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SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Madam

Public Advocate and I want to say good afternoon to

all my colleagues. I want to ask everyone to please

stand for a moment.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: All rise.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Were here today obviously in friendship and kinship and were going to be going on later on to have our holiday celebration but it is with a very heavy heart that we are here also to recognize that last week the Council lost a member of our staff. I know a lot of her colleagues are here with us today. I want to recognize that they've joined us in this Chamber. Savina Derinzo (sp) of the Administrative Service Division passed away on Friday. Savina joined the Council in 2001 where she administered and coordinated with the Mayor's office and our Commission to set up tours of City Hall. She oversaw the day to day facility management for this City Council. She is survived by her children; Anthony, Samantha and Vincent. Our thoughts and prayers are with the family. definitely always is hard the death of a loved one in particular times like this, so we definitely extend our thoughts and prayers to her family, to the loved

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ones, to her colleagues, all of us here in the Council mourn her loss, I want to ask everyone to please join me in a moment of silence for Savina.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you my colleagues. Today we're going to voting on two bills to improve compliance with our City's open data laws. Agencies are required to post much of their data on the open data portal but too often data is so left out. For example, until recently data on millions of yellow taxi trips were available to individuals through a freedom of information law request but not to the wider public on the open data portal. to the efforts of Council Member Vacca and diligent staff, that data and other missing data are now available to the public. But with these two bills were helping agencies better identify their own public data sets. This Council remains committed to making government as assessable and transparent to New Yorkers as possible. On the staff end I want to thank Brad Reed, Ken Grace, Nathaniel Toth, Jeffery Baker and Ed Adkins and I'd like to ask Council Member Vacca to say a few words followed by Council Member Palma.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Thank you Madame Speaker and with the passage of these 2 bills today and the 5 bills we passed 3 weeks ago concerning open We in this Council have made a significate contribution to increase transparency and today to further assure accountability. The legislation I have introduced concerns accountability, making sure that City Agencies are not only posting information as they should but that there's also an aspect where there can be enforcement and compliance with open data regulations so that the public is assured that they are getting online as much information as they should be getting under the law concerning City's policies, complaints and programs and anything in the open data portal that concerns statistics, information and transparency. So this represents the 7<sup>th</sup> bill in pass 3 weeks that the Technology Committee has put together concerning open data, I want to thank the Speaker, I want to thank the Speaker, I want to thank Brad Reid our Committee Counsel and Stacy Gardner, my Deputy Chief of Staff especially. I do want to acknowledge very honestly that these open data bills are not really sexy but I will say that these bills today are a little more

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exciting then what we passed 3 weeks ago. They don't reach the top 10 hippary threshold but I think that we're doing governments works and governments work is often not excitable and it's often not really controversial but I think that were doing what should be done and I think that were setting a... a... pace that perhaps other governments throughout the State and throughout the Country will look to replicate in the years ahead. Thank you Madame Public Advocate.

Member, Council Member Palma. Well congratulations on the bill. Next the Council will be voting on the Land Use proposal to develop the Brooklyn Heights Public Library. This is a proposal that will strengthen Brooklyn public library system as a whole while providing much needed updates to branch in a growing neighborhood. This project will deliver a much needed \$40 million infusion into the library system to address needs across the Borough while also building a new state of the art branch library in Brooklyn Heights and a new library for the Dumbo Vinegar Hill Farrigot houses neighborhood.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Quiet, quiet in the balcony please, quiet in the balcony.

