our assistance.

I am here today to request the sign-on of my colleagues on my Introduction, No. 0149, also sponsored by Council Member Brad Lander. Our legislature, in large part, is here to pass laws, but where do they go once we pass them? How are those who are governed by them able to gain access to these new laws? They're currently accessible through third-party vendors who receive exclusive access to our law which they sell at a profit to lawyers, lobbyists and those that can afford it. My first online hacktivism [sic] as a lawyer was to put the

laws online at Wikilaw.org, which eventually became
JurisPedia.org, but now we can fix it in government.
I hope that my colleagues will join me today in
setting our laws free by putting them online.

I also wanted to speak to another

Introduction, our... sorry; another Resolution. Our

City Comptroller, Scott Stringer, served on his local
community board when he was just 16; in my

Governmental Operations Committee hearing on best
practices for community boards we learned that having

16- and 17-year-olds on community boards was in fact
a best practice, so please join me in signing onto

Resolution No. 115 and I am joined as a sponsor on
that with Council Member Mark Levine and I believe

Council Member Ritchie Torres, so please join us on
making the community boards more accessible. Thank
you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Mendez.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you Madame
Public Advocate. Today I rise to ask my colleagues
to sign onto Intro 0162; this would require an
environmental assessment to determine the density of
development in any of the flood-prone areas that is

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now known as Zone 1. After Sandy there were areas that have been targeted for development and essentially were putting people back in harms way and some big developments, and I think we need to determine how we can get people out of the area and reach safety, but we should not be building really enormous big building if the... you know, if the area cannot manage that many people in a Zone 1 area.

And I also ask my colleagues to sign onto Intro 0164; this was a bill by Manhattan Borough President, Gale Brewer, which is extending J-51 tax benefits to any owners who will put green roofs in their buildings. So thank you very much.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you Madame

Public Advocate. I wanna thank my fellow members of

the Aging Committee who participated in a great first

hearing on elder abuse earlier this month. At the

hearing we heard excellent testimonies from

government agencies and organizations who are

currently working on the front line protecting our

seniors from abuse. As a follow-up to this hearing

I'm introducing two resolutions today and one

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introduction related to elder abuse. Resolution 105 with Council Member Vallone in support of Assembly Bill 7892 and State Senate Bill 6221, which would strengthen protection for older adults against financial abuse by allowing a banking organization to refuse to conduct transactions requiring the disbursal of money into an account of a vulnerable adult if there is reason to believe that financial exploitation has occurred or may occur and authorizing banks to provide record access to law enforcement if there's a reason to believe that a vulnerable adult is being exploited. Resolution 106, which calls upon the New York State Legislature to pass legislation requiring mandatory reporting of suspected elder abuse so that professionals who work with seniors will be mandated to report elder abuse if they believe it is occurring. Many states in the United States have already begun to create these protections. Many types of professional classes are already required to report child abuse and it's time to extend the same protection to our seniors.

I'm also introducing Intro 0129 with

Council Member Williams to expand protection for

tenants against tenant harassment b increasing fees

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2	for tenant harassment and creating an online record

I ask my colleagues today to join onto two pieces of legislation that I am introducing; the first is Intro 0140; it's a Local Law to amend the code of the City of New York to lower the speed limit on New York City's side streets. The second law is a resolution that would support the Mayor's initiative to lower the speed limit all across the City to 25 miles per hour.

These of course are significant items within Vision

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Zero; I will point out that the first law, aside for
requiring lower speed limit on side streets would
also in fact require the designation of seven slow
zone in New York City and would require slow zones
around our public schools as well. So in essence,
what these two pieces of legislation do is; the first
is, it supports the Mayor's initiative; we certainly
hope that Albany will finally agree with our
contention that New York City should be in charge of
its own speed limits, but if for some reason Albany
does not do that, which I know would be shocking to
all of us, I have Intro 0140, which would what we
are currently allowed to do, which is we would lower
the speed limits on those side streets. So I
encourage all my colleagues to join our support for
Vision Zero by co-sponsoring Resolution 111 and
Introduction 0140. Thank you.
