2	CHAIRPERSON CONSTANTINIDES: Good
3	afternoon, I am Costa Constantinides, Chair of the
4	Environmental Protection Committee and today the
5	Committee will hold a hearing a vote on proposed
6	Intro 1198-A, a local law in relation to flood
7	mitigation in southeast Queens. The prime sponsor of
8	the bill is Council Member Donovan Richards who is
9	also a member of this Committee. I would like to
10	recognize also that Council Member Eric Ulrich from
11	Queens is here as well. The Committee previously
12	held a hearing on this bill on January 23, 2017.
13	There is a chronic long-standing flooding problem in
14	southeast Queens dating back more than 40 years and
15	affecting over 400,000 city residents. The area has
16	more 311 flooding and confirmed sewer back-up
17	complaints that any other area of the city in certair
18	neighborhoods including Rosedale, Springfield
19	Gardens, St. Albans, Jamaica, Queens Village and the
20	Rockaways experience recurring flooding conditions.
21	In these neighborhoods when it rains, the water
22	floods streets, buildings, businesses and homes. The
23	factors contributing to the extraordinary flooding
24	problem in southeast Queens include a post World War
25	II commercial and residential development that

belts and green infrastructure. In March of 016,

during a preliminary budget held by this Committee, the Department committed to spend \$1.5 billion on measures to reduce flooding in southeast Queens by pairing traditional sewer construction with green infrastructure throughout the region. Southeast Queens communities have struggled with flooding and sewer back-ups in homes and businesses for decades with little relief. The Mayor's plan is designed to finally bring some relief to these flood burdened communities and I would like to recommend a yes vote on this legislation. At this moment I would like to also recognize Council Member Rory Lancman, also from Queens, has joined us. I will turn it over to our Committee Member Donovan Richards for his statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Thank you, Mr.

Chairman, and I want to thank you for your steadfast

leadership and continuing the work that we started

many years ago it seems like now but I really, truly

appreciate your partnership in ensuring that this is

moving forward and that many of the infrastructure

projects that we are seeing in southeast Queens are

still happening. I am proud to be here today to cast

a vote, of course, in favor of Bill Intro 1198. For

decades, residents of southeast Queens have lived

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 2 with the fact that a slight rain could end in their 3 home being flooded but in 2015 a historic ten-year 4 plan by Mayor de Blasio committed \$1.5 billion, 5 actually it is looking like closer to 1.7 billion now, to build-out a sewer system that never caught up 6 7 with the population growth in the area. Let me be 8 clear. In certain parts of our neighborhoods, I don't understand how homes were built and how buildings were built without any infrastructure being 10 11 put in place at the time of these buildings in the 12 first place. It seems to me that when you build 13 things you should put storm sewers. It should just 14 be a natural thing that comes with any growth in the 15 community. Homeowners have been forced to swallow flooded lawns and streets and basements because 16 17 proper drainage was never built-out for our 18 communities. With the administration's help, finally 19 we are starting to address many of these ignored 20 Thankfully, this administration has answered 21 the call and come up with some tangible solutions. 2.2 However, even though we trust, we believe in 2.3 verifying and we believe that transparency and accountability is a key in ensuring that this plan is 24

even more a success. Now, no plan will provide

their status whenever they like instead of calling

I would like to send a special thank you to Former DEP Commissioner Emily Lloyd who really came back and got this ball rolling. She said Donovan, she said Costa, we are really are gonna see this through and she really helped us to reach this moment. Also want to thank, of course, Mayor de Blasio. I just want to say after 15 years this bill will sunset so I will be around 49. God willing, whoever the council member is at the time, will not have to deal with this but certainly we hope that they will make sure that after 15 years that all of this work is done and if not this bill should certainly be looked at again and amended. With that being said, I want to thank everybody, all my colleagues, Council Member Lancman, everyone who has really been supportive of these
