CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Good morning everyone. I now call this [gavel] meeting of State and Federal Legislation to order. Today we are going to vote on Preconsidered SLRs: S.6488/A.7406; A.7464; S.5088/A.6663; S.6460/A.8055, the Senate and Assembly bills.

Good morning and welcome to today's hearing and vote. My name is Karen Koslowitz and I am the Chairwoman of the State and Federal Legislation Committee. On today's agenda we will be consider four State Legislative Resolutions and one Preconsidered Resolution calling upon the New York State Legislature to amend the State Education Law to extend provisions related to mayoral control for two years.

First I would like to introduce the members of my committee that are present at this time. To my right is Council Member Ben Kallos, to my left is Council Member Alan Maisel and Council Member Brad Lander, and to my Committee Legislative Counsel, Carlos Beato.

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The first State Legislative Resolution this committee will be considering and voting on today is Senate Bill S.6488 and Assembly Bill A.7406, and act to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to a tax on the transfer of certain real property within three years of the prior transfer of such property. The purpose of this bill is to prevent the flipping of property in distressed communities.

The second State Legislative Resolution is Assembly Bill A.7464, an act to amend the Tax Law of the Administrative Code of the City of New York, Chapter 877 of the Laws of 1975, Chapter 884 of the Laws of 1975, and Chapter 882 of the Laws of 1977 relating to the imposition of certain taxes in the City of New York in relation to postponing the expiration of certain tax rates in the City of New York. These taxes generate more than \$7 billion in revenue.

The third State Legislative Resolution is Senate Bill S.5088 and Assembly Bill A.6663, an act to amend Chapter 130 of the Laws of 1998 amending the General Municipal Law relating to temporary investments by local governments in relation to

COMMITTEE ON STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATION 5 extending the expiration of the provisions thereof. This bill extends the authority for the City to continue to make investments in prudent [sic] financial instruments.

The final State Legislative Resolution is Senate Bill S.6460 and Assembly Bill A.8055, an act to amend the retirement and social security law in relation to the definition of additional member contributions and basic member contributions for certain New York City employees' retirement system members who are subject to certain retirement plans under Articles 14 and 15 of the retirement and social security law. This bill cures a technical issue for our NYCERS members by letting them use a surplus in one of their accounts to offset a deficit in another account without having to undergo a long bureaucratic and expensive process.

Finally, we have a Preconsidered

Resolution calling upon the New York State

Legislature to amend the State Education Law to

extend provisions related to mayoral control for two

years. We have had mayoral control since 2002 and it

has proven to be effective. This body is calling for

Bill 6488 and Assembly Bill A.7406, introduced by

COMMITTEE ON STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATION Assemblyman Erik Dilan in the State Assembly to bring in a flip tax here in the City of New York, and what that flip tax would do is apply an extra tax on people buying property and selling it within three years, and what this bill is looking to do is actually discourage from investors coming into neighborhoods like East New York, that was recently rezoned, and buying homes, doing repairs and then selling them at a much higher price. If this flip tax is incorporated, then that means that they will lose a lot more money on that investment and this will protect really the integrity of our communities, it'll protect current homeowners, it will protect the character of our neighborhood and really make sure that people will have the opportunity to buy homes at a fair price and not be subject to the prices that speculators decide to put on those homes. So I just wanna say, this is a great Home Rule, this is a great bill up in the State and I proudly vote aye on that bill and all other bills being considered. you.
