CHAIRPERSON RECCHIA: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the committee room of the New York City Council Chamber. My name is Domenic M. Recchia, Jr. and I am the chair of the Finance Committee of the New York City Council. At this time, I would like to introduce all my colleagues who have joined us today. To my left, Jimmy Oddo, Darlene Mealy, Diana Reyna, Diane Helen Foster, Julissa Ferreras, Vincent Ignizio. To my right, Oliver Koppell, Gale Brewer and Al Vann, Annabel Palma—is there anyone else—and Karen Koslowitz and Rosie Mendez.

Today this Committee will take the necessary actions to allow the full City Council to adopt fiscal 2013 budget. We will adopt an expense capital and revenue budget, which includes Schedule C fixed property tax rates, set the property class shares, adopt a transparency resolution, take action on other budget related resolutions. We will also vote on non-budget

| related items. We will vote to override the |
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| Mayor's veto on the Banking Commission bill, also |
| vote on four Land Use items. Before we start, I |
| would like to take a second to thank our talented |
| and hardworking Finance staff under the leadership |

Also I want to take a minute to thank the entire staff of the Finance division individually because all of them work hard and many work behind the scenes to ensure that the Council adopt an on time and responsible budget, so I want to thank them all. I also have to start off by giving a special thank you to my attorney sitting at my right, Tanisha Edwards. Thank you for - - .

| With that said, let's move on. The |
| Finance Committee members should have a budget |
| packet, which contains all the budget related |
| legislation that must be voted on by the Committee |

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| and at the full Council. The packet also includes |
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| supporting schedules that are not voted on, but |
| filed with the Committee. On your desk, the |
| Finance Committee Members should have the Land Use |
| items and the Banking Commission bill and the |
| veto. Before I provide a brief description about |
| the items to be voted on today during the Finance |
| Committee, I want to strongly emphasize the |
| Finance Committee members will be given only one |
| budget packet, so after you vote on the packet |
| items, you must bring your packet and all of the |
| contents to the Stated Meeting to vote again. Non |
| Finance Committee members will be given the budget |
| packet at the Stated Meeting. |

So let's start with the non-budget related items that are on your desk. We first have the Banking Commission bill, Intro 485-A, sponsored by my colleague, Council Member Al Vann. This bill establishes an advisory body that will hold public hearings and prepare an assessment every two years on banking needs throughout New York City. Once a year the Board will prepare and publish a report written in plain language - - on how the city's depository banks are doing in

| helping to meet those needs. If you remember, the |
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| Committee and the full Council passed legislation |
| on April $30^{\rm th}$, 2012 . On May $30^{\rm th}$, the Mayor issued |
| a message of disapproval and vetoed the |
| legislation. The veto message is attached to the |
| briefing report. Today the Committee will vote to |
| re-pass Intro 485-A and file the Mayor's veto |
| number M-817. In order to override the Mayor's |
| veto, this bill in question must be posed to the |
| Committee that asks whether Intro 485-A should be |
| re-passed notwithstanding the objections of the |
| Mayor. I encourage all my colleagues to vote aye. |

The next items are all Land Use.

The first Land Use item is the Bialystoker

Synagogue in Council Member Margaret Chin's

district in Manhattan. This property serves low

income seniors. It consists of one building with

126 units of rental housing. This property will

also undergo rehab and will receive a partial tax

exemption to assist in the rehabilitation.

The second Land Use item is Access
House, a property located in Council Member Rosie
Mendez's district. The property serves low income
seniors. It consists of one building with 16

The third Land Use item is the Kosciuszko Street Apartments, a property that will be located in Council Member Al Vann's district in Brooklyn. The property - - constructed will serve low income families in ten units throughout five buildings.

The last Land Use item is Schaeffer Apartments in Council Member Erik Dilan's district in Brooklyn. The property will be newly constructed with severe formerly homeless individuals and 33 units throughout the one building. All four Council Members support these projects.

