CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Today we will
vote on a piece of legislation that we know will make
a real difference in protecting some of the most
vulnerable workers in our city taxi and livery
drivers. In this case, neither the statistics nor
the headlines lie; according to the federal
government, taxi and livery drivers are 20 times more
likely to be the victim of a homicide on the job than
the average worker, but we don't have to have the
federal government to tell us; we know from
experience; every New Yorker knows about a rush of
violence against our drivers that occurred this
summer; just this past June a yellow taxi driver was
attacked with a skateboard after he told his
passenger his nationality. Our drivers are sometimes
the frontline for these hate driving attacks and we
need to make sure we protect them in every way
possible. Each incident is a tragic reminder of the
risk that taxi and livery drivers take each day
simply by going to work to provide for their families
and to provide a vital transportation service to the
City and to all New Yorkers.

Proposed Int 082-A will require that a
warning of the potential consequences of assaulting
driver be placed in every taxi and livery car. We
know that this simple addition will make anyone thin
twice before deciding to assault a taxi or a livery
driver, an action which is never excusable. For me,
this issue is personal; as a former livery driver
that I was, I want to thank the bill's sponsor,
Council Member Lancman, the drivers who came to
testify on this bill, Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito
and the Administration for working with us on this
important piece of legislation.

Vision Zero is all about safety on our streets; taxi and livery drivers play a big part in setting the example of safe driving and so it is imperative that we do all we can to protect them on the job; this bill will do just that.

No I invite the sponsor of this vital legislation, Council Member Lancman, to deliver an opening statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANCMAN: Thank you Mr.

Chairman and to the members of the Committee and to

Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and the staff who

worked to get us to this point. As you said, the men

and women who drive our taxis and livery cars and the
other vehicles that are covered by this legislation
are very, very important to us as New Yorkers, but
also as an integral part of our mass transportation
system and it is very, very dangerous work. And so
I'm very, very grateful that we're gonna take this
modest but I think important step towards ensuring
their safety and letting everyone know that when they
get into a taxi or a livery that there will be very,
very serious consequences for assaulting that driver
and that New York City cares about their safety and
will take the measures that are necessary to make
sure that they go home to their families safe and
sound after performing such a vital and essential
service for New York City. So thank you very much.

21	support, but I rise today however to express my
22	dismay at the manner in which the Taxi and Limousine
23	Commission has been conducting business. This law,
24	Int 082, has been amended to include commuter vans so

25 that the drivers of these vehicles may also receive

signage to be promulgated by the TLC in order to help
protect the drivers, yet TLC has done little to
protect constituents in my district and throughout
the City who are often victims by these same commuter
vans. There are hundreds of illegal vans running
throughout Southeast Queens and throughout the City,
thousands throughout the City and many more properly
licensed vans which are operating in illegal fashion;
they do business directly in front of bus stops,
intimidate mass transit passengers and hold little
regard for the rules of the road, particularly given
the nature of the business is so frequently illegal.
Recently a young woman from my district ended up in a
coma after the police engaged one of the vans in a
high-speed chase; this is how bad things have gotten.
Despite my pleas, these concerns have gone on deaf
ears from the TLC and I've heard nothing but excuses
on their part. With this in mind I cannot in good
conscience vote for this legislation which supports
TLC while it repeatedly fails to support and protect
the constituents and the citizens of New York City.
A good relationship is beneficial to all parties at
the table, but this one I certainly think is
unhealthy. I will abstain from voting on Int 082;

committee meeting is adjourned.
