just want to thank Speaker Mark -- Melissa MarkViverito for allowing us to use the chambers today to

who have given so much back to our community. Not
only in the Bronx, but throughout the City of New
York in making sure that the Bangladesh community
were acclimated in a real way around the
neighborhoods in the City.

The Bangladesh Freedom Fighters many,
many, many years ago, in particular Tofia Ahmed
Chawdhury [phonetic], you know, without his bravery
we would not be celebrating here today. And what
we're celebrating here today in the Bangladesh
community is Bangladesh Independence Day. And so,
we're honoring Bangladesh-American Community Council,
and we have the President here with us, Mohamed
Mojimba [phonetic] and Shakawi Alli [phonetic], who's
the Vice President, among some of the other members.

So they're going to be standing to my right, and we also have the Bangladesh Cultural Society, who are and I want them standing to my left.

And the President is Nasri Ahmed [phonetic] and

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Mohammed Igbal Hassad [phonetic], who's the Senior

Vice President. So if you can quickly come up, and

we can hear a few words from our speaker, our

president and we can have the clerk read. Yes, you

can send someone to the left. And I promise each of

you will get your own individual picture with Speaker

Mark-Viverito.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: All right. So I want to thank Council Member Palma for welcoming these two great organizations into our chamber as we celebrate them, and celebrate the work. And I always say this, you know, this is the people's offices, a place that welcomes everybody that is a true beautiful reflection of our city, and our city is made up of so much diversity, so many different cultures.

And we have so much to learn from each other. So it's great that we have these opportunities to really highlight work of these local organizations so that we can learn about each other. SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: As you know, we

are being shadowed today. Carla is not only here and

she goes a local school, she lives in the neighborhood that I represent. She literally lives at 116th Street and Park Avenue right near where the explosion happened, something that obviously touches both of us very dearly. And she actually came to our office looking to see how she could be helpful. But I want to take a moment. I know the last time I was here, I was coming from the site. Since then, there's been a lot of work that has happened.

But all of you have been extremely supportive, and extended your thoughts and your prayers in these days in which we've been burying the eight members of our community and of the city that passed away due to this unfortunate incident.

Hoping, which obviously will never repeat itself. So thank you. I just wanted to take a moment to personally thank all of you.

Today, we are going to be voting on legislation sponsored by Council Member Vacca that amends the City's Human Rights Law to assure that interns are legally protected from discrimination in the workplace. The spirit of the Human Rights Law has always been to protect all workers from unfair discriminatory practices. But a recent court ruling

found that an intern did not have grounds to sue

after being sexually harassed at work because she was

unpaid and, therefore, not considered an employee of

5 | the company under the law.

By passing this legislation, it will spell it out for everyone that employees do not have to tolerate discrimination or abuse in the workplace. And neither do interns regardless of whether or not they receive wages. Interns are often young people who are getting their first exposure to a professional environment. It is unacceptable for this first experience in such an environment be one where they are told they have to put up with discrimination and abuse. It's unfair to them and sends the wrong message to the next generation of professionals. I'd like to thank also Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer for her support on this issue, and again I want to thank Council Member Vacca for his leadership.

Additionally, we'll be voting on a

Resolution sponsored by Council Members Wills, Levin,

and Gibson that calls upon Albany to pass and enact

the budget that allows our city to establish a new

state funding for a Rental Subsidy Program for

homeless people. And I also want to thank the leadership of Council Member Levin who has chaired General Welfare. He was up in Albany yesterday again to reiterate this message.

Under the language of the current State
Budget Bill, state reimbursement is only allowed for
anti-eviction services. A Rental Subsidy Program is
necessary to move the homeless from shelters into
housing. It is a successful and cost-effective way
to help them get their life back on track. There are
a record number of homeless people in the shelter
system today, and it has only grown in recent years.
The City Council developed the State Legislative and
Budget Agenda. Many of you here today wrote to
Albany and helped lobby for our agenda, and Homeless
Rental Subsidy was included. It is something we
reiterated since then, and we've made sure that the
State hears it loud and clear.

