SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Okay, we're gonna get started with our ceremonials; we've got three ceremonials... [background comment] three ceremonials, uh starting off with Council Member Vallone, who is issuing a Proclamation to help the Selfhelp Community Services on their 80th anniversary. So if the reps from Selfhelp could please come on up. [background comments, applause] Alright. And I'll hand it off to Council Member Vallone. [background comment]

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you Madame

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you Madame Speaker. Come on up, Selfhelp. It's a great day and all our Council Members have joined us and signed onto this.

So just to give you why we're here; okay, so we are up here with Selfhelp, and along with my fellow Council Members we are presenting a Proclamation to honor and recognize Selfhelp Community Services for 80 years of serving the senior population in New York City. So 80 years ago Selfhelp was founded and began by supporting Holocaust survivors seeking refuge here in America.

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Built on a mission to enable the elderly and other at-risk populations to live their lives independently and with dignity, Selfhelp has grown to become a nationally recognized innovator in in-home care and senior independent housing. Selfhelp provides over three million hours of professional, quality homecare each year and operates 10 award-winning affordable housing complexes -- Shire House, five senior centers, one Clearview Center, four naturally occurring retirement communities, and continues to grow and expand their services.

In my district, the Clearview Center and Shire House of Bayside are shining examples of the incredible work and services that Selfhelp provides to our seniors. Together with our Speaker we have expanded to the innovative Virtual Senior Center, which The Speaker's been a big fan of and helping with, allowing more homebound individuals to participate in this program. Now we are launching classes in Chinese, Korean, Russian, and Spanish. We are also proud to announce a brand new transportation alternative pilot program that will serve seniors in Bayside and Northeast Queens. Too often all of us have heard that our seniors are left stranded with

little or no transportation options; now we have connected our seniors to cultural institutions and the ability to get their medical appointments through with this new pilot program. Selfhelp's continued services in our city will play an enormous role in providing the best services for all of our seniors; congratulations on 80 years of work to Selfhelp. Congratulations everyone.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Council, City of New York Proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor Selfhelp Community Services for 80 years of outstanding service and contributions.

And whereas, Selfhelp Community Services was founded in 1936 when a group of German émigrés joined forces to help European Jewish immigrants who had fled Nazi persecution and came to America seeking a better life; its founders knew that with support, new immigrants could use their experiences, skills

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2 and strengths to become independent, dignified and 3 productive in their new country.

And whereas, in its early years, Selfhelp worked with successive [sic] waves [sic] of refugees, providing the direct service that has become its hallmark. While the needs of its clients have changed over the years, Selfhelp has remained unwavering in its commitment to maintaining the independence and dignity of seniors and at-risk populations through a spectrum of housing, home health care and social services.

And whereas, today Selfhelp serves nearly 20,000 men and women every year, helping them to live with dignity and avoid institutionalization; it manages five City-funded senior centers in Flushing, Bayside, Forest Hills and Maspeth that provide a full range of educational and social programming, as well as meals. Selfhelp also offers an Alzheimer's social day program to care for those coping with Alzheimer's and related disorders, as well as to provide much-needed respite for their caregiver. In addition to being a pioneer in developing the concepts for serving naturally occurring retirement communities

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2 (NORCs), Selfhelp provides comprehensive services for seniors at four NORCs in Queens.

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And whereas, Selfhelp's new initiatives include the development of a senior center of the future to accommodate all segments of the aging population including baby boomers. They are also expanding cutting edge technology in client homes that will enhance the safety and quality of independent living. At this special milestone we not only reflect upon this organization's great legacy of service, but also we affirm our faith in its equally promising future.

On behalf of all of the staff that are Selfhelp. here with me today; the President of our board, Raymond Schragg, the 2,000 employees of Selfhelp, and the 20,000 seniors, of which about 5,000 are Holocaust survivors, many Asian Americans and all others who reflect Selfhelp, the senior population is our heritage, they are why we are here today; we are proud to be serving them, helping them to live with independence and dignity, whether it's with our social workers or the technology or going from handholding to high-tech. The Council Members who are here with us today, I thank each and every one of you; you guys and girls have been just tremendous supporters of Selfhelp; we thank you ever, ever so much and Speaker, [applause] thank you very much for this recognition; [background comment] Paul, thank you for carrying it.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: So thank... again, thank you and I know you do work throughout the city; wonderful and appreciate it and that is why so many

Officer Cybulski were sitting in a police car in

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Times Square when someone suddenly threw what appeared to be a bomb through the car window.

Without hesitation and thinking only of the thousands of New Yorkers gathered in Times Square, these heroes drove the device away and notified the bomb squad when they were both a safe distance away.

