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CHAIRPERSON CHIN: Good morning. Council Member Margaret Chin, Chair of the Council's Committee on Aging. Today, the committee will be voting on Proposed Resolution 748A sponsored by our colleague on the Aging Committee and the Chair of the Subcommittee on Senior Centers, Council Member Paul Vallone. This resolution calls on the State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign legislation requiring banking organizations to provide at a minimum the preceding six months of financial document following a request from authorized governmental agencies for such documents to help fight financial exploitation of older adults. Too often, social services agencies such as Adult Protective Services, APS, are provided with insufficient documentation to allow them to identify and prevent financial exploitation against seniors and other vulnerable adults. The changes in state law that this resolution urges are essential to clarifying the responsibility of financial institution to cooperate with governmental agencies to allow them to protect individuals from losing their life savings or the money they need to survive on a daily basis. I want to thank Council Member

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you.

Vallone for his strong advocacy on these issues and his hard work on behalf of all seniors in New York City. I also would like to thank the Aging Committee staff, Eric Burnstein [sp?], our Committee Counsel, James Saboodi [sp?], our Policy Analyst, and Doheni Sampora [sp?], our Finance Analyst, and I urge my colleagues to support this resolution. Before the clerk calls the role, I would like to turn it over to Council Member Vallone to say a few words. Thank

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you, Madam Chair, and once again we make a great team, and it was a long good six months and I think the beginning of something new that we're going to work on with this taskforce, and many things were talked about. I know it was one of those rare opportunities where we had private and public partnership to figure out how to make things better, and today's resolution really is one of those steps, because anyone who has had any attempt to dealing with those in need and trying to assist them in getting their financial life back in order. One month of banking statements isn't going to do anything, and when the financial institutions step forward and say, "That's all we're going to give

2	you," here's a piece of legislation and the
3	resolution calling on the passing of it to say, "We
4	need at a minimum six months." Because how can you
5	tell if a senior or someone in need has been
6	financially abused on one month of records? You
7	can't. You have to look back. So, after 20 years of
8	working in this field in a world called
9	guardianships, many of the courts and the judges and
10	the attorneys get very frustrated when there's a
11	financial barrier put in front of our seniors and our
12	persons in need when you can't get the documents you
13	need to help the person. So here's one of these
14	common sense, but yet necessary pieces to say at
15	least give the minimum, and I thank everyone for
16	allowing this resolution along with quite a few of
17	our pieces we worked on together out of the taskforce
18	that are coming up this week in our Stated Hearing to
19	be voted on, and a lot of people made this happen.
20	So, also our fellow Council Member Stephen Levin was
21	part of the taskforce as well as Margaret Chin. Of
22	course, Laura Popa [sp?], Eric Burnstein [sp?], James
23	Saboodi [sp?], Johnathon Shot [sp?], and Amanda Zarr
24	[sp?] from my office for really working tirelessly
25	this year to make these taskforce happen. And APS,

2	just so everyone knows, is a division of HRA, and
3	it's that safety net I just talked about for the
4	abused, neglected and exploited adults, providing
5	them with the supportive services necessary to live
6	safe and independent lives. APS has faced criticism
7	over the last decade. It's become clear that reform
8	is necessary from the overworked and burdened case
9	load that APS is faced with. After spending two
10	decades as an attorney working hand in hand in this
11	system, there was a need, especially from
12	guardianship proceedings. This was one of the areas
13	we were determined to focus on, was financial elder
14	abuse of our seniors. Today, we're voting out
15	Resolution 748A, legislation that will help fight
16	financial exploitation of older adults by requiring
17	banking organizations to provide at a minimum the
18	immediately preceding six months of financial
19	documents following a request from an authorized
20	government agency for financial documents. As New
21	York City senior population continues to grow, too
22	many of our older New Yorkers find themselves
23	neglected, exploited and abused. This resolution
24	will go a long way in addressing that escalating

problem. And as we heard from our District Attorneys

2	and from those who know, senior financial elder abuse
3	is one of the fastest, unfortunately, growing areas
4	of crime. Once again, thank you to our great Chair,
5	Margaret Chin, for holding this hearing quickly and
6	at the last minute, and I'll actually thank all of
7	our participants in the taskforce for their ongoing
8	time and efforts, and it will be continued, and it's
9	a taskforce that we'll see more things to come.
10	Thank you all my fellow Council Members and thank
11	you, Madam Chair.
