PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Today's Land Use call ups are adopted by a vote of 45 in the affirmative and 0 in the negative. Quiet in the Chambers please, and now will hear communication from the Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito.

Public Advocate. Before we begin today I want to take a moment to acknowledge last night events. In the Bronx around 8 p.m. last night 2 NYPD officers were shot while in the line of duty. Many of us were hearing about it as we were attending the Mayor's State of the City. This was an egregious act of violence that we will not tolerate, if you don't tolerate violence in particularly you're not against the men and women of the NYPD. Today were joining all New Yorkers in wishing the quick and full recovery of both officers who exemplify the best of

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our City and we honor and respect their courage and commitment to New Yorkers. We all know about the sacrifice that officers make each and every day to keep us safe and they always deserve our support.

This week New York City lost also a... a lost a great young man in an up and coming journalist of color, Michael Feeney (sp). Michael began working at the Daily New in New York, 2009 were he covered my neighborhood of El Vaho East Harlem. He was elected President of New York's chapter of the National Association of Black Journalist in 2011. He was set to begin his dream job as a report for CNN but tragically passed away on Sunday, so definitely want to recognize the work and our prayers are with Michael's family and friends at this time.

Before we get to today's business I'd like to bring also everyone's attention the crane collapse that just happened not far from here in Margaret Chin's district. While were still getting details we obviously have a very hazardous situation near, nearby on Worth Street. I want to thank all the first responders in our City who were at the scene of the collapse helping others. That is something that already Margaret and I have spoken

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about obviously we have to figure out what did we learn from a tragic incidents like this. Our thoughts and prayers are with everyone there and

wishing them, those that are hurt the best.

On our agenda today the Council's going to voting a legislation to coning 42 streets through fairs and public places. There include streets and parks named for community leaders, clergy, dedicated public servants and in the case of detective Randall Holderway (sp) and NYPD Officer who bravely serviced our City and sacrificed his life to keep his fellow New Yorkers safe. Detective Holder serviced in the police department for 5 years. All those 5 years were served in the district that I represented, East Harlem and last October he was shot and killed in the line of duty. The brave men and women New York City Police Department put their lives on the line in order to protect us for Detective Holder, this tribute in the Bronx will be a small yet enduring token of our gratitude. Additionally, will be voting on legislation requiring the Department of Parks and Recreation to establish discounted annual membership fees, a department run recreation centers for seniors, youth and people with disabilities. When I

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chaired the Committee on Parks and Recreation we did a lot of advocacy on recreational centers and making sure the fees were affordable for New Yorkers in need of recreation opportunities. This legislation follows in that same mission. This City Parks

Department has a variety of quality programming for all of our residents and this bill will help ensure that everyone has access to them. I definitely want to thank on the staff side; Chris Atoria, Patrick

Mulvihill, Ed Adkins and Jeff Baker, Chair of the Parks Committee, Council Member Mark Levine is the sponsor of this legislation and I would like him to say a few words.

Speaker and thank you for carrying the torch on this important issue for so many years. Our Parks

Department, 35 recreation centers are incredible resources with everything from indoor pools to basketball courts, art studios, dance studios, weight rooms, even libraries and there used by no fewer than 3.5 million people every year. They are especially important for 2 key groups; our veterans and New Yorkers with disabilities. Many of whom need to use the facilities of our rec centers for physical

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rehabilitation or generally to maintain their health and many of whom can benefit from the social interaction that our rec centers offer. To many veterans and people with disabilities are living in isolation because of physical or emotional challenges. But there's a barrier, memberships cost \$150 a year and for those in poverty that can be insurmountable. Shamefully, that applies to too many of our veterans and people with disabilities. fewer than 70,000 veterans it's estimated relied on food pantries and soup kitchens last year, that's almost 1/3 of all the vets in the City and 30% of New Yorkers with disabilities aren't employed, that's many times the rate for the population at large. to help lower the barriers for these important groups our bill would require that there be a 75% discount off the standard rec center fee in any park rec For veterans, for people with disabilities center. and for good measure of the bill codifies existing discounts for young people and seniors. I want to thank the Speaker for her leadership on this issue, I want to thank a colleague, Council Member Eric Ulrich who chairs the Committee on Veterans Affairs who's a partner in this effort and I want to thank Chris

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2 Artoria, Patrick Mulvihill, my Legislative Director,

