5	CHAIRPERSON CONSTANTINIDES: Good
6	afternoon. I am Costa Constantinides, chair of the
7	Environmental Protection Committee and today the
8	Committee will hear and vote on Intro 1503-B, a local
9	law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of
10	New York in relation to exemptions from air
11	conditioning prohibition.
12	I want to recognize we're joined today by
13	Council Members from Queens, both members of the
14	Committee, Council Members Rory Lancman and Eric
15	Ulrich.
16	In October of 2015, the City enacted
17	Local Law 92 in relation to the use of air
18	conditioning systems. The law expanded to small
19	stores, retail and hotel establishments under 4,000
20	sq. ft. the prohibition against propping open outside
21	doors and windows while air conditioners or a central
22	cooling system is operating. We also at that time
23	exempted those restaurants with sidewalk cafés,
24	because it was part and parcel to their business to
25	be connected to the outside world. There is the

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 4 2 argument that the industry continues to have French 3 doors, those that are ineligible for sidewalk cafés but do have fresco dining French doors that are also 4 5 often built at substantial cost to restaurants who made this investment or it's employing men and women 6 7 in our communities and that it's a significant 8 selling point that allows them to continue to keep 9 their doors open literally to continue to make money and employ those people in our communities. 10

11 And furthermore, unlike the case of the 12 store that props open its exterior windows or doors and run the air conditioner to blow cool air and 13 attract customers in, the windows and doors at these 14 15 restaurants are usually integral to the dining 16 experience at hand. Intro 1503-B would clarify that 17 the prohibition against keeping the doors of 18 commercial [inaudible] open when the air conditioning 19 is on would not apply to most restaurants. This 20 local law would effectively create an exemption to 21 the requirement that keeps stores' exterior windows and doors closed while air conditioning is operating. 2.2 23 The exemption is for windows and doors that connect indoor seating areas where food and beverages are 24 served to the outside. The bill would take effect 25

This bill in no way 3 weakens the requirement that retail stores keep their 4 front doors closed while air conditioning is on, but 5 supports our local restaurants that do not seek to flout the law, only to continue to exist in the 6 7 communities in the way that they have already invested. This local law seeks to save fuel by 8 9 preventing a waste of fuel that otherwise occur when air conditioning cannot possibly cool the entire 10 11 outdoors while at the same time not unduly burdening 12 restaurants that have invested significant resources 13 to comply with the existing local law by creating 14 French doors when sidewalk dining permits are 15 unavailable. I am voting in favor of this law and recommend a yes vote to the Committee. 16 17 COMMITTEE CLERK: Good afternoon. This 18 is the Committee on Environmental protection; today 19 is June 20, 2017; we'll be voting on Intro 1503-B and a Preconsidered Resolution related to the New York 20 State Environmental Quality Review Act.
