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3 CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Good morning. 4 My name is David Greenfield. Good afternoon 5 actually. My name is David Greenfield. I'm the Council member of the 44th... district and I'm 6 7 privileged to serve as the chair of the Land Use 8 Committee. This is a Land Use Committee for Wednesday, November 12th. Apologies we're generally 9 10 very much on time, today we're running a little bit 11 over three hours late. That is because we are very 12 pleased that we have reached an agreement with the 13 developers, and the administration, and most 14 importantly the council member on Astoria Cove. 15 Well welcome my esteemed colleagues... members of the 16 committee; Council Member Arroyo, Council Member 17 Dickens, Council Member Garodnick, Council Member 18 Mealy, Council Member Gentile, Council Member 19 Rodriguez, Council Member Koo, Council Member 20 Levin, Council Member Weprin, Council Member 21 Williams, Council Member Richards, Council Member 2.2 Barron, Council Member Cohen, Council Member 23 Kallos, Council Member Reynoso, Council Member 24 Torres. I would also like to thank the chairs of 25 the sub-committees; Chair Weprin, Chair Koo, and

2	Chair Dickens for their leadership as well. I want
3	to thank you all for your attendance. You will see
4	on the table before you several items relating to
5	the committee. First is the agenda prepared by the
6	committee staff containing those matters which have
7	had a hearing, been reviewed, and fully vetted by
8	the subcommittees, those are the matters on which
9	we will be acting today. Also before you the Land
10	Use Committee and applicable subcommittee for each
11	item we're voting on today with the proposed
12	resolution for each item. What the committee is
13	voting on today is to approve each of the
14	resolutions before you for presentation and vote by
15	the full council. The resolutions reflect the
16	recommendations of the applicable subcommittee. And
17	today we are voting on several different
18	applications. Our first item is a series of
19	applications tied to one project in Queens
20	Community Board One. LUs number 126, 127, 128, 129,
21	130, and 131 are six applications submitted by 2030
22	Story Developers LLC. The grant of special permits
23	zoning amendments, zoning map amendments,
24	waterfront authorizations, the city map changes in
25	connections with the new residential development

2	with approximately 1700 units retail and a public
3	school in Council Member Constantinides' district.
4	Before I turn it over to the council member for his
5	comments I want to make it clear to the committee
6	that we're voting to approve this application with
7	modifications to the zoning text and district
8	declaration and modifications to the plans. The
9	modifications taken in tandem would for the first
10	time mandate the construction of affordable
11	housing. That means that, and this is really
12	incredibly significant that the developer cannot
13	build unless they build affordable as well which is
14	something that we have actually never done before.
15	And so we have an agreement that we're proving a
16	historic level of affordability, 27 percent which
17	by my math is approximately 468 units. And to that
18	end we especially would like to thank all of the
19	party's involved, the developer for agreeing to
20	work with the community to reach a project that the
21	community is in full support of the administration
22	for their leadership, the outstanding staff much of
23	whom like myself spent our wonderful holiday
24	yesterday actually working so thank you all staff
25	for that. We are incredibly grateful for that. And

2	of course the Council Member as well. It's also
3	important to point out that really what's unique
4	about this project is that this is an area that has
5	quite frankly been blighted for many years. And
6	there have been attempts in the past to make
7	improvements over here. And thanks to the
8	leadership of Council Member Constantinides and the
9	developer and the administration we're in a place
10	today where not only is there going to be 27
11	percent affordable housing which incidentally is
12	more affordable housing than any other project in
13	the history of New York City but also are going to
14	be good jobs that are guaranteed for those people
15	who will be working on the project and once the
16	project is completed as well. And that is
17	incredibly significant. Plus I will also add, now
18	just on a, on a personal note that I dealt with
19	many many council members but Council Member
20	Constantinides was absolutely focused like a laser
21	in making sure that his constituents were
22	represented, that they in fact had the best deal
23	possible. And this agreement also includes many
24	improvements, improvements to a NYCHA senior
25	center, improvements to a public park, improvements

to the public library, improvements to the
waterfront quite frankly most of which would not
have happened but for the Council Member's
determination I want to thank him for that. And of
course a long dream for this community to have a
ferry is now going to be a step closer to reality
with the funding of the actual ferry dock. So all
around I just have to say that Costa, as we call
him around here because most of us can't pronounce
his last name, really did phenomenal work day and
night, weekends, evenings, with his son, with his
wife, he kept pressing and pushing and thanks to
his leadership we really are making history today.
And with that being said I turn it over to Council
Member Costa Constantinides.

