And 11 today's hearing is LU No. 34 (20145279 HKX), the 12 Bronx General Post Office in Council Member Arroyo's 13 district and Jenny Fernandez, representing Landmarks 14 Preservation Committee will give the testimony. 15 JENNY FERNANDEZ: Thank you, Chair Koo; 16 Council Members. My name is Jenny Fernandez, 17 Director of Intergovernmental and Community Relations for the Landmarks Preservation Commission. 18 19 today to testify on the Commission's designation of 20 the Bronx General Post Office Lobby, First Floor 21 Interior. On October 29th, 2013, the Landmarks 22 23 Preservation Commission held a public hearing on the 24 proposed designation of the Bronx General Post Office 25 Lobby, First Floor Interior. Four people spoke in

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING AND MARITIME USES 4 support of designation, including representatives, Congressman Jose Serrano and Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr., as well as representatives of the Historic District's Council and the New York Landmarks Conservancy. There were no speakers in opposition to designation. The Commission also received 13 letters and emails in support of designation. On December 17th, 2013, the Commission voted to designate the building as an interior landmark.

The Bronx General Post Office building and its notable interior lobby were planned and constructed between 1934 and 1937. The architectural design was executed by Thomas Harlan Ellett. The space contains a series of 13 mural panels created by noted artists Ben Shahn and Bernarda Bryson. In the early 20th century, as the Bronx was becoming one of the fastest growing urban areas in the country, it became apparent that the Borough needed improved postal facilities. Efforts to secure a proper headquarters began as early as 1902, but it was only during the depths of the Great Depression and the advent of the New Deal Public Works program that the Bronx General Post Office was finally completed.

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Funding came from the Public Works Administration and the architectural design was overseen by the Federal Government's Office of the Supervising Architect of which Ellett was a temporary employee.

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The Bronx General Post Office and its lobby were designed in the modern classical style of architecture preferred by the New Deal era public works programs. Ellett's design combines modified classical ornament with a tendency to abstraction and simplification of these motifs. Integral to the design of the Bronx General Post Office lobby was the series of murals titled, "Resources of America," conceived by Shahn and completed with Bryson's assistance. The artists won the commission through an open competition sponsored by the Section of Painting and Sculpture, a Federal agency closely aligned with the Office of the Supervising Architect. Per the requirements of the competition, Shahn's designs comprise a unified decorative scheme that integrates with the architectural setting of the lobby. All of the panels relate to the general theme of labor and depict dynamic, even heroic views of American workers, which include African-Americans and women.

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An acclaimed photographer as well as painter and graphic artist, Shahn often used photographs as a basis for his paintings. In 1933 he apprenticed with Mexican muralist Diego Rivera. Several of the panels in the Bronx Post Office were clearly inspired by his photography trips to the American heartland during the 1930s, which others were derived from his extensive collection of newspaper clippings.

The Bronx General Post Office has
continued to serve its original purpose since it
opened in 1937; the murals have been restored on at
least two occasions and the lobby underwent extensive
renovations, all of which occurred in the 70s. In
spite of alterations that have occurred in the
interior space, the Bronx General Post Office lobby
retains much of its original fabric and modern
classical architectural design. The notable series
of murals executed by Shahn and Bryson are in tact
and are still situated in their original context.
This structure, whose design incorporates a
significant synthesis of architectural sculpture and
painting, remains a monument to the ideals of the New

Commanding the intersection of the Grand

Concourse and East 149th Street, the Bronx General

Post Office has been a focal point for those working,

living or visiting the Bronx since it was first

opened in 1937. The Bronx GPO is the significant

example of a grand public space; its outer perimeter

precincts create a sense of place and aspiration that

an important public service is being provided

therein; its exterior forms a focal point for all who

traverse this intersection.

Beyond the grand exterior is the true heart of the building, where the public has been served for more than 75 years. The interior lobby is the place where citizens communicate with the world by posting their mail, applying for passports and completing financial transactions. The grand interior space is glorified with the notable murals by Ben Shahn, making the ordinary transaction of business at this facility an enable experience.

Concern has been made for preserving the famous murals, but their display in any lesser circumstances would be inadequate. This additional

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING AND MARITIME USES 9 protection is especially welcome, given that the United States Postal Service has essentially refused to engage the people of the Bronx in the ongoing process to sell this structure. The Bronx GPO is not merely a retail facility, but a great public space that respects those who visit and those who work here; one of those great public spaces that are disappearing from everyday life all too frequently.

I continue to enthusiastically endorse the designation of the Bronx General Post Office lobby interior at 588 Grand Concourse as an official landmark of New York City. Thank you.
