CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS: [gavel] Good
morning, and welcome to today's Finance Committee
hearing. I'm Council Member Julissa Ferreras and I
Chair this committee. We've been joined by Council
Members Van Bramer, Ignizio, Gibson, Cornegy, Levine,
Johnson, and Chin. Today, we have six items on the
agenda. The first item is a Preliminary Budget
Extender. The second item is a transparency
resolution, and the remaining four items are Land Use
items. The preliminary extender is the first item
this committee and the Council will be considering
for FYfor Fiscal Year 2016's budget. It extends
the date by which the Mayor releases the Preliminary
Budget, and other budget related dates. Under the
Charter, the Administration has until January 16th of
each year to submit the Preliminary Budget to the
Council. If the Mayor does not think that he will be
able to do so by that date, then he must submit
legislation to the Council to amend the dates of the
Charter.

The Mayor has requested an additional 24 days until February 9th, to submit the preliminary budget so he can have adequate time to review the State Budget, which will be released on or before

February 1st. The legislation would extend the dates
for preliminary budget actions taken by other
entities such as the Department of Finance, IBO and
community and borough boards. The legislation also
extends dates for the submission of the Ten-Year
Capital Plan, and the date for the Council's budget
response would also be moved from March 25th to April
20th giving the Council an additional 25 days to hold
hearings and submit the preliminary budget
recommendations. For a complete list of the dates
that would be extended by this legislation, please
see the Committee Report prepared by the Finance
Division. Representatives from OMB are here to
answer any questions we might have on the Preliminary
Budget Extender.

Next, is a Transparency Resolution, which sets forth new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local, aging, and youth discretionary funding as well as new changes to the designation of certain organizations receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. Organizations appearing in the resolution that have not yet completed the pre-qualification process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contract

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2 Services, the Council or other entities are identified in the attached chart with an asterisk. 3 As with all transparency resolutions, council members 4 will have to sign a disclosure form indicating 5 whether or not a conflict exists with any of the 6 7 groups on the attached list. If any council member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the 8 organizations listed, he or she has the opportunity 9 to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. 10 As a reminder, please disclose any conflicts you may 11 12 have with proposed subcontractors that are used by organizations sponsored by discretionary funding. 13 14 These disclosures must be made before the subcontract 15 can be approved. Lastly, we have the four Land Use items, which are all seeking property tax exemption as HDFCs under Article 11 of the Private Housing Finance Law. The first is Lands End 1 in Council Member Chin's District of Manhattan. This property provides 128 units of affordable housing for low-income families. This property will receive a partial 40-year property tax exemption.

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The next two hand ose Items are in
Council Member Arroyo's District in the Bronx. 3160
Park Avenue, which is currently a vacant lot will
have two projects developed on the property. One
project is through HPD's Low-Income Program and will
price 94 units of affordable housing, plus a
superintendent's unit. The second project is through
HPD's Mixed-Income Program, and will provide 57 units
of affordable housing for a total of 152 units. Both
will receive full four-year property tax exemption.

Member Levin's District in Brooklyn. In June 2014, the Council granted Green Point Landing, which will provide 98 units of affordable housing for low-income families, with a full 40-year property tax exemption. The residents have stated that the units would be leased to families making up to 120% of area mean income. HPD now informs the Council that the units would, in fact, be leased to families making up to 130% of AMI, and the resolution we are voting on today reflects the amendment. All three council members support the project, and representatives from HPD are here to answer any question you may have on the Land Use item. Additionally, more details about

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these items including income thresholds are in the briefing papers of these items on your desk. 3

Those are our agenda items for today. Before I open the floor to questions, I want to note that today is the last Finance Committee meeting for I'm extremely proud to have served as the Chair of the Finance Committee during this remarkable Working together, we have fought and fought hard to accomplish great things for this city, and I look forward to building on our past successes as we continue work on behalf of all New Yorkers. And for us to be able to at least save half of it to be continued to be affordable housing for the next 40 years is really needed in my district. So I urge my colleagues to support it thank you.
