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CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Good morning; welcome to the New York City Council's Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections; my name is Brad Lander, chairing the Committee; I'm pleased to be joined this morning by Committee Members Margaret Chin from Manhattan, Debi Rose from Staten Island, Rafael Espinal from Brooklyn, Vinny Ignizio, the Minority Leader from Staten Island, Dan Garodnick from Manhattan, Ydanis Rodriguez from Manhattan, and Mark Levine from Manhattan, who are both frantically signing finance resolutions from earlier. this morning that the Speaker, who's a member of this committee and also Council Member Inez Dickens are up in Harlem dealing with the explosion that took place earlier this morning, so we'll hold the roll open at the end for them and obviously are praying that everyone, as many people as possible, are okay up there and I'm gonna go ahead and get started with this hearing. This morning I'd also like to acknowledge the Committee's Attorney, Amatullah Booth, and the staff of the Council's Investigative Unit who have been doing a lot of work these days on

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 4 all the nominations that we're getting, Chuck Davis, our Director of Investigations, as well as Deandra [phonetic] Johnson and Diana Arriaga [phonetic], so thanks to you guys.

On March 6, 2014, this Committee held a public hearing regarding the Mayor's candidates for appointment to the New York City Conflicts of Interest Board, Richard Briffault and Fernando Bohorquez, and this morning the Committee, and later today the Council, will vote on whether to give its advice and consent to these candidates.

Richard Briffault is a resident of

Manhattan and if the Council gives its advice and

consent, he'll be appointed to the Board and

subsequently designated by the Mayor as Chair,

filling the vacant position formerly held by Nicholas

Scoppetta, serving a six-year term, which will expire

March 31st, 2020.

Fernando Bohorquez is a resident of
Brooklyn and if the Council gives its advice and
consent, he'll be appointed to the Board, succeeding
Board Member Burton Lehman and serve on the remainder
of that six-year term, which expires March 31st,
2018.

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As we discussed at the hearing, the COIB is the entity that serves to provide clear guidance to public employees regarding the Conflicts of Interest Law, which lays out the type of conduct prohibited by public servants; the Board achieves this through training, education and the issuance and publication of advisory opinions and adopts rules to implement and interpret New York City's Conflict of Interest Law; it reviews and makes decisions on alleged conflicts violations and has the power to impose fines of up to \$25,000 per violation and suspension or dismissal of that city employee when deemed appropriate, and we noted that Council Members are subject to the COIB's decisions and also seek frequent guidance and receive training and education from the Board as well, and that the Board collects and reviews financial disclosure forms for a range of public officials, including the City Council. Board consists of five members, all appointed by the Mayor; with the advice and consent of the Council and the Mayor designates one of them as the chair. Charter states that these members should be chosen for their "independence, integrity, civic commitment and high ethical standards." Board members are

mandated to meet at least once per month and are prohibited from holding public office, seeking election to any public office, being a public employee in any jurisdiction, holding party political office or appearing as a lobbyist before the City pursuant to Charter Section 2602. Board members are entitled to receive compensation in the amount of \$250 for each calendar day that they perform work for the Board and the Chair is entitled to receive \$275 per day of service.

At the hearing members asked extensive questions of both Mr. Briffault and Mr. Bohorquez; Mr. Briffault is a professor at Columbia and has an extensive track record on ethics law matters and we had a big book of articles of his. Mr. Bohorquez is a lawyer who's also worked on a range of ethics and conflicts issues. During... and members asked and can speak too if they want, the questions and I think both of them are imminently qualified to serve on the COIB and exhibit the characteristics required in the Charter.

An issue was raised at the hearing; several members asked questions regarding Mr.

Bohorquez' intent to continue his fundraising

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 7 activities; he had received a letter from COIB detailing the fact that COIB members are not allowed to fundraise for any City-elected office or on behalf of any City officials running for other offices, but that that leaves some additional loopholes, essentially, especially in cases involving State and Federal elections, which Council Members or other City-elected officials are sometimes candidates in and where the potential might exist if a City official was a candidate in that race for a conflict to arise. So there have been two follow-up matters since that hearing and I just wanna call everyone's attention to. First, Council Members have and we'll provide members of the public, a letter that's being entered into evidence today dated March 11th, 2014 from Mr. Bohorquez, and I won't read the whole letter, but I will read the concluding paragraph in which he says, "Therefore, in addition to abiding by the existing fundraising prohibitions and limitations under Chapter 68 of the Charter, I represent that if confirmed to the Board I will make a personal commitment to not solicit contributions or raise funds in any race for State or Federal elective office wherein a current City public servant has

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COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 8 announced his or her candidacy for that office," and members and members of the public can look at the letter as well.

