3	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: We good? Alright.
4	[gavel]
5	Good morning and welcome to the New York
6	City Council Committee on Rules, Privileges and
7	Elections. My name's Brad Lander; I chair the
8	committee. We're joined by our Minority Leader Steve
9	Matteo of Staten Island, and other members of the
10	committee will be coming in I'm guess for this
11	hearing. As usual in this committee, we're not going
12	to vote at the same time that we do the hearing; we
13	get the chance to ask questions of the candidates and
14	then follow up on them if there need be and we will
15	reconvene to vote in advance of next week's Stated
16	Meeting.
17	This morning and I also want to
18	acknowledge the committee's attorney, Habid [sp?]
19	Hussein, who's in his first, with Jason Otano off on
20	active duty. Habid is our committee counsel, so
21	thank you; nice to have you with us.
22	And as always, we wanna thank and
23	acknowledge Chuck Davis, Director of Investigations
24	and Deandra Johnson and Alesia Vassel [sp?] for their
25	good work in preparing for this hearing. We're

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joined also by Council Member Debi Rose from Staten
Island, welcome.

This morning we'll be considering the 4 nomination from the Bronx Borough President, which 5 was submitted to us on October 16th, 2015, when Bronx 6 7 Borough President Rubin Diaz, Jr. formally submitted the name of Orlando Marin to the Council of the City 8 of New York for its advice and consent regarding his 9 reappointment to the City Planning Commission. And 10 today the Council will consider whether to give its 11 12 advice and consent to this candidate. If reappointed 13 to the Planning Commission, Mr. Marin will serve the remainder of a five-year term expiring on June 30th, 14 15 2020. And I will skip all the telling you what the City Planning Commission does, but I will note that 16 17 these are salaried, even though part-time, salaried 18 positions; CPC members receive an annual salary of \$54,150 for their significant but not full-time work 19 20 for the Commission. Yeah, and I'm gonna skip all of this excellent language on what it is that the City 21 2.2 Planning Commission does, and we're gonna get right 23 to it.

24 So Mr. Marin, thank you so much for 25 joining us this morning; we appreciate the questions

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 5 2 and answers that you submitted in advance, your conflicts letter and a range of other things that 3 we'll talk about in your Q&A and we value your 4 5 service and appreciate your being here. 6 We've been joined as well by Council 7 Member Mark Levine from Manhattan, a member of the committee. And we'll now ask you to be sworn in by 8 Committee Counsel and then give your opening 9 10 statement. COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Do you swear or 11 12 affirm that you will tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth in the testimony that 13 14 you're about to provide? 15 ORLANDO MARIN: Yes, I do. 16 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you. 17 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So I'll just call 18 the attention of members of the committee, both to the background materials prepared by our staff in the 19 20 red binder and to the draft, the text of the opening statement which you have. 21 2.2 ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you. Good morning, 23 Chairman Lander and members of the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. My name is Orlando 24 Marin. 25

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Thank you for the opportunity to address
the committee regarding my reappointment nomination
by the Bronx Borough President to continue serving as
a member of the City Planning Commission.

When I first came before the committee in 6 7 August of 2011, I discussed the blackout during the summer of 1977 and the destruction and decimation of 8 various New York City neighborhoods due to the fires 9 and subsequent raising of neighborhoods block by 10 block throughout the City of New York. This was a 11 12 very dark time for the City of New York. I discussed 13 how I am a product of the public school system and 14 NYCHA housing and that I have lived in the Borough of 15 the Bronx all of my life. I emphasized my 16 enthusiastic and optimistic views at a very young age 17 and how I wondered what would become of me and what 18 my participation and contribution to the city would be in order to realize a more healthy and vibrant 19 20 city. I also briefly outlined my education, experiences and career to date. I mentioned my 21 2.2 participation as a fellow with the National Urban 23 Fellows program, employ with one of the most prestigious architectural firms globally, Perkins and 24 Will, my employ with the New York City Housing 25

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 7 2 Partnership, my involvement securing funding for and 3 developing hundreds of units of affordable housing 4 throughout the five boroughs that are the City of New 5 York.

