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CHAIRPERSON GIBSON: Good morning ladies and gentlemen; welcome to City Hall; welcome to the Committee on Public Safety's hearing this morning.

Before we begin our hearing we will take a vote this morning on a package of resolutions to support state and federal gun reform legislation to ensure universal background checks for all potential gun owners, local jurisdiction's ability to decide who can carry concealed weapons and additionally, to provide safeguards against wrongful convictions.

I am Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Chair of the Committee on Public Safety of the 16th

District of the Bronx and I thank you all for being here today.

This City Council and this administration have made addressing gun violence a number one priority, as evidenced by the \$19.9 million that was specifically allocated towards addressing gun violence in the FY 2016 budget. New York City and New York State are among the toughest in the nation on ensuring gun safety, but as we all know, gun violence continues to be pervasive and we will not stop this public health crisis alone. The

resolutions we are voting on today address the various ways that we can combat this issue with our

4 partners on the state and federal levels.

Res. 0853, sponsored by the Public

Advocate, Letitia James, calls on the federal

government to close the loophole in the current gun

background check system; this loophole abuses the

commonsense laws that are in effect across our

country and have led to a thriving, unregulated gun

trade which must be stopped.

Res. 1094 [sic], which is sponsored by our Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito, and I proudly cosponsor, calls on the federal government to oppose the Constitutional Concealed Carry Reciprocity Act of 2015 which would allow a resident from one state who has a license to carry a concealed handgun to lawfully carry the gun into a different state, regardless of the licensing standards of the other state. We cannot control the public safety of our city if our safety measures can be undermined by the safety measures of another jurisdiction with deferring interest.

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In addition, we are also voting on a resolution that addresses another important issue; providing safeguards against wrongful convictions.

Res. 0979, which I proudly sponsor, calls on the state to pass legislation which requires the recording of entire custodial interrogations in certain serious crimes, mandates blind or double blind identifications and allows photo identifications to be admissible at trial. Studies have shown that two of the leading contributing factors resulting in many wrongful convictions are eyewitness misidentification and false confessions, and these basic procedural methods would safeguard against wrongful convictions.

I am thankful for all of the support of the Speaker and our colleagues; when we had this hearing several weeks ago we had New Yorkers Against Gun Violence and many other gun advocates talk and speak in favor of these resolutions and the ways in which we can continue to work together to not only invest in programs that focus on prevention, but also focus on ways in which we can safeguard many of our New Yorkers, and I'm thankful for all of my colleagues who are here this morning and I'd like to