COUNCIL MEMBER CONSTANTINIDES: Thank

you Chairman Greenfield and I'll begin by thanking

you because all those late nights, all those

weekends, all those calls were shared by you as

well as we were on the phone last night until I

think 11:23 in the evening not that I was counting

but... But was the first call I made in the morning

as well. So I definitely want to thank you for all

of your efforts in helping my community get what we

2	needed to fully integrate that project but it
3	would not have happened but for the efforts of your
4	hard work, Chairman Weprin, the great Land Use
5	staff of Raju [sp?], Ann, and Amy who just really
6	from day and night made, you know on Veterans Day
7	working you know pretty much 25 hours a day. I
8	appreciate it. And of course the administration for
9	their grand vision and their participation and
10	their great work and the developer for being a
11	partner and their candor and their partnership in
12	this effort. You know really just want to reiterate
13	my comments that was in the Zoning Committee this
14	is really an exciting time for our, our district
15	22. This fully integrates this project into our
16	neighborhood. We're able to take a commitment that
17	was originally set at 10 percent and bring it up to
18	27 percent affordable. This, you know in the zoning
19	tax, and that's exciting. And we were able to as
20	our neighborhood grows and, and our need for
21	interconnectedness in the city rose we were able to
22	secure a path to a ferry dock which is important to
23	make sure that we can connect as developments. We
24	need this, this, this development has, is going to
25	have good jobs and safe jobs, and the workers who

2	work on this job are going to get paid you know a
3	wage that is, that's necessary and is going to have
4	the highest safety standards. As well we have
5	things for our community. This has been as
6	reference one of the more isolated pockets of
7	poverty, being out on the Halletts Point peninsula
8	where there was no supermarket, no doctor's office,
9	no dentist office, no school… our, this particular
10	site was a, warehouses that were quite blight on
11	our community. And through our efforts today with
12	the developer and through, with the administration
13	we're going to have a school here. We're going to
14	have open space. We're going to have a supermarket
15	that is going to be work towards a local
16	cooperative. We're going to have an upgrade to the
17	NYCHA senior center. We're going to have
18	improvements to our parks, improvements to the
19	local library. You know really working with our
20	NYCHA residents there to make sure that their lives
21	are improved and all boats rose from this passage
22	of this development. So I thank you Mr. Chair again
23	and I don't want to, throw in before I was remiss
24	in missing Ramone Martinez who never likes to be
25	thanked but I want to publically thank Ramone for

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all of his efforts as well. So thank you Mr. Chair again for your great leadership.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Thank you

Council Member. I would also like to note that we've been joined by Council Member Mark Treyger. I additionally want to note that we're proposing modifications to the ... declarations required construction working group given all the expected construction in this area. And I also just wanted to state on the record that we have a commitment from the administration together with the developer to provide five million dollars for the ferry and remainder of course will be raised by the council members as well so I want to thank them for that. And I also just would like to add that you know at this point I think we're on a first name basis especially with uh, with John and Meyer who we've been speaking to for literally weeks. And I will say that they are tough negotiators to their credit but they are fair and they are community minded and they're folks that have a long history... does in Queens and especially in that neighborhood in Queens. And they were always focused on doing the right thing for the neighborhood and for the