Thankfully, the bomb turned out to be a hoax, but the courage and bravery displayed by both Sqt. Armani and Officer Cybulski that day and each day they serve in uniform is something we're all extremely proud of; it really is significant and meant a lot to all of us here today to be able to recognize you and you are a reflection of the NYPD and we thank you for the service and your selflessness in keeping us protected each and every day. So we wanted to... at least a small token that we could do is to share this moment with you and to show our appreciation by sharing these Proclamations. I will ask the clerks to read it and then ask the supervisors here as well to say a few words, as well as our Public Safety chair and we thank you so much; it really is a pleasure to have Thank you; we're glad that you're safe and you here. glad that you're keeping us safe. Thank you so much.

proud to honor NYPD Sgt. Hameed Armani and NYPD

Officer Peter Cybulski for their courageous service

to our city.

And whereas, every hour of every day the men and women of the NYPD work together to enforce our city's laws, keep out neighborhoods safe and protect their fellow 8.3 million New Yorkers, whether safeguarding property or the general public, these heroes and heroines commit themselves to their daily duties which often necessitate extraordinary risks that few others can fully comprehend; Sgt. Armani and Officer Cybulski are two such heroes.

And whereas, on Wednesday, July 20th,
2016, around 11:30 p.m., Sgt. Armani and Officer
Cybulski were sitting in a parked police van in Times
Square near 46th Street and Broadway, there in the
crossroads of the world, amid masses of people
leaving Broadway shows, an SUV slowly passed them and
its driver suddenly threw a device with flashing red
lights into the police van's open window; the

officers believed they were literally sitting with a ticking bomb. And whereas, rather than abandon their vehicle and flee to safety however, Sqt. Armani turned on the lights and siren, hit the gas and drove away from the huge crowds; they were putting their own lives at risk so they could save potentially hundreds if not thousands of people. In the moment they believed their lives could end at any second, but they were determined to save others. Once they stopped their van at a quieter area, Officer Cybulski handed the device to Sqt. Armani, who removed it from the van and put it on the sidewalk, away from the public and buildings. When they were both a safe distance away, they requested the bomb squad; fortunately, the device was soon determined to be a hoax and the mysterious assailant in the SUV was later arrested.

And whereas, we commend Sgt. Armani and Officer Cybulski for their incredible bravery and their unflinching commitment to the safety of our city; they are truly among the finest of New York's finest and have earned the esteemed and enduring gratitude of every New Yorker.

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Now therefore be it known, that the Council of the City of New York gratefully honors NYPD Sgt. Hameed Armani and NYPD Officer Peter Cybulski for their extraordinary valor and selfless service to the City of New York and the community at large. Today is a day that we've been looking forward to for quite some time; we have been given the honor of giving a Proclamation to one of Southeast Queens' own, myself and Daneek Miller and Donovan Richards and Greg Meeks and Vivien Cook and all the others overwhelming with pride. This morning this young lady knocked out three schools and last night she was up at Fashion Week and she just keeps

2 going and going; she's very tired. [background 3 Yeah, and Cardozo, yes, yes... yes, yes, yes, comment] 4 and the Borough President; she's done [background comments] so much in the last few days, but we don't 5 just have her here today; we have her parents, Mr. 6 7 and Mrs. Muhammad are also here, who spoke at the 8 schools this morning, so we wanna give them a round of applause. [applause] This young lady, when you get to meet her and know her, to be somebody who has 10 11 actually taken the world by storm is just... she has 12 just a humility of a spirit that I haven't seen in a 13 long time and as far as ... she is just physical poetry 14 in motion to see her run; she is inspiring tens of 15 millions of women; she is the first woman to win the 400-meter hurdles in... first American woman in history 16 17 to win it and... [cheers, applause] and as Inez 18 Dickens; I don't know where she's at, but she would 19 have me point out that she is also a black woman, a 20 minority that won that title, so we're... Inez; I got 21 it right? [background comments] That's right. That's right. Well no, Speaker, you're right, but 2.2 2.3 right, Inez; I got that right? Okay, I don't want any problems with these two, so [laugh] ... we just 24 wanted to thank you for allowing us to present this 25

to you today and just extend our thanks for you being

committed and dedicated to excellence. She's only 26

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years old when she did this, y'all, so she should get

Proclamation. The Council of the City of New York is

proud to honor 2016 Olympian Dalilah Muhammad for her

outstanding achievements in track and field.

And whereas, Dalilah Muhammad was born on February 7, 1990 to Nadirah and Askia Muhammad and grew up and attended school in Jamaica, Queens.

Dalilah developed her passion for track and field at a very young age while watching such greats as Wilma Rudolph and Florence Griffith Joyner; she too wanted to be among the greats to compete in the Olympics and to win gold for her community and country.