6 Today I am very pleased to discuss the 7 milestones I have accomplished personally and what we 8 have accomplished as a city since then, my 9 involvement on the Planning Commission to date, and 10 my desire to continue serving on the Planning 11 Commission in an effort to move the city forward in 12 this 21st century and beyond.

13 My desire to continue with the 14 development and management of affordable housing has 15 led to the creation of Tortola Property Management 16 Corp, an S corporation which I own and manage. Ι 17 provide consulting services relating to the 18 management, maintenance and marketing and homeowner relations in the realm of public housing. 19 Tortola Property Management Corp. also provides guidance with 20 asset management and securing of funding for 21 2.2 affordable housing.

Being on the Commission is a privilege and I enjoy greatly the work that the City Planning Commission performs, from vetting applications staff

3	and the affirmative for projects that will inevitably
4	shape the city for years to come. My decisions are
5	rendered after thorough, thoughtful and extensive
6	review of relevant and pertinent public records and
7	public testimony that ultimately assist me in doing
8	so.
9	Additionally, I express and communicate
10	any issues, questions or concerns to the Department
11	of City Planning and City Planning Commission staff
12	for elaboration well before any scheduled hearings.
13	Lastly, I am fully prepared to fully
14	participate and ask informed and pertinent questions
15	at all hearings and sessions.
16	The primary mission of the members of the
17	City Planning Commission and the Department of City
18	Planning are to fulfill their charter-mandated
19	functions in a manner that best serves the people of
20	New York by making land use decisions in a holistic
21	and deliberative fashion while, to the best of our
22	ability, improving the quality of life for all New
23	Yorkers. I believe deeply that my participation on
24	the Commission and the decisions that I have rendered
25	have been with this imperative driving my actions.

2	Moreover, my deep and abiding commitment
3	to serving the city in its development efforts has
4	grown greater as a result of the privilege of serving
5	on the City Planning Commission. Our city is
6	evolving and it is imperative that during this change
7	it evolves responsibly, equitably and in a
8	sustainable manner. I believe that I continue to
9	maintain and have developed a considerable level of
10	knowledge and possess the skills in planning matters
11	that will contribute and assist me in doing so.
12	It is for these reasons that I wish to
13	continue to serve on the City Planning Commission.
14	The experiences that I have gained and the
15	professional acumen that I have developed, combined
16	with the skill sets and development expertise that I
17	have honed throughout the years have grounded me and
18	are the basis for my continued desire to serve the
19	city and which I believe will continue to compliment
20	that of those currently serving on the Commission.
21	I am proud to once again have been
22	nominated to serve on the Planning Commission and I
23	look forward to continuing the work with the
24	currently appointed members. Thank you.

3	Mr. Marin and we appreciate your testimony and your
4	past service and your time here today with us. I'm
5	gonna ask you a couple of questions and then Council
6	Member Levine has a questions and other members may
7	as well.
8	First I just wanna ask some, you know,
9	the technical questions about the conflicts of
10	interest letters we have from COIB; I guess there are
11	two COIB letters; one from the first time you came
12	before us [crosstalk]
13	ORLANDO MARIN: That's correct.
14	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: and one more
15	recently. So on the first one from 2011, it's my
16	understanding that covered your work at the time at
17	the Bluestone Organization and you now don't work for
18	them, but you do some consulting, marketing and sales
19	work in partnership with them; is that [crosstalk]
20	ORLANDO MARIN: I believe I consulted
21	[sic], my company Tortola Property Management Corp.
22	actually holds the contract and we provide marketing
23	and homeowner relation services in Staten Island
24	under the Rebuild Resilient Staten Island Program
25	that we've developed in corporation with the City of

New York, HPD, Build It Back and the Housing Recovery
Office of the Mayor.

CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And you've indicated that, in your questions and answers for today, that you will continue to abide by the guidance of that 2011 letter in relationship to Bluestone, even though you're no longer directly employed by them...

9 [crosstalk]

ORLANDO MARIN: Absolutely. Because you 10 know, it's a perception issue and so even though I'm 11 12 a consultant, I will abide by the letter; if there 13 are issues that come before the Commission that may be questionable, I always refer to counsel, I get 14 15 their opinion and whether or not I can vote on the 16 matter and I have not had to recuse myself to date on 17 anything.

18 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And then now you have a new letter, you're entering into a new 19 business relationship and you sought guidance 20 appropriately from COIB on that and they've indicated 21 2.2 that it is not a problematic conflict, but lay out 23 what you would do if, you know, if a matter involving I guess RBR, is that right, yes, Rayann Besser Realty 24 came before the Commission... [crosstalk] 25

3	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So can you just sort
4	of summarize that relationship and the COIB letter?
5	ORLANDO MARIN: Well actually, that
6	relationship was terminated last night. She and I
7	had a discussion and we realized that being
8	Commissioners and working together might be a problem
9	and so… it created a problem in that for us in
10	that if there's an action that we would need to
11	recuse ourselves, we would be doing the Commission an
12	injustice, so as a result, at 5:00 last night we
13	wrote to the state and she's terminated my license
14	with her and I'll be seeking another brokerage house
15	to work with.
16	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: So that makes this
17	even very easy; I don't have to ask you to follow the
18	guidance of this letter, which in any case, COIB had
19	permitted. I guess just for other members of the
20	committee, Rayann Besser is the Staten Island Borough
21	President's appointment to the City Planning
22	Commission and you know, you are allowed to meet
23	people through your work and so long as those things
24	don't present conflicts, engage, and COIB, we have
25	the COIB letter which outlined the guidance that they

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 13 2 were asking you to follow if you were doing, but if 3 you're not doing it, then we don't need to... then I 4 don't need to ask you whether you will follow the 5 guidance of this letter, so.

ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you. I mean my 6 7 intention was to follow the guidance of the letter, of course, but you know in reading the letter, it 8 clearly states the subordinate and superior 9 relationship, and so even though in a brokerage house 10 11 there is no subordinate and superior relationship, there's a fine line there and so we decided that it 12 would be in the best interest of all to terminate 13 14 that relationship and I can always find another 15 brokerage house to work with.

CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Well I think it's 16 17 admirable to, you know, to be concerned with even the 18 appearance, especially in a case where you have the conflicts letter and have been told it's not a 19 20 technical conflict, to still nonetheless go beyond 21 that standard and appearance... the appearance ... 2.2 [crosstalk] 23 ORLANDO MARIN: But the appearance... the

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appearance...

3	thank you for doing that [sic] [crosstalk]
4	ORLANDO MARIN: Right; we were concerned
5	with the appearance as well, so we decided it would
6	be in the best interest to terminate the
7	relationship. Thank you.
8	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Alright. And then
9	I'll just ask one kind of general question; you got
10	to some of this in your answers and there's certainly
11	no right or wrong on this, but obviously, as you
12	know, the moment or in everywhere in the city
13	there's a really interesting American Prospect
14	article about the Bronx specifically, but we're sure
15	feeling it in Brooklyn, just the challenging dynamics
16	of growth and how that relates to change in people's
17	neighborhoods, how that relates to displacement, how
18	we balance creating and preserving new affordable
19	housing while making sure people don't get displaced,
20	our neighborhoods stay great places to live, they're
21	sustainable and resilient; we are grappling with
22	those issues in every neighborhood and every
23	significant item that comes before the Planning
24	Commission evokes very strong feelings on those
25	grounds and I just wonder; you had some thoughtful
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1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 15 2 things to say I thought in your answer, but if you could just say a little more about how you approach, 3 you know, specifically that set of passionate, 4 5 sometimes tense disagreements that are presenting themselves today as our neighborhoods are 6 7 experiencing the challenges of growth and change and gentrification and how you think about those issues 8 and explore them as they come before the Commission ... 9 [crosstalk] 10

