Int. No. 0805-A, sponsored by Council

Member Dromm, is a Local Law to amend the

Administrative Code of the City of New York in

relation to expanding the protections of the City of

New York Human Rights Law with regard to public

accommodations and making certain technical

corrections.

Int. No. 0814-A, sponsored by Council

Member Lander, is a Local Law to amend the

Administrative Code of the City of New York in

relation to construction of the New York City Human

Rights Law.

Int. No. 0818-A, sponsored by myself, is a Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to provisions of attorney's fees under the City Human Rights Law.

And finally, Int. No. 0832-A, sponsored by Council Member Williams, is a Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to prohibiting discrimination in housing accommodations on the basis of an individual's status

13 as a victim of domestic violence.

Council Member Lander and Dromm would like to give an opening statement, if they make it, for their bills momentarily, soon.

But first I'm proud to discuss the bill I've sponsored, Int. No. 0818-A.

First, the bill would allow the Commission on Human Rights to award attorney's fees and expert fees to a complaining party who wins in a matter brought before the Commission.

Second, the bill makes clear that courts may include expert fees when expert fees when awarding attorney's fees to a winning party.

Lastly, to the extent that the hourly rate of an attorney is factored into the attorney's fees award, this bill will direct courts to consider the hourly market rate charged by attorneys of similar skills and experience in New York County, which usually has the highest attorney rates in New York City and that means some of our lawyers usually [sic] in Brooklyn would get less pay than ones on Park Avenue; now they will get the same market rate wage.

It is our hope that all of these bills we are voting on today will have a positive impact on the lives all New Yorkers.

Thank you, members of this committee, and thank you, Members Danny Dromm, Lander, Mendez; Williams for your hard work on all these bills. I would also like to thank Alicia Brown, Counsel to this Committee -- thank you so much -- and would also like to thank Caruso, Wes Jones, Juan Parks and Annie Decker. Thank you all for your hard work on this bill.

I hope that my fellow committee members will support these bills today so we can vote on them tomorrow at a Stated Meeting. Thank you again for

Jumaane Williams, who is here now; we would love to

on the books of any place in the United States; with
the passage of this legislation we're expanding the
Human Rights Law to protect domestic violence victims
against discrimination. The current administration
is doing substantial outreach in domestic violence
incidents and homicides are decreasing, but domestic
violence is a serious problem in New York City and we
must work tirelessly to make sure anyone who is
facing intimate partner violence can more easily find
safe housing. Women are disproportionately affected
by intimate partner violence, with more than 1 in 3
women experiencing rape, physical violence and/or
stalking by the intimate partner in their lifetime.
Victims often can't find safe and affordable housing
and landlords too frequently discriminate against
domestic violence victims; nationally [sic], 11
percent of evictions involve victims of domestic
violence who are evicted due to abuse and between
2000 and 2012 in New York City there were 864
domestic violence homicides; women account for about
80 percent of intimate partner homicides in New York
City and in 2014 there were over 280,000 domestic
incident reports.

I wanna say thank you to The Speaker, to the Chair, Matt Gewolb, Laura Popa, Rachel Cordero, and Alicia Brown from the Legislative Division and the many advocates who helped bring this day about, including Sanctuary for Families, and also the Commissioner of the Human Rights Commission and all her staff for working to execute all of these statutes; in addition, Nick E. Smith, my Legislative Director and Deputy Chief of Staff from my staff. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON MEALY: Thank you for giving us that great statement on your legislation on domestic violence. Thank you so much; looking forward to voting for it tomorrow; I hope the whole body will vote on all these five important legislations.

We're just gonna take a few minutes to see if Mr. Lander will come and give his statement just as well; he worked on two of these legislations also.

International Women's Day by strengthening and
advancing the New York City Human Rights Law, already
pioneering in so many ways and now in all of the ways
that these bills do to strengthen it further. I'm
honored to be co-sponsors with others and with you
and others on all of them; it's a great package, and
congratulations to you and Council Member Williams
and Council Member Mendez, Council Member Dromm and
I'm proud to be the prime sponsor for 0814-A.

The New York City Human Rights Law has
this just wonderful and unique phrase in it that some
folks in this room worked hard to get there, which is
that it is to be construed liberally for the
accomplishment of the uniquely broad and remedial
purposes of the law, even where state and federal
laws that look similar don't get read that way, don't
get interpreted that way by the courts, so we have
gone out of our way not only to spell out all these
rights in the law, but to say in the law to the
judges and to the Human Rights Commission, but
especially the judges, this law is to be construed in
the broadest way possible to protect the rights of
New Yorkers in all these ways and don't, if some

court somewhere has construed or read those protections to be narrow assume that that's what we intended; we intended for those protections to be construed liberally and as broad as they possibly can, but that's tricky and it gets played out over time in the courts and so by identifying court cases where judges have done just that, have construed that law liberally and encouraging other judges in the law to construe liberally and to look to these cases to do it, I believe that we're strengthening and protecting that law for years and decades to come.

So thank you again; I'm proud to be a -I appreciate your leadership; I appreciate The
Speaker's leadership and I look forward to passing
these bills. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON MEALY: Thank you. We have a great package of these bills and we wanna thank everyone for being here today, International Women's Day, we rock. I can't hear ya. Yeah, alrighty.