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SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: I want to congratulate Council Member Levin on all of his hard work. I know he's really, really took this seriously and drove a hard bargain on behalf of his constitutes. On the staff side before I allow Council Member Levin to speak is Brian Paul, Dylan Casey and Amy Levightan, thank you for your hard work and Council Member Levin if you want to say a few words. 

much Madame Speaker. I want to thank you as well as our Land Use Chair, David Greenfield, our
Subcommittee Chair, temporary Subcommittee Chair Andy
Cohen and Subcommittee Chair Inez Dickens as well as our Land Use staff Roger Mann, Brian Paul, Amy
Levightan, Dylan Casey. My staff Glomani Bravo-Lopez and especially Rami Metal, my Chief of Staff and
Deputy Chief of Staff, Casey Adams. I want to also acknowledge our partners in the de Blasio administration for helping in negotiating this project as well as the Brooklyn Public Library
leadership, Ms. Johnson, David Wallace and all of their staff as well as the library board and David Cramer and Hudson Companies for working with us.

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Ladies and gentlemen this has been a very difficult process. It has been a very controversial project and... and it has a lot of people have taken a lot of time and effort to... to put in their opinion on the matter and to work hard, including those that are here today to oppose this vote. I want to thank everybody who has put in all their time including citizens for the defending libraries, including the Brooklyn Heights Association and... and everybody that has taken the time to work on this. This project as presented today is a significantly better project then was initially proposed. I'm not going to go through all of the details but I will hit the main The project when proposed was roughly 21,500 square feet for a library space through the Councils negotiations we have expanded that to 26,500 square feet and in addition for the very first time since 1983 we will be having a new library branch in the Borough of Brooklyn in the neighborhood of Dumbo Vinegar Hill and Farrigat, that is very first new neighborhood branch, roughly about 5,00 square feet but the first neighborhood branch since 1983 and that is significate. In addition, the ... the new library in Brooklyn Heights will have 3,000 square feet

2 dedicated to extensive business and career services, 3 significate business career services. That will be a 4 significate upgrade for what is there currently. Business and career services that are geared towards a new economy in the 21st century and will be 6 7 available as part of and hopefully link into the 8 Brooklyn Tech Triangle which include Dumbo, the Brooklyn Navy Yard and Downtown Brooklyn. addition, the developer the City Department of 10 11 Education have also agreed to a new 9,00 square foot STEM lab that will available to students primarily in 12 13 district 13 but maybe available to students 14 throughout the City and this is a first in New York 15 City, the first time that we have dedicated state of 16 the art STEM lab and were going to be working with 17 the Department of Education to find best practices 18 throughout the County to have this be an innovative 19 and State of the art and cutting edge facility. 20 We're very excited about that opportunity as well. 21 In addition, we have negotiated so that the maximum area medium income... income limit for this development 2.2 2.3 for the affordable units in this development will maximize at 125% of AMI. Prior to this they were at 24 165% of AMI and we have negotiated that would not 25

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exceed 125% of AMI in addition to the 80% AMI and 60% of AMI affordable units and two other points I want to mention, one is that the programming here at Brooklyn Public Library in Brooklyn Heights will now be 7 days a week so long as there is 7 day week service at any of the neighborhood branches in Brooklyn. This branch will have 7 day a week service with as robust programming as exist throughout the entire system and lastly as a matter of public policy in... in... in looking toward what is right value for this property, we have introduced a participation clause so that if the developer exceeds a profit equal to or more than 19% of an internal rate of return that 25% of that profit above that 19% IRR will be recaptured by the Brooklyn Public Library There's a small (inaudible) and that will be system. less \$1.5 million to help lower the AMI's but beyond that what that is saying is that if the developer does very well on this project and it makes a significate profit, then the City will realize a portion of that profit. And lastly ladies and gentlemen I just want to acknowledge two people that are here today in the audience that did have big influence on me and how I approached this project and

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that Rachel and Oldest who are the two librarians of Brooklyn Public Library in the Brooklyn Heights branch and unsolicited and... and not in any way as a political endeavor, they encouraged me to vote in favor of this based strictly on a library from a library perspective. They as librarians know the work that they do, they know it better than anybody else and they both see this as an opportunity to better the services for the people that they work with every single day and so you know I couldn't ask for a more informed group of people to advise me on this and I want to just thank them for their input and thank you all very much and I encourage my colleagues to vote aye.

