CHAIRPERSON ROSENTHAL: Good morning.

I'm Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Chair of the City Council Contracts Committee and I'm calling this hearing to order. [gavel] Today the committee will vote on a package of legislation that will bring greater transparency to the city's contracting with minority and women owned businesses enterprises, M/WBEs. These bills will also encourage collaboration and information sharing through instituting training requirements for agency staff on meeting the aspirational goals of the M/WBE program, and requiring a standing advisory board to advise this and future mayors on how to increase participation by M/WBEs in city contracting. like to briefly discuss the legislation that I have sponsored, Intro No. 1019-A and Intro 1020, which will not only make technical changes to MOCS reporting requirements, but will present information on the number and total-total dollar value of contracts with M/WBEs in a more useful manner, but will also require a more comprehensive explanation by MOCS of the determination made by the City's chief

procurement officer whether or not to divide large
contracts into smaller ones that would enhance
competition for M/WBEs and other bidders. The public
deserves to know whether bids and proposals are being
formulated and solicited in a fair manner for all of
those who may be able to participate in the
contracting process. These bills will also change
the dates for the submission of M/WBE utilization
plans, and agency procurement plans to allow agencies
to consider their utilization plans in light of their
planned contracting for the year. I believe that
these changes are important steps ensuring that the
city is accountable for meeting the objectives of the
M/WBE program, and I would like to thank the
administration for working with us on those
proposals—the proposals and commend them for the
efforts they have undertaken on M/WBE issues. The
information we gleaned from this legislation will lay
the groundwork for how we can and will do a better-do
better by our minority and women owned businesses.

Additionally, we will be voting on

Proposed Resolution 105-A sponsored by Council Member

Cohen, a resolution condemning all efforts to

delegitimize the State of Israel, and the global

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movement to boycott, divest from and sanction the people of Israel. At our hearing last week, we heard from more than 30 individuals representing over organizations expressing points of view both for and against the resolution. I also received dozens of calls and emails since our hearing expressing a wide range of views. There is one misconception in particular that I'd like to address, and that is the idea that Resolution 1058-A undermines individuals' freedom of speech. The text of the resolution is It condemns the movement that delegitimizes the State of Israel. Resolution 1058-A does not prohibit or condemn criticism of the State of Israel. Each individual not matter their viewpoint on a particular issue must feel comfortable exercising their First Amendment rights. I strongly value these rights, and would never attach my name to a resolution that had an impact on the right to free speech or the right to protest. I'm comfortable supporting this amended version, which pointed condemns the global BDS movement that specifically delegitimizes the State of Israel. I want to thank the sponsors of these important measures. First, Council Members for the M/WBE Council Members Cumbo,

16 opportunity to be heard. I am disappointed that many

17 people did not take advantage of the opportunity to

18 be heard, and chose to disrupt the hearing and not

19 participate, and—and waste an opportunity for real

20 dialogue. So I was disappointed about that, and I

21 don't know that I can do a better job of articulating

22 a rebuttal to some of the arguments that were made,

23 but they were not really germane to—to this

resolution that really was the—the thoughtful product

25 of listening to dialogue with our-with our

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colleagues, and coming up with a resolution that had broad support-support. There is nothing punitive in this resolution. There's no blacklist. There's nothere nothing that inhibits anybody's ability to contract with the City of New York. There's no infringement on anyone's right to free speech, andand our commitment to that is unwavering. And ultimately there was one particular argument I found particularly pernicious and it-it suggested there was some impact on member items. It was just disingenuous, and again, I think a lot of the opposition perhaps didn't bother to read the resolution, which I think is unfortunate. I do want to thank the—the legislative staff—staff for the hard work in developing a-a clean resolution that really articulated what we wanted to say in this. I want to thank Matt and-and the entire Leg staff, and-and you. Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON ROSENTHAL: Thank you, Andy.