And whereas, at the age of 7, Dalilah joined a local track club, the New York Novas and competed in many track and field events -- distance running, sprints, the hurdles and high jump, but it

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wasn't until she attended Benjamin N Cardozo High 2 3 School that her love and dedication for the sport of 4 track and field began to crystallize, making her one 5 of the premier 400-meter hurdle runners in the In high school she competed in many track 6 7 and field events and experienced her first 8 international exposure when she won the gold medal in the 400-meter hurdle at the 2007 World Youth Championships, the same year she earned the title 10 Gatorade Female Athlete of the Year for New York 11

And whereas, in 2008 Dalilah enrolled in the University of Southern California on a sports scholarship and joined the USC Trojans track team. While she remained committed to furthering her education by majoring in business, she continued to excel at track and field. During her first season on the USC team, she competed extensively and she won the silver medal at the 2009 Pan American Junior Athletics Championships in 58.42 seconds.

Outdoor Nationals titles in the 400-meter hurdles.

In 2008 she won the New York State and Nike

And whereas, when Dalilah ran for the USC Trojans, she became a four-time All-American at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. In 2013 her personal

record for the 400-meter hurdles was 53.83 seconds.

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In 2016 she was the American National Champion; by

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the end of her college career she had ranked the

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third fastest ever on the USC Trojans track team.

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And whereas, after graduating college,

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Dalilah chose to go professional and has represented Nike since 2013; she continued to perfect her craft

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by increasing her speed and time for the 400-meter

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hurdle. In July 2016 she won the 400-meter hurdles

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in 52.88 seconds, earning her a place on the United

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States Olympics team. At the 2016 Rio Olympics in

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August she fulfilled her dream of winning the gold

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medal in the 400-meter [applause] hurdle... [cheers]

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: So last week we lost Dabney Montgomery, age 93. Mr. Montgomery was distinguished as a Tuskegee Airman, a body guard to Martin Luther King, Jr. and a member of Manhattan's Community Board 10. His work played an important role in aiding the civil rights movement and our own

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2 city and our thoughts and prayers are with his

3 family.

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Earlier this month two people were senselessly murdered during the West Indian Day Parade J'Ouvert festival, the victims were Tyreke Borel and Tiarah Poyau. Tyreke was 17 years old and a student at Boys and Girls High School in Bedford-Stuyvesant and Tiarah was 22 years old and a graduate student in taxation at St. John's University. It's just the senseless violence that continues and hoping we can come together and change our laws and do what we must to make this end. So I definitely want us to also remember them in a moment of silence.

And this past weekend we commemorated the 15th anniversary of the horrific events of September 11th. New York has not and will never forget that day and ask my colleagues to hold a moment of silence to recognize all the lives that were lost.

Thank you my colleagues.

Today the Council will vote on legislation to make our streets safer for pedestrians. Int. 997-A, sponsored by the Public Advocate, Tish James, updates out-of-date regulations

implemented before the use of countdown clocks and
guarantees pedestrians the right-of-way in crosswalks
during the entire display of a countdown clock or
flashing hand. This bill is the latest in over two
dozen bills this Council has passed as part of our
ongoing efforts to promote Vision Zero and end
traffic fatalities in New York City. Again, this is

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you Madame

Speaker; I also want to thank Transportation Chair

Rodriguez and all of the Council Members who signed
on as co-sponsors for their support for this critical
commonsense bill that will help protect pedestrians

from car crashes. I'd also like to thank the many
advocates -- Transportation Alternatives, Families

for Safe Streets, AARP and the League of Conservation
Voters.

If we are ever to achieve Vision Zero, we must ensure that the laws in our books follow basic logic and right now the city is installing pedestrian countdown signals all over the city and these are a great step towards improving safety. But the law regarding these signals is out-of-date and includes a

the city. As bicycle usage in our city continues to

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surge, we must make sure that we are doing our part to support this sustainable and healthy form of transportation. Currently there are significant restrictions on where and how bicycles can be transported; Int. 695-A, 795-A and 405-A will help expand bicycle access by permitting individuals to transport bikes on passenger elevators in office and residential buildings and will make it easier for New Yorkers to bike to work and to other destinations around the city. Council Members Rosenthal and Williams are sponsors of the three bills and would ask them to say a few words. Council Member Rosenthal, followed by Williams.