Member and congratulations. Today we're also voting on two bills, the bills on our efforts to make City streets safer for pedestrians, cyclist and motorist. This session we've passed 20 bills aimed at increasing safety through our vision 0 initiatives and today were building on that with two bills focused on hit and run crashes. Eliminating hit and run crashes is one of the biggest and most important challenges we face as part of vision zero. This year

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there were over 38,000 hit in runs in New York City. More than 4,000 times a driver fled the scene after injuring another person and 29 times this year the driver fatally struck another person a left the scene without contacting the police or getting their victim These numbers are staggering and simply help. unacceptable, so the Council is doing everything in its power to put an end to those avoidable tragedies. One of these bills will significantly increase the civil penalties for leaving the scene of a traffic collision. The other bill will require the New York Police Department to provide a quarterly report on the number of hit and run incidents so we can track the progress that were making in reducing the number of hit in runs in our city. Our goal under vision zero has been to reduce the number or traffic fatalities in New York to zero. As I said when we passed our first package of vision zero bills last year, this won't be something we can achieve overnight. In achieving our goal will require ongoing diligence. With these two bills were taking the next step towards making our streets safer for everyone and in the year to come, will continue to look for ways to improve street safety across the 5

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Boroughs. I want to thank Kelly Taylor, Gufar Zaylof (sp), Jonathan Masorino (sp), (inaudible) and Lyle

Frank for all of their work on this and now I will

ask our Majority Leader Jimmy Van Brammer, the lead

sponsor to say a few words and then followed by our

Transportation Chair Ydanis Rodriguez.

MAJORITY LEADER VAN BRAMMER: very much Madame Speaker indeed we are passing two very important pieces of legislations that I'm extremely proud to sponsor along with our Transportation Committee Chair, Ydanis Rodriguez. want to direct all of our colleagues attention to the front of the room where Ms. Martha Puntacahas (sp) is here once again to honor the life of her son, Louis Bravo a 19 year old young man full of life who was killed when a car struck him in Woodside Queens, the person who hit Louis Bravo left the scene of that crash and Martha has been an inspiration to me and to so many of us continuing to press for justice for her son and for all of the victims of crashes in New York City. At our Committee hearing last week the number was revealed for the first time, nearly 40,000 hit and runs this year alone so far. 4,000 hit and run crashes that involve another human being which means

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that over 4,000 this year alone someone hit another human being with their car, knew they hit someone and left the scene of that crash. That is unforgivable and unacceptable. So today we pass two pieces of legislation; Intro. 603 which will establish the most severe civil penalties, the most severe that we can as a City Council install, \$20,000 when the life is taken by a repeat hit and run driver and were going to pass Intro. 604 which is going to increase significantly the reporting requirement from the NYPD so now that the quarterly reports on serious hit and runs investigated by the Collision Investigation Squad will now include information on how often the NYPD issues a notice of violation for civil penalties. The public will also receive annual reports on a number of property damage hit and run complaints, the number of hit and run crashes resulting in injury and how many of those cases resulted in arrest. And just in case there are some folks who wonder if they are repeat hit and run drivers and how many could there be, I offer the case of Jack Montobono (sp) a driver who hit and killed a pedestrian in 2013 at an intersection in Manhattan only to know that, that driver hit and killed a

pedestrian at the exact same intersection in 2008,
that driver killed two people at the same
intersection 5 years apart, left the scene of the
crash in both cases, that driver was subsequently
arrested a $3^{\rm rd}$ time after leaving the scene of a
crash while driving while intoxicated. So this is a
very serious serious issue, I'm proud that we passed
two bills last year and that we come back again to
strengthen the hit and run victims act and I want to
recognize all of the staff, Matt Wallace my Chief of
Staff, Steven Miller, my Legislative and Budget
Director, Jason (inaudible) my Deputy Chief of Staff,
Kelly Taylor and Jonothan Masorino from the
Transportation Committee. This is not meant to put a
value on a life, we could never do that, but we can
make a statement that we will not tolerate this in
those who committee these heinous acts will be
punished to the fullest extent of the law. Now
Martha whose become a friend of ours, her primary
language is Spanish so allow me to say a few words
about Martha in espaniol.

