SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you my colleagues. Today will be voting on legislation requiring copies of annual reports from the City's Economic Development Corporation to be distributed to Community Boards. While these reports are currently distributed to the Mayor, the Council, the Controller, the Public Advocate and to all the Borough Presidents. Extending this information to Community Boards will help increase communication between the City and all of the neighborhoods across the 5 Borough's. On staff I would like to thank Alex Polonoff (sp), Rachel Harris, Kendal Stephson (sp), Jeffery Baker and Ed Adkin. This is a piece of legislation that is sponsored by Council Member Cabrera and ask him to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: Thank you so much Madam Speaker, thank you for your support on this bill. Currently a job creation and retention report is provided to the Mayor, the Council, the

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City Controller, the Public Advocate and the Borough President. I hope that the Council will vote to pass Intr. 128 so that our Community Boards will... will also receive this report as they are critical players in proving the unemployment rate in our communities. Specifically the report must provide through information on projected and actual jobs created and retaining connections with any project undertaking buyout contracted entity. These entities include local development corporations other not for profit corporations and all other entities involved in economic development in our City. This bill will not only apply to projects that involve expenditures or City Capital for creations but also those who were provided with assistance in the form of a loan, grant or tax benefit of over \$150,000. It would also apply to projects involving the sale or lease of City involved land where at least 25 jobs are created, expected to be created or retained. In addition, the report must include terms of restriction on the use of lease property including the rent received in the prior fiscal year for sales, the price for which the property was sold and any terms of restriction on the resale of the property must be included. I believe

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this bill will increase transparency, allow us to get a better since of the role that City funds are playing in the creation of retention of job. Access to a job is truly a lifeline and all of our residents deserve to make a decent living if they are willing to work. I hope that all my colleagues will recognize the importance of Intro 128 and vote in

support of it this afternoon. Thank you so much.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVIERITO: Thank you Council Member. Additional were going to be voting on legislation to promote the use of Geothermal energy in City facilities across New York. Geothermal power use heat from the earth to provide heat to buildings. As a clean renewable source of power it's exactly the type of innovation that will help New York become a greener more sustainable City. This bill will require the City to create a screening tool to determine why the Geothermal energy is cost effective for public buildings. Any building that is determined to be a good candidate for Geothermal energy and heat must have a Geothermal system installed. Through this process were taking another step toward our goal of reducing New York City carbon admission by 80% before the year 2050. On staff end

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COUNCIL MEMBER CONSTANTINIDES: Thank you Madam Speaker and thank you for your strong environmental leadership under this Council we become more green and more sustainable and that's due to your leadership, so thank you. You know recently we marked the anniversary of the passage of local law The law that mandate that New York City reduce it greenhouse gas admission 80% by 2050. time our City has made real progress in sustainability. In September for instance the City open PS62 on Staten Island, the first net zero building in New York City. We also using our roll a market participate to spur further developments in (inaudible) by requesting proposals on how the City's energy consumption can be sourced from 100% renewables. Finally we passed legislation to discourage frizzles energy usages that strain the inaudible grad and necessitate the use of peaker plants that burn dirty and harmful fossil fuels. important as these first steps are, it is far more

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necessary that we move even further. Greenhouse gas emissions in buildings are the number one gluten at over 70%. Much of this comes from our heating, ventilating, air conditioning or HVAC systems. systems are generally relied on fossil fuels such as heating oil or natural gas to run and are often economically burdensome not only on the property owner as many older inefficient models but also on countless New Yorkers must deal with pollen the unleash. That's why I'm proud to sponsor Intro 609-A, which encourage the adoption of Geothermal exchange system. I want ask my colleagues for their support on this bill. For many Geothermal can replace additional HVAC systems. These systems work by utilizing stored heat from the earth's crust in the winter for heating and the sun earth conversely the process can be reversed by channeling the heat back into the ground, eliminating the need for separate air conditioning or central air installations. Geothermal systems are currently used at St. Patrick Cathedral, the Queens Botanical Garden and the Brooklyn Children Museum, so we know that they work in New York City's diverse hypography.