3 Amy Slattery and the entire legislative affairs team

4 for their help on this bill, thank you.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Chair Levine. We will also be voting to set the salaries of all the Cities elected officials, including Council Members. Today were also considering a package of bills that would implement crucial and profound ethics reforms long recommended by good government groups. Together these reforms will increase transparency and fairness, reduce the potential for conflicts of interest and improve the process for considering future changes in compensation for local elected officials. bills will make the position of a Council Member full time and excepts for some narrow exceptions eliminate outsider and then come underscoring the dedication and high ethical standards Council service demands. We spent a considerable amount of time discussing the restriction of outside income and the outside income reform were passing today are ground breaking. is an issue that were going to continue to monitor and I'm sure there will be much discussion in the future. We also ending the practice of providing

To dully give credit where it is due, without her progressive leadership none of today's reforms let alone previous reforms would be possible. In a city most famous for (inaudible) we've come a long way from taminay hall, especially in this Council. Editorial boards, advocates and the people have demanded an end to the corruptive influences of campaign dollars, conflict of interest, member items, outside income lulu's and more. The City Council has created a model public matching campaign finance system in the country and a conflict of interest board that continues to rule out corruption to this day. In our first year in the Council we created an equitable and transparent formula for the distribution of discretionary funding for Council Members know as member item funding. Today were considering a package of reforms that would mean New York City Council Members will be working full time for the people without the influence of stipends or outside income. voting on 4 pre-considered introductions today in governmental operations, sorry that we voted in governmental operations a Committee who's chairman ship I sort partly in order to shepherd though these

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reforms with 2 pre-considered resolutions that were voted out of Rules Committee under acting Chair Mark Levine. The 4 bills are based on recommendations of the 2015 Quadrennial Commission. The 1st bill which I've introduced with Council Member Garodnick, Reynoso, Richards, Cohen and Chin would prohibit outside income with rules further delineating what earned income is acceptable. This is coupled with the rules reform that I've also introduced that would eliminate payment in lieu also known as lulu's. These reforms that have been long sort by editorial boards, government groups and the people are reforms that I am proud to sponsor. The 2nd bill sponsored by Council Member Vacca and myself would increase transparency by making a financial the financial disclosure forms of elected officials available for the public to view on the conflict of interest board website. In 2010, I was an advocate and I worked with New York Public interest group, groups Bill Mahoney to use freedom of information law to put the, there the Albany's outside income online. We put it up on (inaudible) website and then soon Japcop adopted it, it's amazing to have the leadership of Jimmy Vacca and the Technology Committee and for him

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really brining this reform forward, I do not think there's anyone better suited or a better champion for it. The 3rd bill sponsored by Council Member Van Brammer would change the timing of the appointment of the quadrano commission from the 2^{nd} year of an election to the 3rd and would give the quadrano commission an additional time to deliberate an issue they recommendations. The final bill sponsored by our Speaker would increase the salaries of the Mayor, Public Advocate, Borough Presidents, Controller, District Attorneys is recommended by the Commission. The bill would also increase the salaries of Members of the Council as well as the Speaker of the Council as recommended by the Commission both an additional increase to account for prohibiting most outside income and changing status of Council Members to full time. These bills (inaudible) an important reforms and won't increase the transparency, effectiveness and the efficiency of the City's government every dollar is a worthy investment in a government that works full time for the people without the influences of stipends or outside income. Thank you to Committee Council Samita Dishmuk, Laurie Wynn, James Sabotty, Committee Alum, David Sightser as well as

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Member, Majority Leader Van Brammer.

MAJORITY LEADER VAN BRAMMER: Thank you very much Madam Speaker and Chair Kallos and all of my colleagues I am in deed very proud to serve in this City Council. My bill Intro. 1078, improves the workings of the quadranial advisory commission appointed every 4 years by the Mayor to examine compensation of New York City elected officials. The most recent commission recommended improvement so the commissions timeline. This bills follows through on those recommendations and in some cases does even more. Presently quadranial commission pointed are appointed in the first half of January and they must issue a report by March 15. The commission asked for an additional month but this bill give the commission even more time requiring a report after 120 days approximately 4 months. Presently the quadranil commission is appointed in the 2nd year of a 4 year cycle. This bill changes it to the 3rd year. makes it more likely that the commission recommendations take effect in the session after

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which they are voted on and approved addressing
issues associated with changes to compensation. All
of these changes help to improve the mechanics of our
City's Government. I'm proud to be a sponsor of this
bill and proud of the larger package of reforms,

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Majority Leader and Council Member Vacca.

