CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Good morning. name is David Greenfield, Council Member from the 44th Council District in Brooklyn. I'm privileged to serve as the chair of the Land Use Committee. I want to welcome my esteemed colleagues who are members of the committee and have joined us today. I want to recognize that we've been joined by Council Member Mendez, who is the first to arrive. Thank you, Council Member. Council Member Gentile, Council Member Garodnick, Council Member Koo, Council Member Lander, Council Member Rose, Council Member Williams, Council Member Richards, Council Member Cohen, Council Member Kallos, and Council Member Treyger. want to thank our subcommittee chairs as always for their work, Chair Richards, Chair Koo and Acting Chair Cohen. We have one item for a vote from the Zoning Subcommittee, LU 544 Bread & Tulips sidewalk café in Council Member Mendez's district. We will be voting on a motion to file LU 545, which is a zoning text amendment concerning the feeder sub-district of the Special Midtown District, which was withdrawn by the Administration yesterday. To remind everyone, this text amendment would have changed the rules

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governing the transfer of unused floor area from lifted feeders within the feeder sub-district. The proposal would increase the required payment into the Feeder Sub-District Fund from a fee per square foot of development rights transferred to a fee of 20% of the sale price for each development rights transaction including the concept of a floor price. This change would have roughly quadrupled the amount of money that would have gone into the Feeder Subdistrict Fund, which is used to support non-profit feeders and access to Broadway by communities from around New York City, and would have, in fact, conformed with the original intent of this legislation. Unfortunately, despite working diligently over the last several months and weeks to make a good proposal even better, the proposal was withdrawn by the Administration. I know that Council Member Johnson and Garodnick believe that this outcome represents a missed opportunity to ensure our non-profit feeder community has additional resources, and I certainly hope the Administration will address this needed revision to the contribution amounts soon. That being said, because the Administration has chosen to withdraw this application, we will be

voting on a motion to file this application. I recognize we've been joined by Council Member as

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Next, we'll be moving onto six landmarks designations that the Council will be voting on. The landmarking of these buildings located in Manhattan, Queens, Brooklyn and Staten Island is part of the Landmark Preservation's Backlog Initiative to resolve the status of 95 sites that were calendared but never designated. Of course, this initiative coincided with the legislation that was introduced by Council Member Koo and myself, Intro 775-A. This legislation actually does several things. First, it required the Landmarks Preservation Commission to finally go through the backlog and we certainly appreciate the cooperation of the Landmarks Preservation Commission. I certainly would like to recognize the work of the Chair Meenakshi Srinivasan, and at the same time the Koo/Greenfield legislation Intro 775-A makes sure that there will never be a backlog again. From hereon in it is now a requirement that items actually get settled on within one year on individual items and two years on districts. In fact, one of these items actually had a hearing, believe it or not, and

[laughter] That being said [laughs] that being said, we are certainly pleased that as a result of the Good Government effort that Council Member and Chair Koo and myself that we're finally able to resolve this through Intro 775-A, and we're so happy Chair Koo and myself that we can contribute to the landmarking of so many buildings in New York City that under our leadership we have landmarked more properties than anyone else in the history of the New York City Council.

So the first item is LU 574, which is 183 to 194 Broadway in Council Member Reynoso's district in Williamsburg, Brooklyn.

The second item is LU 575, St. Barbara's Roman Catholic Church located at 138 Bleecker Street

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in Council Member Espinal's district in Bushwick,
Brooklyn.

The third item is LU 576, the Excelsion

Steam Power Company building located at 33-43 Gold

Street in Council Member Chin's district in Brooklyn.

I want to recognize that we've been joined by Council

Member Rodriguez as well.

The fourth item is LU 577, the Bergdorf

Good man Building located at 74--754 Fifth Avenue

also known to locals as 2 West 58th Street in Council

Member Garodnick's district in Manhattan

The fifth item is the famed LU 578, a wood frame house located at 412 East 85th Street in Council Member Kallos' district in Manhattan. It's been waiting 50 years for its vote.

The sixth item is LU 583, the Brougham

Cottage located at 4746 Amboy Road in Council Member

Borelli's district in Staten Island. All of the

members support these respective applications in

their districts. I want to recognize that we've been
