Today the committee will vote on two important bills: proposed Intro 487-A and proposed Intro 486-A, which will seek to severely limit the cooperation between Immigration and Customs

Enforcement, commonly referred to as ICE, and local law enforcement. These bills were introduced by Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and I am proud to be one of the co-sponsors, along with several other members of this committee.

Local law enforcement's cooperation with ICE has led to heightened and often unnecessary fear in immigrant communities and has in practice made things like reporting crimes or being stopped by a traffic officer a possible pathway to deportation.

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The proposed legislation will work to restore the trust in law enforcement, protect families from unnecessary separation and help prevent the possible violation of a detainee's constitutional rights that can result when law enforcement honors these detainers. I am happy that this initiative has wide support from both the administration and this City Council.

Our committee held a hearing on October 15th, 2014 on this matter. During that hearing, we heard testimony from members of the administration on their support of the proposed legislation. administration testified about their commitment to work with the Department of Correction and the New York City Police Department to implement regulations and policies that would immediately reflect the changes brought on by these bills. We also heard from the former Manhattan District Attorney, Mr. Robert Morgenthau, elected officials and leaders from other municipalities with similar regulations in place. They all testified in support of this legislation. Community members provided additional testimony about the financial and emotional impact of losing a loved one because a detainer had been lodged

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against them. Further, legal service providers testified that immigration detainers have resulted in immigrants being held up to about 70 days longer than they would otherwise, raising questions about the possible violation of constitutional rights and leading to millions... millions of dollars in unnecessary expense for the city.

Proposed Intro 487-A is the local law that looks to amend the administrative code of the city of New York in relation to persons not to be detained by the NYPD and proposed Intro Number 486-A is the local law that seeks to amend the administrative code of the city in relation to persons not to be detained by the Department of Correction. Under the proposed legislation, the New York City Police Department and the Department of Correction would only honor an immigration detainer if it was accompanied by a warrant from a federal judge and only if that person had been convicted of a violent or a serious crime during the last five years or his or her name is on the terrorist watch list. Further, the legislation seeks to completely remove ICE facilities off Rikers Island.