MAJORITY LEADER VAN BRAMMER: Thank you.

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COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: First I would like to say that a driver who hits someone and leave the scene knowing that, that person is bleeding because he or she doesn't have medical attention is not indifferent from act of terrorist and I think that we need to ask the State to provide more tools so that the DA will be able to prosecute every irresponsible driver that every week take the life away of a family who will never see that person coming back home. It's one person per week that is dying in the street of New York because of hit and run. Hit and run is epidemic that a Council lead by Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito, my colleagues, Mayor de Blasio and his administration our determine to eradicate. Members of the Transportation Committee were shocked two weeks ago to hear that there have been nearly 40,000 hit and run crashes on our streets. 4,000 of which injured a pedestrian, cyclist or other driver. With Intro. 603 and 604 passing today, we expect the NYD to be more diligent

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in pursuing open cases and holding accountable those who commit the awful crime of leaving others to die as they speed away. We also want to let hit and run drivers know when the NYPD find you, you will be paying more now than ever before. This penalty can reach up to \$20,000 so we urge you to think twice before fleeing the scene by increasing this penalty we also know that there's no money that can bring back the life of the loved one. I also want to express to our partners and government at the State level we take action today because there continue to persist loophole that make no sense in our criminal law. I ask that you focus on increasing criminal penalties to hit and run violations so that drunk drivers do not have an incentive to flee the scene of a crash as they now do. I want to dedicate this bill to many families of victims who have suffered preventable tragedies and pray that Ms. Orvanya Nelson(sp) a victim of a hit and run crash this pass Sunday where she saved the life of her 5 year old niece by sacrificing also fully recover from her injuries and that the person who hit her suffered the full force of the law and also we are with you Martha, thank you Speaker.

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2 SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Ydanis
3 and I apologize going back to the issue of the, of
4 the rezoning I want to ask the Chair of the Land Use

5 | Committee David Greendfield to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank vou Madame Speaker and I ask the Speaker to give me some time from her time to weigh in today. I don't always weigh in on these projects in a public way but I thought it was important as the Chair of the Land Use Committee to clarify some issue especially considering the reaction that we've had here today. I think it's important to put in context what's happening today with the Brooklyn Library. The first think to understand is that the reality is that our public library are underfunded and have been for decades and so the Brooklyn Public Library have a very practical problem which is that libraries across Brooklyn are crumbling and they need the resources to pay for it and they simply cannot hope and pray those resources are going to fall from the sky and as a result there engaging in a process which is an innovative process that will provide them with a least \$40 million in new funding to improve and to quite frankly to build new library in other members

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districts throughout Brooklyn. We have tradition here of allowing Council Members to speak and we're certainly happy to hear you afterwards but we'd respect that you hope that you'd respect us as well, thank you. And so the reality is that the Brooklyn Public Library has to engage in this process in order to help libraries throughout Brooklyn. So once you start from that prospective you then have to look at the question of what's happening, it's important to note and I think this is a miss (inaudible) because I've gotten tweets and emails about this as well as, there's a missed impression being put out there as if thought the library is selling the library and closing it down and not replacing it and now of that is true, the reality is that under the deal that Council Member Steve Levin has negotiated and I have to tell you that I've been involved in dozens of deals in the two years that I've been Chair of the Land Use Committee and this may be one of the best deals that we've ever had thanks to the intervention and the insistence of Council Member Levin. There is going to be a brand new library in that location. will be a newer better library. There will also be another library in Council Member Levin's district,

2	there will be more money for the library assistant.
3	There will be more programming at those libraries.
4	There will be more service at those libraries. There
5	will also be an addition STEM funding, more
6	affordability and more affordable housing. I respect
7	opposition and I want those who oppose the deal to
8	know that as a result of your insistence this has
9	become a better deal. It is not always a zero sum
10	game about win or lose and you shouldn't look at it
11	that way. You had complaints, you had concern, your
12	Council Member took those into consideration and
13	worked 18 hours a day for the last few weeks to try
14	to address as many of those as possible and because
15	of Council Member Steve Levin we have a much better
16	deal. It's a good deal for the community, it's a
17	good deal for Brooklyn, it's a good deal for the City
18	of New York and I want to thank Council Member Levin
19	for his leadership and for working hard to make sure
20	that this is the best deal that New York City and
21	get, thank you very much.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Yes and...