We forwarded that Agenda to the Governor as well as to the Legislature, and we lobbied for that Agenda where we went to Albany. So we need action from Albany to assure that we can reverse this unfortunate trend in the City of New York. We also have a resolution sponsored by Council Members Palma

and Arroyo before the Council that calls on the State
Department of Transportation to implement the plan
drafted by the City known as the Sheridan-Hunts Point
Land Use and Transportation Study. This is a study
that was conducted by the City in 2013 dealing with
the Sheridan Expressway in the Bronx, and quality of
life related issues for the surrounding communities
following years of advocacy by community and advocacy
groups. The study yielded several recommendations
that address environmental concerns such as poor air
quality, lack of open space, and other negative
impacts to the area while also improving the Hunts
Point Market. The Council will show the State, and
more specifically the State Department of
Transportation its support for the plan by passing
this resolution today.

One other thing I'd like to bring up, as
I mentioned in the press conference today. Now,
which all State press conferences will be streamed
live so people can check it out. There are only five
days left for New Yorkers to enroll in the Health
Insurance Marketplace under the Affordable Care Act.
After March 31st anyone looking to take advantage of

2 this opportunity will need to wait until November
3 15th to enroll.

So I'd like to encourage all my colleagues to keep your constituents informed about this over the next few days, and help anyone who wants to get enrolled to do so before we reach the deadline. And obviously, there is a hotline number that really is important that we get out there. So please when you're out in your districts, when you're talking to constituents, make sure they know this is the deadline. It's coming up, and if they want to get enrolled, they should visit healthcare.gov or call 800 number 1-800-318-2596, 1-800-318-2596, and that concludes communications from this speaker.

One of which was a pregnant woman in the District of Council Member Carlos Menchaca, who was killed by a snow plow that was backing up right into her. This legislation would require all snow plow vehicles to be equipped with flashing lights, and warning audible sound to alert pedestrians that they are nearby.

during emergency conditions, declarations of emergency whether it's the city or the state, and they should be treated as such emergency vehicles. Typical emergency vehicles alert people that they are nearby. We must buy time for people to react if these vehicles are nearby. And this would apply to flashing lights day and night.

These are vehicles that are deployed

The sound would be a beeping sound similar to the sound that you hear while a truck is backing up. And you don't have to play that all night, but certainly during the day. We must do all that we can to buy pedestrians time to react. And sometimes, let's be honest, when these vehicles are deployed, they're deployed during low visibility hours. So the view of the drivers are obstructed in addition to the plows in front of them, which can obstruct their view. So we must question ourselves are we doing enough to protect New Yorkers. And this legislation has the power to mean the difference between saving a life. And that's why I'm urging my colleagues to support with me Intro 226. Thank you, Madam.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Thank you Public Advocate. I want to just call your attention to the fact that you should have received a report on all of your desks. It's a Policy Report on Improving Community Boroughs in New York City, Best Practices and Recruitment, and Appointment in New York City's 59 Community Boroughs. Between April 1st, which is coming up right away, and May 30th of this year, four new borough presidents and 21 new City Council members, along with the rest of those who have already been elected, we'll be making 1,475 appointments to 59 community boards spanning all five boroughs.

This report is something that my office prepared from testimony that we received at the Governmental Operations Committee from Controller Scott Stringer; Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer; Bronx Borough President Rubin Diaz; and the Staten Island Borough President Oddo, as community borough leadership from all five boroughs. encourage you to read the 80 pages. It's a really great read if you can't sleep at night.

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But we do have substantial recommendations including standard online applications; requiring reappointment applications; independent screening panels. Engaging those who did not receive appointments, and important changes to restore the public trust including disclosure of conflicts of interest; ban on appointments of people who are on the executive board of a political party, or staffers who are elected officials.

