CHAIRPERSON ESPINAL: Good morning and welcome to today's hearing of the Committee on Consumer Affairs. My name is Rafael Espinal, and I am the Chair of the Committee. Before going any further, I'd like to introduce the other members of the committee who are with me here today. We have Vinny Gentile straight from South Brooklyn and we have Karen Koslowitz from Queens.

Back in October, we met to discuss the used car industry. As we all know, the used car market is an attractive and affordable option for many New York City residents who wish to own a car. At the same time, the industry remains the subject of a high volume of consumer complaints, and has a long history of deceptive and unfair practices. Those among us who have bought a used car--I am one of them--or know someone who has, can relate to stories of aggressive salesmanship, and watching the price tag go up and up. Ultimately, walking away paying much more than anticipated and without really understanding how.

Proposed Intro 178-A, sponsored by my colleague Council Member Jumaane Williams, would respond to this ongoing problem by providing consumers with the information they need to make informed choices about which vehicle they are going to buy, to purchase add-on products they actually want, and to refuse those they do. Proposed Intro 178-A would accomplish this by requiring that all costs and fees assessed by the dealer be included in the total selling price on the sticker that advertises the car. The only additional costs that may be assessed are the costs to secure registration, and a certificate of title as required by the relevant state and local laws.

At the first hearing on this bill we heard testimony that consumers are often pressured to purchase add-on products that they did--that they did--that they did--that they didn't intend to buy and don't need. To respond to this practice, proposed Intro 178-A would require the dealer to display the total selling price of any add-on products available for purchase with the car. And, the dealer must disclose that purchase of any add-on products is optional. This law would ensure that they can drive off the lot with
