5	CHAIRPERSON ESPINAL: Good morning. My
6	name is Rafael Espinal; I'm the Chair of the Consumer
7	Affairs Committee. Thank you for being here today on
8	this snowy edition of the Committee on Consumer
9	Affairs. Today the Committee will hold a vote on
10	Proposed Int. 436-A, a local law to authorize a cure
11	period for certain item pricing violations.
12	According to a recent State Comptroller's
13	report, over 98% of firms in New York City qualify as
14	a small business. The Council and the Mayor are
15	committed to sound regulation that protects New
16	Yorkers on improving conditions for small businesses
17	in our city. In 2015, the Department of Consumer
18	Affairs surpassed its goal of reducing its annual
19	fine collection by \$5 million. These goals have been
20	accomplished through a reduction in fines collected
21	and legislation promoting business education,
22	providing additional resources and streamlining the
23	bureaucracy where practical.
24	One way we have managed to accomplish
25	these goals is by providing businesses with the

2	ability to cure violations. A curable violation
3	allows the business to respond to the violation by
4	taking corrective action within a prescribed
5	timeframe to avoid a fine. This approach applied for
6	violations that cause no immediate consumer harm,
7	lessens the punitive nature of the regulation,
8	improves business education and encourages
9	compliance.
10	At the first hearing on Int. 436, the
11	business community expressed support for fine
12	reduction efforts. The retail food industry also
13	argued that the wide use of computerized checkout
14	technology and price scanners have overtaken the need
15	for individual sticker prices on each item offered
16	for sale at a grocery store. However, DCA testified
17	that item pricing remains an important protection for
18	consumers, particularly seniors, those with limited
19	English proficiency and low-income communities.
20	Originally, Int. 436 would have allowed DCA to issue
21	a warning instead of a violation if less than five
22	stock-keeping units failed to comply with the City's
23	item pricing laws. However, at the previous hearing
24	on this bill DCA recommended curable violations for
25	first-time violators. The agency noted that such

1COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS52violations will still be considered first violations3and subsequent violations will be treated as4recidivist, subject to penalty and incentive5compliance.

Additionally, DCA testified that the 6 7 agency keeps manually of warnings issued, inspectors use handheld devices that do not provide on-the-spot 8 9 information regarding previous warnings. Based on DCA's feedback and the inability of inspectors to 10 11 keep track of warnings, Int. 436-A was amended. 12 Proposed Int. 436-A, as now amended, allows retail 13 stores to cure a first-time violation by submitting 14 satisfactory evidence within 30 days that corrective 15 action has been taken to cure the violation and the 16 cured retailer would not have to pay the fine.

17 Proposed Int. 436-A will preserve pricing 18 transparency for consumers and treat merchants acting 19 in good faith with fairness. I recommend a yes vote 20 from my colleagues. Mr. Clerk, please call the roll, 21 but before we do that, do any of my colleagues have 2.2 anything to say on the bill?