Mandatory reporting on appointment process to the City Council, and determinants, which were actually supported by Borough President Melinda Katz, and Borough President Eric Adams. And their response to the Citizen's Union questionnaire in their election. It's a good read, and I recommend everyone take a look at it. And I hope to work with you as a body towards a resolution where we can take on a lot of these best practices voluntarily.

One is a Resolution calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign legislation that would establish the Public Campaign Finance System for Campaigns for the Office of New York State Comptroller. This is Res 0150.

The next is to Amend the Administrative

Code of the City of New York in relation to boroughspecific coordination of snow event and responsive

communications. Intro 241. Those who went through

the recent snowstorms understand how difficult it was

to coordinate. This will put a borough coordinator to help implement a borough-specific snow plan to communicate with OEM and other elected officials.

And the last one is to amend the

Administrative Code of New York in relation to filing
semi-annual reports on catch basin cleanup and
maintenance. That's Intro 240. It would ensure that
catch basins across the city are properly maintained,
and require that catch basins are inspected on an
annual basis. A minimum of one inspection per year.

And if there are any complaints regarding the catch
basin or if it is in need of repair, it is handled at
least three days after the complaint is lodged.

Unclogged basins have the potential to lead to various issues such as flooding or causing property damage to residents. This legislation will provide local elected officials with an update of the status of catch basins in the district. Anyone who has ever dealt with this issue knows how difficult it is dealing with these catch basins. And I've found that the Administration and the agency really doesn't have a good command of what is happening with the catch basins, how often they're being cleaned and where the problems are. Thank you very much.

2 PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

Council Member Mendez.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: My colleagues, today I rise to talk about someone who is special to me. But very special my dear friend and colleague, Dan Garodnick. His mother, Barbara Riotto Garodnick was an incredible wonderful person. She was an artist, and a public school teacher. And during the last few years when certain people demonized school teachers, Dan took that very personally. Dan and I share a border, and we live about ten blocks away.

But we also through the years shared the love of our parents, as he was very kind to my mother and his parents have been kind to me. And until he got married, I was the daughter they never had, and now they have Zoey. I know she's in Heaven. I know she is very proud of Dan, and you could just see it in her eyes and in her smile. I just want to read something that I saw at the Italian Chiville [phonetic] that we were all sitting at.

At her desk for many years author unknown, it said, Of all the forces that make for a better world, none is powerful as hope. With hope one can think, one can work, one can dream. If you have

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hope, you have everything. And as a teacher I know she was instilled that in so many individuals, and she instilled that love and kindness in my dear friend Dan. Thank you, Dan, for sharing your mom with all of us. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Excellent. [applause] Council Member Garodnick, our thoughts and our prayers are with you and your family during your time of loss, and she's at peace. Thank you. Council Member Levine, Mark Levine.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you, Madam Public Advocate. I would like to call the attention of my colleagues to two Introductions. First, to Number 214, which would seek to level the playing field in Housing Court where tenants currently face virtually 100% of landlords being represented by attorneys, while tenants themselves on average fewer than ten percent have legal representation. puts them at a severe disadvantage in the legal proceedings leading up to eviction and other such proceedings, and landlords know this.

And the most unscrupulous property owners exploit it by dragging tenants into Housing Court knowing they will not have the legal fire power to

defend themselves, who may be intimidate, and they 2 3 take the buyout. And they lose cases they shouldn't have lost. Our bill would require that all tenants 4 who may have income of 125% of the poverty or lower 5

would receive free legal counsel from the City. 6

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Secondly, I want to call your attention to Introduction 216, which would help make our streets safe for visually impaired New Yorkers. is a critical component of Vision Zero. It would require the installation of all of the pedestrian signals, APSs at additional intersections. Today, in the City of New York there are 10,800 intersections with traffic signals.

Only 71 of them have audible signals that allow a visually impaired person to cross safely. That's 71 out of 10,800. I'm sure all of us agree this is unacceptable. This legislation would require installation of 25 new APSs a year. Also installation in any kind of a bike lane, a lead pedestrian interval or automated pedestrian interval is installed. And would also require the retrofit of 50 such installations a year. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Gibson.

COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON:

Thank you very

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24 25 much, Madam Public Advocate. I, too, want to join my

colleague, Council Member Mark Levine in expressing

our firm support, and encouraging our colleagues to

please review Intro 212, which does relate to

providing vulnerable low wage income New Yorkers with

sufficient legal services. In Bronx County I

represent every courthouse from Family, Criminal,

Civil Court, and in particular Housing Court.

And I have been a part of major efforts with an abundance of advocacy groups through the Bronx in focusing on how we can reform the Housing Court process. And in addition, how we can provide sufficient legal consultation for many residents that insufficiently served. It's very unfortunate that in Bronx County last year there were 11,000 families evicted in Bronx Housing Court. And when I hear that number, there are many families that are behind that number.

And so, I really want to acknowledge and recognize incredible organizations like Urban Justice, UHAB, New Settlement, Cause Up, Palante [phonetic], Bronx Works, and so many organizations in my district that do this work each and every day.

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This is a great bill that takes us in the right direction. It's the right approach to find balance in a system where there is inequity. And I'm urging my colleagues to please look at Intro 14 and join us in this collective effort. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, and thank you Council Member Levine for your leadership. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Mealy.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Good afternoon. I rise with my Council Member for a Day, Avia Allen, and I would like to thank Council Member King to introduce a legislation of Intro 218. A bill that required the Department of Transportation to fix winter weather related potholes in a timely manner. As we all know, our city had been plagued with an unusual large amount of snow this season. will require DOT to survey and fix all winter potholes on main streets by April 21st or 30 days after the beginning of spring.

And survey and fix all winter potholes on non-main streets by May 21st, 60 days after the beginning of spring. This is a common sense bill that will provide our safe -- our city with safer

streets while giving DOT adequate time to do the work. I thank my Council colleague Andy King for working with me on this bill and I urge all my colleagues to vote on this bill. And I want to just thank -- commend Council Member Jimmy Vacca,

Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, and our Speaker Mark-Viverito for their passionate advocacy on behalf of interns.

I look forward to working with this entire city on behalf of interns, and the City Human Rights Commission to ensure that our city interns that they have every right to be free of discrimination and harassment of any kid. While internship are a vital introduction to the workplace, interns are often in a truly vulnerable position.

Intro 173 empowers interns by stating specifically that all interns, whether they are paid or unpaid, have the same protections from discrimination and harassment that every employee currently enjoys. No one should have to tolerate discrimination when they are trying to achieve professional or educational goals. And I ask all my colleagues to get on this legislation, and thank you Council Member Vacca.

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, and does your Council Member agree, the one who's sitting next to you, standing next to you?

COUNCIL MEMBER: Yes, I do.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Yes, good

Council Member Cumbo.

afternoon. Thank you, Madam Chair. I just want to first start by thanking Council Members Crowley, and Mealy for a wonderful job today of bringing so many dynamic young women today. [applause] The Council just has altogether new energy. And we are so much more committed after today, and after our luncheon of refortifying our strong unified efforts to make sure that young women are sitting in these very seats in the years to come.

So, I'm very proud of that. I'm also very proud to have a dynamic young woman with me here today, our Council Member Amanda Matea, Marte, excuse me and she is a sixth grader in my district. And I met her actually on the campaign trail. So she's a dynamic woman, and I'm very excited to have her here today.

I am rising today because I want to request the support of my colleagues on Intro 187, which will require the Administration for Children's Services to provide information regarding high school graduation rates of youths in foster care.

AMANDA MARTE: Thank you, Madam Public

Advocate. It is an honor to be here today. This

rule will call for an A-S -- A-C-S Commissioner to

submit an annual report to City Council no later than

October 1, 2014, and no later than every October 1st

thereafter. Regarding the number of youth in foster

care who graduated from high school in the previous

year from September 1st through August 31st.