2	community and that certainly helped us get to where
3	we are today where we have this historic deal that
4	we've achieved so thank you John and Meyer for your
5	leadership as well. We're very pleased that we
6	could get here. We're also voting on three
7	applications from the Landmarks Public Siting and
8	Maritime Use Subcommittee… LU number 132 which was
9	lodge number 710 Brooklyn Community Board 4
10	designation by the Landmarks Preservation Committee
11	pursuant to Section 3020 of the New York City
12	Charter regarding the Landmark designation of
13	Ridgewood Lodge located at 1054 Bushwick Avenue as
14	a historic landmark. Also Land Use number 136, five
15	borough shop relocation site Bronx Community Board
16	1, application submitted by Department of Parks and
17	Recreation and the Department of Citywide
18	Administrative Services pursuant to Section 197-c
19	of the New York City Charter, for the site
20	selection and acquisition of property located at
21	850 East 138 th Street, Block 2589, Lot 31, for a
22	repair, maintenance and storage facility in
23	Community District 1, Council Member Arroyo's
24	district. And finally LU number 137 The Green Wood
25	Cemetery Brooklyn Community Board 7 and application

2	submitted to the Green Wood Cemetery pursuant to
3	Section 1506 of the New York State Not-for-Profit
4	Corporation Law for approval of the acquisition of
5	land located at 242 25 th Street, Borough of
6	Brooklyn, for nonOburial purposes, Community Board
7	7 in Council Member Manchaca's district.
8	Subcommittees have recommended approval for all
9	these applications. The chair recommends an aye
10	vote on all these matters and would also like to
11	note that we are laying over Land Use number 135,
12	the… community justice center. Would anyone like to
13	make any other comments? Council Member Arroyo did
14	you want to speak on yo0ur project or are you good?
15	Anyone else wanting to make any comments or are
16	there any questions from any council members?
17	Hearing none I will ask the clerk to call the roll.
18	COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: William Martin
19	Committee Clerk. Roll call vote Committee on Land
20	Use. Chair Greenfield.
21	CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: I vote aye on
22	all.

8	Parks, what you were able to secure with Parks
9	Council Member Arroyo and for Costa for the work
10	that you were able to secure and the, the dedicated
11	support that you received from your community and
12	you stood tall to create affordable housing as well
13	as to secure jobs. It's, it's inclusive of labor.
14	You got a school. You got a awful lot and that's
15	what you are here to do as a Council Member. Land
16	Use is clearly the most important factor here at
17	the City Council, one of the most important factors
18	and you stood tall in doing that. And thank you.
19	And I vote aye.
20	COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Garodnick.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Just want to say congratulations and you did a great job for your district. And I vote aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: I'd also like to congratulate our council Member Costa and of course like, the good things about the council is that we also follow the guidance of the local council member. So beside going over the details of this legislation for... knowing that the local council member is in favor, his supporter, he was able to negotiate it. I just for record would like to say that the 27 percent that a, in this process has been able to be accomplished is not the model for the citywide goal that we have. That even though 27 is good for the local council member because immediate... that he has in his district because he being able so to negotiate all the thing that is important for his district. In... such as does have a 35 thousand... it would never fly a 27 or 25 percent because when you look at the market price a community a district that is making 35 thousand dollars a year cannot survive with that number. So for me as supporter because again we chose a council member right for record the 27 percent affordable cannot be the standard for

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affordable housing plan. And also like to thank the developer but also to... to let know that we want also for them to a slow a little bit down when it come to how they, how they also working in other part of city, working with the tenants. So I think that they have a great opportunity by being the developer of this project. But I also would like for... to look at other part in the city. How is that you're doing with the tenants because we learn from vantage, we learn from pinnacle and we cannot have developer a company that is pushing people out.

With that I will aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: ...aye.

COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Permission to explain my vote?

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Mr. Levin to explain his vote.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you Mr.

Chair. I want to congratulate my colleagues Maria

Del Carmen Arroyo, Antonio Reynoso on these Land

Use items. And a special acknowledgement and

congratulations to Council Member Constantinides

who I've been watching throughout this process and
he has displayed grace under pressure throughout
and has been deliberate and considerate and has
never lost his cool and has shown a very effective
way to negotiate these sometimes very difficult and
very contentious and vexing land use items. And
he's done a, a stellar job. I want to congratulate
him. And I want to acknowledge his hard work with
my vote aye on all.

COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: Aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you.

