8	afternoon and welcome to today's Finance Committee
9	meeting. My name is Julissa Ferreras-Copeland; I'm
10	the chair of the Committee. I want to begin by
11	welcoming my colleagues that have joined us this
12	afternoon Council Members Cumbo, Matteo,
13	Rodriguez, Miller, Cornegy, Levine, and Majority
14	Leader Van Bramer. Today the Finance Committee will
15	take the necessary actions to allow the City Council
16	to adopt the Fiscal 2018 Budget which totals
17	approximately \$85.2 billion. The Committee will vot
18	on 18 budget-related items, along with three land us
19	items.
20	Before we being, there are many people to
21	thank who helped take us to today's budget adoption,
22	so please be patient.
23	Today is a bittersweet day for me; as

this will be my final budget as a member of the

Council. The opportunity to serve my district here

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has been a true privilege; my experience has only been enhanced by the remarkable individuals that I've been able to work alongside these past few years.

First and foremost, our Speaker... shhhhh... our Speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito; the Speaker has been a tireless advocate for the people of the City and a fearless leader for the members of this Throughout the past four budget cycles she Council. has listened to the concerns and priorities of each of us and our constituents and has approached budget negotiations with clear purpose of ensuring that the Council's vision for the City is reflected in each budget. Because of her leadership more young people than ever before can get summer and year-round jobs, more immigrants have access to education, health, and legal services, more police officers keep our city safe, and more students have access to affordable, healthy school meals. This year's budget delivers even more victories for New Yorkers and I believe the Speaker can be proud of what she has delivered in her final budget.

I also want to thank the Speaker's Chief of Staff, Ramon Martinez [cheer] for all of his work

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on behalf of this institution and for all of us as members.

Thank you to my fellow Finance Committee members for their partnership over the last three years and a half; they are: the Majority Leader Van Bramer, Minority Leader Steve Matteo, the Council Members Corey Johnson, Helen Rosenthal, I. Daneek Miller, Laurie Cumbo, Mark Levine, Robert Cornegy, Vanessa Gibson, and Ydanis Rodriguez.

This year the Committee heard nearly 100 hours of testimony from agency heads about their operations and goals for the upcoming fiscal year and questioned each of them thoroughly. We also heard the vital testimony of our public. Throughout this process we shared the information we obtained from these hearings with our colleagues, which helped inform the creation of a budget that reflects the Council's priorities. Thanks to each of you for being my partner throughout these past four budgets and I will miss working with each and every one of you.

And of course, I must express my enormous gratitude to our dedicated and talented Finance staff. This begins with Latonia McKinney, our

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amazing Finance Director. One of the things that I'm
most proud of about my tenure as Finance Chair is
that for the first time the Council was represented
by three women in the City's budget process and
negotiations. [cheer] Latonia, you have been a
fantastic leader, negotiator, advocate, friend, and
just a fierce woman overall. Thank you. [cheers,
clapping] All all 51 of us know that none of the
budget successes we have achieve would have been
possible without the committed effort that you and
your staff have put; it has been a pleasure working
with you.

I also want to thank the staff of the
Finance Division individually, each of you has played
an essential role in bringing us to today's adoption,
and I thank you for the long hours you have worked on
this budget, responding to Council Members' requests
-- the many, many Council Member requests -- and
questions, and guiding the delegations and B and T

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of several months of hearings, negotiation and advocacy from New Yorkers across the five boroughs; it reflects the Council's vision for a budget that strengthens our community and plans responsibility for changes that may lie ahead. These wins will benefit the people of the City through the programs and services we fought to include, along with additional long-term budget stabilization measures that allow New Yorkers to be confident that the City

is prepared in the event of an economic downturn.

This year we entered budget negotiations aware that the new political climate in Washington threatens many of the program services and freedoms that New Yorkers hold dear. The Council was determined that the final budget would demonstrate our support for our city's diverse communities, invest in the most vulnerable among us, and budget prudently to guard against economic risks. I feel strongly that we have negotiated a budget that accomplished these goals and incorporates many of the Council's signature priorities for the coming fiscal year. I want to highlight a few items in particular.

2	First, the Council has repeatedly made
3	youth jobs a top priority, believing that our city's
4	young people can grow to their maximum potential I
5	mean they could become Finance Chairs if you are an
6	SYEP participant if given the right opportunities.
7	The Fiscal 2018 Budget continues our unprecedented
8	investment in youth jobs by adding an additional
9	\$9 million to provide a record 70,000 summer jobs,
10	along with \$20 million to provide an additional 6500
11	year-round jobs. The budget also includes \$60
12	million for COMPASS programs, supporting after school
13	youth programming; in addition, this budget includes,
14	among other priorities: \$12.5 million to expand the
15	Universal Lunch Program and provide breakfast in the
16	classrooms for all elementary school students and
17	expansion to the Veterans Tax Exemption that will
18	provide hundreds of dollars in savings per veteran on
19	their tax bill; \$28.89 million baselined funding for
20	senior services; \$17.6 million for indirect contract
21	rate increases for our human services providers,
22	among \$12.7 million for model contracts in ACS
23	Runaway Homeless Youth and Adult Protective Services;
24	\$110 million in increased capital funding for
25	libraries, and \$7.2 million to expand the Emergency

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Food Assistance Program, and \$4 million to provide a second pair of boots to our brave firefighters who keep us safe each and every day.