ORLANDO MARIN: Well of course, you know, 11 12 I begin with, you know, the examination and perusal 13 of all documents that are given to us so we can get a 14 background from the staff and the applicant on what 15 they intend to develop. What becomes most crucial 16 for us, or for me specifically, is the public hearing 17 sessions where we hear from the public and we 18 actually hear from those communities the desires and wishes of those specific communities, which I believe 19 20 should be left to each specific community, 'cause they are the ones that are on the ground, are at the 21 2.2 point of interest and know their community best. So 23 I don't feel that it is up to the Commission to, or my vote and my action to determine what happens 24 without having first heard the public, understanding 25

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 16 2 what they'd like to see; weighing that against the testimony, of course, of the developer, the testimony 3 of Department of City Planning, to see what's the 4 best balance and what can be done to of course put 5 planned development in the community in a responsible 6 7 manner. CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Okay, I may push a 8 little more on that, but I'm gonna let my colleagues 9 get in on the action as well. 10 11 I wanna note we've also been joined by 12 [sneeze, background comment] Council Member Margaret Chin and Council Member Andy Cohen from the Bronx. 13 14 We have questions from Council Member Levine, 15 followed by Council Member Chin. 16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you Chair 17 Lander. Mr. Marin, your background is so impressive; 18 as far as I can tell, your service thus far on the Commission has been exemplary; I think you had a 19 20 flawless attendance record, so very happy that you are seeking to continue to serve in this capacity. 21 2.2 Just following up on Chair Lander's 23 question. You talked about, I believe, that the

community should have a voice over the kinds of

changes in zoning that are imposed on them, and I'm

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1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 17 2 wondering if you mean that if grassroots groups oppose, for example, one of the Mayor's upzonings, 3 4 that that plan should be dropped by the Mayor? ORLANDO MARIN: I don't believe that any 5 action presented should be dropped; I truly believe 6 7 that all ideas should be considered, all discussion should be vetted, and of course, a determination made 8 based on the information gathered from both the 9 stakeholders, from the department staff, from the 10 Mayor's Office considering how that would affect that 11 12 community. 13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Do you have a sense in the Bronx where public sentiment is heading 14 15 vis-à-vis, for example, the Jerome upzoning? 16 ORLANDO MARIN: I have heard a couple of 17 comments on the upzoning proposed and I know that 18 there are folks in opposition and I know that there are folks that are for the rezoning, and so again, I 19 believe that it is our responsibility to work with 20 the community, hear out their concerns and where 21 2.2 possible, adjust the proposal so that the concerns of 23 the community are parallel with the concerns of the 24 redevelopment efforts such that it's an inclusive 25

2	process, and everyone is heard and their reasoning
3	why is heard.
4	COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you very
5	much.
6	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you Council
7	Member Levine. Council Member Chin and then we've
8	been joined by Council Member Espinal.
9	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Good morning
10	ORLANDO MARIN: Good morning.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: thank you for your
12	service on the City Planning I have two questions
13	[interpose]
14	ORLANDO MARIN: 'Kay.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: one is as-of-right
16	development, especially in Lower Manhattan, my
17	district, I see, you know, tall buildings going up
18	and there's nothing we can do about it; they don't
19	come in… the City Council has no role, so I wanna
20	hear some thoughts from you; is there any way that we
21	can modify that process so that development cannot
22	just go on as-of-right; that they do have to come in
23	and see how they can coordinate what's going on in
24	the neighborhood?