Just adding to what I had said earlier with two
things. I neglected to mention Council Member
Rodriguez mentioned one which is I, I reject the
notion that somehow this is a prototype where the
direction of the mayor's housing plan will be
going. I think we have to view all these projects
individually and what comes with the project, land,

costs are different no matter where you, depending
where you go in the city. And we'll have to adjust
accordingly when adjusting what subsidies and what
other things are given to the developer. So I just
want to, that notion is out there, that this
particular project will define the direction that
the mayor's housing plan is going. And as a, a
chair of housing and buildings I completely
emphatically reject that, that notion. And second
making sure that we kind of define or redefine
affordable. I'm glad that there is income targeted
housing across the board. I wish it was more on the
low end but sometimes we use the word affordable
and think people believe that we're talking about
the lower income bands. And so while I'm happy at
going 125 percent of AMI I think those people also
need income targeted housing. It's not probably the
affordable housing that people are usually thinking
of, they're usually thinking of 40, 60 percent, 80
percent of AMI. So I know we use that turn to lump
the entirety of the 27 percent which again I
congratulate you on. I just want to make sure we're
clear on who it is and what it is that we're doing
here. Thank you. I vote ave.

2 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Richards.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: I guess I will 4 piggyback now off of Council Member Williams points. First of I want to, and this is not against 5 6 Costa. You've done a phenomenal job with the cards 7 you were given to get labor in there, to get schools, to get a supermarket, amazing. To get them 8 from 10 percent to 27 percent is a, is a huge 9 10 victory in your right but I want to reiterate once 11 again that this should not be the overbearing 12 standard that we utilize across the city. We're 13 still dealing with a huge homeless population in 14 New York City. And if we're going to really address 15 this issue we have to make sure that we are really 16 targeting these particular folks who don't have a 17 leg to stand on as well, as well as the middle. But 18 we also have a huge homeless population in the city and the only way to resolve that is to ensure that 19 20 we are moving affordability, looking at the AMIs but also making sure that we're pushing for more. 21 2.2 So this is an excellent victory for you. And I 23 stand with you on that and we spoke last night and, and I will certainly want to be supportive of you 24

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in this effort but this should not be the overall standard. Thank you. I vote aye.

COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you Mr.

Chair. Thank you to Council Member Constantinides

for the hard work that you've done. I'm, I'm sorry

Mr. Chair I'd like to explain my vote.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Of course.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Council Member

Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you. Want to commend you for the work that you've done because we know that at the outset there was a barrier which none of us who call ourselves being reflective of what's going on in this city would accept so I do want to commend you for what it is that you've achieved. You've overcome some great obstacles and you've made great outreach to the community and to the NYCHA and to the other aspects of what can be done to improve the community. However I have to echo my concerns. As I understand the area median income for your community is about 74 thousand dollars so as we look at the term that

2	we use, affordable, we have to say affordable to
3	whom. So as we look at the fact that only five
4	percent is designed for people at 60 percent of the
5	AMI and 15 percent at 80 percent that we're now
6	looking at approximately 73 percent of the people
7	who are not within that band who are not eligible
8	to apply because they do not meet those
9	requirements. I'm also very concerned that this is
10	a housing development which is going up which has
11	no provisions for as has been said homeless or for
12	special needs population and those are two large
13	populations that we have to address. And I think
14	that we should look to see that we have models
15	which of course this doesn't have a but models
16	which distinguish who the clientele, who the
17	residents are who are living in this establishment.
18	So for those reasons and for the exclusion of
19	people below the 60 percent AMI I will be
20	abstaining on this vote and I'll vote aye on the
21	others.

6	COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I just want to						
7	congratulate Council Member Constantinides for						
8	getting affordable housing and getting so much more						
9	affordable housing that was initially on the						
10	drawing board for making sure that everything being						
11	built is being done sustainably at a living wage						
12	with benefits and training for quality buildings,						
13	for investing in local infrastructure and parks and						
14	schools for getting transportation alternatives						
15	like ferry service that will not only benefit his						
16	district but other districts including mine. Having						
17	you is a benefit to every other member here and I						
18	am lucky to have you as my neighbor to the east. I						
19	vote aye.						
20	COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Reynoso.						
21	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: Permission to						
22	explain my vote?						
23	CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Yes, Council						
24	Member Reynoso.						