Geothermal systems are also easy and cheap to

maintain and do not require large roof units. 2 3 will not be problematic for landmark buildings or 4 other structures where roof space is a premium. 5 Intro (inaudible) call the City to develop to make publically available online a screening tool that can 6 be used to determine when an installation for a 8 Geothermal system will be cost effective. Starting in 2017 the City will be required to use this screening tool whenever it construct or retrofits a 10 11 City owned building. The tool determines a 12 Geothermal system maybe cost effective that a more 13 through engineering analyst must be done to balance 14 the real cost versus other alternatives taking in 15 account not only the cost of installation but the 16 utility bill savings and the social cost of carbon 17 which is the first time were doing that in New York 18 City. Such as the benefits of reduced greenhouse gas 19 emissions. Last it would require that the 20 administration sent to the account the recommendations for standards for installation for 21 2.2 Geothermal systems, qualifications for system 2.3 installers, informing property owners and Geothermal systems installers of the benefits of coupling with 24 solar which would make buildings energy neutral. 25

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President Obama has said that we are the first
generation to fill the effect of climate change and
the last generation that will be able to do anything
about it. This legislation marks the progressive
step of making our City more sustainable and does not
create greenhouse gas emission and will take us in a
more green sustainable future. I want to thank staff
attorney Samara Swanston (sp), Policy Analyst Bill
Murray for their tireless efforts. Jonathan Seltzer
(sp), Jeff Baker, Laura Popa (sp), the Mayor's
office, Nelda Masa(sp) from the Office of
Sustainability, Anthony Peori (sp) as well and my
staff Nick Widzowski, Nick Roloson and Shachar
Sharon. Thank you.

Member and finally today (inaudible) to vote on legislation that will authorize the City to reimburse non-public schools for cost related to higher and paying security guards for school facilities. This bill will allow schools from across the 5 Boroughs to make sure there facilities are a safer and more secure place for their students. This is a first of its kind measure to keep students in non-public schools safe and were proud to lead on this landmark

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safety measure. Students across our City deserve a safe learning environment no matter what community they come from or where they attend school. With this bill were reaffirming that message and showing our commitment to all students in New York City. I want to thank Rob Newman, Iesha Shumberg (sp), Deepa Ambicar (sp), Beth Gotleib (sp) Rachel Codero, Seria Ansher and Laurie Wen and would ask Council Member Greenfield the lead sponsor on this bill and who has been a tireless advocate for this, to say a few words.

Madam Speaker, I'm extremely proud that New York City today is leading the way in protecting our most vulnerable or nearly 1 ½ million school children in public and non-public schools. Intro 65-A, legislation that I have sponsored and is being voted on today is a truly landmark measure extending the promise of school security on the basic notion that every single child deserve to be safe regardless of where go to school. First I want to thank you Speaker for your setfast support. I want to acknowledge that you made an immense contribution to the development to this legislation. You meet with

me and several of our other colleagues over a half a 2 3 dozen times in the last 21 months. You provided 4 feedback and guidance as we worked toward the passage of this vital bill and I'm really grateful for that. I want to thank my colleagues the unarmed prevailing 6 7 wage security officers will soon provide an incredible protection to nearly 200,000 non-public 8 school children, that's over 70% of the non-public school children in New York City. Thanks to you 10 11 colleagues the program authorized by Intro 65-A offer security officers to schools of 300 or more students 12 13 in grades preK-12 and give larger schools an 14 additional guard for every 500 students. 15 officers will be extensively trained to protect the 16 unique student bodies of these schools and be 17 sensitive to the profound threats they face including unfortunate arise and bias attacks. Intro 65-A 18 19 security officers will be state licensed and employed 20 by state licensed security companies. The companies 21 will be screened and prequalified by the administrating agency. Today we are both voting to 2.2 2.3 give hundreds of thousands of New York City parent's peace of mind and create up to 500 new living wage 24 jobs. I want to thank all of you for that. I also 25

