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CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: Good morning, everybody. In case you are confused, you did not stumble into a Parks Committee and there has not be a coup in the Finance Committee. Chair Ferreras has asked me to sit in for her today at this meeting. don't want it scandalized. I'll do my best. Big shoes to fill. We are joined today by my colleagues on the Finance Committee, Jimmy Van Bramer, Helen Rosenthal, Laurie Cumbo, Daneek Miller. Andy Cohen is not a Committee member. Joining us to present an item today, and Committee members Corey Johnson. We're going to start with a transparency resolution and we have a Land Use item and we have two BID items. So, first up is our transparency reso, which sets forth new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local, aging, and youth discretionary funding. As well as new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. Organizations appearing in the resolution that have not yet completed a pre-qualification process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contract

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2 Services, the Council or another entity are identified in the attached charts with an asterisk. 3 As with all transparency resolutions, council members 4 will have to sign a disclosure form indicating 5 whether or not a conflict exits with any of the 6 7 groups on the attached list. If any council member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the 8 organizations listed, he or she has the opportunity 9 to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. 10 As a reminder, please disclose any conflicts you may 11 12 have with proposed subcontractors that are used by 13 the organizations sponsored by discretionary funding. 14 These disclosures must be made before the subcontractor can be approved. Next, let's turn to the Land Use item, which is the Schervier Apartments in Council Member Cohen's district in the Bronx. This property provides 155 units of affordable housing for low-income senior citizens. This property will receive a partial property tax exemption for 35 years through the City's HDFC Program. Council Member Cohen supports this project, and I would like to invite him

COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Good morning.

Thank you, colleagues. I really just wanted to take one second of your time to let everyone know what a great organization Schervier is. This is existing housing. This is part of a refinance. So this would preserve 155 affordable units for seniors. I'm enthusiastic about the organization, and I'm enthusiastic about this tax exemption. So I would urge you all to vote yes. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: All right. Lastly, we have two BID items. The first BID is a resolution concerning the establishment of the meat packing area Business Improvement District in Council Member Johnson's district. The resolution sets forth the date and time of the hearing that this Committee will hold to consider the legislation establishing the BID. The hearing will take place on March 11th at 10:00 a.m. in this room. This BID will be located in Manhattan in the northernmost part of the West Village, and the southernmost part of the Lower Chelsea. The BID will be comprised of 649 tax lots, which include 154 commercial lots; 472 residential

approximately \$512,000.

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lots, which are primarily individual condominiums; five vacant lots; one parking lot; and 17 government or non-profit properties. The BID will have a first year budget of \$1.6 million. By the subsequent years the BID's budget may rise to \$3.2 million as additional development occurs in the district. The median annual assessment is projected to be approximately \$1.92--excuse me--\$1,920 with the minimum assessment projected to be approximately \$120, and the highest assessment projected to be

The second BID item is Intro 656, which establishes the South Shore Business Improvement

District in Council Member Ignizio's district. And he has joined us I believe. Yes, indeed. I would like to offer a big congratulations to Council Member Ignizio on his first BID. I know you have been advocating for this BID for a long time, and we're happy to see your hard work and your efforts pay off for your district and for your community.

On February 12th, this Committee voted on Resolution 571 to set today as the hearing day to hear from individuals who may be affected by the establishment of the South Shore BID. First, we'll

- 2 hear from any witness who would like to testify.
- 3 Once we have heard any testimony, we are going to
- 4 adjourn the hearing for at least 30 days to allow any
- 5 property owner with a proposed BID to file an
- 6 objection to the establishment of the BID with the
- 7 City Clerk. In the absence of objections filed
- 8 | either by a majority of all impacted property owing a
- 9 majority of assessed value of the property within
- 10 BID, the Committee and the full Council may adopt the
- 11 | legislation establishing the South Shore BID. In
- 12 order to do so, the Committee and the full Council
- 13 must be prepared to answer the following four
- 14 questions in the affirmation?
- 1. Were all notices of the hearing for
- 16 | all hearings required to be held published and mailed
- 17 | as required by law and otherwise sufficient?
- 18 2. Does all the real property within
- 19 | the district boundaries benefit from the
- 20 establishment of the district except as otherwise
- 21 provided by law?
- $22 \parallel 3$. Is all real property benefitted by
- 23 the district included within the district?
- 4. Is the establishment of the district
- 25 \parallel in the best interests of the public?