2	The second question is that also within
3	my district we have a lot of special permits that
4	come through the Planning Commission and I've been
5	very frustrated with especially the SoHo
6	neighborhood, all these 74-711 coming in and I was
7	like, we've gotta put a moratorium on it and really
8	look at how to take a look at rezoning, because all
9	these special permits that are coming in is really
10	changing the character of the neighborhood, and on
11	top of that we are losing affordable units and we're
12	losing artist housing; the joint work-live quarter.
13	So I just wanna hear your thoughts on those two
14	issues.
15	ORLANDO MARIN: I'm gonna address the
16	second first and then we'll go the as-of-right
17	second, if you allow me.
18	The first is; you know we realize there's
19	a problem on the Commission with the 74-711 and the
20	conversion of some of these buildings, warehouse
21	buildings from manufacturing to retail. We're not at
22	all happy with some of the actions that have come
23	before us and the latest one that came before us were
24	two anal buildings and a Broadway building, which
25	actually rescinded their application. Why? Because

2	we had very pertinent questions concerning how their
3	actions came to be. So before they even came to us
4	there was a retail sign on the window saying let's
5	rent this as retail; we had a problem with that; we
6	really have a problem with that. So we as
7	commissioners have requested of the Department of
8	City Planning to take a look at this district
9	specifically to see if we can somehow come up with a
10	zoning pattern that makes sense, of course in
11	consultation with the community, but the special
12	permit process we realize is flawed and needs to be
13	corrected and we are working towards that now.
14	In reference to the as-of-right
15	development, I share your concerns. I just read the
16	other day that the Extell Tower is going up where the
17	old Pathmark site is
18	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: It's in my
19	district.
20	ORLANDO MARIN: and I realize that, and
21	60 stories next to the projects that are 12 and 13
22	stories, creating shadows throughout the entire
23	community. I don't have an answer for you right now,
24	but I do think that we do need to consider that more
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1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 21 2 fully and understand how that affects the community before we can make any decisions. 3 4 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Yeah, I think that's something that we all have to look at, because 5 we have to have some input and right now we don't ... 6 7 [crosstalk] ORLANDO MARIN: I agree with you. 8 Ι agree with you, Council Member. 9 10 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: and they're really causing a lot of havoc. 11 12 And on the second question that you 13 answered, I'm really glad that the Commission is 14 looking at that and we also made a request to the 15 Commission to really look at these special permits, 16 so hopefully going forward we can find a solution to 17 that. 18 ORLANDO MARIN: I'd also like to elaborate a little bit further. On the joint living 19 20 work quarters for artists, we also have a problem 21 with that, because we are losing affordable units and 2.2 we at all times always question the Loft Board; DHCR, 23 what the original registrations were, if they were registered as a JLWQA; you know, the fact that it's 24 been empty is not a reasoning to turn it now into 25

2	market rate housing and quite honestly, we've
3	involved the Loft Board; the Loft Board has come to
4	testify and they cannot do it. Those folks that do
5	have joint living work quarters in their buildings,
6	regardless of the number of years that they have been
7	empty, must go back to joint living work quarters for
8	artists and we're grappling and fighting with them
9	now on this issue.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Great. Thank you.
11	ORLANDO MARIN: My pleasure.
12	COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Chair.
13	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Thank you Council
14	Member Chin. We've been joined by The Speaker,
15	welcome.
16	[background comments]
17	ORLANDO MARIN: Hello; how are you? It's
18	a pleasure to see you.
19	SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Yeah, same here.
20	ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you.
21	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Council Member
22	Espinal, did you have a question?
23	COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Good morning,
24	Mr. Marin.
25	ORLANDO MARIN: Good morning.