much, Speaker. I'm delighted to sponsor one of the bills today that will remove unnecessary barriers for people who want to bike to work. Int. No. 405-A would require that office buildings provide foldable bicycle access in passenger elevators. Presumable, if a person can fit into an elevator, so can their foldable bike. Before today let's say you wanted to bike to work with your handy foldable bike, the City is doing all it can to encourage you to do so; we've got over 1,000 miles of bike lanes, over 300 miles of

which are protected bike lanes, all public modes of transportation allow foldable bikes onboard; the MTA, Metro North; LIRR at all times, including peak rush hours and without a permit, but until now, once that person go to work with their foldable bike, they would've had to go through a lengthy process to get permission to use the freight elevator to take it up to their office or lock it up outside. According to the New York City Department of Transportation, some office buildings shut down their freight elevators at three or four in the afternoon before workers leave for the day and in addition, DOT found instances of office building managers or owners requiring tenants to buy extra insurance or pay a fee to bring their bike or foldable bike on the freight elevator, both of which are against the law. As for locking up a bike outside, over the past four years bike theft has increased by 70%.

I wanna thank Speaker Melissa MarkViverito and Housing Chair Jumaane Williams for
moving this bill along and thanks goes to Meagan
Chen, who drafted the legislation; Ben Smith, who
during the time he was in the Council helped champion

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2 it, and Sarah Mallory, my Legislative Director, who
3 shepherded it through. Thank you very much.

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COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: I wanna thank the Madame Speaker for her leadership on this package and other sponsors of the package; Chairs Rosenthal, Lander and Rodriguez. This bill package, the aim of the bill package is to make biking easier in the city, decrease vehicle usage, decrease the city's carbon footprint, save on gas, and increase health benefits. Though it's difficult to encourage folks to ride bicycles without taking out the encumbrances that prevent them from doing so, our city is growing, but our space to travel on roads are not and so we have to be as expedient as we can. My bill, 795-A is co-sponsored with Council Member Lander; it requires that owners allow bicycles in their buildings and allow tenants to request a way to do so when possible on passenger elevators, and we were careful to make sure that if any fines come the way of the landlord that was not his or her fault, but the fault of the

Next the Council will vote on a package of legislation to strengthen and enhance reporting data on sexual offenses, domestic violence incidents and hate crimes. These bills will require the NYPD to report all sex offenses in their quarterly reports, broken up by specific offenses, enhance reporting related to domestic violence and hate crimes and require domestic violence reporting to be disaggregated based on whether the crime involved intimate partners.

The increased reporting of these incidents will give New Yorkers a clearer picture of where these crimes are taking place and is a vital step toward increased transparency so that we can help stop these crimes before they occur.

I am proud to have sponsored Int. 948-A; will ask my colleagues, Council Members Reynoso and Torres and Cumbo to say a few words about their bills. So Council Member Cumbo, we could start with

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you, followed by Council Member Reynoso and then
Torres.

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Two out of three sexual assaults or rape
victimizations go unreported to police. In recent
years, and unlike in the case of many other crimes,
the rate of sexual assaults in New York City has
increased. While forcible rape has decreased by more
than 10% in other counties in New York State, New
York City has a five-year upward trend, with a total
of 1,439 reported rapes to the New York City
Department in 2015. Think about that; almost 1,500
rapes that happen each year and the pain that so many

Since introduction, we were able to amend the bill to include reporting in our parks, public schools, basketball courts, recreation centers, and playgrounds. Before CompStat, the NYPD provided quarterly reports on seven index crimes including rape, but did not include other felony or misdemeanor sex offenses, which overlooked nearly 20 other sex assault offenses; today we are going to change that.

individuals experience as a result of this.

As we know, without proper services, sexual assault victims are at a greater risk to

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Reynoso.

psychological, social and behavioral distress, such as shock, denial, depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, attempted suicide, drug use, and strained family relationships.

I would like to specifically acknowledge Mary Haviland, the Executive Director at the New York City Alliance Against Sexual Assault for championing this bill. I would like to thank Deepa Ambekar, the Public Safety Legislative Counsel for sticking with this bill and working to modify the bill to speak to the urgent and growing needs of public concerns in our city.

Once again, thank you to my very good friend and colleague, Council Member Vanessa Gibson for standing strong with me in partnership and for hearing this bill and keeping it on track to pass.

A huge thank you goes to Laura Popa and Matt Gewolb for your leadership and tireless support throughout this process, and I wanna thank everyone that made this possible today and this is for so many who have remained so quiet about an issue that impacts so many New Yorkers. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Council Member

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COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: Thank you I wanna thank you and Chair Gibson for their attention to the issue of domestic violence and the importance of using data to assess what is happening in our communities so that we can be

proactive about adjusting it.

Last year there were 8,027 domestic incidents reported in my district, that's 22 per day; 34% of all felony assaults and 45% of all the rape offenses in my district were determined to be domestic violence related, so I feel compelled to work proactively on this issue and have met with the Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence to do outreach in my district, both to educate and hopefully prevent these incidents and to ensure that victims know how to access services.

