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2 CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Good morning. 3 [gavel] We are convened today for a second hearing 4 and vote on two bills, Proposed Introduction 519-A 5 and Proposed Introduction 562-A. In the past year, 6 this committee has held hearings on many topics, and 7 we have identified many areas in both which our 8 recovery and general preparedness can be 9 strengthened. I am proud to say that these two bills 10 before us today for which I am the prime sponsor are 11 the product not only of the work this committee, but 12 also of the many advocates and members of the public who have brought their stories and the ideas to us. 13 And we thank them all for that. 14

15 The first bill, Introduction 519-A will 16 require the Office of Emergency Management to create 17 local emergency preparedness materials for the city's 18 coastal communities. Currently, the City's materials 19 all have a citywide focus but in an emergency our 20 concerns are often very local. For instance, we want 21 to know if our home is in an evacuation zone, and 2.2 where the nearest evacuation centers. Intro 519 will 23 make it easier for people to find the information 24 they need during a coastal storm or emergency by 25 identifying the local emergency resources, and in

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2	some cases the charitable organizations in those
3	areas that are able to help them during and after an
4	emergency as well. The bill also requires these
5	materials to be accessible to the public. They will
6	not only be distributed in person and online, but
7	they will also be translated, which is so important
8	into the ten most commonly spoke languages for the
9	relevant communities.
10	The second bill, Introduction 562-A will
11	require the creation of a Hurricane Sandy charitable
12	organization and house of worship recovery task force
13	to study the recovery and rebuilding of not-for-
14	profits and houses of worship in areas affected by
15	Sandy. The Membership of this task force will
16	include representation from every borough as well as
17	recovery experts from the Administration, and
18	representatives from the communities and
19	organizations this task forcethis task force seeks
20	to assist. Within eight months of enactment, it will
21	submit a report of its findings and recommendations
22	both to the Mayor and to the City Council. That
23	report will contain an analysis of the damages and
24	losses suffered by these organizations, and to what
25	extent they have recovered, or as too often is the

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2 case, have not recovered. Further, it will make recommendations on how best to address that remaining 3 4 recovery need as well as how to better prepare and utilize these organizations in planning for future 5 6 natural disasters. This bill puts a focus on 7 organizations that too often get overlooked when we discuss recovery. But the simple fact is that every 8 part of our community must be made whole again before 9 10 our recovery can be complete.

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I want to thank my fellow committee 11 12 members for their support, for this committee and its 13 work and thank the Administration for their testimony on these bills in our prior hearings. And just to 14 15 make a very clear statement that where houses of 16 worship and many local groups in these impacted 17 communities they were in many cases the first 18 responders. And they did not ask anyone about their religious denomination or what language they speak. 19 20 They helped everyone in need. So at minimum we have an obligation to be there for those groups and those 21 2.2 houses of worship, those churches, those synagogues, 23 those mosques, all houses of worship that were there for people during their time of crisis and need. And 24 if we do not have that representation of houses of 25

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2	worship on this task force, this task force will not
3	serve its intent. So I want to be very clear in
4	making that statement.
5	And I willnow I justjust to say who
6	we've been joined by in the committee, we've been
7	joined by Council Members Steven Matteo, Council
8	Member Margaret Chin, Council Member Carlos Menchaca,
9	Council Member Rosie Mendez. And I will now ask the
10	clerk to call the roll.
11	CLERK: William Martin Committee Clerk
12	roll call vote Committee on Recovery and Resiliency.
13	Chair Treyger.
14	CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: I vote aye on all.
15	CLERK: Mendez.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: I vote aye.
17	CLERK: Chin.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: I vote aye.
19	CLERK: Menchaca.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: I vote aye.
21	CLERK: Matteo.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: May I be excused
23	to explain my vote?
24	CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Absolutely. Sure.
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2 COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: I just want to 3 reiterate and join Chair Treyger in his remarks about having members of the house of worship on the task 4 5 force. On Staten Island, they were the first They were--they opened their doors to 6 responders. 7 everyone, and they need to be on this task force. And I agree that the purpose of the task force the 8 intention doesn't work without them on it. So with 9 that said, I strongly support that the members of the 10 clergy house of worship be on this task force. 11 And 12 with that, I vote aye on all. 13 CLERK: By a vote of 5 in the 14 affirmative, 0 in the negative, and no abstentions, 15 the items have been adopted. 16 CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Sure, and Council 17 Member Menchaca would like to also explain his vote. Council Member Menchaca. 18 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: 19 Thank you, Chair and in the spirit of explaining votes, I'll do 20 the same. There was a time very recently where we 21 2.2 all experienced as a city the preparations for a 23 blizzard. Now, whether it came or not is not the 24 question. What we saw in Red Hook I just want to say that what the spirit of pieces of legislation that 25

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2	this committee has continued to look at really call
3	to community members being supportive at every level.
4	And that the religious organizations are just one
5	component of many that come together. We're really
6	proud to report that in Red Hook we designed over an
7	eight-month period a readiness plan that was
8	activated in preparation, which is what the plan
9	allows us to do 72 hours an event. We're very proud
10	that we're the only community to have done that thus
11	far and hope that other communities come together to
12	design those pieces. But every piece has to be
13	strong and this is why the religious organization
14	infrastructure has to get our support. Not just in
15	words and signals, but in actual process and
16	resources. And so, we're happy that this Council is
17	sending a strong message to those. Thank you.
18	CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Thank you Council
19	Member, and I will certainly add that you have done
20	incredible work in your district. And really have
21	given great ideas and best practices that can be
22	shared across the city in terms of recovery and
23	preparation for the next storm. So I really
24	appreciate your work. And we've been joined now as
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1 COMMITTEE ON RECOVERY AND RESILIENCY 8 2 well by Council Member Donovan Richards. And the Clerk will call the vote. 3 CLERK: Council Member Richards. 4 5 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Permission to 6 explain my vote. 7 CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Absolutely. COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: 8 All right, I just want to thank the Chairman for certainly 9 shepherding this bill, this task force through the 10 Council and every representative of the Rockaways in 11 12 particular. I can tell you our churches were on the 13 front line, and I know we get caught in this. You 14 know, there's a, you know, obviously a line between 15 church and state. But we must not forget who we call 16 in our biggest time of need and that is the church of 17 the people, can really reach people on the ground as 18 they did during Hurricane Sandy. And I just want to give a shout out to a few particular churches in my 19 20 district, the Church of the Nazarene, the First 21 Church of God, the Macedonia Baptist Church, and now 2.2 Carmel Baptist Church. These were churches who 23 opened their doors who literally lost their basements and were still out there servicing people in our 24 25 communities. So this is an important, a very

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important step, and I look forward to working with
the Chair and others on this particular task force.
Thank you Chairman.

5 CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Thank you, Donovan. Thank you, Council Member Richards. I just want to 6 7 just say that basically every member of this committee here represents areas that were severely 8 impacted by the storm. And every member of this 9 committee has done outstanding work to this day. 10 This is an issue that runs much deeper than politics, 11 12 much deeper than anything that we've really seen 13 before. This was an unprecedented storm that 14 requires an unprecedented amount of cooperation with 15 local, state, federal officials and agencies. And I 16 just commend every single member of this committee 17 for their sacrifice, their diligence, and their hard To this day, over two years past the storm, we 18 work. are still on this. So, I'm very proud of every 19 20 member of this committee, and I thank you all for your incredible support, for your communities and for 21 2.2 the entire City of New York. 23

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1 COMMITTEE ON RECOVERY AND RESILIENCY 10 2 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: I vote aye. 3 CHAIRPERSON TREYGER: Right. [laughter] CLERK: Okay.