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Quiet, quiet in the balcony we will not tolerate out bust.

2	SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Yeah no out bust
3	and again thank you Council Member Greenfield and
4	congratulations to Council Member Levin. We also
5	know that ULURP processes can get a little
6	contentious in our district but we do the best that
7	we can and in the interest of our constitutes and
8	Council Member Levin has done an exemplary job of
9	really striking a very good balance here and bringing
10	a lot of resources back to his constitutes into his
11	community so he is to be commended, thank you. And
12	finally today were going to be strengthening our City
13	Human Rights law with a bill that make caregivers a
14	protected class, protecting them from workplace
15	discrimination. Caregiver status would apply to
16	anyone who primarily responsible for caring for a
17	child or a disabled adults. This is a bill I
18	committed to passing in February during my State of
19	the City Address because we can never stop working
20	toward our goal of creating more equality and justice
21	for everyone in New York City. Caregivers make
22	personal sacrifices to improve the lives of their
23	loved ones and they shouldn't have to face
24	discrimination from employers or prospective
25	employers because of this. New York City is a place

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where no one should be denied their rights. With today's bill were taking another step toward that and letting those who care for others know that we have their backs. I want to thank Council Member Rose who has been consistent and very diligent on this issue for her leadership. She is the sponsor of this bill and I would ask Council Member Rose to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you Speaker Mark-Viverito. I am really excited to address you today as the Council votes on Intro. 108-A, the Caregivers Discrimination Bill which will prohibit employment discrimination based on an individual's actual or perceived status as a caregiver. Thank you to Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito for highlighting this bill in her State of the City Address earlier this year and working to ensure it's passage. you to Chair Mealy for her support and moving this bill along and to the legislative Council Alesha Brown, Policy Analyst, Rachel Cordero and Finance Staff, Eisha Wright for their hard and diligent work on this legislation. Further thanks to my tireless Council and Legislative and Budget Director, Edwina Martin for all of her help in bringing this vital

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2 legislation to the floor. I also wish to thank A 3 Better Balance, AARP and the New York City Progressive Caucus, Co-Chaired by Council Members 4 Reynoso and Richards and all of the advocates who worked so hard to bring us to this point. Last but 6 7 not least I want to thank Borough, Manhattan Borough 8 President Gail Brewer. We have been working together for many years to get this bill to this point. Thanks as well to her Director of Policy and Special 10 11 Projects, Shulamet Warren, for her dedication to this 12 Truly it takes a village to create and pass a cause. 13 bill so many worked on this legislation because it 14 will have a dramatic impact on many, many New 15 Yorkers. I've pushed for this because I believe that 16 no worker should face negative consequences at work 17 because of their familiar responsibilities. 18 reality is that many workers juggle responsibilities 19 of work and of caring for children or other family 20 members. Many workers are afraid of losing their 21 jobs because of their family responsibilities. our City the majority of parents including mothers of 2.2 2.3 young children are in the workforce. The population of disabled elderly adults is projected to grow 24 significantly in the next 20 years. And the

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responsibility for their care will fall predominately on people who are in the workforce. I have personally experienced the difficulty of balancing work and caregiving and it is especially true for those of us who find us to be a part of the sandwich generation, taking care of children and elderly parents at the same time. Intro. 108-A will protect caregivers from being treated differently than their colleagues who are not caregivers. It would prevent employers from discriminating against caregivers in hiring, termination and providing compensation or terms, conditions or privileges of employment. enacted, Intro. 108-A will be landmark legislation. Highlighting once again why New York City remains to be the best place to both work and live in the United States and possibly in the World, thank you.

