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CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: Buenos dias everyone. Good morning. We're about to start this hearing, so I remind everyone to turn off your phones or put them on silent mode.

MALE VOICE: Committee on Immigration,
June 26, 2014, the meeting is recorded by James
Preston.

CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: [background comments] So I'm Carlos Menchaca, Chair of the New York City Council's Committee on Immigration. This morning the Committee will vote on proposed Introductory Bill No. 253-A, a Local Law to amend the administrative code of the city of New York in relation to the creation of a New York City identity card program. I am proud to have co-sponsored this bill with my colleague and form chair of the Immigration Committee, Council Member Daniel Dromm.

The creation of a New York City identity card, or NYC ID, is not only important to me, but to many of the people living in my district; to my colleagues as well, like Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and our Mayor, Bill de Blasio.

I'm happy that this initiative has wide support from both City Hall and at City Council. The

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Committee on Immigration received testimony in support of the bill from the Commissioner of the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs, the Director of the Mayor's Office of Operations, advocates, immigration practitioners, and affected individuals.

Throughout the hearing we kept hearing the same sentiment; that the creation of a municipal ID card would greatly benefit various New York City communities, including disconnected youth, seniors, unbanked immigrants, transgender, homeless, and the recently incarcerated. Then there are people like me who bike everywhere and don't have a driver's license that could benefit from a municipal ID card. I look forward to being one of the first people to apply for and use NYC ID card and really what this says and the message for today is that this is a card for all.

Now for the record I would like to walk through the details of proposed Introductory Bill 253-A.

Under the bill, the New York City
identity card program would be administered by an
agency designated by the Mayor. The NYC ID would be
available to any resident of New York City who can
establish identity and residency. Applicants will

| prove identity by providing a range of documents, |
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| including a U.S. or foreign passport, military ID, |
| visa, etc. These documents will be weighted by the |
| administering agency and an applicant may be required |
| to provide more than one document to establish his or |
| her identity. Applicants would prove residency by |
| providing documents that show both their name and |
| address located within the City. These documents car |
| be utility bills, a lease, a bank account statement, |
| proof that a child is enrolled in a City school, or |
| an employment pay stub. These documents will be |
| weighted by the administrating agency and an |
| applicant may be required to provide more than one |
| document to establish their identity. It is also |
| important to note that the administering agency will |
| be required to create alternative methods by which |
| homeless individuals can establish residency in the |
| City, even though they may not have a fixed address. |
| Each NYC ID card will include, at a |

Each NYC ID card will include, at a minimum, the cardholder's photograph, name, date of birth, self-designated gender, address and an expiration date. The bill also requires that the card be designed in a manner to deter fraud. Under

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the bill, applications will be made available for pickup and drop-off at sites throughout the City.

The bill requires that there would be at least one site in each borough; additionally, applications are to be made available online. The bill requires the administering agency to establish a reasonable fee for card applicants and come up with rules for those who cannot afford the fee to receive a full or partial waiver. The bill establishes confidentiality guidelines and protections for applicants and recipients of the NYC ID. The City will seek to expand the benefits associated with the NYC ID by promoting the acceptance of the card by banks and other public and private institutions, like cultural institutions, libraries and the list continues to grow as ideas continue to come.

The proposed Introduction 253-A requires the administering agency to submit quarterly reports to the Mayor and to the Speaker of the City Council beginning March 31st, 2015 regarding various metrics pertaining to the New York City identity card program.

As you can all see, there was a lot of thought put into this bill to encourage widespread

And to also say that this has been something that I've been dreaming about since I was Chair of this committee and it's almost five years of work that we've put into this to see this day happen and my legal counsel was Julie Bedford, my policy analyst was Jennifer Montalvo [sp?] as well and I wanna thank them for the work that they've done, I know you were up many late nights working on this as I also wanna thank my counsel, Sebastian McGuire, for his wonderful negotiating strategies and for all the work that he did; I am so happy and so pleased to have an attorney like him, an immigration attorney working on these issues. And also to thank the Speaker and the Mayor, because I think you're right, the climate in this city has changed, the fact that we have elected progressive people to office has made this day a reality. So I also wanna thank Rob Newman for the work that he did and for his negotiating skills with the administration as well; very impressed with that. It was just an overall dedicated effort on behalf of everybody here in the

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Council and even on the Mayor's side as well to make sure that we got this.

So the New York City ID for all, and I'm calling it an ID for all, will in many ways make the lives of all New Yorkers easier, from the homeless family in Sunset Park to the transgender youth in Jackson Heights. Most notably, this program reaffirms the Council's commitment to helping immigrant New Yorkers integrate into the life of our city. Having a widely accepted ID card will only strengthen relations between our immigrant communities and schools, police and other City agencies. Beyond the access to City services, this card will facilitate the exciting possibilities for additional benefits to be added. The program outlined in the legislation raised the foundation for such growth. Together with the Mayor's stated commitment to dedicating resources to its success, the New York City ID for all is poised to become the must-have accessory for all New Yorkers.

I look forward to lining up with my colleagues here to apply for an ID once the program is launched. Thank you very much and this is a very proud and historic day for New York City. Thank you.