If the Committee and the full Council
finds in the affirmative on these four questions, and
the number of objections required to prevent the
creation of the BID are not filed, then the
legislation can be adopted. Council Member Ignizio
strongly supports the establishment of the BID, and
the total first year budget of the BID will be
\$185,000, which will go towards sanitation, security
services, marketing and promotion, and the
administrative and advisory services. For further
details on the management structure, and the district
profile of the South Shore BID, a description of the
services that will be provided, and information
regarding the properties located within the BID,
please refer to the Committee Report in the attached
District Plan.

Those are our items for today. Before we take questions on these items, I'd like to give

Council Member Johnson and then Council Member

Ignizio a chance to speak about the BIDs in their districts. So we'll first start with you, Council Member Johnson.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOHNSON: Thank you,

Council Member Levine, Chair Levine. It is good to

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be here this morning. I will withhold much of my comments until the actual hearing date where we talk about the BID. But I want to thank Small Business Services for a very long collaborative process to bring us to this point today. It has spanned two community boards, a lot of public meetings, and I finally like we're at a very good place to officially move forward on this. So I thank Chair Ferreras for her support and the Finance Committee staff, and I look forward to discussing this at the March 11th hearing date. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: All right. I just want to pause to acknowledged we've been joined by Committee Member, Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez, and I will queue Council Member Ignizio to speak about the South Shore BID.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Thank you, Mr.

Chairman, and thanks to members of the committee.

We're excited today as a multi-year process, which

began with a merchant association that went to an

LDC. And ultimately the desire was to become a BID.

We are breaking new ground today by allowing for a

BID to encompass or include multiple towns. Many

communities in Staten Island and they've got some in

Queens as well. We have small little towns. So any
of themselves a BID doesn't work because the
administrative costs would kill the benefit you would
get. What we did here is we utilized the train
right-of-way as the connector between the three
towns, and allowed for one administration to go
amongst three towns, which would could provide
services. I want to thank the SAEBC, Anthony
Rafachillo [sp?], the board that did so much work and
SBS that worked with us every step of the way. You
know, some of the things that came out of this is we
hired some security. And these security guys are
former police detectives. They identified and
brought down over 25a 25-member drug organization,
I guess we call it, in the down of Great Kills alone.
There were several others that were tipped off to the
Police Department. And just having that presence
there along with the benefit of cleaning up the town
and trying to really bring it back to its former
state of glory. It's something we're looking to do
across these three towns. So we're very excited
about it, Mr. Chairman, and I look forward to its
expeditious passage. Thank you very much.

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CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: Are there any
questions on the transparency resolution or the Land
Use Items from among my colleagues? All right. So
now we're going to have representatives from the
Small Business Services to provide testimony on the
South Shore BID and to answer any questions about the
meat packing area BID. So SBS please come up and

6 proposed BID and found them to be acceptable.

As required by law, the South Shore BID

Steering Committee mailed a summary of the City

Council Resolution no less than ten days and no more
than 30 days before today's hearing to the following
parties: To each owner of real property within the
proposed district at the address shown on our latest
city assessment roll; to such other persons that are
registered with the City to receive tax bills
concerning real property within the district. And to
tenants in each building within the proposed
district. In addition, SBS arranged for a copy of
the Summary of the Resolution at least once in the
City record.

I would like to acknowledge the members of the BID Steering Committee who are present today to testify and answer any questions about the specifics of the BID plan. And I would like to congratulate Council Member Ignizio, and thank him

CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: Okay. Thank you.

STEVE GRILLO: My name is Steve Grillo, and I'm the First Vice President of the Staten Island Economic Development Corporation. The South Shores Merchants' Program was founded in 2010 to create a safe and attractive commercial destination to help foster thriving businesses, provide a variety of retail goods and services, and reap the benefits of collective marketing. Some of the successes are in addition to what Council Member Ignizio has already mentioned is \$17 million in new investment; 42 new businesses in the town; so a \$40,000 grant from the Richmond County Savings Foundation. A \$10,000 grant from Wal-Mart and the drug bust that he had mentioned earlier.

In addition to these successes, the South Shore effort has also launched Family Fun Day; the Art in the Towns Program; the Annadale Tree Lighting; and Annual Holiday Lighting in each town. The groups involved in the creation of this BID recognize the important history and the strategic value that this

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towns place as commercial corridors in the South

Shore. However, newly expanded services are required

to help keep these areas robust and thriving. SIEDC

and the local community look forward to advancing the

South Shore BID, and in the refinements [sic], and

help expand business opportunities in Great Kills,
