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CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Good afternoon everyone and welcome to this very important hearing and vote of the Committee on Cultural Affairs,

Libraries and International Intergroup Relations. We are here this afternoon to take up a resolution,

Resolution 801-A; the prime sponsor, which is our good friend and colleague, Council Paul Vallone and this resolution is called in honor of the visit of Pope Francis in less than two weeks and this resolution praises Pope Francis for his lifelong pursuit of peace among all peoples and commence him on his upcoming historic visit to New York City.

I want to recognize the members of the committee who are here and we'll hear from a couple of folks, including the prime sponsor of the resolution in a moment. But let me welcome Council Member Costa Constantinides from Queens, Council Member Julissa Ferreras from Queens, Council Member Elizabeth Crowley from Queens, Council Member Paul Vallone from Queens, Council Member Peter Koo from Queens [background comments] and way over out on the outskirts of the table here, Council Member Steve Levin from Brooklyn. [background comments]

18	resolution and I would request that my name be added
19	to the list of sponsors. Thank you.

Hendrick. Also, a lot of folks know that I am also

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES AND 1 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 Catholic, baptized at St. Teresa's in Woodside and 3 made all of my other childhood sacraments at St. 4 Joe's in Astoria and there was a time in my life when I thought I couldn't be both proudly gay and Catholic, but I no longer feel that way and I'm proud 6 7 to say that Pope Francis and some of the actions and 8 words and messages that he has offered up in his papacy has brought hope to me and I think hope to millions of others throughout the world that it's 10 11 Pope Francis who will guide so many people in the world to further understand the love and the dignity 12 inherent in every single person, including my LGBT 13 brothers and sisters. 14

So it's an enormous time for us and for our city and I remember when I went to St. John's University, itself one of the largest Catholic universities in the country, I loved the Vincentian mission, I love service, I love that about our church and I love that Pope Francis is so dedicated to the poor, to those who have so little and who is so dedicated to peace and love all over the world.

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And I will also say this, that when I was a student at St. John's University I organized a gay and lesbian student group and we were met with some

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2 resistance at the time, but last year; actually,

3 earlier this year, an LGBT student group at that very

4 | same university, St. John's University in Queens, was

5 recognized for the first time and I remember going to

6 their event, they invited me to their prom and I

7 spoke with administrators of St. John's and some

8 members of the clergy and there was the sense that

9 Pope Francis had indeed sent a message that was being

10 received all over the world and there was space being

11 | created within the church for all of us who are LGBT

12 to be both LGBT and Catholic and proudly so.

So it is with great anticipation that we await the Pope's visit with great excitement for all that can and will be; there is certainly more to do in terms of LGBT space within the church, but I am hopeful and I think Pope Francis has brought so much hope to all of us. And so it is in that spirit that I am voting in favor of the resolution and supporting it and I will be attending the mass at Madison Square Garden, proudly so and I think my Irish Catholic grandmother would be very proud.

So with that let me introduce Council

Member Paul Vallone, the prime sponsor of the

resolution, but before I do that, let me recognize

everyone and I haven't seen that. And Jimmy and I

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much, Paul and like any good Catholic, I am not

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COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Yeah, I just wanna say that you know this pope is unusual and what he has to say resonates for me as somebody who cares about what's happening in our world and on our planet. His ability to connect on issues that are current is extraordinary; here's a guy who's steeped in history where his predecessors did not necessarily open their eyes to the world around them and this pope is able to do that. I am [background comment] very... natural [background comment]... his ability to think about climate change, in particular and to try to influence what governments are doing with climate change is unprecedented, I think and I think at the end of the day will help move the needle for what governments should be doing around protecting their people from possible devastation; he does that because it's happening now, he sees what's happening in Vietnam or the small pacific islands or Morocco, where people in these countries already have to change their behavior because of climate change and the fact that this pope can make it a current issue

[interpose] 4 COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Refugees, right; he's now tackled the refugees issue and I mean as the 5 world sometimes looks like things are collapsing on 6 7 itself, here's this bright light trying to bring us forward so. 8 9 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you very 10 much. 11 CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Thank you, Council Member Rosenthal and Council Member Vallone 12 13 and I think the Pope has inspired so many of us and I think this visit will inspire us further and in going 14 15 over my Catholic resume before, I failed to mention 16 that my husband is also Catholic. So with that... 17 [interpose] 18 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Deputy Leader 19 [sic]... so is mine. 20 [laughter] 21 CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: There you go ... 2.2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: I just wanna 23 say...

Philadelphia, but before going there he will stop in

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2 Cuba, Washington, D.C. and New York City. Although

3 his time in New York City will consist of only 36

4 hours, his schedule is of a whirlwind nature,

5 | focusing on many of the causes that he has focused

6 upon throughout the decades and especially during his

7 | last two-and-a-half years since assuming the office

as the successor of Saint Peter in 2013.

