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us to recognize the passing late last month of FDNY Officer Ray Pfeifer. Officer Pfeifer retired from Engine 40, Ladder 35 in 2014 after serving the City of New York for nearly 28 years, including as a member of the response team on 9/11 and in the months following. Officer Pfeifer was a tireless advocate for the passing of the Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act, which works to protect and provide for first responders like himself who suffered and continued to suffer from the ill health effects of having working on-site at Ground Zero. We thank Officer Pfeifer for his years of service and our thoughts are with his family at this time, so I would like to us to join in a moment of silence.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you, my colleagues.

So today hopefully will be a fairly short Stated Meeting as we review one item of legislation and several resolutions regarding home rules and happenings at the state level.

As our legislative calendar ends next
Wednesday, we are moving to provide our partners in
the state government with an opportunity to pass
these bills in a timely manner.

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Council Member Danny Dromm, which would require the results of school cafeteria inspections to be posted online on the Department of Education website. This is the one piece of legislation that we will be considering today. So these inspections would be posted online on the Department of Education website for public schools or the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene website for private schools. Council Member Dromm, who also chairs our Education Committee, is the lead sponsor of this bill and he will say a few words.

much, Madam Speaker, and I deeply appreciate all the work that you've done to move this legislation quickly and swiftly. This legislation would provide information, vitally important information to parents about the quality of the food and the conditions of the school cafeterias. As the number one prepared food vendor in the City of New York, the Department of Education should be required to present parents with information about the conditions in those school cafeterias. And I am also pleased that we are moving this legislation here in our City Council and where

2 we have a say in what happens in our New York City

3 Department of Education as opposed to having

4 outsiders come in and tell us how to run our schools

5 or how to inspect our cafeterias, or what information

6 our parents should have about the conditions of those

7 cafeterias.

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So again, I am thankful to you, I'm thankful to Chair Corey Johnson as well for passing this legislation and to the members of the Committee [background comment] and I look forward to the passage of this legislation today so that the parents may know the condition of school cafeterias. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Member. And next the Council will vote on six state legislation resolutions and one communication from the Mayor.

State Legislation Resolution 0005-17
requests the New York State Legislature to pass bills
introduced by State Senator Martin Golden and State
Assembly Member Herman Farrell, an act to amend the
real property tax law, in relation to the
determination of adjusted base proportions in special
assessing units which are cities for the fiscal year

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The effect of this change will be to reduce the amount by which the current base proportions for any class is allowed to grow.

State Legislation Resolution 0006-17 requests the State Legislature o pass bills introduced by State Senator Golden, State Assembly Member Abate, an act to amend the administrative code of the City of New York, in relation to providing awards to spouses of emergency medical technicians and advanced emergency medical technicians who are killed while engaged in the discharge of duty. bill would create a death benefit for the surviving spouses of EMTs employed by the FDNY who are killed while engaged in the performance of their duties.

State Legislation Resolution 0007-17 requests the State Legislature to pass bills introduced by Senator Golden and Assembly Member DenDekker, an act to amend the retirement and social security law and the general municipal law, in relation to pension benefits of widows or widowers of sanitation workers. This bill would make the widows and widowers of sanitation workers who are killed in the line of duty due to accidents eligible to receive

2 accidental death benefits as are afforded to the 3 surviving spouses of other uniformed services.

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State Legislation Resolution 0008-17 requests the State Legislature to pass bills introduced in the Senate and in the Assembly, an act authorizing the City of New York to discontinue parkland for the purpose of construction -- give me one second -- [background comment] okay, got it; sorry -- an act authorizing the City of New York to discontinue parkland for the purpose of construction and operation of a pre-kindergarten center with a focus on instruction in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. This legislation will provide New York City the authority to discontinue the use as parkland of certain parkland in Flushing Meadow Park in order to permit the construction of a new pre-K facility in the proximity of the New York Hall of Science.

State Legislation Resolution 0009-17
requests the State Legislature to pass bills
introduced by State Senator Jose Serrano and Assembly
Member Latoya Joyner, an act to authorize the City of
New York to discontinue the use as parkland of a
portion of Corporal Fischer Park in the borough of

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housing.

the Bronx and to sell and convey such land upon terms
and conditions to facilitate the construction of
affordable housing. This legislation will provide
New York City the authority to discontinue the use as
parkland of Corporal Fischer Park in the Bronx for
the purposes of creating a housing complex where 100%

of the units will be classified as affordable

requests the State Legislature to pass bills introduced by State Senator Serrano and State

Assembly Member Benedetto, an act in relation to authorizing discontinuance of the use as parkland of land in the City of New York commonly known as Marx

Brothers playground — this is actually in my district. This legislation will provide New York

City the authority to discontinue the use as parkland of Marx Brothers playground and to transfer such land to the New York City Educational Construction Fund to permit the construction of a combined occupancy structure that will include several schools, and the parkland will be replaced.