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: As elected officials, we have a duty to ensure that our city's most vulnerable population is well regarded. After yesterday's hearing with General Welfare and chairing that with Council Member Levin, we recognize that foster youth are 44% less likely to complete high school than their peers in general. And less than half of former foster youth are employed within four years of emancipation.

We need to hold ACS accountable for the academic success of our young people by increasing

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COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: And I apologize for jumping the gun. So I stand again at the right time to ask you, my colleagues today to support Res 0142. This resolution is calling on the United States Congress to pass, and the President to sign, H.R.1593, also known as the Stop Act, which would establish a sexual assault an oversight response council. Sadly, statistics bear out that this legislation is greatly needed.

According to the Department of Defense, an estimated 19,300 sexual assaults occurred in the military in 2010. Yet, only 13.5% reported assaults. For those few who came forward to report their assaults, only 8% saw their assailants referred to court-martials. Indeed, in the most recent case reported only regarding sexual misconduct in the military, a brigadier general was reprimanded for, among other offenses, mistreating an Army Captain, who was his mistress. He was only reprimanded.

This bill will address this dilemma by changing how sexual assault is handled in the military by creating an independent body to investigate and prosecute sexual assault cases. Please join me in protecting the civil rights and

dignity of all of our citizens putting their lives on
the line in the armed services by supporting this

Stop Act.

And I just want to commend the Women's Caucus Chairs for a wonderful day. We've seen such wonderful, powerful, young dynamic, young people and today I have with me, if you notice, they're twins. They were valedictorian and salutatorian in their class and they are [applause] -- and they are proof that arts in schools are -- is really important. I thank you for having them today.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, Council member. Thank you. Council Member Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you Public

Advocate, and I also wanted to thank the Co-Chair of
the Women's Caucus for organizing this event so that
we could see all our future young women leaders here.
So I'm going to ask my Council Member for the day,
Kelly May, to introduce the three legislation, three
bills that I'm talking about today.

KELLY MAY: The first bill is a bill to regulate portable generators and to acquire companies that use them to monitor the impact on indoor air quality. If you're going to use a generator for an

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extended period of time in street light under someone's window, it should meet certain emission standards. The second bill is a bill to ensure that new buildings in the city are built to include simple environmental design standards so that they retain heat better. When buildings leak heat, tenants are cold, and it uses unnecessary amounts of electricity at cost both the building and everyone in our city.

And the third is a bill I'm introducing with to Council Member Lander, Public Advocate James, and Council Member Richard, and 16 other Council Members legislations to reduce the use of carryout bags. This bill will create a mandatory ten cent charge on paper and plastic bags that are normally given for free. Stores would use the charge -stores would keep the charge, and customers would have to make a more conscious choice about the impact that paper and plastic bags have on the environment. Many other towns and cities in the United States have already passed single-use bag legislation. New York is behind -- is being left behind. So I hope my colleagues will join us in signing on to support this important legislation. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. 2 3 in the chambers, please. Council Member Rodriguez.

COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. First of all, I'd like to invite everyone to go to the movies on the 28th, and see the movie about the

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you, my colleagues. Today I rise to talk about two specific pieces of legislation of several that I mentioned in sum today, and I defer to my colleague, Council Member Melissa Rodriguez.

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MELISSA RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. So I'm introducing Intro 221. This bill, which will provide legal representation to single heads of household with children who are subject to eviction, and -- and judgment or foreclosure. I introduced similar legislation of the February 26 stated by legal representation to senior citizens subject to the same proceedings. This bill is of equal importance as it will create protection for this population, preventing children of single-parent households from becoming a part of our city's homeless population.

I'm also introducing Bill Intro 19, which will create a bicycle safety task force operated through DOT and required to meet at least five times per year. To ensure that we have a better understanding of how to improve the use of bicycles in New York City, and to encourage safe riding practices. In an effort to create legislation that will align with Mary de Blasio's achievement of Vision Zero, it is important to recognize that comprehensive traffic safety requires regulations of vehicles that operate on two wheels as well as four. I ask that you support this bill. Thank you.