Our next item is a transparency reso. This reso sets forth the designations or changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local aging and youth - - funding as well as new designations or change sin designation of certain organizations to receive funding pursuant to certain initiatives in fiscal 2012 and '11 budgets. For clarification purposes, it is to be noted that organizations appearing in

| the reso that have not yet completed the |
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| prequalification process conducted by MOCs and the |
| Council or another entity are identified in the |
| attached charts with an asterisk. Additionally, |
| as with all transparency resos, Council Members |
| will have to sign a disclosure form indicating |
| whether or not a conflict exists with any of the |
| groups attached on the list. If any Council |
| Member has a potential conflict of interest with |
| any of the organizations listed or he or she |
| might want to disclose the conflict at the time of |
| their vote. |

Now let's move on to the budget related items the Finance Committee will vote on. I will provide a brief description of the items on our agenda today to require a vote. Preston Niblack, the director of the Finance division, will testify shortly to provide a greater detail. The first item is reso A, capital budget. Second is reso B, capital budget, which is the capital budget as amended by reso. The third item is a resolution adopting the contract budget. Fourth is the resolution adopting the expense revenue and contract budget. Fifth is the resolution to

| approve the amendment to the five year education |
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| capital plan. The sixth is the resolution |
| approving 39 th year of the community development |
| program and 38 th year of reallocations. The |
| seventh, eighth and ninth items are three property |
| tax reso. The tenth item is the resolution |
| approving the expense budget mods. The eleventh |
| item is the resolution approving the revenue |
| budget modification. As a reminder to Council |
| Members, schedule C is the schedule C of the |
| expense revenue contract budgets, so we do not |
| vote on schedule C separately. Disclosures must |
| be made for FY '13, schedule C and reso A capital. |
| Liz, Jim and have copies of the forms. The |
| budget packet that members have in front of them |
| contain all the items just mentioned. The budget |
| packet also contains supporting documents and |
| schedules items to be which are not voted on by |
| the members. Before I turn the microphone over to |
| see if anybody would like to ask Preston Niblack |
| any questions or the Office of Management or |
| Budget, I want to briefly speak about this year's |
| budget and the process. This is my eleventh |
| budget and my third year as chairman of the |

Finance Committee. As chairman, I have seen 2 firsthand the tremendous amount of work and 3 dedication made by the Speaker, the Council and 4 5 the Mayor to balance the city's priorities. 6 year's budget was not easy. Although this budget originally was viewed as somewhat painless as compared to prior budgets, we did get a few last 9 minute surprises that required the Council to work closely and collaboratively with each other in 10 11 City Hall to make tough choices and compromise on 12 levels that were extremely difficult - - this 13 budget. We were also able to work collaboratively with the administration to ensure libraries would 14 15 remain open for five days, both daycare and after school programs are restored at or above FY '12 16 17 level meaning not one child will lose access to 18 his or her care. In fact, nearly 4,000 more city 19 children will be able to take advantage of these 20 services. In FY 2013 budget nearly 30,000 out of 21 school time slots for school aged children are 22 restored and more than 160,000 children will be 23 able to participate in after school programs saved 24 or funded by the Council. The Council also 25 successfully prevented the closure of fire

| companies and protected senior services. An |
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| increase of funding for senior case managers |
| their caseloads for all case managers do not rise |
| above 80. Education, the Council reached an |
| agreement with the DOE to avoid a reduction in |
| teachers and restored funding to help teachers buy |
| necessary materials for the classroom this fall. |
| Additionally working with the DOE, DC 37,, the |
| Council helped avoid layoffs of 250 school aides. |
| All of this was done with a budget that remains |
| balanced without increasing taxes or major cuts to |
| essential services budget is supported by 2.4 |
| billion prior year resources carried from FY '12, |
| '13 and 1 billion from the retired health |
| [phonetic] benefits trust, the creation of which |
| reflects the fiscal responsible and insightful |
| action by saving surpluses funds during the city's |
| boom years 2006, 2007. Before we move forward, |
