CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: Good morning and welcome to today's finance hearing. I am Council Member Julissa Ferreras... Chair of this committee. I'd like to all, welcome you to our August hearing which is always a special one and I hope everyone is enjoying their summer and will enjoy the last couple of weeks of summer. We've been joined by council member's Van Bramer, Rodriguez, Miller, Cumbo, and Levine. We have four items on our agenda today. First we have a transparency resolution relating to the, the designation of certain organizations to receive funding in the expense budget. Our second and third items are two expense budget modifications. And lastly we have a resolution concerning the establishment of the West Shore Business Improvement District. Let's start with the transparency resolution. This resolution sets forth new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local aid and unique discretionary funding as well as new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. This resolution contains new

2	designations in many of the council's initiatives
3	which will, which is a crucial step in giving these
4	worthy organizations the funds to accomplish all
5	the good work they do. As you all may recall in
6	this year's budget the council was able to provide
7	236 million to create 14 new initiatives and was
8	all, and has also, was able to secure 36 million in
9	enhancements to increase services, 54 million
10	dollars to maintain existing council programs and
11	over 500 million dollars in base line funds. It is
12	great to see our work from the budget season being
13	put into practice. We look forward to hearing about
14	the successes of these initiatives in providing
15	vital services to New Yorkers. Organizations
16	appearing in the resolution that have not yet
17	completed the prequalification process conducted by
18	the Mayor's Office of Contract Services, the
19	Council, or other entities are identified with the
20	attached chart with an asterisk. As with all
21	transparency resolutions council members will have
22	to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not
23	a conflict exists with any of the groups on the
24	attached list. If any council member has potential
25	conflict of interest with any organizations listed

3	conflict at the time of their vote. As a reminder
4	please disclose any conflicts you may have with
5	proposed subcontractors that are used by
6	organizations sponsored by discretionary funding.
7	These disclosures must be made before the
8	subcontractor can be approved. Jimmy Plafca [sp?]
9	from the General Counsel's Office can assist you
10	with any questions or concerns. I don't know if
11	anybody has any questions on the transparency
12	resolution, members? Next we will be voting on two
13	expense budget modifications. One modification will
14	transfer city funds from the reserve for collective
15	bargaining to the Health and Hospital's
16	Corporations in fiscal year 2014 to pay the
17	agency's collective bargaining agreements. The
18	second modification will do the same thing in
19	fiscal year 2015. The net effect of each
20	modification is zero. Representatives from the
21	Office of Management and Budget and the Health and
22	Hospital Corporation are here to answer any
23	questions on these two expense budgets. I don't
24	know if any members has any questions on the
25	expense budget? Council Member Cumbo. If we can

9	here on the back page it says the modification will
10	implement expense budget changes by transferring
11	43.8 million dollars of collective bargaining from
12	the miscellaneous budgets reserved for collective
13	bargaining to the Health and Hospital Corporation
14	How much money or funding is actually in this
15	miscellaneous budget reserve? And how much because
16	I see there are two and wanting to know the
17	difference in terms of why there are also two
18	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: So I'm going to
19	answer just the question on the two modifications
20	and it's… (crosstalk) FY14.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Uh-huh.
22	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: So we have to
23	make all expenditures and changes for FY14 before
24	October which is the opportunity where this shuts

down.

3	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: For FY14. And
4	the, the rest of the money is being do, being done
5	in FY15 and that's why we have those two
6	modifications. But that's for the two. As how much
7	in the reserves John if you are able to
8	COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Or the
9	miscellaneous budget… (crosstalk)
10	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: We're going to
11	get this now. And if you could just state your name
12	for the record I would appreciate it. Thank you.
13	JOHN GRATHWOL: Good morning. My name's
14	John Grathwol from OMB. I'm a Deputy Director.
15	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: I'm sorry, yes?
16	JOHN GRATHWOL: John Grathwol from OMB,
17	Deputy Director, good morning (crosstalk)
18	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: How are you?
19	(crosstalk)
20	JOHN GRATHWOL: How are you? As you know
21	over the course of the last six months we've, over
22	several steps funded the labor reserve for all of
23	the collective bargaining agreements that the
24	administration expects to make with all the city's