Tracking these incidents and distinguishing intimate partner violence from other types can give us the ability to target services to meet the needs on the ground. The Office to Combat Domestic Violence and local organizations, such as North Brooklyn Coalition Against Family Violence in my district, provide targeted services for intimate partner violence, both for prevention, such as THE

Healthy Relationship Training Academy, and for victim services as well. Data can help us figure out more specifically where outreach about these services is

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needed.

Again, I wanna thank the Speaker and the Council Members today for their support and also wanna thank my Legislative Director Lacey Tauber, and I look forward to the day where we don't have to say that these services are needed, but until we eradicate domestic violence from the city, we're going to have to take on bills as this to make sure that these needed services reach our communities. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Council Member Torres.

Speaker. My legislation requires periodic reporting of domestic violence within public housing, not only at the level of police service areas, but also at the level of individual developments. Here in New York City we've made historic strides toward reducing crime, but the one area where progress has been allusive is domestic violence, especially in settings like public housing and there's reason to think that

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the crisis remains as prevalent as it's ever been and so there are few challenges more worthy of our time and resources than domestic violence, which has a well-documented link to adult criminality and juvenile delinquency. We know from social science research that violence within the home has far-reaching consequences beyond the home and that the struggle against DV depends first and foremost on awareness and by disclosing data about domestic violence, we are building greater awareness, a greater sense of urgency by keeping our city, the public continually alert to the changing patterns of domestic violence, particularly in public housing. Thank you Madame Speaker.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Member. I wanna thank, with regards to staff, Jen Wilcox, Meagan Chen, Guillermo Patino, Jose Conde, and Sarah Gastellum.

And next the Council will vote on a series of land use items which will facilitate a new mixed-use development in Melrose in Council Member Salamanca's district. The La Central project is a 100% affordable housing development containing almost 1,000 units of affordable housing; there will be 831

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COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: Thank you Madame Speaker, good afternoon.

New York City has the largest and most diverse population of businesses in the country, yet our city procurement does not reflect the same diversity. To change this, it is critical our City agencies prioritize MWBE contracting and be more transparent in its goals. My legislation requires the City to publicly share these goals, which will also allow us to identify any agency that is falling short. The legislation would also make public the list of names and titles of agency personnel responsible for implementing these plans, as well as a description of the proposed methods and activities to achieve participation goals.

Census data shows the number of MWBEs increase each year; it's our responsibility as a city to accommodate that growth. Currently MWBEs are met with certification hurdles, flawed contract agreements, weak legal guarantees against

discrimination, a lack of transparency in the bidding process, and more. At a time when income inequality remains in the forefront, it is so important we take these steps to support our MWBEs. We must strengthen what makes our city so vibrant, attractive and unique.

I wanna thank Speaker Melissa MarkViverito for her unwavering advocacy for equal
opportunity, current Women's Caucus co-chairs,

Council Members Cumbo and Rosenthal and Council
Member Inez Dickens, who championed this issue and
cause in the previous council and is still a lead
champion on it, and her work -- we were able to usher
in the first concrete and substantial MWBE law in
this city and she's remained a fierce advocate on the
cause as well. And I'd like to thank other
advocates, including The Black Institute, for being a
strong partner in this fight. So I'm proud to work
with my colleagues in government and I'm proud to see
this legislation get voted on today.

As chair of the Women's Issues Committee and Co-Chair of the Women's Caucus, I am elated that six bills will report on stats and foster new prospects. For far too long we have been a city that has put the priorities of women and minority womenowned businesses out of the spotlight and as I have stated earlier, when we talk about minority and women-owned businesses, we as a people of color continue to refer to ourselves as minority and womenowned businesses, which in fact justifies why we receive a minority share of the resources. "Minorities and women" are actually the majority of the City of New York and need to see themselves as such in order to justify why we should be receiving the majority of New York City procurement opportunities.

Today we will unlock the power of data to spur advancement across our city to improve the

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quality of services, programs and opportunities made possible by our City agencies and partners, such as the NYC Economic Development Corporation. Currently "minority and women-owned" businesses only comprise 4.6% of procurement opportunities in the City of New York. I'll repeat that again -- 4.6%, which results in about \$751 million, whereas spending for non MWBEs or I should say minority, is \$15.94 billion, the equivalent of 95.4%. This is a dynamic that is ravishing our communities, explains a great deal of the unemployment in our neighborhoods and causes so many of the issues that we see in equality, all the way from small businesses to our schools and procurement opportunities.

