2	CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning. My
3	name is Council Member I. Daneek Miller; I'm the
4	Chair of the Committee on Civil Service and Labor.
5	I'd like to thank everyone for coming out,
6	particularly on this short notice; I'm extremely
7	pleased that the committee here and I expect that the
8	full Council will vote today on the Grocery Worker
9	Retention Act, proposed Int. 0632-B. This bill was
10	originally proposed after 9/11; the Council passed a
11	similar law in 2002, called the Displaced Building
12	Worker Protection Act, which was Local Law 39 of
13	2002. This law requires that a new building owner
14	must retain building service staff for 90 days after
15	it is purchased, it then must evaluate them and offer
16	continued employment to those who they deem
17	satisfactory. Although we do not have hard data on
18	this law over the past 13 years, our friends at 32BJ
19	inform us that it has been a success.
20	I note that the National Labor Board last

I note that the National Labor Board last year found that new owners of several properties were in violation of this law.

Grocery workers however have not been afforded the same right as building workers, while the State of California last year passed such

2 protections for grocery workers statewide, New York

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3 City should at least provide such benefits to our

4 local grocery workers. We watched haplessly last

5 year as bankruptcy of A&P unfolded with the company

6 also running Pathmark, Food Emporium, Waldbaum's,

9 hope that the Grocery Worker Retention Act will be

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Permission to explain my vote. Grocery store owners provide important jobs that are accessible to local community residents, they also provide a service that community members rely on, one that's not easily replaced by similar, more distant or more high end businesses or new models like grocery delivery services. Today the threatened loss of supermarkets is causing real panic and protests from Park Slope to Fort Greene to the Bronx, our city is responding to this need by providing significant incentives for developers to include full-service grocery stores in their properties through the Fresh Program. recognition of just how important local markets are for families, seniors and community members without cars. Now this bill is only directed toward grocery businesses that are undergoing an ownership change to remain in business, profitability serving the community where they're already located. I'm not comfortable substituting the expertise of this body,

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR rigorous thought it is, for that of these business owners who are already doing a great deal of good of a type only the private sector could meet. This is a bill with excellent intentions that's been around for quite some time and I'm sympathetic to the goals of the labor groups who are also expert in this area, however, I don't believe that this is the right moment in our city for this change in this industry; therefore I will be abstaining. 

COMMITTEE CLERK: By a vote of 4 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative and 1 abstention, Int. 0632-B has been adopted.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I'd like to thank the members of the committee for not just their support, but for their positive consideration and their thoughtful consideration over the past year on this important piece of legislation as we move forward and I look forward to bringing it to the general body this afternoon. Thank you so much; the hearing's now adjourned.