unions. And we hope you get it done over the course

2	of the next year. We've made as you know a good, a
3	lot of progress on that in the last few months. So
4	after these transfers you want the amount in the
5	labor reserve… because we put money in the labor
6	reserve for all of the collective bargaining
7	agreements we expect to make. We've already had
8	major agreements as you know with UFT and DC37 and
9	a number of smaller unions. But that represents 60
10	percent of the workforce. And
11	COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: And that up to
12	this point, the, the decisions that have been
13	made in terms of these negotiations have impacted
14	60 percent of the workforce?
15	JOHN GRATHWOL: Roughly, roughly.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Okay.
17	JOHN GRATHWOL: And remaining in the
18	miscellaneous budget reserve for collective
19	bargaining as of the adopted budget in fiscal year
20	15 it's 1.8 billion.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: 1.8 billion?
22	JOHN GRATHWOL: Yes.
23	CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: That's what we
24	started off with?

JOHN GRATHWOL: Well that's where we
were as of the adopted budget. And of (crosstalk)
COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Okay.
JOHN GRATHWOL:course where we started
off with, before January 1 st was not much in the
labor reserve and no plans for settlements with
labor unions. Now eight months into the new
administration we have put a lot of money in the
labor reserve because we anticipate agreements with
the entire city municipal workforce and we've
already made a lot of progress on that. So

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: How much do we,
how much do we have currently, right now, today in
that reserve?
JOHN GRATHWOL: 1.8 billion and 14 and
990 million, 999 million and 15.
COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: So we have money

money that's been put aside into fiscal year '15?

JOHN GRATHWOL: Yeah and the money

that's in fiscal year '14 is pledged to payments

for retirees and work by employees up to fiscal

year '14.

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will be located out in Staten Island in Council

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Member Matteo's District. This is an, an exciting

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and interesting BID because it is the city's first

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industrial BID. The BID will be compromised of 72

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parcels of land, 52 of which are privately owned. There are 42 businesses in the BID. The majority of which are industrial, transportation, and commercial businesses. The BID will have a relatively small budget of 110 thousand dollars in its first year with the average assessment being approximately 22 hundred per year and the maximum assessment being 8,000 per year. The area comprising the BID currently does not have sanitary or storm sewers. Many streets are in disrepair and prone to flooding and street sign just lacking. Therefore the BID is really necessary to improve the infrastructure and to help the businesses within the BID stay competitive and grow. I understand that Council Member Matteo is here and would like to say a few words about this BID.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Thank you Madam
Chair. I want to start by thanking you, the members
of the Finance Committee, the Finance Staff for the
work that's, lies ahead and partnership with the
Staten Island Economic Development Corporation
whose been a great partner with me on, on, on this
proposed I BID so far. I whole heartedly support

the creation of the West Shore I BID. The area in
question is one that is full of potential but has
been overlooked for years. The I BID will be able
to provide current property owners and businesses
the resources they need to navigate the often
complex permitting process and address their needs
to city agencies and elected officials. In addition
I recently stood with the property owners of the
proposed I BID. They are already working to provide
support for their perspective members. There
already gearing up to pay for services like private
security to prevent illegal dumping, bringing
private cleaning services to maintain the area, and
provide a voice for the members with agencies. We
were already successful working with DSNY to bring
wastepaper baskets to the area for the first time.
As we all know every neighborhood, every commercial
corridor has unique needs and this slice of the
west shore is no different. I think that is why the
rate of support in the I BID zone is among the
highest of any BID in the city. I look forward to
working with everyone here on this issue and I am
available to any of my colleagues for any questions
and I appreciate it. Thank you Madam Chair.