Member. I want to focus on two things right now. You know today for me personally it is a bitter sweet day, it's a bitter sweet day, I'm really happy and it's sweet because the Congress has finally included Zadroga 911 Health and Compensation Programs in the Congressional Omnibus Bill. This bill should give right we should clap for that.

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SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: This bill will give or 72,000 first responders and survivors in New York City and around the Country long overdue piece of mind knowing that they will have access to the vital healthcare and support they need. So I want to thank the New York Congressional Delegation, our first responders, those who responded to the horrific tragedy of 911 and terror attack, deserve to be treated well and that is what that this bill has been asking for and I'm glad to see if finally there. I want to thank the Congressional Delegation of New York for championing this effort and for really being strong, strong voice on behalf of our City. bitter end today I'm extremely heartbroken. It is to me unconscionable that Congressional Republicans refused to include in the year-end spending bill meaningful provisions to allow Puerto Rico to restructure its debt. This is something that is very personal to me. My mother continues to live on the There are many of us that have direct links but this should be of concern to every single person. Public Advocate and just too briefly state my opposition to this resolution. You ever wish you had the opportunity to go back in time and do something differently? Maybe do something a little bit better, given a second opportunity? That's the opportunity we have on Willets Point. The Courts have handed us a gift and opportunity to break from the development policies of the last administration, the last Council. The last administration didn't believe in affordable housing like we do and that's why the Council settled for affordable housing on this project that wouldn't kick in until 2026, if ever.

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The last administration didn't believe in living
wages, that why we had settle for vague aspirations
instead of concrete requirements. Many of us want to
get a better deal. Real affordable housing that will
actually happen in our lifetime. Real living wages
for retail workers. This resolution is like the claw
of the Bloomberg administration reaching up from the
grave, forcing us to accept its old affordable
housing in living wage policy. I'm going to be
voting no on this resolution and I urge my colleagues
to do likewise.

The Community Violence Prevention Act would enable an independent body of experts to review the City's efforts to promote upward mobility in communities afflicted by violence and design a comprehensive strategy that would deliver more direct and immediate benefits to our disadvantage. The plan itself would nicely complement the community, police and initiative that is already been implemented to greater effects in many districts. It will also incentivize an honest and peaceful way of life. thank my Co-Sponsors for their support on this bill as well as Erica Ford and Life Camp which is one of the Keepsfire (sp) groups for over one year with now shooting in our area. I would like to thank all of the rest of the advocacy groups, our children and families cannot wait so I urge immediate passage of Intro. 1040, thank you Madame.

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COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Thank you public advocate. I really want to first start off by thanking all of my colleagues that were present with me today at the launch of the Council Anti-Gun Violence Initiative Art as a Catalyst for Change. want to thank Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito, Council Members Julissa Ferreras-Copeland, Majority Leader Jimmy Van Brammer, Council Members Fernando Cabrera and Jumaane Williams and many others who heated the call for more resources and communities deeply impacted by gun violence. According to the daily news the number of shooting reported within the City of New York as of December 6<sup>th</sup> was 1,061 which reflected a 3.2% decrease from 1,296 shooting within the same time frame from last year. However, the number of murders have risen from 5.5% from 307 to 326, additional 49% of gun violence is gang related and predominantly in communities of color. I'm so excited today because today we're allowed the opportunity to utilize the arts as a tool kit in the solution for ending gun violence in our communities. So I'm very proud that so many of my colleagues were

there. This was an opportunity for us to infuse
\$720,000 to provide art education and art programming
for our young people to channel their talents and
resources. I would also like to draw your attention
to Intro. 1040 and I applaud Council Member Williams
and Wills for introducing a resolution calling upon
Congress to fund gun violence, research and a bill to
create a commission in the City of New York that
would identify the root causes of violence in the 5
Boroughs. We can no longer continue to do business
as usual when our communities particular our youth
are caught in the cross fire and addition to that we
want to urge Governor Cuomo to match our anti-gun
violence commitment on the State level as well. I
also want to draw attention to legislation that ${\tt I'm}$
introducing that I would very much appreciate my
colleagues support on, it's an introduction of a bill
to create a sexual education task force. The task
force would be comprised of 7 members including a
parent, family member from a public school, student.

