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CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Good morning, everyone.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Quiet, please.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Welcome to today's hearing of the City Council's Transportation Committee. I's Ydanis Rodriguez, the chair of the committee. First, let me recognize my colleagues who are here today with us, Council Member Vacca, Van Bramer, Menchaca, Greenfield, Constantinides and Chin. Today, we will vote on a bill that makes a common sense change to the rules governing how New Yorkers cross our streets. Currently, pedestrians only have the right of way if they enter a crosswalk while the-while the white walk symbol is displayed, as a con—as the controlling rules were developed before the years a countdown clocks. So even if a pedestrian is able to safely enter the crosswalk and finish their crossing, they're under a red countdowncountdown period. They do not legally have the right-of-way and the legal ramifications that follow. Proposed Intro 997-A introduced by Public Advocated James would establish the right-of-way for

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pedestrians-pedestrians while crossing the roadway, and require traffic to yield to pedestrians when a walking person flashing hand or flashing hand with a countdown clock is displayed. This change will more closely align the law with how most pedestrians assume they should approach single-light crosswalks particularly when they have a countdown clock to guide them. New York is a-is a walking city, and pedestrians should be protected with the right-of-way the entire time. It is safe to cross the street. This committee continues to prioritize safety on our streets from the many bills we've passed to help achieve Vision Zero. I'm proud of the work-of the work we have done on these important issues, and we will continue to make the changes necessary to save lives in New York City. This is a common sense bill, and I'm glad we are finally moving forward to protect all those who walk our streets.
