CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Good Morning. I
am Council Member Eric Ulrich, Chair of the
Council's Committee on Veterans. Today, we are
voting on Resolution 159, a resolution in support
of Senate Bill 2182, the Suicide Prevention for
American Veterans Act. Introduced in the United
States Senate early this year by Senator John Walsh
of Montana. The SAV Act would extent VA healthcare
for veterans from five to fifteen years, review
wrongful discharges, and foster a greater
collaboration between the Department of Veterans
Affairs and the Department of Defense to ensure a
seamless transition of care for our men and women
in uniform. In our April hearing, this Committee
reviewed the SAV Act, explored the greater mental
health issues facing veteran return and returning
service members, and heard testimony from veterans'
service organizations, mental health subject matter
experts and other stake holders on a range of
topics and policy concerns. We had a very
constructive exchange and I am acting on some of
those issues this Committee is acting on some of
those issues that were raised at that hearing.

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New York City is home to roughly 200,000 veterans and many more service members will be leaving active duty, and returning home to the boroughs in the subsequent months and years ahead. Given existing demand in this looming reality, New York City must ensure that sufficient program services and policies are in place to meet current mental health challenges and issues facing the post 9-11 veterans are now experiencing.

After April's hearing, the Committee has a strong understanding of what steps the City needs to take on this front, moving forward. an estimated twenty two veterans dying each day by suicide, and many more grappling daily with the complex mental health challenges that stay well beyond the years of service, we need to act now. The Suicide Prevention for American Veterans Act is not perfect, but it is a solid starting point and draws much needed attention to the invisible scars and injuries that stay with veterans well beyond the years of service. I am confident today that this Committee will pass Resolution 159 and I deeply urge the members of Congress and the President to act on this important health

2 initiative, and pass and sign the Suicide3 Prevention Act swiftly.

I want to acknowledge my colleagues,

Council Members Vallone, and the bill's sponsor

today, Council Member Cabrera of the Bronx, for

joining us. And I want to recognize Council Member

Cabrera for introducing this very important piece

of legislation and I would ask him to say a few

words on the bill before we vote, and then the

Committee will vote on the matter at hand.

MR. CABRERA: Thank you so much, Mr.

Chair. I want to take a moment to just express my dear appreciation because you have been a champion of... for veterans and your leadership is one in which you do it from the heart, and I appreciate your support on this Resolution, the Suicide

Prevention for American Veterans Act. You know, it is one thing to lose American soldiers overseas, fighting for us, but it is another thing to lose them while on our ground to suicide. Having had a grandfather who contemplated suicide, he was a World War II veteran, this hits home first hand.

The other day I was with a World War II veteran who is ninety-something years old and just to see that

after, even from the forties, all the way to right
now, talking about how war was hell. He couldn't
stop, just saying that. I was just really the
impact that he felt, and having spoken to so many
veterans to date, we… this is about saving lives.
And, this is why we must urge Congress through this
Resolution to provide the health that our veterans,
desperately, desperately need. And, this is a good
beginning. It is not the end of all, in regards to
our veterans, but it is a good beginning and we
must, again deal with these mental health issues
because we are literally losing soldiers by the
day. The numbers are clear where the rate of
suicide among veterans are much higher than the
general public. And, there are programs, there are
ways to help our veterans in making this
transition. It is taking us all of this year to
really learn how to do this, but we must have the
pathway for them to do so. So, with that, I
encourage all of the Committee Members to vote on
it.

MR. VALLONE: I just wanted to say thank you, and how proud I am to be a part of something as important as this. Twenty two veterans dying a day is unacceptable. So, anything we can do to help provide additional services and support they need in transitioning, back to civilian life, I am proud to stand with them. So, thank you today.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Okay. Seeing as there are no other members who will speak, but there are the members who will come, and I will make sure that the role will be kept open so that they will have the opportunity to vote.

Before we do go to the roll call, I do want to thank the Committee Council, Kelly Taylor, and also the Policy Analyst for the Committee, Redmond Haskins(sp?) for their work on drafting this Resolution. And, of course, I want to acknowledge and thank, again, the bill's primary sponsor, Council Member Cabrera of the Bronx.