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 23 2 COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: First of all, I 3 just want to introduce myself; I'm Councilman Espinal and I represent East New York and Cypress Hills, 4 which I'm sure you're aware is undergoing a huge 5 6 rezoning... [crosstalk] 7 ORLANDO MARIN: Yeah. COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: and I just kinda 8 wanna bring up some of the issues that the community 9 is facing and things they've been bringing up and you 10 know one is how affordable is the affordable units 11 12 that come into the neighborhood; the amount of jobs 13 it's gonna create and I guess overall, commitments 14 from the administration of improving local 15 infrastructure to make this a real viable community, 16 and I just kinda wanna make a statement and just hope 17 that when the plan does reach your table that you 18 take a look at it and actually take all these things into account before, you know the Commission decides 19 20 to approve it when it comes to the City Council. Ι just wanna see; do you have any thoughts on the plan 21 2.2 currently or have you looked at it or any insight you 23 can provide...? [crosstalk] 24 ORLANDO MARIN: We've had some preliminary discussions as well as a site visit out 25

2	to the East New York area and we realize that there
3	needs to be some cohesive thought about the zoning of
4	that community. Specifically, I forget the name of
5	the street, but it's right behind Arlington Village,
6	where you have a lot of car repair shops mixed in
7	with housing [crosstalk]
8	COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Liberty Avenue.
9	Yeah.
10	ORLANDO MARIN: Yes, correct. And so you
11	know, it is a hodgepodge it reminds me of the Bronx;
12	it is sort of a hodgepodge that needs to be
13	straightened out. What does concern me is some of
14	the infrastructure; we have parcels that are
15	stretching across the conduit at Atlantic and people
16	have to cross that area; there needs to be more
17	thought there the idea of putting a school is
18	great; there is a site that's identified for a school
19	the concern is; will there be funding when that
20	school is going to be built. So some of these
21	concerns… again, we're still vetting out the
22	proposal, but I do think that we are asking the right
23	questions and with the help of the community we're
24	trying to reach a determination that would work for
25	everyone.
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1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 25 2 COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: It sounds like 3 you're on top of it, so… [crosstalk] 4 ORLANDO MARIN: We are and you know, we

do have ... we do have the concerns that you have about 5 affordable housing, keeping housing affordable and 6 7 perpetuity; the issue of preservation, which buildings will be kept in preservation; which are not 8 in preservation. The Arlington Village development 9 that has gone fallow for years and being taken care 10 of; that has been brought [sic] over by the Bluestone 11 12 Group and what they're gonna do with that. So 13 there's a lot of concerns that we have in the East New York corridor, specifically since the Atlantic 14 15 Avenue, again, really presents a challenge for 16 pedestrians crossing over, access; we have to 17 continue vetting the proposal.

COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Well again, it sounds like you're on top of it and I appreciate your insight and I look forward to see you continue serving the Commission... [crosstalk]

ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you Councilman.
COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON LANDER: And now that you've
mentioned the Bluestone Group, I'll flag this issue

3	answers, since we had mentioned before that you do
4	consulting work for the Bluestone Organization, but
5	the Bluestone Group that has a large property in East

8	whom you do consulting, so… [crosstalk]
9	ORLANDO MARIN: Absolute… Absolutely.
10	Absolutely. And just to I know them intimately,
11	because when I was working at the Bluestone
12	Organization I was just having this conversation
13	with Tom a little while ago when I first heard of
14	the Bluestone Group, I mentioned, this is a problem
15	because the Bluestone Organization has a stellar
16	reputation in the realm of affordable housing and
17	here the Bluestone Group is coming in and what I'm
18	reading from them is negative, negative, negative; we
19	should talk to the state and do something about it,
20	and they waited too long and when they went to the
21	state, the state said sorry, it's too late, they've
22	been the Bluestone Group for three years now; if you
23	had an objection, you should've done so in year one
24	and not year three. So unfortunately we couldn't
25	work or force the state to have them change their