The places Pope Francis will visit were chosen by him and him alone. In addition to vespers at St. Patrick's Cathedral and a mass for 20,000 people at Madison Square Garden, he will address the General Assembly of the United Nations, make a prayerful visit to the 9/11 Memorial and then participate in an interreligious service with the leading representatives of many faiths at the 9/11 Memorial and Museum. Pope Francis will visit a 3rd grade classroom at our Lady Queen of Angels School in East Harlem where he will spend time with 3rd and 4th grade students and principals from four Harlem schools and will be greeted outside the school by hundreds of students representing over 200 Catholic schools. He will then meet with hundreds of immigrants and refugees mostly from Honduras and El Salvador and other countries throughout the world

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES AND 1 17 INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS 2 that have been helped by Catholic Charities, 3 including unaccompanied immigrant minors whose welfare has been a longstanding and absolute priority 4 of Catholic Charities, both of the Archdiocese of New 5 York and the Diocese of Brooklyn and who have 6 7 benefited in so many ways from being a major focus of 8 your far-reaching legislative and funding initiatives. Much has been written about what people are calling "The Francis effect". In the words of 10 11 Cardinal Dolan, the Pope's sincerity, warmth, 12 simplicity, joy and humility have captivated a world 13 and although many are seeking a worldly message from Pope Francis; quoting again from Cardinal Dolan, "He 14 15 is not coming as a politician, an economist, a scientist, an ethicist, a social commentator; Pope 16 17 Francis will come as a pastor, an evangelist, an 18 apostle." 19 The Archdiocese of New York and the 20 Diocese of Brooklyn are pleased that the New York 21 City Council is part of this warm welcome. Thank you 2.2 very much.

I'm Rosemarie Pace, Director of Pax

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Christi Metro New York, a regional chapter of the

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International Catholic peace movement. It is my

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honor to affirm this resolution unconditionally. The

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resolution eloquently recognizes many of the reasons

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I could only reiterate to encourage passage of it,

2 but there is even more than can be said. For example

-- and these are actually taken from the resolution

-- not only has Pope Francis been a ceaseless

5 advocate for the poor and a staunch critic of

6 economic inequality; he has also been quite clear in

7 | connecting poverty with conflict. Accordingly, he

8 has stated unequivocally that when some people are

9 allowed to suffer from lack of basic necessities; not

10 \parallel just luxuries, we have planted the seeds for revolt.

11 | Conversely, conflicts help create poverty where there

12 was none. Not only did Pope Francis invite President

13 | Peres and Abbas to meet and pray together; he has

14 | appealed for an end to the violence with which

15 Palestinians, especially Christian Palestinians are

16 | forced to live under occupation. Similarly, he has

17 | expressed compassion for innocent Israeli civilians

who may live in fear of retaliatory violence.

Not only has Pope Francis denounced the violence in Iraq and Syria and prayed for peace there; he called all people of faith to join him in a day of prayerful solidarity that many of us believe is what avoided all out war by the U.S. and western

allies in the region. Similarly, he has opposed

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2 military interventions in every other part of the world where there is violent conflict.

Pope Francis was a clear catalyst in the reopening of relations between the U.S. and Cuba, reversing decades of ineffective embargo and choosing dialogue instead.

In his recent encyclical Laudato Si, "On Care for Our Common Home," Pope Francis again makes the connection, referring to integral ecology; he articulately illustrates the links among the environment, economics, politics and peace. He says throughout the document that we cannot protect creation if we do not protect one another from economic exploitation, political power play and war; each feeds or starves the others.

In addition, Pope Francis has called for the abolition of nuclear weapons -- not mentioned in the resolution; one of the greatest threats to our earthly existence, he joins countless others in supporting the Iran deal which promotes diplomacy over nuclear weapons proliferation and the risk of nuclear holocaust.

In every possible way on every possible issue, Pope Francis is an informed voice for which I

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2 | might call integral peace, a peace that is not just

3 | the absence of war, but also the triumph of justice

4 for all people and all of god's creation. Just last

5 week at an international meeting called "Peace is

6 Always Possible, Religions and Cultures in Dialogue,"

7 organized by the Community of Sant'Egidio in

8 cooperation with the Orthodox Autocephalous Church of

9 Albania and the Albanian Episcopal Conference held in

10 Tirana, Albania, Pope Francis issued this message:

11 | "It is necessary to reaffirm that peace is always

12 possible; we must never be resigned to war and we

13 | must not be indifferent in front of people who suffer

14 | from war and violence. To state that peace is always

15 possible is not naiveté; we are required to be

16 involved personally and through our communities in

17 | the great work of peace."

And so I'll change my last paragraph to say I thank the Committee on Cultural Affairs,
Libraries and International Intergroup Relations for approving this resolution as a most well-deserved welcome to Pope Francis to our wonderful city. Thank

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you.

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CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much to both of you for your testimony and sometimes

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2 we need testimony that convinces Council Members to

3 support a piece of legislation or a resolution; in

4 this case it was so overwhelming that that wasn't

5 necessary, but your testimony and your support is

6 | welcomed and we're thrilled that you both would come

7 today to the City Council. I know Council Member

8 Vallone probably would like to offer a closing

9 remark.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: I just

11 personally wanna say thank you for your help and

12 | support and obviously it takes a lot to come down and

13 I'm glad this was your first one and I can't think of

14 a better reason to come down and testify for the

15 | Council, so that's great and I'm glad you... I hope you

16 remember this... [background comment] there's always...

17 | yeah, there will be another great one too. And Joe,

18 | thank you for your guidance throughout the process

19 | and again, Majority Leader, thank you so much and

20 | Council Members; this will make all of us shine a

21 | little brighter at our Stated hearing, when we're

22 able to have this ready for him and signed by

23 | everyone, so thank you so much.

JOSEPH ROSENBERG: And I'd just like to add something. Thank you, all of you; your words were beautiful and tremendously appreciated.