want to thank the historic coalition that joined 2 3 together to support this legislation. Foremost I 4 want to thank the Chair of the Public Safety 5 Committee Vanessa Gibson and my colleagues on that Committee who voted unanimously to pass this 6 7 legislation this past Friday. I want to thank the 44 8 Council co-sponsors plus our esteemed Public Advocate Latisha James, all of who co-sponsored this legislation; in fact we have more sponsors on this 10 11 bill than any other bill. I also want to thank the 12 advocates, without of whom it never would have 13 happened. The Muslim Community Network, The Islamic 14 School Association, Rafic Muhammand (sp) is with us 15 today, The Catholic Community Relations Council, Joe 16 Rosenberg is with us today, The Archdiocese of New 17 York, The Archdiocese of Brooklyn, The UJA 18 Federation, Jeff Letts (sp) is with us today, The 19 Good of Israel of America, (inaudible), The Orthodox 20 Union, where Jake Adler is with us today as well. 21 They turned out with students, they had their diverse 2.2 voices heard loudly and clearly and finally I want to 2.3 thank the labor advocate especially building service workers local 32BJ of Service Employee International 24

Union, I'm proud to call them supporters and

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advocates for this bill. We know that we will not 2 3 just be receiving protection from properly trained 4 security officer but they will also be earning a prevailing wage and excellent benefits. I want to thank as well Mayor Bill de Blasio for recognizing 6 7 the safety needs of all children whether they attend 8 public or non-public schools. The Mayor personally negotiated this bill and every public school has security guards regardless of its size, location or 10 11 risk and were simply extending that to non-public schools and finally I really want to my thanks to all 12 13 the co-sponsors of this legislation. I want to give 14 a special shout to a half a dozen or so members 15 including the Public Safety Chair Vanessa Gibson, she gave me non-stop feedback and advice, the Jewish 16 17 Caucasus Chair Mark Levine was a 18 (inaudible) supporter, Finance Committee Chair Julissa 19 Ferreras-Copeland really help me with invaluable 20 advice to crunch the numbers as well, the Majority 21 Leader Jimmy Van Brammer who kept pushing along with 2.2 me, Council Member Ritche Torres who pushed me every 2.3 day to work harder on this legislation and Minority Leader Steven Matteo and his predecessor Vincent 24 Ignizio for the bi-partisan support, we're very 25

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grateful for that. All of you gave me support, most of you co-sponsored this bill, you'll gave me advice and encouragement over the last 21 months. couldn't have done it without you and finally I want to give a shout out to our wonderful staff, you're incredible especially Romon Martinez (sp) who kept the faith in this bill, our amazing Counsel Rob Newman, who stayed with me until 1:30 a.m. on the eve of Thanksqiving to negotiate this bill with the administration. I want thank Gary for his behind the scenes wisdom as well and I want to thank Emma Wolf and John Palupa (sp) who took the lead negotiating this bill on behalf of this administration and to my fabulous Chief of Staff, my current Chief of Staff Danny Pearlstin (sp) and my former Chief of Staff Jane Carrie for spending 100s of hours working on this and to my other staffer who worked on this Becky, Alex, Helania, Juliani and Danny and Finally on your desk today you will see that you have gold coins with chocolate inside. It's a tradition for 100s of years known as Hanukkah Gelt or Hanukkah money. Today's bill will create as many as 500 prevailing wage jobs in New York City, these will be real good high paying jobs on behalf of those who

We are fighting to see a return to that condition. believe that for those private, for profit, religious as well as profit, hedge fund operated and other entities that choose to establish private education institutions must bare the cost associated with the operation of such schools. I believe that we have an obligation to provide safety and public places which is why I introduce legislation requiring one way stop signs at every intersection of a block where a school exists be it public or private. Certainly such a measure would help to provide safer traffic condition for all children on their way to and from school. But the responsibility for what transpires in a private school building should be the obligation of the operators of that school. Public dollars should not be used to provide for conditions within private The money be required to bare the cost of schools. these school safety agents in private schools will

further constrict the already struggling City budget
that is not providing funds for construction of new
schools, not providing funds to reduction of class
size, not providing funds for much needed long and
overdue school repairs and forcing co-locations.