Finally, the Council will vote on Mayor's Message 0520-17, requesting the State Legislature to

pass bills introduced in the State Senate and in the
Assembly which relate to amending several laws in
order to allow for the expansion of the school speed
safety cameras program. Seeing this legislation pass
is a vital public safety measure. Speed cameras make
our streets safer and help save lives. Over the next
three years installing 150 more speed cameras along
school zones throughout the city will protect
drivers, shield pedestrians and safeguard young
people from the dangers of unchecked speed. From
lowering speed limits to spearheading critical Vision
Zero legislation, this Council has made strengthening
street safety a top priority. I am proud of this
resolution; I really want to thank the leadership of
my colleagues; in particular, our chair of
Transportation, Ydanis Rodriguez and our Majority
Leader, Jimmy Van Bramer, who is sponsoring this
resolution; really proud of everyone in this Council
for championing our successful efforts by working to
bring more oversight to the streets of New York City
through the installation of additional cameras.

And secondly, I would like to say that we know this is about getting people to slow down because not only will there be a speed camera; there will also be a sign placed in front of the camera well in advance to tell people that there's a speed camera. If this were some sort of hoax to raise money for the City, why would they put up a sign saying slow down? And I would like to add that to those who are listening to the noise out there

My prayers are with the victims' families and many people are going to portray this as some of us who are voting against don't care and that's just absolutely not true. I don't think that occurred here, and I hope the Mayor in the future does a better job of engaging this Council with what's going on in this entire city and has a better discussion. I abstain on M 0520 and aye on all the rest.

Nightlife in New York City has been under attack for a very long time, to the point where we're really losing the cultural capital that has created, for New York City, you know everyone who looked at New York sees it as a city that never sleeps because of all the bars and the music venues and all of the artists that came out of this city and they feel that the City has been imposing a lot of

legislation and a lot of rules that have been onerous
on their businesses, which is why I am introducing
Intro. I am very excited to introduce this bill; it
will create the Office of a Night Mayor; not
nightmare, Night Mayor and the Night Mayor will be an
office that will be solely in charge of working with
the communities, working with the night venues and
working with the City in finding ways where we all
can co-exist without putting a burden on the cultural
institutions that we have in our city. This is
something that I've been working on for over a year
and I hope there will be a time where we can talk
about what really makes this city breathe and it's
the nightlife venues in our city. So I really ask
all my colleagues to please sign on to Intro 1648 in
order for New York City to be the city that it has
been for decades. We have to step up and do
something to protect our night venues, and you know,
it's something that I'm very, very proud of,
introducing something that is very personal to me,
you know, is place where I spent a lot of my time,
being someone who's very introverted, these spaces
gave me an opportunity to express myself in ways that
T haven't been able to and we have a lot of New

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Yorkers who feel the same exact way and they are counting on the support from our city to keep these venues alive. Thank you.

ACTING PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE: Thank you Council Member Espinal. Any others for general discussion? [background comment] Council Member Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: wanna call my colleagues' attention to Preconsidered Reso 1559, which calls on the State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign [background comments] Assembly Bill 6811; Senate Bill 5120, an act to establish a private student loan refinance task force, and this task force would bring together the State Comptroller, the Higher Education Service Corporation and private lending institutions in New York State to study and report the ways in which those lending institutions can be incentivized to create student loan refinancing programs. The rising costs of college education and the rising debt that students have incurred is continuing to rise, from 2009 to 2014 the federal rate has more than doubled; in New York State the student loan debt has more than doubled between 2006 and 2015. So in light of this

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worse -- one of them that got postponed is to make it easier to access silencers -- I do not understand what part of the Second Amendment means that you have to have a silencer on your gun; it is going from bad to worse; the time to act is now. We are the City Council; we are very good on these issues; my hope is that the rest of the country will catch up to us very soon.

Obviously we all know that violence in any type is unacceptable and the issue of gun violence continues to be pervasive and an epidemic and we need to do something about it.
