properties that are currently owned by Queens Library and are being used for the Mitchell-Linden and Rosedale Community Libraries in the City of New York and to sell these properties, transfer ownership to the City of New York.

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The Mitchell-Linden branch is located at the northeast corner of Union Street and 32nd Avenue in a five-story, mixed residential and community facility, condominium building known as the Sunrise Terrace Condominium. The library owns and occupies seven ground floor condominium units totaling 8,800 sq. ft. for use as the library there; the library has been operating at this site since 2012.

This community library had previously operated from a rental space two blocks away, but due to the extremely poor physical condition of the premises and the landlord's desire to redevelop the site, the library sought and decided to acquire the condominium units and relocate the Mitchell-Linden branch to the present site. The library's purchase of the condominium units was for \$3.5 million and it was approved by the library's board of trustees, with the stated express goal that the property would thereafter be sold to the City.

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The library's board of trustees consists of 19 voting trustees appointed alternately by the Mayor and the Queens Borough President and the Mayor, Speaker, Comptroller, Public Advocate, and Queens Borough President are all nonvoting ex officio members of the board as well.

The Mitchell-Linden branch is located in a densely populated Flushing neighborhood and is the eighth largest branch in the Queens Library system. It serves approximately 150,000 visitors a year and more than 12,000 people attend library programs at this location annually.

The Rosedale branch is located at the northeast corner of 243rd Street and 145th Avenue.

The 7,000 sq. ft. lot includes a 4,469 sq. ft. one-story building and the Rosedale branch has been operating at this site since 1962. The Rosedale branch hosts approximately 80,000 visitors a year and more than 5,400 people attend free library programs at that location annually.

Queens Library purchased the Rosedale property in 2012 as the result of provisions in the existing lease in effect at that time which gave the library a right of first refusal in the event the

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LANDMARKS, PUBLIC SITING AND MARITIME USES property owner decided to sell the property, and there was a 14-day option that had to be exercised in order for the library to purchase the property. owner put the property up for sale sometime around the beginning of 2012 and received an offer of \$800,000 for the property. In accordance with lease provisions, the library was given 14 days to decide whether to exercise its option to purchase the property at that price. Given the monetary benefits of exercising the option and in order to ensure the continued provision of critical library services in that community, the library's board of trustees voted and approved to exercise the option, again, with the expectation that the property would ultimately be sold to the City.

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The City's acquisition of these properties will facilitate the continued operation of these branches and enhance the ability of procuring city capital funding for needed renovations, maintenance and/or improvements. Currently there are 57 library branches that are City-owned out of the 62 that are in the library's portfolio. City ownership of the library branches is consistent with a 1907 agreement between Queens Library and the City, which

5	agreeing to administer the libraries in Queens and
6	the City agreeing to pay for the maintenance and
7	support of the libraries.

22	one, Middle Village, that the library is a title

LEWIS FINKELMAN: uhm it had been contemplated that Middle Village would be included with these two ULURP applications, but the funding was not available uhm for transferring that property to the City, so we were only able to go forward in conjunction with DCAS with these two properties. There are two locations where the library leases premises.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay.

LEWIS FINKELMAN: But otherwise, everything else is City-owned.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: So this now will enable you... So if I heard you correct, before you wouldn't have been able to really do capital improvements at the library because it wasn't under the City's...

LEWIS FINKELMAN: Well this will make it a lot easier, because it becomes the City's responsibility...

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Yep.

LEWIS FINKELMAN: to undertake capital improvements at the properties that it owns and that the City occupies.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: And how much would it cost to expand the Rosedale Library?

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LEWIS FINKELMAN: I really haven't looked at that; I'm really not in a position to answer that.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay. Alright, so I'll just say I'm thankful... thank you, Queens Library and our partners for certainly -- I mean this is a big deal for the Rosedale community, although it's a minor ULURP change in one sense, but it's a community that's really been looking and really utilizes the library as a community space and community center in one sense because there are no library... no other community spaces really in that community, so we look forward to working with our partners at Queens Library and DCAS to ensure that we can really make this library a state-of-the-art library one day. And believe we worked with... We did some minor capital improvements there, I think to the tune of around a million dollars around two years ago, but we know that that library is in desperate need of much more, 7,000 sq. ft. serving 80,000 people a year, it's still... you know, it's not enough space there for the community and it's a growing community at that, so we look forward to continuing

Member. I was actually at the community board hearing on this and they were unanimously in favor of it; in fact, they were somewhat frustrated that it had taken this long to finally get here and... so I appreciate that. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON KOO: Thank you. The other library, the Mitchell-Linden Library is in my district and I strongly support the transfer of the library to the City and it makes (inaudible) much easier and better. So I wanna thank all gentlemen for testifying today. Any questions from members?