Speaker and thank you all and my bill just requires that City Council financial disclosures forms be posted online. I think it provides the ultimate step towards transparency and accountability and we as public officials certainly want that. Many times right now if a member of the public wants our financial disclosure form they must go and file a foil request, freedom of information act, this will eliminate that necessity and it will be available through the internet at will. So I urge my colleagues to vote yes on the bill and I thank the Speaker and the Government Operations Committee and the Rules Committee for considering the legislation, thank you.

2 SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Member. And finally since this is our 1st Stated 3 Meeting in February this year I wanted to also 4 mention that as we all know it's Black History Month. Across the City we will be celebrating in a variety 6 7 of ways all month long. As a matter of fact the vast majority of reforms we are taking have no monetary attachment to it. take the recommendation to do away with lulu's which are an average of about \$9000, so that there made this not necessarily at 32% increase and then on top of that as the commission said as the commission said at the hearing, they put in the suggestion to make full time pay and did not put a monetary attachment

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to that, so that is quite deliberative to say were going to take all of what you're saying not in exchange for reforms but the one thing you said that we should do and did not attach a monetary compensation to we did that. So it is a fair discussion of whether or not it should be full time or not, it is not fair to say that they should be no monetary compensation for taking away full time, taking away outside income and making it full time. I just hope that as this is discussed, people see the deliberation that actually went into this. We took it very, very responsibly, wanted to make sure everything was justifiable and I also want to thank the Speaker for her leadership. Dr. Derrick Griffith Way will be located on Montgomery Street between Bedford Avenue and Franklin Avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn. Derrick Griffith served as the Acting Dean of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management at Medgar Evers College and prior to his position he served as an Assistant Provost for student success in the Office of Academic Affair. He oversaw and managed the Smart Scholars Early College a collaboration between Medgar Evers College and Medgar Evers College Preparatory High School which allows high school students to enroll in Medgar Evers College courses, giving them a head start in their college careers. He joined Medgar Evers College after serving as the Executive Director of Brown Work, a Brooklyn based community

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organization working to increase college access among residents of public housing developments. Prior to that position he served as founding Director and Principal of Cuny Prep Transitional High School administered by Cuny Office of Academic Affairs where he oversaw the Adminsitration of Cuny Prep, a model school that continues to offer out of school youth between the ages of 16 and 18 an opportunity for full time study. I want to add that before he was tragically killed on an Amtrack train, he was in the process of receiving his Phd in Urban Education at Cuny Graduate Center. Dr. Rudy Crew and members of Medgar Evers College came to the graduation to accept the degree on his behalf. I also want to acknowledge at this time that Carey Gabay Way will be on Clinton Avenue between Willoughby Avenue and Myrtle Avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn. Carey Gabay grew up in the Boston Secor houses, a Bronx public housing project. He graduated from Harvard where he studied Government and in his senior year was elected President of the Undergraduate Council, the main body of student government. He attended Harvard Law School and worked at several firms in New York specializing in corporate finance law. In 2011 he became an

Breastfeeding mothers are among the New Yorkers that use our City job centers, snap centers, they wait sometimes for hours in health clinic waiting rooms and HRA offices. These are places it can be challenging to nurse and impossible to pump. Intro. 1063 will require the creation of dedication lactation rooms in these public serving City offices. These rooms won't be bathrooms, they'll be clean, comfortable, dedicated, lactation rooms with seating and outlets near a source of running water where a mother can handle the important business of feeding her children or pumping milk in privacy and peace. Mothers are demanding and when in similar spaces in airports and we've seen the powerful message of usefulness of setting aside a advertising space for lactation in my district office in Brooklyn and at Brooklyn Borough Hall. Now is the time to expand this resource and give members of the public the facilities they're required for employees.

So American cultural icons from Woody Guthrie to Woody Allen were inspired by featured by Coney Islands beautiful destination and geography. While the original Luna Parks, Steeplechase Parks, Dreamland and Astro Land captured both American and International imagination with their skeptical, it was the Boardwalk that was accessible to all visitors in Coney Island hay day. When over a million people visited each day. For immigrants, the poor and the marginalized, Coney Island was the poor man's Rivera, the nickel empire, the \$.50 admission fee to Steeplechase Luna may have

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been out of reach but the \$.05 fare was the only cost