7 With that, I vote no on Intro. 65, I on the others.

This measure will come at a great cost to our public schools that are still owed \$2.3 billion in campaign for fiscal equity funding from the State. These types of budget decision should be part of the established City budget process and not rammed through legislatively. The Council should not be in the business of circumventing its own procedures. Furthermore many of these non-public schools and religious construction classes teach homophobia and transphobia to young people each and every day. are not subject to Council oversight and mostly exempt from New York City Union Right law. These are nonprofit schools that are struggling to pay their bills. second thing which I think is important to note is that this follows 50 years of legal precedent. Right now the City already pays for busing to get a child to and from school to make sure their safe. We pay for nursing to make sure that their safe. We pay for crossing guards to make sure that their safe. simply extending this one final point which is for school safety officers. The final statement that is factually inaccurate is well is, this doesn't take away any money from any other program. The reality is that in the City of New York quite frankly were flushed with cash, we have a \$78 ½ billion budget. Just a couple weeks ago we announced the new initiative that's important for HIV funding before that we announced another new initiative that's

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important for mental health funding, before that we announced another new initiative that's important for supportive housing, no one claimed then, nor should we claim now that this takes away money from any other process, sorry to bother you I just can't see the clock there and so the reality is that this is a funding decision that is simply made based on good government and based on a public priority which is to keep every single child safe. If that's not a good use of government funding, making sure that every parent has the peace of mind knowing that their child goes to school and is safe, quite frankly I'm not really sure what is a good use of public funding. thank all my colleagues, I wish you all a very Happy Holiday, a Happy Hanukkah and I proudly vote I on all.

People of all backgrounds and all faiths or no faith at all are welcomed to participate. And I also want to remind my colleagues in the Jewish Caucasus that will be meeting downstairs immediately following Stated. And I'd like to call my colleagues attention to a piece of legislation I'm introducing today, that Intro. 1018, now colleagues many of you know that for years really disgracefully, members of the NYD have often had to dig into their own pockets to pay to replace their bullet proof vest when they've become worn out, damaged or passed there warranty date. Thankfully recently the Mayor and the police commissioner have amended the policy so that officers are guaranteed new vest when all vest go out of

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warranty. But we want to go further and we want to enshrine this guarantee into law and this bill would mandate that vest be replaced after 5 years and importantly they'd be replaced if any significate damage is sustained from a bullet or other projectile or if the vest no longer fits due to changes in body weight or other reasons why the device might be damaged or unusable. And I invite all of my colleagues to join me again in supporting this important bill, Intro. 1018. Thank you.

PULBIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, Happy Hanukkah to you as well. Council Member Lander.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you Madam
Public Advocate I also want wish a Happy Hanukkah to
everyone these in many ways around the world are dark
and anxious times and sometimes lighting a candle can
help nudge miracles along, so I hope everyone will
join us and in the miracles vein I also want to
welcome prince Donovan III very cute pictures and I'm
so thrilled for he and his family. I would like to
call my colleagues attention to 2 Intros. Intro.
1016 and 1017, providing additional protection for
freelance and independent workers. Intro. 1017,
which some of you joined us to intro a few minutes