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Thank you. Good I am Council Member Laurie Cumbo. morning. like to thank you all for coming today and allowing me the opportunity to speak on my two bills: Proposed Intro 923 and Intro 981 that are two of the bills in this incredible M/WBE legislative package. I want to thank Council Member Helen Rosenthal for your partnership, and all of your support in these efforts. Today we will hear throughout the day testimony with the hope to vote on a package of legislation intended to enhance transparency, accountability, opportunities and resources to better serve women and the businesses in this great city. As Chair of the Committee on Women's Issues and Co-Chair of the Women's Caucus with Council Member Helen Rosenthal, I am elated that the six bills in the M/WBE legislative package will be voted on at today's Stated. For far too long we have been a city that has put the priorities of women and minority women businesses out of the spotlight. Today, I am proud to congratulate my colleagues in government and the fierce advocates that have created legislation that

bring greater transparency and accountability
procedures to the forefront in order to support and
highlight opportunities to advance M/WBEs. Today, we
will unlock the power of data to spur advancement
across the city to improve the quality of services,
programs and opportunities made possible by our city
agencies and partners such as the NYC Economic
Development Corporation. Intro 923 will require the
EDC to assess and evaluate whether contractors
receiving economic development benefits have fully
complied with M/WBE requirements as well as require
the Department of Small Business Services to submit a
report on EDC's assessment. These requirements bring
real oversight to the process, and support continued
development of M/WBEs.

advisory board, which is so critical to this process to enhance City procurement opportunities for M/WBEs. According to Checkbook NYC, New York City's Controllers, an online transparency tool that tracks the City's day-to-day spending in the public domain it notes the prime spending by M/WBE share. And unfortunately, in 2016, M/WBEs comprise only 4.6% of spending, a total of \$751 million. Whereas spending

2 for non-M/WBEs is \$15.94 billion. So when you look 3 at the City of New York, when you look at the 4 African-American, the Asian women and Hispanics, we certainly make up more than 4% of New York City. 5 Asian-Americans and M/WBE spending and contracts are 6 7 only 2.3%. African-Americans are only 0.3%, not even 8 a percentage point. Women are 1.5% and Hispanic Americans are 0.6%. So, when we're looking at how our tax paying dollars are being spent, communities 10 11 of color as well as women are paying into the city's 12 tax revenue, but are not receiving ample contracts 13 reflective of the city. As a city, we have a long 14 way to go to meet our 10-year goal of spending \$16 15 billion set out by the Mayor, but I am hopeful 16 through agency support and incredible leadership at 17 City Hall and agencies such as Small Business 18 Services and the Department of Design and 19 Construction we can raise opportunities and numbers. 20 This is a significant milestone in achieving our 21 greater goal of providing these enterprises with more 2.2 openings to participate in the procurement process 2.3 and to thrive in the City of New York's business sector. I am confident that this package of 24 legislation will led us in the direction that we need 25

to go in, but there is an incredible amount of work that still needs to be done in order to create true equality in the City of New York. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ROSENTHAL: Thank you so much, Council Member Cumbo and congratulations to—on your two incredibly important bills. It's truly an exciting day for moving the box over. I'd like to ask Billy Martin to now call the roll.

just want to say that on Intro 1058-A the fact is is that, um, um, Israel employs thousands of Palestinians, and I support employment, I support human life, and I support the State of Israel. So I am—I'm following our intentions today. I want to commend—I want—I want to commend the sponsor of the

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bill as well as Laurie Cumbo on her bill, and I vote
aye on all. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOHNSON: Permission to explain my vote. I want to thank you, Madam Chair, for-I wasn't able to be here last week. I had a family emergency, but from all of the coverage, you did an incredible job chairing the hearing and dealing with a very sensitive and difficult topic, and I know that it was difficult, and so I'm grateful for your leadership in handling it in such a good. want to thank Council Member Cohen and congratulate Council Member Cumbo on this piece of legislation. On 1058-A I want to say that I've been to Israel twice, and I went with the City Council in our second year in office, and a few of us were there. I know Council Member Cohen, and Council Member Rosenthal we were-we were on that trip together, and it is a complicated place in the world. But the thing that I think is important for us to recognize today is that this resolution is condemning BDS because BDS does not support a peaceful two-state solution to the complications in that region. BDS is about undermining Israel. BDS is about not having people

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work together for a peaceful solution, and this resolution states that both Israelis and Palestinians have the right to live in safe and secure states free from fear violence and with mutual recognition. that can only be achieved through a conversation between Israelis and Palestinians. The BDS Movement is not about having a conversation. The BDS Movement is about delegitimizing a people. Israel is not Israelis are not perfect. There are plenty perfect. of people that have many, many problems with this current government in Israel, but we in New York City are the largest population of Jewish people around the world outside of Israel, and it's important for us to speak up, and lend our voices to this important free and open society where LGBT people like myself can live open and freely and with respect. proud to vote for this resolution today. I'm glad that the Council is handling this. I want to thank Council Cohen for putting this forward, and I want to thank you, Madam Chair, for your leadership on this. I vote aye on all.
