CHAIRPERSON GIBSON: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the City Council's Committee on Public Safety. I am Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Chair of the Committee on Public Safety. I welcome each and every one of you. I'd like to announce that we have joined with us members of the Public Safety Committee, Council Member Rory Lancman, Council Member Chaim Deutsch and Minority Leader Council Member Steve Matteo. We will be proceeding with the hearing in just a few moments. Thank you colleagues for joining us today. Welcome once again to the City Council's Committee on Public Safety hearing. I am Council Member Vanessa proud to chair this committee. I want to thank all of my colleagues and all of the members of the public for being here today to vote on these very important bills. I also want to recognize and thank the sponsors of this legislation that we're voting on today, including Council Members Rory Lancman, Council Member Jumaane Williams, and Council Member Debbie Rose. I'd like to acknowledge that we have with us Council Member Rory Lancman, Chaim Deutsch, Jimmy Vacca, Vincent Gentile, Robert Cornegy and

Jumaane Williams. Thank you all, colleagues for being there. This afternoon we're voting on three pieces of legislation regarding police reform. first bill is sponsored by Council Member Lancman, Proposed Intro 539-A, which will require the NYPD to publish reports relating to the use of force incidents. More particularly, the bill will require the NYPD to provide a quarterly report on the number of use of force incidents disaggregated by the type of force used, the precinct or unit of the officer that used force, and whether the officer was on or off duty when the force was used. In addition, the bill will require the NYPD to report on the number of injuries to an officer or civilian resulting from a police and civilian interaction involving a use of force incident, and the severity of those injuries. Finally, this bill will require the NYPD to provide an annual report on the uses of force found to be excessive by the department. These excessive uses of force will be disaggregated by the type of force used, including whether a firearm was used, the precinct to which such officer was assigned, whether such officer was on duty, and the outcome of any departmental charges brought against such officer.

The second bill, Proposed Intro No. 605-B, sponsored by Council Member Williams, will require the NYPD to issue quarterly use of force and Council report based upon any encounter between an officers and a civilian that resulted in a use of force. The NYPD will be required to report all uses of force disaggregated by the conduct, offense or reason that formed the basis for the initial approach by an officer.

The third bill, Proposed Intro No. 824-A, sponsored by Council Member Rose, will require the NYPD to report in relation to police officer deployment. This bill will require the NYPD to post an annual report of the total number and percentage of officers in each precinct that have two or more substantiated CCRB complaints in the last three calendar years, have been the subject of an IAB investigation that resulted in the suspension in the last five years, and used excessive force in the last three years, or have been arrested in the last ten years for police related behavior.

I recommend a yes vote on these three bills, but before we vote, I certainly want to allow the prime sponsors of these bills to make opening

2 remarks, and we will being with prime sponsor of 3 Intro 606-B, Council Member Williams.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Well, thank you, Madam Chair. My name is Jumaane Williams, and I want to thank the Chair again for having a hearing on these bills and voting them out. This piece of legislation is sponsored by--by myself, Council Member Lancman and Rose. My bill, Intro 606-B of 2014 introduced shortly after the tragic death of Eric Garner. I wanted more information from the Police Department of the City and the use of force when it comes to incidents such as those alleged to have been committed by Mr. Garner like quality of life offenses. I think that this bill will shed light on the basis for all police officers approaching, and engaging in police interactions New Yorkers. And combined with legislation by Council Members Lancman and Rose, who I'm proud to have worked with on this, we will get further information on the overall use of force along with additional reporting on the locations of officers who have received the highest number of CCRB complaints, the highest number of substantiated CCRB complaints, and the highest incidents of being named as the defendant

It is my hope that as we move toward improved police community relations that the data gleaned from this new reporting will help us understand the overall use of force guidelines including their relation to quality of life offenses and finding ways to de-

I want to thank the Speaker, Chair Gibson her staff Dana Wax along with the Speaker's staff including Rob Newman, Rob Pollandra (sp?) and Deepa Ambekar (sp?) for their work on this package, and also my Deputy Chief of Staff Nick Smith. I'd also be remiss if I didn't mention at least the time that we're in right now, how tense it is, and all the emotions that are out there. I am convinced that legislation alone will not fix this. I'm also convinced that focusing solely on policing will not fix this. However, we do have to continue as a Council and legislature of pushing forward legislation to do our best to address this. I'd also like to say that those in leadership [coughs] need to be careful in the words that they use in trying to push these conversations further. Commissioner Bratton has said some direct specific things when it

2 comes to what's happening now that I think is 3 destructive, and I think it's without merit. It's 4 full of privilege, and it's devoid of empathy and any historical context. I would ask him to please stop that. Many of us here could have taken many 6 7 different routes with the correction that is going on 8 with him hiring men, his people who are corrupt. With him even promoting someone so they can get a high pension before they leave. One of the people 10 11 who were caught there was in charge of giving gun 12 licenses. We don't know what the impact can be, and 13 for him to assimilate that folks are not concerned about the violence in the communities is something 14 15 that I think should be apologized for. Be careful if 16 you have a glass house, and you start throwing things 17 I would like this conversation to continue around. 18 constructively, and it's difficult to do that when 19 leaders are making destructive comments that are not 20 based in fact. There is no--not one police reform 21 legislation that was passed out of this Council that 2.2 has made anyone less safe. In fact, we've seen the 2.3 data. We are safer. I'd also like to give congratulations to many of the groups that this city 24 funds that has helped make this safe. 25