2	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: So I just want							
3	to thank, I want to congratulate Costa							
4	Constantinides, Council Member from Astoria. And I							
5	just want to say that I, I'd asked a couple of							
6	questions during the last hearing regarding AMI and							
7	Astoria's AMI is at 72 percent and the average uh							
8	income is less than 67 thousand dollars a year,							
9	it's more like 60, 62 64 so I just wanted to make							
10	sure I was on the right that we finally got it							
11	Costa, amazing job, way to work hard, and, and I'm							
12	more than happy to be voting aye on this. Thank							
13	you.							
14	COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Treyger.							
15	COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Permission to							
16	briefly explain my vote?							
17	CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Yes, Council							
18	Member Treyger.							
19	COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Just want to							
20	echo the, the congratulations to my colleague Costa							
21	for working hard to, to meet the needs of this							
22	district. You know and I, as, as a new member to							
23	the council I appreciate the fact of the support							

that the council gave to Costa. I think that speaks

volumes. And his leadership played, was very

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2 important here because this affects his district.

3 I'll also say that the council and working with

4 Costa as well will make sure that everything that

5 was promised to the district actually happens

6 because the council will be watching that as well,

7 working with you. Congratulations again and I vote

8 aye on all.

COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Land Use items 132, 136, and 137 have now been adopted by a vote of 18 in the affirmative, zero in the negative, and no abstentions. And Land Use items 126, 127, 128, 129, 130, and 131 have been adopted by a vote of 17 in the affirmative, zero in the negative, and one abstentions. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Thank you Mr.

Clerk. I just want to clarify an important point

which is that the level of affordability is

actually very significant. The original proposal

that the administration negotiated would have had a

requirement of a 10 percent of the affordability

which is half of the affordability be at 80 percent

and the rest could have been higher. And the total

potentially would have just been 20 percent at 80

percent AMI. And in fact this, or it could have

2	actually been in a much higher level at 175 AMI.						
3	And this deal that was negotiated actually provides						
4	for five percent at 60 percent which is actually a						
5	fairly low AMI for a family of, for a couple that's						
6	approximately 40 thousand dollars a year and rents						
7	on a one bedroom is around 950 dollars. 15 percent						
8	at 80 percent AMI which is very significant because						
9	the 20 percent has now been locked in below 80 and						
10	an additional seven percent at the 125 level. And						
11	I, I do want to make it clear because I think folks						
12	have… about this, there, there is honestly no						
13	single standard for building affordable housing in						
14	the city because every project is site specific						
15	because every neighborhood is different and every						
16	issue is different and every income level is						
17	different and the economics of every deal is						
18	different. Certainly a deal on the upper west side						
19	is going to be different than a deal in Astoria						
20	Queens. And if there was I would have nothing to do						
21	all day as chair of the Land Use Committee because						
22	we would have cookie cutter deals. And so that's a						
23	good thing. So I don't think that we have set a, a,						
24	a standard in terms of the percentage of						
25	affordability. I will say that we actually have						

2	created a very good model in terms of going forward						
3	in the future of what it is that we would like to						
4	accomplish and that is good jobs which have been						
5	locked in. 100 percent of these jobs are going to						
6	be good high paying quality jobs. Affordable						
7	housing in a significant way and a significant						
8	increase. 35 percent more than was offered to the						
9	administration which I think is incredibly						
10	significant. And finally improvements to the						
11	community which saw many significant improvements						
12	here to the community ranging from supermarket to a						
13	brand new school, to an improved library, to an						
14	improved park, to an improved NYCHA senior center.						
15	And certainly in every process we could always, we						
16	could always strive for more. But I will just say						
17	on the record that this is my 5 th year on the city						
18	council and we have not had a better deal than this						
19	one. This is the best deal we have made to date in						
20	my five years in the city council on a land use						
21	zoning application in front of this committee. And						
22	for that I once again, I want to thank council						
23	Member Costa Constantinides, I want to thank the						
24	speaker for her support. She was unwavering in her						
25	support… Council Member. I want to thank the