Popa and Matt Gewolb for their leadership and tireless support throughout this process. I also want to thank Bertha Lewis and The Black Institute for their continued advocacy on this particular issue, but the opportunity to be able to create an advisory council is going to speak volumes; the opportunity to be able to have access and evaluate whether contractors receiving economic development benefits have fully complied with MWBE requirements

Int. 1019-A and 1020 not only make technical changes to the Mayor's Office of Contracts' (MOCS) reporting requirements that will present information on the number and total dollar value of contracts with MWBEs in a more useful manner, but will also require a more comprehensive explanation by MOCS of the determination made by the City's chief procurement officer whether or not to divide large contracts into smaller ones that would enhance competition for MWBEs and other bidders. The public deserves to know

whether bids and proposals are being formulated and

22 solicited in a fair manner for all of those who maybe

23 able to participate in the contracting process. I

believe these changes are important steps in ensuring

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that the City is accountable for meeting the

3 | objectives of the MWBE program.

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I would like to thank the administration for working with us on these proposals and commend them for the efforts they have undertaken on MWBE issues; the information we glean from this legislation will lay the groundwork for how we can and will do better by our minority and women-owned businesses.

I'd like to thank the sponsors of all of these pieces of legislation -- Council Members Cumbo, Crowley, Cohen and Public Advocate Tish James -- sorry, Cohen you're a different one; I take you out -- as well as committee staff. Eric Bernstein, the Committee Counsel, who has very quickly mastered the City's procurement rules and laws, and Casie Addison, our Policy Analyst who similarly has quickly learned from wading into the minutia and the details about all the procurement that happens in New York City; John Russell, Brendan West from the Finance Division and my Legislative Director, Sarah Mallory. At its essence, Boycott, Divest and Sanction Israel does not support Israel's right to exist and advocates for policies that would lead to the destruction of the State of Israel and as the hearing made abundantly clear, does not support a two-state solution; that is why we must take a stand as the home of the largest population of Jews outside the State of Israel and as the people who support the only true democracy in the Middle East and the United States' strongest ally in the region. I wanna thank the Speaker as a stalwart supporter of Israel, for her leadership and her personal support. I wanna thank Council Member Rosenthal for her hard work and shepherding this resolution to a very challenging I wanna thank all of the members of the hearing. Jewish Caucus and I wanna thank a super majority of the members of the City Council for co-sponsoring this resolution and I'm gonna yield my remaining 16 seconds.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Levine... I neglected to mention the fact that this is

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a voice vote and for those who wish to vote in the negative and/or abstain, you have to approach the desk; otherwise all members will be recorded in the affirmative. Council Member Levine.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you Madame Public Advocate.

You have a right to free speech and that includes the most hateful forms of speech; you have the right to boycott anyone and anything you want, but we also have a right and actually an obligation to denounce the kind of hateful attacks which are being leveled on people in this city who express any support for Israel. There are so many New Yorkers who whether because of ties of family or faith or ethnic identity or immigration or just their beliefs feel a connection to Israel, they feel affection for Israel and they are being targeted, often in the most hateful fashion. I refer you, as Exhibit A, to the report produced by CUNY just last week documenting a horrifying series of anti-Israel and anti-Semitic attacks on campuses here in our city. There are communities connected to every country on earth here in New York City, but only the community connected to Israel, not any of the other nations led by despots

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around the world, only the supporters of Israel are being targeted; that is unfair and I'm proud we're standing up against it. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you Madame

Public Advocate and my colleagues. As somebody who identifies as Jewish, who believes in the State of Israel as a national home for the Jewish people, who believes in a two-state solution with a secure Israel and in independent Palestine in Gaza and the West Bank, who respects our American tradition of protest and right to free speech, who believes in the right of all humans to live in peace, security and selfdetermination and who believes that peace in Israel and Palestine is achievable in our time, I was and am very conflicted about the City Council taking on perhaps the most impractical issue in the world. During the past few months I have also recalled the time, 21 years ago, when I was 14 years old, learning of the assassination of Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin one Sunday morning. I didn't know then why it was so important and so tragic, but in time I came to realize what Rabin's assassination, at the

deadly oppression of Palestinian people; it is

2 supported by and advanced by collaboration of Jews,

Muslims and Christians, along with other faiths.

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4 Just to jump to the end. Students have

traditionally been catalysts in social movement and should in no way be inhibited from participating in sensitive issues. BDS is not about religion or national origin, it doesn't call for [bell] boycotting Jews and thus is not anti-Semitic... I'll continue in the general discussion.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

Council Member Elizabeth Crowley.

COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: I believe that the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions Movement is simply an act of discrimination and that this discrimination goes beyond criticism of Israel's policies. Democracy is in place to root out discrimination and here in the New York City Council it is our job to do the same. Holding hearings and enacting reform geared towards enhancing opportunities and fairness. Furthermore, at a time when our national security is threatened, we must support our strongest allies and Israel is the only true democracy in the Middle East. We must feed on each other's strengths instead of adopting measures

Council Member Lander.

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COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: As a proud active, progressive Jew I feel deeply invested in

Israel, the history of our people returning after two millennia of exile and persecution to courageously build the Jewish homeland while also striving, as the Israel Declaration of Independence set out, for equality of social and political rights irrespective of race, religion and sex is a powerful inspiration to me, so I am forthrightly opposed to global BDS, which is incompatible with Israel's right to exist as a Jewish democratic state and pleased to be a cosponsor. I am proud this Council is expressing our strong opposition to BDS without supporting a blacklist, using the contracting power of the State to punish peaceful political expression goes against core American values and I'm grateful to the sponsors for amending the resolution to make it compatible with constitutional guarantees of freedom of expression. It's also important for me, like Council Member Levin, to make clear that many of the same values that lead me to oppose BDS also lead me to oppose the Israel occupation of the West Bank and Gaza; like Israelis, Palestinians have a right to self-determination and the protection of their [bell]

Even though this is a voice vote, I have a particular constituency I think deserves to hear my vote, why

I'm voting on this. Just from the outset, I do support a two-state solution and understand why the Jewish people should have a place, based on the

history, to call home. Also, most of my issues are
based on process; not substance; I do wanna say the
wording makes me uneasy, because I believe that in
saying we should not boycott and I am a huge
proponent of nonviolent resistance, but on process I
was I have an e-mail here where I was rejected from
being able to even draft a resolution on the Haitians
of Dominican descent; actually I can't say that I
wasn't a little relieved; I believe that it would be
very divisive here, it was the right decision and I
think we should continue that decision as well,
including this piece of the legislation and will be
abstaining.

Also I want to say, many of us took care during discussion, like the Community Safety Act and the Right to Know Act, to make sure we created a space [bell] where people could object without being called racist; I would ask that the same be done here.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Cornegy.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: As a former professional athlete and now as a Council Member, I spent time in Israel learning the culture and I've

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developed a good sense of the political climate. As

I vote that Israel should not be condemned, it should

not be overlooked, that we have a responsibility as

legislators to ensure that all people are treated

with equality and respect; we must call out these

injustices, yet in cases of Res 191 that denounced

discrimination and violence against Haitian people

and in the case of Boko Haram, where approximately

276 Nigerian girls were abducted and 219 still remain

missing, we failed to expand any political capital.

Today we are voting on an international issue where in the past we failed to do so for people of color, even domestically we've overlooked some human rights issues as highlighted by the Black Lives Matter movement. We as a body must be consistent in our advocacy and today it should be about equity. I call on this body to look at all issues of human rights, including those affecting people of color.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Reynoso.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: I will be abstaining; my abstention is in no way a declaration of support for the BDS movement; I support Israel's right to exist as a Jewish state and a two-state

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solution to the Israel-Palestinian conflict. I simply believe the New York City Council is not the appropriate authority to hear and address international-based policies and movements. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Greenfield.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank you. I'm proud to be voting yes on this anti-BDS resolution today, it's far past time that New York City take a stand to the pernicious and vile BDS movement that has impacted so many people, especially our students on campus. It's also fitting that New York should take this stand, giving our status as the most diverse city on earth and also home to the greatest number of Jews outside of Israel. Jewish people have endured many attempts to destroy us over many thousands of years; some of those efforts have been explicit and brazen, while others have been subtle and devious; you don't have to be Jewish or even a staunch supporter of Israel to see that we must firmly reject the BDS movement. The movement is not merely the product of noble aims led astray by faulty [sic] reasoning; while I believe that some of

2	its supporters are good people who are just deeply
3	misguided, an examination of the rhetoric coming out
4	of the BDS leaders will see that it is deeply anti-

These tactics, BDS, historically have been successfully using major movements to end oppression, racism and suppression; the civil rights movement gained momentum and expanded through the famous Montgomery bus boycott. Today nations, educational institutions, high-profile entertainers and educated consumers are joining this effort to bring an end to the oppressive conditions that have allowed conditions to exist that have resulted in the deaths of innocent civilians including women and children, destruction of family lives, increased number of orphans, and loss of

Just wanted to speak to Int. 1269, which I'm cosponsoring with Council Member Miller, a bill that would allow community land trusts to enter into regulatory agreements with the Department of Housing Preservation and Development for the development of affordable housing. Currently the Department of Finance will not take affordability restrictions placed on a property into account when doing an assessment unless they are part of a regulatory agreement with HPD. So if this bill were to pass, HPD could form a regulatory agreement with a City land trust requiring that housing built on a land be kept affordable to certain income ranges. Department of Finance would then take these restrictions into account when assessing the property. In order to

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fully grown and flourish as a city we need to not only build affordable housing, but we must also increase opportunities for affordable homeownership; therefore we need to ensure that the administration and nonprofits have every tool at their disposal to accomplish this goal. COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank you Madame Public Advocate. With your permission I wanna do something a little bit radical here today; I'd like to actually read portions of the resolution so for those folks watching at home, they know exactly what it is that we're discussing; these are just portions.