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It was also noted at the hearing and subsequently by Council Members that this is not simply an issue of Mr. Bohorquez, but essentially is a small, but meaningful loophole in the New York City Conflict of Interest Law; at the end of our hearing last week the current Executive Director of the COIB, Mark Davies, noted that in many other jurisdictions the Ethics Law provides a broader prohibition on fundraising for members of the Ethics or Conflicts Board, essentially prohibiting contributions in this type of race or this type of election, as discussed by Mr. Bohorquez in the letter, where a conflict might be seen to arise and so I'm pleased to report that the Council will be moving forward to consider an amendment to the City's Conflicts Law to provide a clearer prohibition on fundraising activities that could present a conflict; we don't have that drafted or in evidence today and there'll be some important questions and of course details to work out about how to describe them and how to do it, but I think it's a good instance where this Committee's hearing

committee on Rules, privileges and elections 9 identified a loophole and is not only, thanks to Mr. Bohorquez; got some assurance from him, but is going to be able to move forward to actually strengthen the City's Conflicts of Interest Law in a way that will cover all members of the COIB in a forward-going way. So I wanna thank those members of the Committee who asked questions and who followed up and are enabling us to use this opportunity to strengthen the City's Ethics and Conflicts Laws.

So with that introduction, let me ask if any members want to make comments before we [background comment] move to a vote? Council Member Garodnick.

much Mr. Chairman and thank you for the summary of all of the issues before us. I just wanted to take a moment to put the nomination just in the context of the City having previously approved at our last Rules Committee Mark Peters to serve as the Department of Investigations Commissioner, who had served as the Mayor's Treasurer during his campaign and we approved his nomination on the basis of his unique qualifications for that position and despite his obvious close and personal relationship with the

It is in that context that this Committee evaluated the current candidates and as you noted, we specifically scrutinized Mr. Bohorquez, who also had raised money for the Mayor during the recent campaign, not that there's anything wrong with having done that, of course, but we were concerned that Mr. Bohorquez could continue to actively participate in elections that could involve a City official even after his confirmation, and as you explained in your intro, we were pleased that he wrote to the Conflicts of Interest Board to get clarity on what the rules would be and he was advised that if he were confirmed he could not continue to fundraise for candidates in City elections or for City office-holders running for non-city offices, but what it did allow was for him to fundraise for State and Federal candidates who did not hold City offices even against a New York City official. So while it may be an accurate assessment of the law, now that this issue is squarely before us, I just wanted to go on record saying that I agree strongly that we should close this loophole; no member of the City's Conflicts Board should be allowed to raise funds in a political campaign for or

against a City official. Arguably, and we should

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COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 11 consider this, no member of the Board should be allowed to raise funds in a political campaign for or against a City official who held office during the time that they served on the Board, and I think that that's something that we should take a look at too. I think to allow any of this creates an unnecessary political atmosphere in the Board and could chill one's willingness to call them to solicit advice in the first instance and we certainly want to encourage people to call the Conflicts of Interest Board. Bohorquez has voluntarily agreed not to engage in political fundraising where a City candidate is running and he could have gone further and posed further prohibitions on himself, but either way for now, he is the only member of the Conflicts of Interest Board to whom anymore broad restriction now applies. So I agree with you, Mr. Chairman, that we should be taking a very clear and complete look at what the Conflicts Law requires and to make sure that our constituents can count on the Conflicts of Interest Board to remain conflict-free itself and I think that an important aspect of that is restricting political fundraising as a condition for membership.

So I will be voting yes on both of the candidates

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COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 12 today, but I did want to note that I appreciate your intro too.

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CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you Council Member. Council Member Ignizio.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Thank you very much. I just wanna echo the comments of my colleague, Council Member Garodnick, and let those that are watching and the Committee Members know how engaged our chairman was on this issue and how he felt it was important that we ensure to all City employees, which is... who are the people that we are speaking to, that the Conflict of Interest Board remain free of any political wranglings or issues relating to it. We need to ensure that this is a Board where the employees of the City of New York go first and to ensure that they're not getting involved in a conflict and I think it starts with the board members being beyond reproach. I think Mr. Bohorquez, from actually voluntarily taking himself out of that situation and putting himself in stronger restrictions than was previously asked of him, I think is a positive step and I think we in this Committee, in this Council ought look to ensure that every board member is held to the highest standard,

particularly for this board, and so I thank you for

your work in this, Mr. Chairman and the Committee and

my colleague, Mr. Garodnick, for staying focused on

this important matter.

COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: I'd also like to say that I feel that the candidates nominated by the Mayor provided the answers that we needed from all those questions that arose from some of us and I am so proud to say that we will be voting on two excellent candidates for those positions.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Chair.

I just wanted to, on the record, that I agree with you, that we need to do something to close this loophole. That was one of my concerns, that he's gonna be... Mr. Bohorquez, was gonna be held to another standard, different from the rest of the Board. So it's good that he wrote the letter, but I think that we really need to look at the law as a whole so that every single board member has to abide by the same standard. So thank you.