Furthermore, we have boosted many Council investments in essential programs and services including immigrant services, with \$10 million -- I'm gonna give you guys the biggest gift -- I'm gonna skip a couple pages, 'cause... [background comments] why not; I'm the Finance Chair; we're gonna move on. [background comment] Yes, I'm sure you want to hear all of it.

With that said; [laughter] I will turn now to the items that the Finance Committee will vote on that will actually make these accomplishments a reality. I'm going to be reading all of this again on the floor, so I just want to take this opportunity for us to really acknowledge the amazing Finance team, so please let's give them a very, very big round of applause.

[applause, cheers]

Finance Committee members should have a budget packet that contains all budget-related legislation that must be voted on by the Committee and again by the Full Council at the Stated Meeting.

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The packet also includes supporting schedules that are not voted on but filed with the Committee, as well as other non-budget-related items that are being voted on today.

I want to strongly emphasize that the Finance Committee members will be given only one budget packet, so please do not distribute. After you vote on the packet items you must bring your packet and all of its contents to the Stated Meeting to vote it out again. Council Members who are not on the Finance Committee will be given their budget packets at the Stated Meeting.

Our Committee Counsel emailed a description of all the items to you, so I will simply list the items that are on the agenda today that require a vote.

First item is Reso A Capital Budget; 2nd item is Reso B Capital Budget, which is the capital budget as amended by Reso A; the 3rd item is the resolution adopting the contract budget; the 4th item is the resolu... well there's only 85 items, you all... the 4th item is the resolution adopting the expense and the revenue budget; the 5th item is the resolution to improve the amendment to the five-year

Education Capital Plan; the 6th item is the ten-year
capital budget strategy; the 7th item is the
resolution approving the 44th year of a community
development program and the 43rd year reallocation;
the 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th item is a
partridge in a pear tree are resolutions approving
the discount rate, interest rates and nonpayment of
the property taxes and the interest rates for
nonpayments of water and sewer rent; the 13th, 14th
and 15th items are the three property tax
resolutions; the 16th item is the resolution
approving an expense budget modification; the 17th
item is a resolution approving a revenue budget
modification; 18th item is a transparency resolution;
and the 19th through 21st items are the land use
items and other documents in your package which are
not required separate votes are. [sic]

A list of the terms and conditions
adopted by Fiscal 2018 Schedule C and Borough
Presidents' proposed changes. As a reminder to
members, Schedule C is a schedule of the expense,
revenue and contract budget and the appropriations
for the organizations listed in Schedule C are in the
expense, revenue and contract budget. We do not vote

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on Schedule C separately. Council Members will have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether a conflict exists with any of the groups listed in Schedule C or Reso A. If any Council Member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the organizations included, he or she has the opportunity to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. If you have not yet signed the disclosure form, staff from the General Counsel's Office is here in the Committee Room to guide you through the process, so please see one of them before you vote.

As a further reminder, please disclose any conflict you may have with a proposed subcontractor used by any organization sponsor.

These disclosures must be made before the subcontract can be approved. As I mentioned, the staff from the General Counsel's Office is here if you have any questions.

In addition to the budget we will also be voting today on a transparency resolution that sets forth the new designation and changes in designation of certain organizations receiving local aging and youth discretionary funding and funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. Organizations

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appearing in the resolutions that have not yet completed the pre-qualification process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contracts, the Council or any other entity are identified in the attached chart with an asterisk (*).

As with all transparency resolutions,

Council Members will have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not a conflict exists with any of the groups on the attached list. If any Council Member has a potential conflict of interest with any of the organizations listed, he or she has the opportunity to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. As a reminder, please disclose any conflict you may have with proposed subcontracts used by organizations sponsored by discretionary funding. These disclosures must be made before the subcontractor can be approved. Rohan from the General Counsel's Office is here and other members of the General Counsel.

Finally, the Committee will be voting on three land use items. The 1st resolution would provide a partial 40-year Article XI tax exemption to support the construction of 45 units of low-income rental housing in Speaker Mark-Viverito's district in

the Bronx. The Speaker has expressed support of this resolution.

The 2nd item concerns the 140-26 Franklin Avenue apartments located in Council Member Koo's district in Queens. This resolution would provide a partial 40-year Article XI tax exemption for the preservation of 54 units of housing for middle-income families. Council Member Koo supports this resolution.

And the final resolution would provide a partial 40-year Article V tax exemption for Sutter Gardens apartments in Council Member Barron's district in Brooklyn. This exemption would preserve 259 units of low-income rental housing. Council Member Barron also supports this resolution.

Before we go to a vote, do any members have any questions on these or any other items?