Whereas as the Global BDS Movement targets Israel and only Israel, while ignoring the world's myriad despotic regimes. And whereas, Israel is far and away the most democratic and open society in the Middle East, with well-established rights for religious minorities, women and LGBT citizens that far exceed those of any other nation. Whereas the Global BDS Movement does not recognize the right of the Jewish people to national self-determination. And whereas, some of the BDS Movement supporters and leaders have trafficked an unacceptable anti-Semitic rhetoric, whereas both the Israelis and Palestinians have the right to live in a safe, secure state, free from fear and violence, with mutual recognition.

Whereas the Global BDS Movement does not support the
two-state solution, a goal which can only be reached
through direct negotiation between Israel and the
Palestinians. The resolution concludes and this
is really the critical part resolve that the
Council of the City of New York condemns all effort
to delegitimize the State of Israel and the Global
Movement to boycott, divest from and sanction its
government and people. I think it's important just
to be clear; we are not taking away anyone's First
Amendment rights. We in the Council have condemned
racism and bigotry and violence; all we are doing
today is simply condemning anti-Israel and anti-
Semitic activity; you still have I wanna be clear;
I'm not talking about any Council Member; I'm talking
about some of the activists and the positions that
we've heard, those activists still have the right to
be bigots and they still have the right if they so
choose to be anti-Israel and they still have the
right if they so choose to be anti-Semitic; all we're
saying as a Council today is that to those of you who
have those beliefs, we in the Council condemn you and
vour beliefs and vour actions. Thank vou.

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. And our last speaker, hopefully, is Council Member Rose.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: I was outraged to discover that Officer Daniel Pantaleo, who was on restricted duty and under investigation for civil rights and departmental violations, has received thousands of dollars in overtime pay, and thus [sic], I am relieved that this will be reviewed by NYPD, but I don't think that that is enough; otherwise, it can give ... it will give New Yorkers the impression that he is being inappropriately rewarded for abusing the public trust that we place in our police officers; this news about his overtime pay only underscores the need for the United States Department of Justice to conclude its two-year-long investigation into this case so that we can move forward toward justice. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Now to close, Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Madame
Public Advocate. I wanna just also thank my
colleagues always for the level of dialogue and
discussion that we have on issues that at times can
be and are extremely controversial. So I wanna first

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thank Debi for her words right now, because those are sentiments that I publicly expressed with regards to Pantaleo.

And on the issue of BDS, I know that and I knew that this was gonna be an issue that was gonna elicit some conversation on the floor. But I think I do wanna just take issue with this idea and concept that people have said that what we're voting on is something that is trying to curtail free speech; I think it's been indicated and the words on the resolution have been read that that is not what we are doing here, and I think words are very important, right; if you have a movement that philosophically is against the right for Israel to exist and its right to self-determination, then any action that is asked us to engaged in has as that premise, right; that Israel does not have the right to exist, and I think that is what we are discussing here and that is what is at the heart of the language of this resolution. And also there has been misconception about what the resolution does or doesn't do, right; it's not targeting any particular group or any particular faith; it is not shutting down dialogue or free speech and I think the comments of Council Member

Rosenthal and Torres speak to that. And yes, we do
have to have a conversation with regards to this
issue and this has been an ongoing conversation since
I've walked into the chambers with regards to whether
or not we are going to engage in conversations on
resolutions that have sort of international
implications, but even that, or foreign policy, even
that I might have an issue with with regards to this
particular issue. The movement is a global movement
that is asking us as individuals, as nations, as
cities to take action on certain things and so it's
not solely a foreign policy matter; it is something
that is being asked of us here in the present. So
really it is my sincere hope that in our lifetime we
do have a stable two-state solution which will allow
Israelis and Palestinians to live in peace together;
that the rights of each will be respected, and as
Council Member Greenfield said, the resolution
clearly states that both Israelis and Palestinians
have the right to live in safe and secure states,
free from fear and violence, with mutual recognition;
that is critical; I believe that it's possible and
that is why I will support this resolution.