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 27 2 name, so that's been a problem for the Bluestone Organization for a while, but they are two separate 3 4 entities altogether. 5 CHAIRPERSON LANDER: It doesn't, in any 6 case, present any conflict from your [background 7 comment] point of view, so... [crosstalk] ORLANDO MARIN: It does not. But you 8 know what; I appreciate the question, 'cause that 9 10 means people are paying attention. CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Yeah, super. 11 Thank 12 Thank you Council Member Espinal. Council you. Member Cohen. 13 14 COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: How are you? 15 ORLANDO MARIN: I'm good; how are you? 16 COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Good to see you. 17 ORLANDO MARIN: Same here; thank you. COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: I have some 18 questions. In my district I have been getting a lot 19 20 of concern from constituents regarding ZQA and MIH, and not ... I don't have questions about the specifics, 21 2.2 'cause I've been doing my best to try to ... but I do 23 have questions about the process and I think that part of the concern of my constituents is that they 24 25 feel like it's been very top down; that this was a

2	plan, you know, devi… these programs or text
3	amendments were drafted downtown and they've sort of
4	been dictated, and some of my community boards have
5	in the last ten years gone through thoughtful

8	high [sic] and I'm wondering if you think that the
9	Planning Commission is collaborative enough on the
10	local level as it could be or it should be.
11	ORLANDO MARIN: I'm sorry; I didn't hear
12	the question, I uhm
13	COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Yeah, that's uh
14	no… no problem… [crosstalk]
15	ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: I'm wondering if
17	you think that the Commission does enough to sort of
18	have the process be collaborative on the community
19	level with the community boards and that it in this
20	particular instance, like I said, it feels very top
21	down and that just… even on the merits, I think
22	there's chafing and sort of a resentment about the
23	process.
24	ORLANDO MARIN: I do think that the
25	Department of City Planning has endeavored to

However, I also 3 do agree that the process is being rushed; the 4 magnitude of materials that we've been presented with 5 I haven't been able to get through, and I know 6 7 communities haven't been able to get through, and it concerns me because I don't think that this mandatory 8 inclusionary housing should be painted with one broad 9 brush stroke throughout the entire city. 10 There are different communities; each community has its own 11 12 issues specific and endemic to its community, for 13 whatever reason, and I believe that there should be cooperation and interaction and feedback put into 14 15 text, but not as a global effort; it should be by 16 community, so that this way we can ... each community, again, has it's only -- Riverdale, it's a high-income 17 18 community; South Bronx is not, and we can't try and force to fit in a round peg in a square box, it just 19 20 doesn't work. So it is imperative that we really take a look deeply at this mandatory inclusionary 21 2.2 housing and the zoning for housing and quality 23 amendments, because they're gonna affect the city for years to come, and the idea of not having parking in 24 every instance just doesn't sit well with me. 25 Each

2	community, as I mentioned, is totally different and
3	has different requirements and needs; there are
4	communities that are isolated from bus lines and
5	train lines; in that instance it may be of benefit to
6	include parking and have the income from that parking
7	serve the maintenance costs for the building. So
8	these are things that we still need to vet out on the
9	Commission floor and with the Department of City
10	Planning.
11	[background comment]
12	COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: I hope you'll
13	convey those concerns to the rest of your people on
14	the Commission [crosstalk]
15	ORLANDO MARIN: Oh I intend to do so.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: I have a second
17	question. I've had a very small rezoning that I've
18	been advocating for and it's gone incredibly slow and
19	I think that part of the reason it's gone slow is
20	that there may be a resource issue at City Planning
21	and maybe in the Bronx office; I know it's not a
22	budget hearing, but do you think that the Commission
23	is adequately resourced or do you think that there is
24	shortcomings there?
25

9	encourage you to look out for the best interests of
10	the Bronx as well as the City when you're on the
11	Commission and [crosstalk]
12	ORLANDO MARIN: Absolutely.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: thank you.
14	ORLANDO MARIN: Thank you.
15	CHAIRPERSON LANDER: Alright, thank you
16	Council Member Cohen and thank you for your time and
17	good answers to all these questions and I like I

22	with so and I don't think we have any other
23	there's no other questions here. It is our custom in
24	this committee not to vote on the day of the hearing,
25	so that is not about the way we do that in general,