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ago is the freelance is in free act, right now when freelancers are victims of payment theft or late payment and 7 and 10 of them have been, they have no way to recover the payments that their due or to deal with the fact that their stiffed by employers sometimes 5,6,7 months even though the rent is due in 30 days. This would establish protections like W2 wage workers have. Giving them the opportunity to collect the wages the payments that are due them and creating a system where they make sure they collect Intro. 1016 would also support independent freelance contingent workers by making more clear that they are covered by the protections the New York City Human Rights Law gives to workers because that was drafted when we had more traditional understanding of employee updating this law to make clear that the human right law protection due to workers also belongs to workers regardless of whether they get a W2 or a 1099, whether there construction day laborers or Uber drivers, or freelance graphic designers, we all outta have the protection of the human rights law. So I hope people will sign on to vote Intros 1016 and 1017 and finally just want to encourage people Council Member Gibson and I have

bills regarding schools crossing guards and are doing 2 3 a hearing next week in her Committee on School 4 Crossing Guards initiative, I know it's near and dear

to many of my colleagues and I hope you will join us

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there, now I can't find the calendar, but it's on the 6 7 calendar, will see you there.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Miller. Council Member Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you Madam Public Advocate. First I wanted to wish all of my colleagues a Happy Hanukkah, Happy Holidays and of course congratulations to the new dad on the City Council. And I also wanted to share that my husband Allen and I are celebrating our 38th Anniversary this week on December 9th and I thank my husband for his love and support. I want to draw my colleagues attention to Reso. 920, a resolution introduced by Council Member Cumbo, Crowley and myself. Resolution 920 urges the US congress and the State of New York to support a woman right to choose and to oppose sex selective abortion band that perpetuate racial stereotype that undermine access to care. At a glance such band might sound like laws meant to further women's right but they do just the opposite.

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These bands exploit and promote and ugly stereotype about the Asian American community. Mainly that we do not value the lives of our girls. Between high rates of limited English proficiently and a complexed healthcare system, these bands will only heighten the barriers to accessing care and family planning services for the Asian American community. New York City is home to one of the largest Asian American population in the country. We must take a stand and demand that our colleagues on the State and federal level work to ensure that our communities have more opportunities and better choices for healthcare and not more restrictions. I want to thank Joan Provoli (sp) for her work in drafting this resolution and I urge my colleagues to sign on to Reso. 920. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you,
Council Member Cabrera.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: Thank you so much Madam Speaker, Madam Public Advocate. Good afternoon and thank you for the opportunity to briefly speak about the resolution I'm introducing today is Reso. 919, with Council Member King to officially recognize November as the Hip Hop month in

Hip hop is not just a style of music but 2 New York. 3 also a cultural art form that was born in the Bronx. 4 The birth and growth of hip hop is rooted deeply in 5 the social and economic disparities that plague residence in the South Bronx during the 1970s. 6 7 Several individuals in particular are remembered for 8 their contribution to creating hip hop culture; Clive Campbell, perhaps better known as DJ Kool Herc is considered the father of hip hop. A Jamaican 10 11 immigrant to New York he was the first DJ to 12 experiment with innovative rhythmic drum beats of 13 funk, soul and r&b. He made the practice of dubbing 14 fames and coined the term break dancer which by the 15 way I was one of them some years ago. African 16 Bombada, founder of the universal, I know that 17 shocking, but founder of the Universal Zulu Nation is 18 credited with coining the term hip hop which envision 19 as unifying force that will draw people away from 20 negativity. Since the release of the Sugar Hills 21 Gang first commercially successful hip hop hit 2.2 Rappers Delight over 40 years ago, hip hop has grown 2.3 to become a multi-billion dollar industry that imparts the fields of fashion, television and film, 24 design, sports, advertising among others. In 2001 a 25

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group of people gathered at the United Nations here in New York to sign the Hip Hop Declaration of Peace, recognizing hip hop as an international cultural of peace and prosperity as the Universal Zulu Nations, as the Universal Zulu Nation recognizes the official birth date of hip hop as November 12, 1974, I am proud to be introducing this resolution calling on the State of New York legislator and Governor Cuomo to recognized November as hip hop month in New York.

PULBIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you and we look forward to seeing you breakdance at the holiday party. Council Member Mendez.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you Madam
Public Advocate, my colleagues today I rise because
yesterday Dan Garodnick and I said farewell to a
friend of ours, Democratic district leader Charles
Buckwald (sp), he was not just a district leader, he
serviced on the community board, he was my dear
friend for nearly 2 decades and it is a big loss for
us as it is a loss for the lower east side. A few
things you should know about Charles. He was born
and raised in Brooklyn, moved to Manhattan later in
life, he loved politics and baseball and those are

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things that we shared and often talked together. I

even use to go to Met games with him cause he was a

big Met fan, so Charles you will be missed and from

this Yankees fan to you I say let's go Mets.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, may he rest in peace and Council Member Cornegy.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Madam Public Advocate, I'd like to say on behalf of myself and my wife I'd like to make our announcement which is we will not be having any more children but I did, I wanted to take a moment to recognize Angelica Morris, a student a Baruch College studying with former Council Member Steve DeVenezia. Angelica is a full-time student in her last semester who also works long hours at JetBlue, a job that requires a very long commute from Central Brooklyn to JFK. Sometimes she comes straight to my office from her airport in her uniform displaying the determination and characteristics so many working students across the City have. She's been enthusiastic, steadfast and contributed a great deal to the subject, to special projects and subject matter, such as getting the word out about the gifted and talented test and connecting our (inaudible) communities to the Museum of Natural

History. Angelica I hope you've learned as much as you contributed during your time at City Council, please stay in touch and best of luck.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. You have six beautiful and talented and smart children, god bless you. Council Member King for a vote.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KING: I vote I.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you and back to general discussion which will end with the beautiful Council Member Debbie Rose.

Public Advocate. My colleagues I want to thank today publically my intern Michael Posca (sp) who's a student at the college of Staten Island and who's here today to observe our Stated Meeting and to get a taste of democracy and action and this is his very last week with my office and we will sorely miss him. Michael has been working in my district office and has proved to be a valuable member of my team doing constitutes service intake work, performing Council staff data entry, answering phones and basically helping out wherever he was needed and you know in district offices that's a lot. So Michael I want to thank you in front of all of my colleagues for all of

your help and I hope that you won't be a stranger,

keep in touch, thank you Madam Public Advocate.

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: And now the very last, Council Member Miller.

COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: Thank you Madam Public Advocate. First I'd like to as the Speaker said that today is December 7<sup>th</sup> the infamous Pearl Harbor Day and I'd like to acknowledge the works of Dorie Miller (sp). Dorie Miller was a cook on a naval ship that was attached in Pearl Harbor after coming from the load deck and saving some of his fellow shipmates. He maned the gun which he was not trained on and shot down Japanese air fighters which saved the rest of the ship, so certainly we want to remember that and then I want to congratulate Council Member Reynoso and his Grand Avenue Campus defeated my alma mater Erasmus Halls yesterday in the PSAL Football Championship. Yes at Yankee Stadium, it was really exciting and if there was any consolation Grand Avenue had the first African American head coach to ever win a championship at the PSAL and we will see you again next year, thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you and may Jacquline Berrien the former Chair of EEOC, may she

with the exception of Intro. 65-A, which was adopted

and no abstentions and now to close, the Speaker

Public Advocate and again I want to thank my colleagues I really do respect and am really proud of how this body conduct itself, particularly when we're engaging in conversations that may get heated at times so I just want to commend everyone for that an again next Stated Meeting is Wednesday, December 16<sup>th</sup>. We have our holiday celebration on that day, the City Council, I would encourage all of my colleagues to attend and to bring your staff if you have not RSVP'd, to please do so, it should be a great evening. So thank you all very much and again that ends this Stated Meeting, at about 2:50. Meeting adjourned.
