CHAIRPERSON GIBSON: Good morning and welcome to the City Council. I am Council Member Vanessa Gibson of the Sixteenth District in the I welcome you to our hearing of the Committee on Public Safety. I want to thank all of my colleagues for being here, our Minority Leader Council Member Steve Matteo, Council Member James Vacca, Council Member Rory Lancman, Council Member Robert Cornegy and Council Member Chaim Deutsch. This morning we are voting on important legislation Proposed Intro 1280-B in relation to requiring the New York Police Department to share collision reports digitally. I want to thank Council Member Chaim Deutsch for his leadership in introducing this legislation because we know that public safety is paramount importance to our city, and while Vision Zero was announced three years ago, just last month we heard at a joint hearing between the Committee on Public Safety and the Committee on Transportation the Administration along with the support of the Council continues to make progress towards reducing and elimination traffic fatalities by the year 2024. But as we all know, accidents do happen. This bill will

2 work to support the victims of car accidents by 3 making it easier for them to get the information they 4 need after the accident has occurred. Historically it's been difficult for many victims to obtain information following a crash. Requiring the Police 6 7 Department to make collision reports available 8 digitally is an important step towards making traffic crash reports more readily available to the public. This legislation will enable victims of accidents to 10 11 recover more quickly and simply move forward with their lives. Intro 1280-B will require the NYPD to 12 13 make automobile collision reports available online to 14 all interested parties. Collision reports will be 15 made available to people who are named on the report, 16 and will also provide their driver's license number, 17 date of birth, license plate number and license plate 18 of the state of issuance to the NYPD for preparation 19 Reports will be made available for a of the report. 20 single web portal located on the department's 21 website. Thank you once again to all of the members of the Public Safety Committee who are here. 2.2 2.3 Promoting public safety in our city also means supporting victims, and for this reason I hope you 24 will join me in voting favorably for this 25

2 legislation, which will require the Police Department

3 to make collision reports available digitally.

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COUNCIL MEMBER DEUTSCH: Thank you, Chair Gibson and members of the Public Safety Committee. This morning we are voting on Intro 1280-B, my bill that would codify into law access to collision reports due to NYPD's online system. Prior to the online system's launch in December, obtaining a copy of an accident report could often make a stressful situation even more aggravating. Those involved in a vehicle collision will need to physically go into the precinct to order-to coordinate through the officers in order to pick up a report. In today's age of technology, this online portal makes it easy and convenient for our constituents to obtain a copy of the accident report, which is often needed in order to file a claim. In addition, it frees up local officers at precincts who can instead focus on other matters. So I urge my colleagues to vote in support