Just for 17 some numbers since 911 3,380 Americans have died from 18 19 terrorist attacks in the Country and abroad. 20 people have died from gun violence in this Country alone, that means for each American that died from 21 2.2 terrorism from here and across the world a 1,000 2.3 people have died from gun violence in this Country. It is appalling that we continue to do nothing, not 24 say the same things about terrorism about gun 25

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violence as we do with terrorism, if a life is a life how can we compare those numbers and continue to deny what we need to do to deal with gun violence in this Country, so I call on everyone to please support these pieces of legislation and I do also want to say rest in peace to Savina, she was such a great person, she lovely, tough you can tell she was from New York City but she had a wonderful personality, I'm going to miss her and congratulations to Lyle Frank as well.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, Council Member Levine.

Intro. 1037 would require that the property owner should not be subject to a civil or criminal penalty when the violation issued is for a building conditions awaiting repair by a City Disaster Recovery Program and any such penalties already imposed may be refunded. It is outrageous that there are property owners waiting for recovery assistance 3 years after the storm who are being subject to City agency violations. Shame on us for not helping them rebuild and yet fining them during their most vulnerable times and so I strongly ask my colleagues to support me to wave these penalties and to reimburse them for any penalties with regards to the recovery program and please support me in Intro. 1037, thank you bye.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you, Council Member Cabrera.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: Thank you so 3 much Madame Public Advocate if somebody can do me a 4 favor and just ask Council Member Rose if she can just step out for a second, I'm the last one speaking, I just wanted to share something about her 6 7 and I would appreciate that. But I want to accentuate and also echo sentiment here where Madame 8 Speaker regrading Puerto Rico, I was raised part of my life in Puerto Rico in Catalina, Puerto Rico and 10 11 have family there who are very, extremely concerned 12 about their future. For those who don't know they 13 were actually placed in a now win situation, in a now 14 win situation and so I know there are people out 15 there that would like to blame them for their 16 situation but it's our time for us to come to their 17 help and to have a fair process of really helping 18 them to what they're going through. Maria I wanted 19 to, today I'm the last one and speaking I have a 20 minute here but I wanted to dedicate it to you, I 21 wanted to thank you. I know when I first came as an 2.2 elected official, no experience in politics 2.3 whatsoever, I've never been involved in government, you sat right next to me right here in the back to my 24 25 left and you took me under your wings and many of us

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here have spoken about the fact that you made us all better but I want to take it a little farther and deeper in the fact that you helped many of us to take the next step. You believed in me when I didn't even see back then to become the BLAC Co-Chair and not only did you inspire me to do that but you actually fought for it and there is no better person that I could think of to have as a fighter to fight with alongside and to have you and you have fought for your community and I want to thank the staff that stood with you all those years as well and with that thank you, we bless you, will continue to pray for you and now you get do your real job and the super job and that is to be a mommy and to be a grandparent. God bless you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you and as we close I'd like to invite my colleagues to sign-on to Intro. 1034 a bill that requires the registration of vacant buildings at a time when we face a homeless crisis by identifying vacant property, the City can be proactive about working with owners of vacant property to put that property to good use. We can also be sure of eliminating properties that often represent neglect and blight to their neighborhoods.

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I know that Council Member Williams and Rodriguez are also introducing related bills and I look forward to working with both of them to improve the City's policies on vacant property and I'm sure that we are doing everything we can to develop viable and affordable housing and now to close the Speaker of the City Council ladies and gentlemen Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito, thank you very much.
